Clarendon Judging Teams Win In Tech Contests

Future Farmer Judging Teams from the Clarendon Chapter were among the top winners in the Annual Texas Tech Judging Contests, Saturday, April 26th at Lubbock. Approximately 2,000 boys from 150 schools participated in the annual event. Clarendon's dairy products team ranked 1st, the livestock team 3rd, and the dairy cattle team 7th in the Area Contest.

Gus Havens, Ronnie Tyra, and Jerry Allen placed 1st, 2nd, and 9th in individual ranking in the dairy products event. Tommy Messer and James Kay were alternates on the products team. Bobby Longin ranked first among the 411 individuals in the livestock judging event in which his team placed 3rd. Sammy Wells and Carl Talley were other livestock team members.

The dairy cattle team that placed seventh was composed of J. R. Graham, Milton Mann, and Pat Roberson. The poultry team made up of Howard Talley, Larry King and Gary Longan did not place in team rankings. Lynn Spier, James McAnear, Cody McAnear, and Jerry Hicks, were alternates on the poultry team.

The dairy products, dairy cattle, and livestock teams qualified for the state contests to be held at College Station, Saturday, May 3rd. The local teams do not plan to participate in the state contests this year as J. R. Graham is the only senior on the teams and the youths will be eligible for the same contests over the state again next year if they do not participate in the state contests. Funds to make the trip are not available and the youths involved in the judging are all youths who exhibited at a number of shows and missed a good deal of school and they feel they should not miss further this year.

James Mahaffey Selected Star Farmer Of Greenbelt District

James Mahaffey, local chapter and Greenbelt District F.F.A. president, was selected at a district meeting of the Greenbelt District last week as the star lone star farmer of the district, the highest honor the district can bestow to one of its members. James is completing his fourth year of vocational agriculture and is a senior in Clarendon High School.

Mahaffey's supervised practice program has been outstanding in both the local chapter and on a state level. Crops, beef calves, and swine have been his chief projects. He exhibited at all the major livestock shows over the state and showed many champions at these leading events. Among his champions were the grand champion barrow at the 1956 Texas State Fair, grand champion and junior champion Duroc Jersey females at the 1957 Tri-State Fair, and the reserve champion barrow and pen of barrows at the 1956 Heart of Texas Fair at Waco. James has been a member of a number of judging teams representing the local chapter and was a member of the dairy cattle team that participated in the 1957 State Contest. He won the award last year as the most valuable member of the Vo-Ag III class. He was recently awarded the DeKalb Agricultural Award for the most valuable Senior F.F.A. member.

CORRECTION

In an article regarding fishing which appeared in the Leader last week we quoted one of our good neighbors being assessed a fine of \$27.50 for fishing with the wrong kind of equipment according to the new law which went into effect last Sept. 1st.

The fine was assessed in Justice of the Peace Court here but should have read \$10 fine plus court costs which amounted to \$17.50. According to Justice of the Peace G. A. Anderson, the \$10 fine was the minimum amount that could be assessed.

If you plan to do any fishing with winding equipment on a rod or pole, be sure to get your fishing license first, provided you are between the ages of 17 and 65. You are safe to use a cane pole and line, trot line or throw line here in your own county without a license.

Mrs. Dean was a graduate of Clarendon College, where she majored in music. She studied at the American Conservatory of Music at Chicago and did extensive graduate work in music.

She taught in the Hedley Public Schools and taught harmony and piano at the Clarendon College for three years. She did missionary work under the Methodist Board of missions in the Jaunesse colony at Terry, Texas from 1924 until her marriage. She taught piano in Plainview 22 years until her health failed in Sept. of 1957. She was organist at the First Methodist Church during the same years.

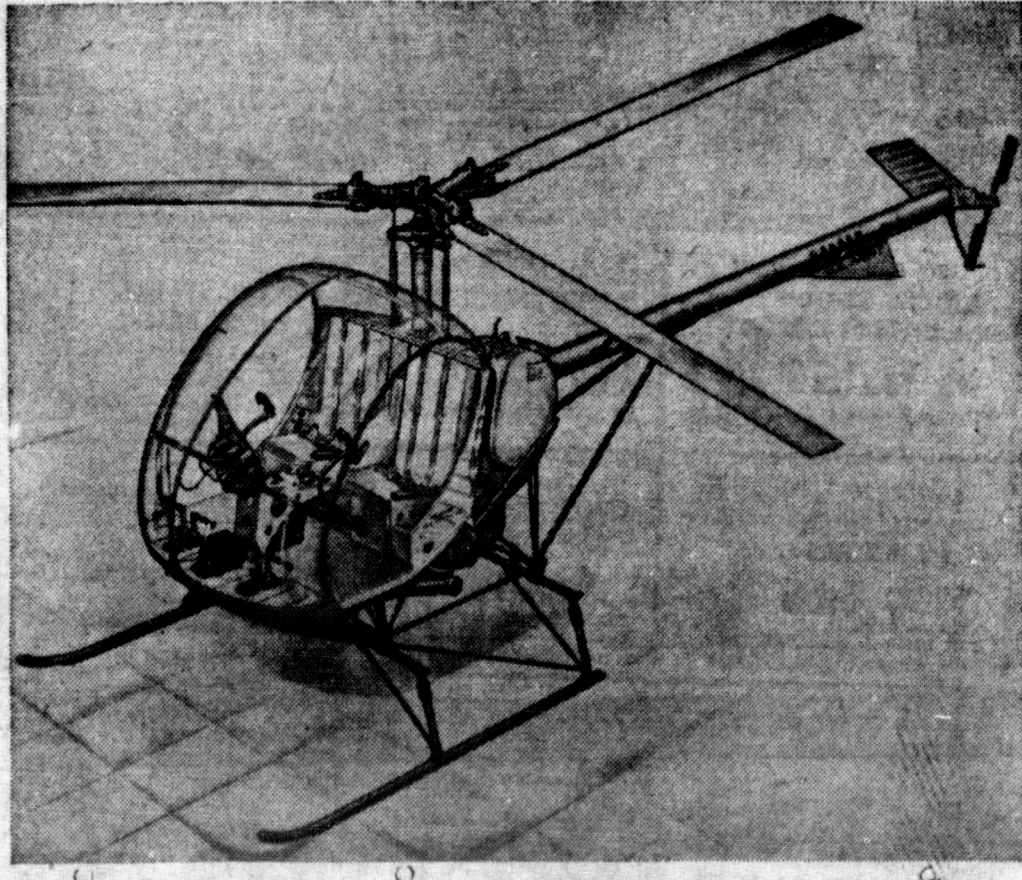
Pyeatt Conoco To Hold Opening Saturday

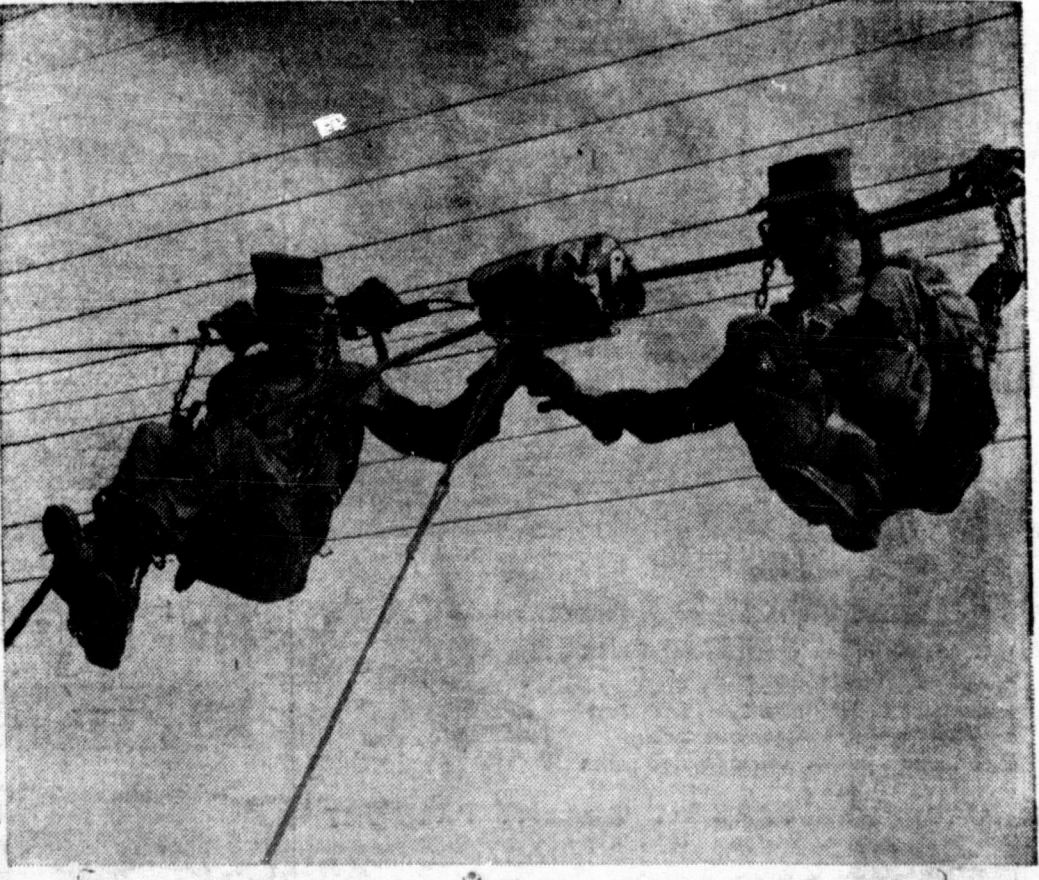

COMMUNITY FACILITIES BILL

The Community Facilities Bill, under the authorship of Senator Fulbright of Arkansas, passed the Senate last week by a good margin of votes. The vote was 60 to 26.

First, it would increase the 100 million dollar Housing and Home Finance Agency's public facility loan program to \$1 billion. This would provide loans for financing local water and sewer systems, hospitals, and school buildings.

Second, it would establish a new interest rate formula which, under present conditions, would produce a rate of interest of 3 1/2 percent rather than the current 4% and 4 1/2 percent.

Third, it would raise the present 40-year maximum payout period on these federal loans to 50 years.

Fourth, it would increase the present federal loan fund, which is available interest free for long range public works planning, by 50 million dollars. The present fund is 48 million dollars, and it is increased to 98 million dollars.

The bill was hotly contested, and the division was very sharp on many of the votes on proposed amendments to the bill that could cripple it. However, when these amendments had been voted down, many of those who had been supporting the amendments came over and voted for the bill on final passage.

IKI'S ARMS PLAN
The President's proposed reorganization of the Pentagon is an issue that becomes more heated each day. His original announcement that he planned to submit such a proposal to Congress was met with varied reactions.

When he finished the final draft of the proposal and submitted it to the Congress, it was obviously anticipated that the message submitting the plan would receive top billing on the front pages of the newspapers throughout the country. However, the President—and especially his advisors—had failed to reckon with the Chairman of the Armed Services Committee of the House of Representatives, the Honorable Carl Vinson of Georgia.

this is causing much discussion on Capitol Hill. Some are asking why it is that this proposed reorganization of the Department of Defense is so essential and so absolutely necessary that it must be accepted and swallowed lock, stock and barrel and without question. They are asking why it is that such a plan was not proposed long ago, if its importance even approaches the proportions represented. They want to know why the President, who represents himself as a man with greater knowledge on the subject than any other active person, and a man who has been associated with the military all his life, waited so long to come up with the program.

AUSTIN — Unemployment or no unemployment, most people this side of the Rio Grande aren't willing to bend their backs to pull onions at 50 cents an hour.

So say Texas farmers. Their crops are going to rot in the fields, they add, if the U. S. Labor Department doesn't relax restrictions on importing Mexican nationals.

Spokesmen for organized labor have demanded a ban on importing labor because of climbing unemployment. But farmers say that idle aircraft mechanics, no matter how numerous, are no help in getting the crops in. Ac-

ording to the farmers, abundant rainfall gives promise of the best harvests in years—if they can get field hands.

Labor Dept. has put a limit of 26,500 braceros to be used in Texas during April and May. It's about one-fifth the number used this time last year. Rio Grande Valley growers say they could use the whole bunch in their area. Texas Employment Commission says there are already about 26,500 here; hence, no more imports.

Under Labor Dept. regulations, workers cannot be imported until the TEC certifies the jobs cannot be filled with American citizens. Valley growers recently asked for braceros to harvest vegetables. TEC certified to a shortage of workers in the area and, even after a statewide canvass, was unable to fill the demand.

But the federal suggested recruiting in other states before bringing in Mexicans.

Farm groups protested to every regulatory official in reach.

Texas crop and weather conditions are such, they say, that when they need laborers, they need them then and there. Neither, they point out, do they have

time or money to run all over the country looking for workers.

Though federal officials catch the brunt of their criticism, farmers put part of the blame for their labor problems on the increasingly fastidious nature of Mrs. Housewife. She won't have dirty old carrot tops any more, say the farmers. She wants clean, topped carrots—packaged in plastic. It means more work.

ALL-OUT FOR SAFETY

Gov. Price Daniel has started "the greatest highway safety campaign in the history of the state."

County judges, mayors, police chiefs, sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys and school superintendents are being asked to hold meetings and organize local campaigns. Awards will be given to the local officials and news reporting agencies which do the best job of promoting traffic safety.

Governor's goal is to save "a life per county." This would total 254 lives or approximately 10 per cent of last year's traffic death toll.

ANTI-AD BAN UPHELD

A new law prohibiting price advertising of eye-glasses is constitutional, says the Texas Supreme Court.

Passed by the last legislature, the law says "ophthalmic dispensers" (which the court says means optometrists, too) may not mention "bait, discounts, premiums, prices, gifts" in their ads.

It landed in the courts when one group of optometrists (Texas State Optical) brought suit to prevent another group (Lee Optical) from advertising prices. Defendants said the law was invalid because its caption did not specifically mention the things the law covered.

But the high court ruled the caption was clear enough.

The bill as originally introduced made no reference to price advertising. The portion pertaining

thereto was inserted in committee "without there being any change in the caption."

Opponents of bill charged "trickery." They argued that this was just another attempt to raise the price of glasses by prohibiting the publicizing of prices.

UP THE LADDER

One plan to up-grade higher education in Texas has official approval of the Commission on Higher Education. Others are under study.

Commission approved a request from the University of Texas to divert \$1,000,000 from its Available Fund, ordinarily, used for buildings, to a research program. Noting that the University needs "brains as well as bricks", President Logan Wilson said the money would be used to attract and hold outstanding research personnel and provide them with equipment and books.

DONLEY COUNTY SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Strip cropping is becoming more popular with farmers and ranchers in the Donley County Soil Conservation District. Lloyd Hahn a cooperator who lives about three miles northwest of Clarendon is planning to strip crop his feed land this year. He will plant four rows of feed and four rows of peas to serve as strips.

The practice of strip cropping is a method of growing crops in a systematic arrangement of strips or bands which will serve as vegetative barriers to wind or water erosion. Organic matter may also be added to the soil as an additional benefit.

Additional information on strip cropping may be obtained from the local Soil Conservation Service Office.

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

"Social security monthly retirement benefits may be available to workers when they are still employed," Mr. John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo District Social Security stated today.

Mr. Sanderson says that every man at age 65, and every woman at age 62 should be aware of the provisions of the law which determines whether one or more monthly checks are payable for the year. The application of these provisions is referred to as the Retirement Test.

Under this test, an insured person whose earnings do not exceed \$1200 in a calendar year can receive payments for all months he was of retirement age. If his earnings exceed \$1200, one social security check will be withheld for every \$80, or fraction of \$80 of his earnings in excess of \$1200.

"For example," said Mr. Sanderson, "a person who worked all year and earned \$1500 could receive 8 social security checks." By applying this same principle, a person who earns over \$80 each month and over \$2080 in the year is not entitled to any social security checks.

Another provision of the retirement test which is not understood by many workers is the monthly earnings test. This rule states that

any worker eligible for benefits who does not earn over \$80 in the month, or does not render substantial services in self-employment in the month can apply and receive a social security payment for that month. To illustrate this provision, Mr. Sanderson pointed out that a worker could have earnings of any amount in some months of the year, and in other months earn less than \$80, or not render substantial services in self-employment and the Social Security Administration would pay the worker for those months.

The month a worker reaches age 72, the earnings restrictions in the social security law are lifted. However, the earnings for the entire taxable year must be counted in determining whether payments can be made for the month in that year before he reached age 72.

Monthly payments may be retroactive for as many as 12 months. Failure to file a timely application may cause a worker to lose payments for some of the

months in which he meets the provisions of the retirement test. Workers who meet any of the conditions described above are urged by Mr. Sanderson to contact their social security office or the representative who visits the town nearest where you live. The local office is at Room 324, New Post Office Bldg., Amarillo, Tex.

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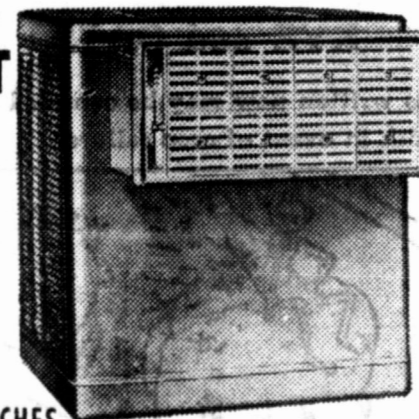
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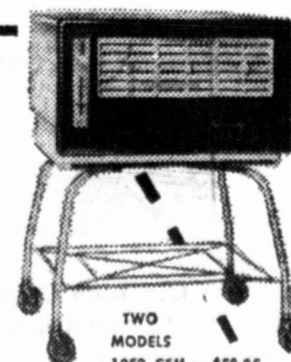

THENCE North along the West lines of Section 120, T & P Ry. Co., Block 2, and Section 12, Block 2, J. Poitevent to the South line of Block B, John G. Adair Survey, crossing Block 1, C. L. Benson, and Section 5, Block X, W. H. Martin, and intersecting the South line of Section 6, Block B, John G. Adair, East of its Southwest corner and East of the Northwest corner of Section 5, Block X; THENCE West to the Southwest corner of Section 6, Block B, John G. VI. That the purpose of the organization of the District shall be for, and include all works, plants and facilities, and appliances if any and all manner incident to, helpful or necessary, in the controlling, storing, preserving and distribution of its waters and flood waters, the waters of its creeks and streams, for irrigation power, and all other useful purposes, the reclamation and the irrigation of its arid, semi-arid and other lands needing irrigation, the reclamation and drainage, the conservation and development of its waters, and the preservation and conservation of all such natural resources of the State; and to control, abate and amend any shortage or any harmful excess of water and to protect, preserve, and when necessary restore the purity and the sanitary condition of waters within said District.

VII. That without limitation upon the general powers of the District,

above set forth which may be employed in the future, the District's first project will be to provide, dams, reservoirs, checks, and all works, facilities, plants and appliances incident to, helpful or necessary in the controlling, storing, preserving, and distributing the waters and floodwaters from the watershed and of the creeks, channels and rivers in the District in such manner as will result in the preservation and conservation of the natural resources of the area and the control or abatement of harmful excesses of water. In this connection the general nature of the work to be done is the construction of a series of dams, reservoirs and checks within the limits of the said District with the aid and assistance of the United States Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service.

VIII. That a necessity exists for the organization of said district and for the accomplishment of its first project, in order to preserve, conserve and put to beneficial use the natural resources of the area, and in order to control and abate harmful excesses of water and the erosion and waste accompanying same.

IX. That the purposes of the proposed District are practicable and feasible due to the nature of the soil and contour of the land within the area of the proposed District. The District and its project will serve and be a benefit to all of the land lying within said District and will be a public benefit and utility. The resulting benefits to the land, land owners and citizens of the District will greatly exceed the cost. The topography of the land presents no feature which would make this project impracticable from an engineering standpoint.

X. Petitioners state that the services of the engineers of the United States Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service, have been secured in connection with the planning of the proposed District's first project and said engineers have estimated that the cost thereof will be approximately \$2,700,000.00.

XI. That upon estimates, plans, specifications and advice of the engineers of the United States Soil Conservation Service, petitioners represent that a complete system of soil conservation dams and reservoirs may be provided within the District as its first project, and said petitioners will, at the hearing requested, demonstrate to the Board the purpose, utility, feasibility, need and necessity for the District and its proposed work in reasonable detail and with reasonable certainty.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners have caused this petition to be filed in triplicate, one with the County Clerk of Hall County, one with the County Clerk of Donley County, and one with the Board to which this petition is directed, and petitioners respectfully pray that said Board of Water Engineers make and enter an order for a hearing on such petition before said Board, as provided by law, and that a date be fixed for such hearing and that notice of such hearing be given as provided by law. 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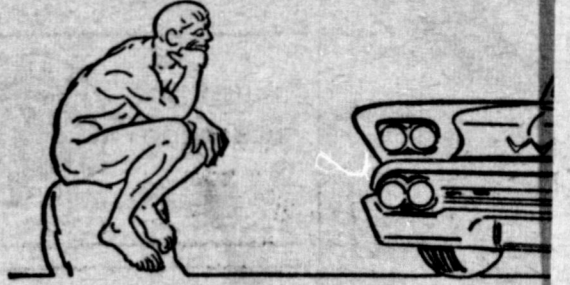

June 30, 1958 Is An Important Date For Disabled Persons Under Age 50

June 30, 1958 is an important date for disabled persons under age 50 who have not filed an application for a disability freeze according to John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.
 Workers or self-employed persons who have been disabled for 6 months or more should file for a disability freeze as soon as possible John R. Sanderson said.
 Failure to file by June 30, 1958, may cause a loss of rights to disability insurance benefits payable at age 50 and to benefits payable at retirement age. Failure to file could also cause survivors of the disabled person to lose survivor's benefits in case of the death of the worker.

All social security payments are based on your average earnings over a certain period of time. If you are disabled over a long period of time and had no wages or self-employment income this could cause you to lose your insured status. Filing for a disability freeze could have the effect of freezing your record during the time you are disabled. This period would not be counted when your average earnings figured, John R. Sanderson said.

If you have been disabled for 6 months or more and have been unable to work because of your disability you should contact your nearest social security office, if you have not already done so. If you know of someone who is disabled and has not contacted the social security office you would be doing him a favor if you told him of this important date John R. Sanderson added.

3. Plan for a successful home when you have your own. Try to build a home to see who can do the nicest things for each other. Work out a plan and follow through with your ideas. Move more things into God's hands.

4. His word of advice to parents was quite clever and direct. "Don't worry about the space age. Don't worry about the age of science. Just wait until you get through the 'teen-age' to plan your home life. Make it family centered."

5. Life is just like a football scrimmage. The coach in a practice game gives you a chance to play. In that time you do the best you can, if you really want to make the team. 94 LOCAL FARMERS PLACE 845.4 MORE ACRES IN CONSERVATION RESERVE

94 more Donley County farmers have offered 845.4 acres of cropland for inclusion in the Conservation Reserve Soil Bank this year. The signup for the program closed April 15. The acreage offered this year makes a total of 21,664.6 acres for the three years, 1956, 1957, and 1958. The most popular practice signed for in Donley County during the 1958 signup was the permanent cover grass, Perennial Sweet Sudan.

ESTABLISHMENT OF COVER FOR CONSERVATION RESERVE

We want to urge all producers who have a 1958 Conservation Reserve contract and have not applied for a practice to be carried out on this land to come into the Donley County ASC Office and let us give you an approval for a practice. You must have an approval before seeding your grass. Producers who established a sorghum or millet litter last year must, also, make application for the permanent grass they intend to seed.

1958 COTTON ACREAGE

During the signup period for 1958 Cotton Acreage Reserve, 185 agreements were signed in Donley County. The total acreage taken by these agreements was 6,674.1. This is about 22% of the county allotment of 30,074.1.

EXCESS WHEAT DISPOSAL

Notices have been sent to all growers who have excess wheat acreage which must be disposed of before the deadline. Farmers who have any questions about disposal are urged to get in touch immediately with the Donley County ASC Office for further information and advise.
