In an article regarding fishing book. which appeared in the Leader last week we quoted one of our good neighbors being assessed a fine of \$27.50 for fishing with the wrong kind of equipment according to the new law which went into effect last Sept. 1st.

The fine was assessed in Justice of the Peace Court here but should have read \$10 fine plus court costs which amounted to \$17.50. According to Justice of the Peace G. A. Anderson, the \$10 fine was the minimum amount that could be assessed.

If you plan to do any fishing with winding equipment on a rod or pole, be sure to get your fishing license first, provided you are between the ages of 17 and 65. You are safe to use a cane pole and line, trot line or throw line here in your own county without a license.



Chairman Vinson is now serving his 46th year in the Congress and has been handling military matters from a civilian standpoint as long or longer than any other living man. His vast experiences and knowledge in this field affords him a weapon that provides him with great influence in the Congress. When the President's message reached the Congress, Chairman Vinson was waiting with a speech on the subject. The result was that the President's program and Chairman Vinson's reply thereto shared the headlines. On the following day the President appeared before a luncheon meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors and the International Press Institute in the Statler Hotel and proceeded to soundly denounce his critics on the subject. He termed many of the charges leveled by Chairman Vinson at the program as "nonsense" and "farfetched". 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#### SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

"Social security monthly retirement benefits may be available to workers when they are still employed," Mr. John R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo approval of the Commission on District Social Security stated

Mr. Sanderson says that every Commission approved a request man at age 65, and every woman from the University of Texas to at age 62 should be aware of the provisions of the law which determines whether one or more monthly checks are payable for Noting that the University needs the year. The application of these provisions is referred to as the Retirement Test.

> Under this test, an insured person whose earnings do not exceed \$1200 in a calendar year can receive payments for all months he was of retirement age. If his earnings exceed \$1200, one social security check will be withheld for every \$80, or fraction of \$80 of his earnings in excess of \$1200.

"For example," said Mr. Sanderson, "a person who worked all year and earned \$1500 could receive 8 social security checks." a person who earns over \$80 each month and over \$2080 in the year is not entitled to any social security checks.
