Local Chapter Receives Top Honors At State F. F. A. Convention

The Clarendon F.F.A. Chapter was presented a plaque by the Texas F.F.A. as one of the top three chapters in the state chapter contest and as one of the top eight chapters in the state in the national chapter contest at State F.F.A. Convention held at Dallas, July 25-27th. The plaque was presented to Doyce Graham, vice president of the Clarendon Chapter, at the morning session of the convention on July 26th. Graham and W. T. Elliott were among the 4,000 members of the Texas Association attending the convention which was held in Dallas with headquarters in the new Statler-Hilton Hotel.

The highlight of the convention was the Lone-Star Farmer Banquet held at the Women's Building on the Texas State Fair grounds and attended by over 1600 Texas Future Farmers and their advisers. Graham and Elliott were presented their Lone Star Farmer State Degree Keys at the banquet along with 768 other Texas youths.

In addition to the honors won in the state chapter contest, Elliott was one of the top contenders for the National F.F.A. award in farm mechanics; Graham was one of the top participants in the state electrification award; Charles Bates was one of the ten winners in the Charles M. Wood Wild Life Scholarship awards and was one of the group considered for the \$1,200 scholarship that was won by a future farmer from Beeville, Texas, and the Clarendon Chapter was one of the top ten chapters in the state F.F.A. Safety Award Contest.

Wreck Victim Dies Saturday

Mrs. Ella Corinne Hyatt, 22, of Brush, Colorado, died Saturday in an Amarillo hospital from injuries received in the head-on collision here with the Leon Reeves car July 22nd. She is survived by her husband, William; a daughter, Roxie Mae; two sons, Rockland J. and Timothy; parents Mr. and Mrs. Adam Riche, all of Brush, Colo.

Mr. and Mrs. Reeves were both killed in the accident and their son Buddy remains in a critical condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo; Orville McIlvanie, driver of the other car, is listed as very critical also.

DONLEY FARMERS SIGN UP IN ACREAGE RESERVE PROGRAM

Preliminary reports indicate that approximately 71 county farmers have signed up to participate in the 1956 Acreage Reserve Program. If the farmers carry out their expressed intentions, about 3,776 acres will be in the Acreage Reserve in Donley this year.

Acres and possible earnings indicated by the farmers participating in the program total: 3,478 acres of wheat, \$20,242.00; 298 acres of cotton, \$5,422.64.

The program, which operates under the Soil Bank Law enacted late in May, too late for full operation in 1956, will continue thru 1957, 1958 and 1959.

CONSERVATION PRACTICES TO CONSIDER FOR FALL

Fall seeding is best for establishing alfalfa stands. Since it is a crop of varied farm uses, you might like to consider seeding it as a source of hay, pasture and seed and also as a soil improving crop. The seedbed should be firm, clean and moist. Seed may be planted in dead stubble in areas where wind or blowing sand is likely to damage young plants. In this county from 15 to 19 pounds of good seed per acre are recommended. There are other grasses on which you may receive payment for establishing additional acreage of vegetative cover in crop rotation to retard erosion and to improve soil structure. Improving pastures and building terraces are other practices you may obtain approvals for Federal assistance on if you are interested. Come to the ASC office and let us help you work out something.

School Case Before Supreme Court

Last Wednesday, word was received here that the Supreme Court of Texas has granted application for writ of error in the Clarendon Independent School District - Goodnight School District case. The court has set the case for hearing on Wednesday, October 3, 1956 at 9 a. m.

The application was granted on Points 1, 2 and 3 which are as follows:

FIRST POINT: "The Court of Civil Appeals erred in holding that the State of Texas had not made a party to this suit in compliance with the requirements of the law, and particularly Article 6253 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and that, therefore, the trial court was justified in dismissing the suit."

SECOND POINT: "The Court of Civil Appeals erred in holding that the State of Texas was not represented in this suit as contemplated by the provisions of the law, and particularly Article 6253 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and that, therefore, the trial court correctly sustained respondents' plea in abatement and dismissed the suit."

THIRD POINT: "The Court of Civil Appeals erred in holding that the trial court did not have jurisdiction in this suit for the reason that this was a suit to enforce the private rights of relators, and the County Attorney of Donley County joined in the suit only as an accommodation to relators."

Large Vote Cast In First Primary Election Here Saturday

Donley County residents went to the polls last Saturday and cast an exceptionally large vote for this county in a primary election. Luther Gribble, candidate for reelection as District Judge (unopposed) received the highest vote with a total of 1,915. This shows that the vote exceeded that number as some ballots are always validated for some reason or another.

In contested races locally, Bill Lowe defeated R. Y. King for County Attorney with a vote of 1207 to 702 for King. The race for Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector was a close affair with Truett Behrens receiving the top vote with 757. Bill Cornell followed close behind with 641 and Lois Putman pulled a very good vote for a third position with 516. This calls for a run-off between Behrens and Cornell in the second primary election August 25th.

Both candidates started off their second round of campaigning Monday morning. R. C. Hill received a majority vote over his two opponents and eliminated a run-off in the race for Constable, Precinct No. 2. Hill received 599 votes, C. Huffman 387 and Erskine Butler 95. The other contested race was for Commissioner of Precinct No. 1. Hubert Rhoades, incumbent, defeated Geo. Bulman by a vote of 93 to 78.

In other unopposed races, Miss Ruth Richerson received 1871 votes for County School Superintendent; J. T. Patman received 1144 for precinct chairman Precinct No. 2; F. M. Murray received 526 votes for Commissioner of Precinct No. 3; R. W. Scales received 380 votes for Precinct chairman of Precinct No. 3; W. M. Patman received 1914 votes for County Democratic chairman and T. C. D'Spain received 6 votes for precinct 4 chairman. In the Segregation issues, No. 1 received 1,071 for and 233 against; No. 2 received 1059 for and 260 against and No. 3 received 1031 for and 226 against.

In other races closer to home, Will Ehrle received 1,001 votes and Elbert Reeves received 742 votes in the State Representative race. Ehrle won the contest over the district with an unofficial total of 5,041 votes to Reeves 3,029. In the District Attorney race Allen Harp led the ticket with 684, John T. Forbis 618 and Paul Spillman 518. There will be a run-off in this race between Harp and Forbis, both Childress residents. Over the district Harp received 4,368, Forbis 4,093 and Spillman 2,372.

In State politics — Governors race: Price Daniel led the ticket in Donley County with 653 votes, followed by W. Lee O'Daniel with 576; Haley received 348, Yarborough 274, Senterfitt 16 and Holmes 1. The latest state tabula-

tion gave Daniel 606,877 and Yarborough 450,979. The run-off will be between these two and it is expected to be a hot one. In the Lt. Governor's race, the run-off will be between Ramsey and Aikin. Wilson and Moore will battle it out for Attorney General. Donley County votes for Ramsey were 564, Smith 812, Aikin 266, Johnson 71. Votes here for Wilson were 741, Moore 421, Hill 145 and Carlton 211.

Pasteur Supplied The Miracle

Texas State Dept. of Health

AUSTIN—In a small laboratory in a suburb of Paris in the year 1884, a mother comforted a frightened boy as a bearded man in a white smock inserted a hypodermic needle into the lad's abdominal muscle.

The bearded man was Louis Pasteur, the brilliant French bacteriologist. The boy was

Joseph Meister, from the province of Alsace. His mother had brought him to Pasteur as a last resort, knowing that only a miracle would save him from one of the most horrible of deaths.

Pasteur supplied the miracle, for the syringe he held in his skilled hands contained a fluid of his own concoction—an emulsion prepared from the spinal cord of a rabbit dead of rabies. At the precise moment he pressed the plunger on the syringe, the world had its most powerful

weapon against a vicious disease which had plagued mankind since the dawn of recorded history.

Joseph Meister lived many years after the incident in the laboratory, despite sustaining 14 mad dog bites. He became celebrated as the first human being to receive vaccine against rabies. Prior to that time, the only treatment for mad animal bites was a red hot iron applied to the site of the wound as the victim writhed in agony.

Today, 71 years later, white-garbed technicians at the Texas Health Department make more than 5000 treatments of antirabic vaccine every year in a tediously exacting process requiring six months to complete. They use a modification of Pasteur's technique, but their product is vastly superior to his.

Six batches or "lots" are made in the spring and six in the fall. Each batch consists of 450 separate treatments, and each is carefully double-checked by the National Institute of Health before being released.

Still, even in this day of modern immunology, and despite the fact that countless thousands of lives have been saved by promptly administering it to victims of mad animal bites, the vaccine is not perfect. No vaccine ever is.

Says Mrs. E.B.M. Cook, in charge of biologics production at the State Health Department:

"The perfect vaccine is a myth, an unattainable ideal. We make our rabies vaccine from the brain tissue of rabbits. Some people are allergic to the material, just as some are allergic to penicillin or poison ivy."

It is a curious fact, Mrs. Cook says, that any vaccine or therapeutic drug—whether it be for smallpox, whooping cough, polio, or pneumonia—may completely

protect 999 people from the disease, yet cause a severe reaction, or perhaps even kill, the thousandth person it is given to.

Ordinarily it takes 14 shots of vaccine, administered one per day, to give protection against the bite of a rabid animal. Last year 2,379 of these "treatment series" were dispensed by the Department for exposed persons.

Reactions ranging from mild, moderate, or severe were registered in 50 of those cases. No paralytic reactions nor any deaths were traceable to the vaccine, and if injections had been stopped when the first signs of re-

actions developed, the number of severe reactions could have been reduced, health authorities say. None of the 5 human rabies deaths last year received treatments.

"Compared to the certainty of death from rabies, once its symptoms develop," says Dr. Henry A. Holle, state commissioner of health, "risk of a severe vaccine reaction is minimal. It is a calculated risk."

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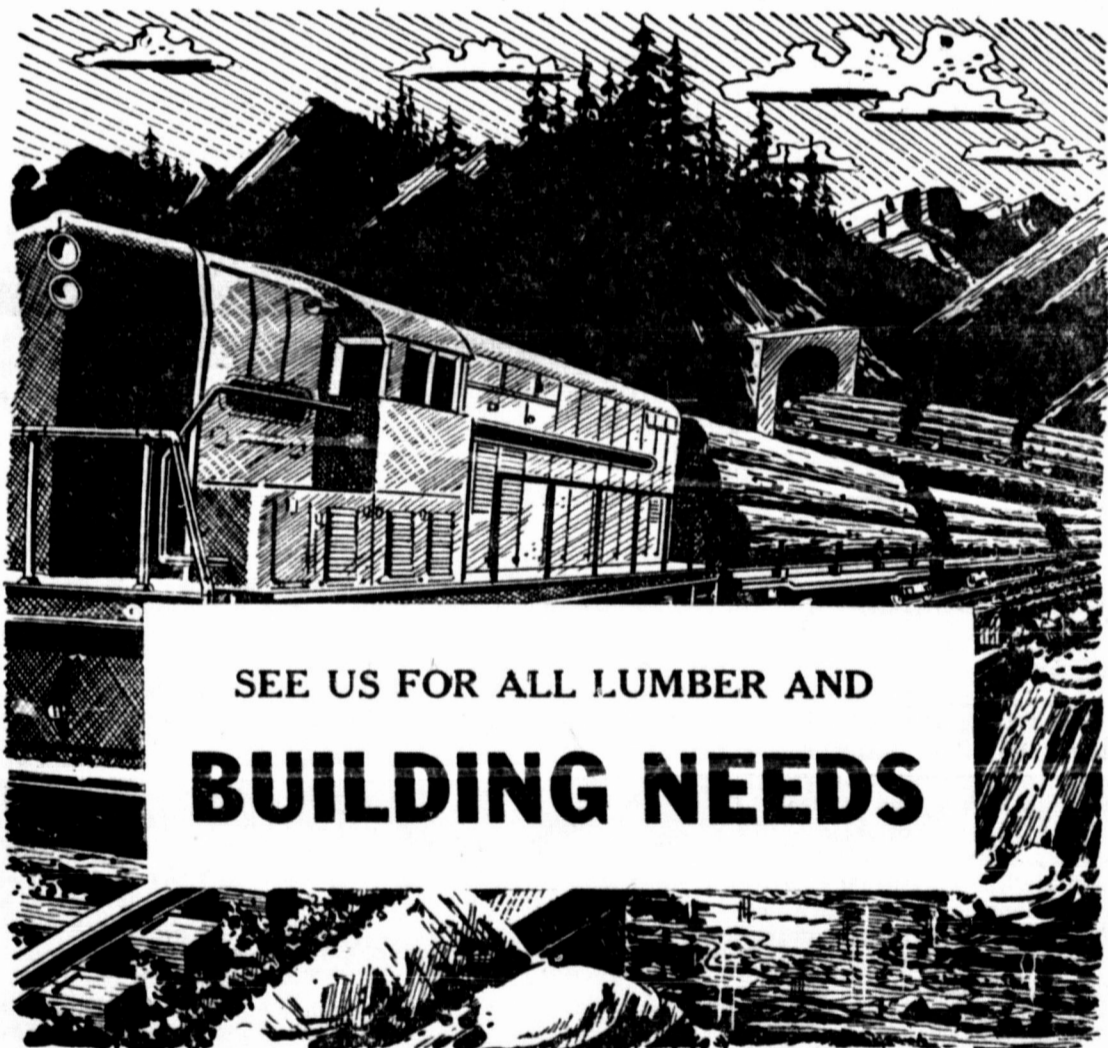

RESEARCH LEAGUE HELPS TEXAS
In contrast with the campaign furor, the Texas Research League works quietly. Their aim is better state government. Election winners, whoever they are, likely will have cause to use the league's exhaustive fact-finding survey.

Only three years old, TRL already has provided Texas taxpayers with nearly a million dollars worth of services. All for free. Big businessmen are footing the bill.

Behind the organizing and financing of the league are nearly 500 business and professional leaders. Their names constitute a Texas "Who's Who." These men, with a bigger than average stake in Texas' future, felt their billion-dollar-a-year state government should have the benefit of the same type of efficiency expert techniques that aid private enterprise.

Ben C. Belt, president of Gulf Oil Corporation, Houston, is chairman of the 72-member board of directors. Alvin A. Burger, a nationally-recognized government research expert, is executive director. A modest office suite two blocks west of the Capitol houses the 21-member staff.

TRL was set up as a non-profit, non-political, educational corporation. It is prohibited by its charter from lobbying for the adoption of any of its recommendations. It can undertake a survey only at the request of the department concerned.

Apparently these restrictions have not hampered its effectiveness. While its analyses may turn up faults and criticisms, state agencies are standing in line for its services. Recommendations from surveys made so far have resulted in far-reaching administrative and legislative changes.

Agencies now working toward league-suggested goals include the state hospital system, University of Texas, and the public school financing (Gilmer-Aikin) program.

A State Library Commission survey is to be ready in about two weeks. Reports on the Department of Public Safety and Board of Control are to be completed by the end of summer. A mammoth State Highway Department analysis is due for release in Sept.

Slated for beginning in 1957 are studies of the Department of Public Welfare and the Youth Development Council.

SHEPPERD URGES ACTION
Shepperd's comment on the situation came as the result of a wire Rep. Wade Spilman, chairman of the committee, sent to C. B. Dick of Laredo. Dick had requested an investigation of absentee voting practices in Webb, Zapata, Jim Hogg, Duval and Starr Counties.

In a wire to Spilman, Shepperd cited a group of bills introduced in the last legislature, at the request of his office, and the Texas Press Association. The measures, he pointed out, would eliminate such situations as now exist in the South Texas area.

All the bills, Shepperd said, failed to win legislative approval. "Since 1953, we have tried to interest legislative agencies in the cleanup of Duval, and your committee will discover, as we did, that the same thing that happened there can happen in any county where a political boss can control election officials and machinery and the judicial processes," Shepperd said.

The bills to which he referred would open meetings of public agencies, allow full inspection of public records, protect reporters' sources of information, require full publication of financial statements of counties and school districts, require an audit upon proper petition by taxpayers, provide punishment for false reporting of official finances or theft of public funds or records, and give venue in adjoining counties in case of theft of public funds.

Texas Oil Pioneers

Away back in 1901, Dr. John W. Thornton, of Toccoola, Mississippi, took his 10-year-old son, Word, to a Fourth-of-July picnic. If the Doctor had known what the consequences of that day's celebration were to be, he would no doubt have left his son at home. For on that day his plans for the boy's future were turned upside down. He had expected Word to go away to school when he was older and eventually to become an M.D. and return to Toccoola and succeed to his father's practice. But at the picnic all this was changed.

Wandering about the grounds the boy found something he had never seen before—a stand piled high with Roman candles, sky-rockets, and firecrackers. He saw other boys buying and shooting, and he bought and shot until all his money was gone and he hunted up his father to beg for more.

What appealed to him most were the giant crackers—since outlawed—that made a noise like a cannon. When he got home he couldn't get fireworks off his mind. He didn't want to be a doctor. He didn't know what he would do, but he knew if he could find a way to make a living shooting off explosives, that was what he would do.

He was 16 when he quit school

to join a crew that was using dynamite to blast the stumps from cut-over timberland. Whether it was to wear his son from this occupation or for some other reason, Dr. Thornton moved to Knox County in West Texas where there were no stumps to clear. But the wildcatters were already invading the region, and one day Word Thornton saw a man shoot an oil well. He promptly announced he was in the well-shooting business himself, and as the big pools came in—Ranger, Burkburnett, Electra, Smackover and the rest—he soon had plenty of clients. He also acquired a new name. Word didn't seem to go with well shooting anyway and he was pleased when the workers began calling him Tex.

As he went from field to field he saw a number of fires. He saw men sweating to put them out by smothering them with steam or mud or by laborious tunneling and plugging. It occurred to him that a burning oil well might be blown out in the same way a burning candle could, provided you only had breath enough. Nitroglycerin, he figured, ought to provide the breath. His opportunity to put his theory to the test came in 1919 at Electra. When the owners of the burning well refused to deal with him, he obtained permission to make a try at his own expense. He made a sort of Mother Hubbard garment out of asbestos to protect him from the heat, managed to get the hot metal dragged away, ran in and placed a charge. The flame was snuffed out, and Tex added fire-fighting to his shooting business.

He designed a complete outfit of clothes—pants, jacket, gloves,

helmet and shoes—and had the Johns-Manville Company make them out of asbestos. He used to keep as many as a hundred of these suits on hand, for he might use up several in putting out one fire.

Nobody knows exactly how many burning oil and gas wells Tex Thornton put out. He did not keep records. A year before his death in 1949, he estimated he had averaged one a month since 1920 and that he had saved enough gas to supply New York City for 500 years.

Thornton gave his scrapbook, largely kept by his wife, and a collection of photographs to the University of Texas, where they are now housed in the Archives Collection.

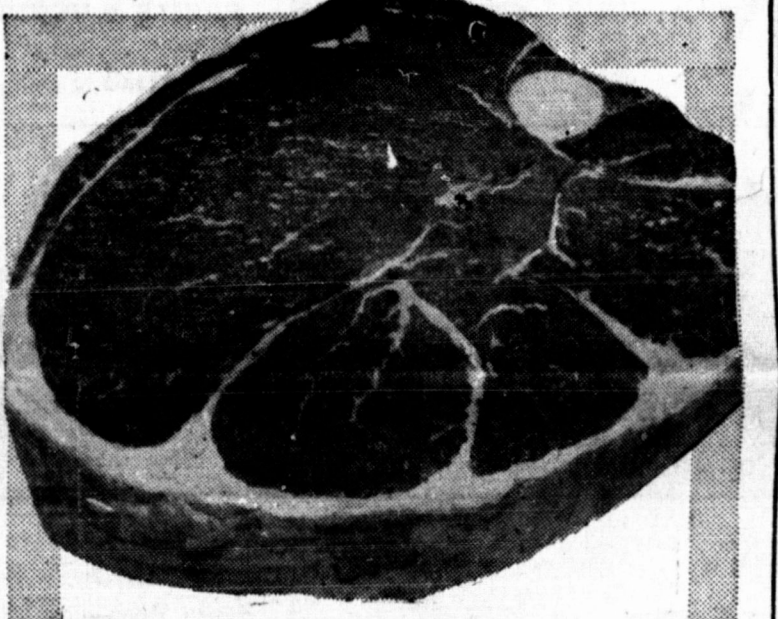

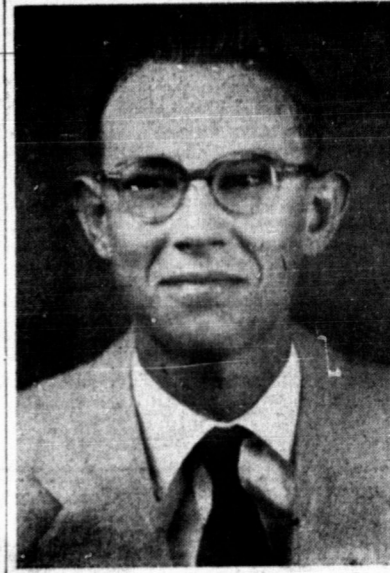

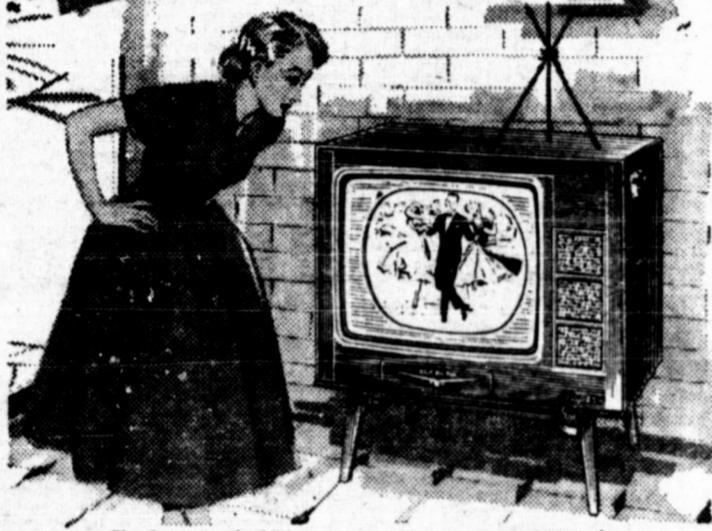
some drake" which apparently had paired with the female after her wing had been hurt.

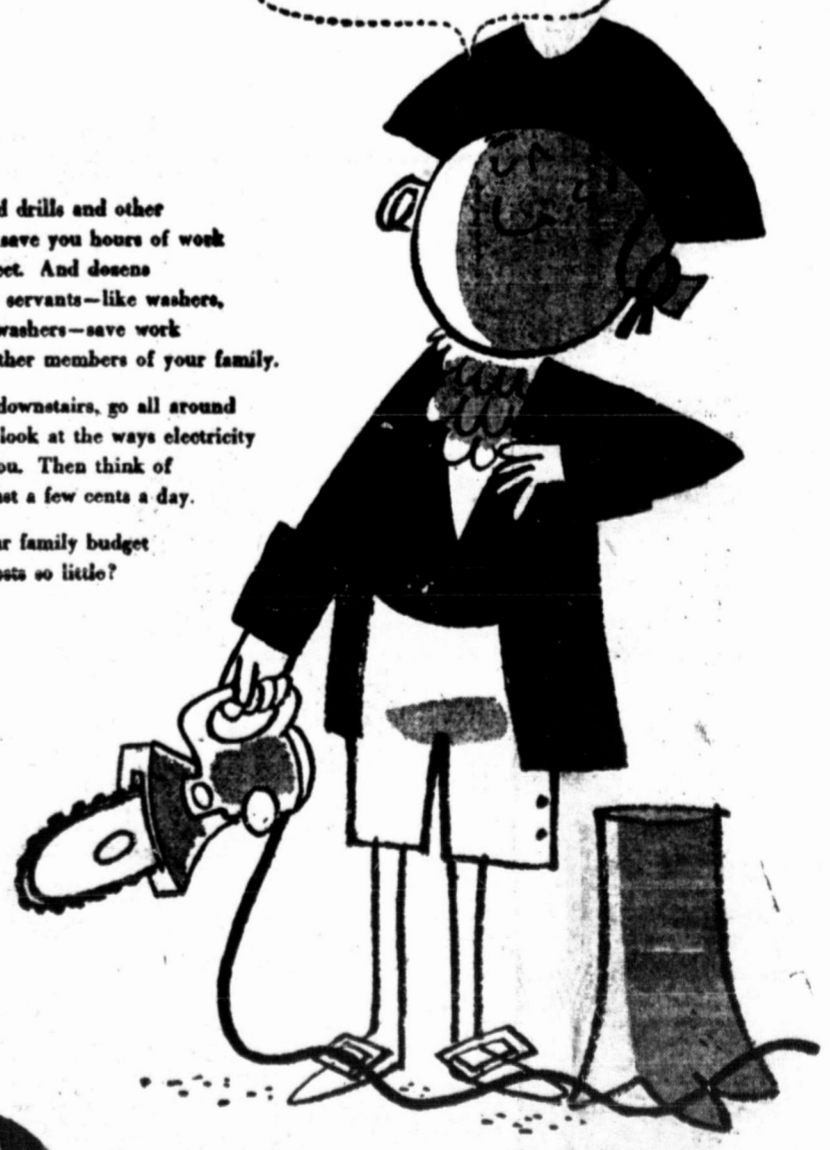

THE PUBLIC DEBT CONTINUES TO SOAR

On June 22, 1956, the Executive Office of the President, Bureau of the Budget, in answer to a question propounded by a Member of the Congress concerning the public debt situation, gave out some very interesting information. The information being that at the end of fiscal year 1952 the national debt was 259 billion dollars. That interest on such debt was 5.9 billion dollars. This means that the American taxpayers at that time were paying, in interest

alone, the staggering sum of approximately 16 million dollars every day. This, however, is not the whole story. Because during the fiscal years since 1952 the debt has continued to move upward. At one time it moved upward to the highest point it has ever reached in the history of this nation. So high, in fact, that the Congress had to pass legislation to authorize the Secretary of the Treasury to put this country into debt over and above the legal debt ceiling. I cast my vote against granting the Secretary of the Treasury such authority. Incidentally, he still has that authority and will, no doubt, use it as soon as tax collections begin to fall off. Because of the peak tax collection period in the spring and early summer, the national debt on June 30th was down some from the record high. The Bureau of the Budget said that it was 274 billions of dollars. That is an increase in the 4 years from 1952 to 1956 of 15 billions of dollars. This increase of 15 billions of dollars means an addition increase in the interest that has to be paid on the public debt. This increase in interest is 500 million dollars per year, or the additional sum

each day of 1 million, 300 thousand dollars. This means that the taxpayers of this country are now paying over 17 million dollars every day that passes for interest alone on the public debt.

The Secretary of the Treasury has been doing a lot of trumpet blowing lately about balancing the budget, and you will, no doubt, hear a lot more about this in the future. Frankly, the whole fiscal picture is somewhat confusing. Yours truly was never considered an outstanding genius in the field of mathematics. However, I have employed simple arithmetic in an effort to gain enlightenment, but no matter how I figured it, borrowing more money in order to balance your budget is a very difficult way to get out of debt. Perhaps this is a new method of financing that will work fine until pay day. The Secretary of the Treasury has been advertised as a very brilliant financier. I am wondering if he has discovered some new scheme of financing that permits the borrowing of money without worrying about having to pay it back. If so, he really is a genius.

During these last days of this session, both of the major parties have permitted a complete week to be wasted for the sake of politics. I have reference to the time that has been consumed in the debate on H. R. 627, the misnamed Civil Rights Bill. The leadership in both parties are grasping and clamoring for the credit of having passed this bill through the House. The bill was written by the Attorney General (lawyer?) Brownell, and has been repeatedly referred to in the debate as the Eisenhower Civil Rights Bill. Everyone who has

read the bill recognizes it for what it really is - - - a loosely drawn, political Mother Hubbard intended to cover everything and touch nothing. From a Constitutional standpoint it is about as legal as murder with malice aforethought. The bill itself, coupled with the political gymnastics surrounding its presentation to the House of Representatives, is a reflection on the intelligence of every fair, honest thinking American in this country. Everyone knows that the bill doesn't have the brightest chance of becoming law. Yet, it is brought before the House of Representatives in its closing days and employed to consume time that should be spent in handling necessary legislation.

As I have always said, our democratic form of government is unquestionably the best government conceived by the mind of man; otherwise, how would it ever stand up against such tomfoolery.

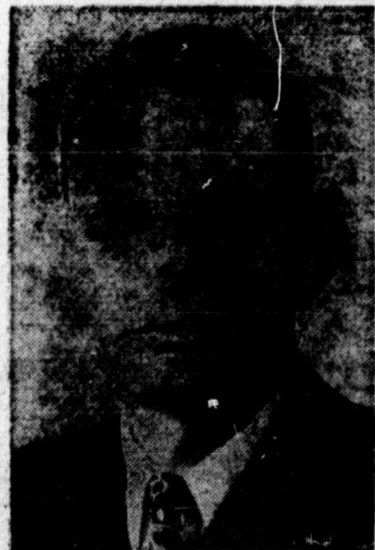

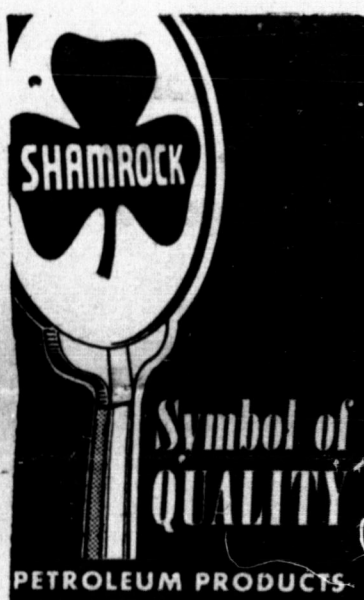

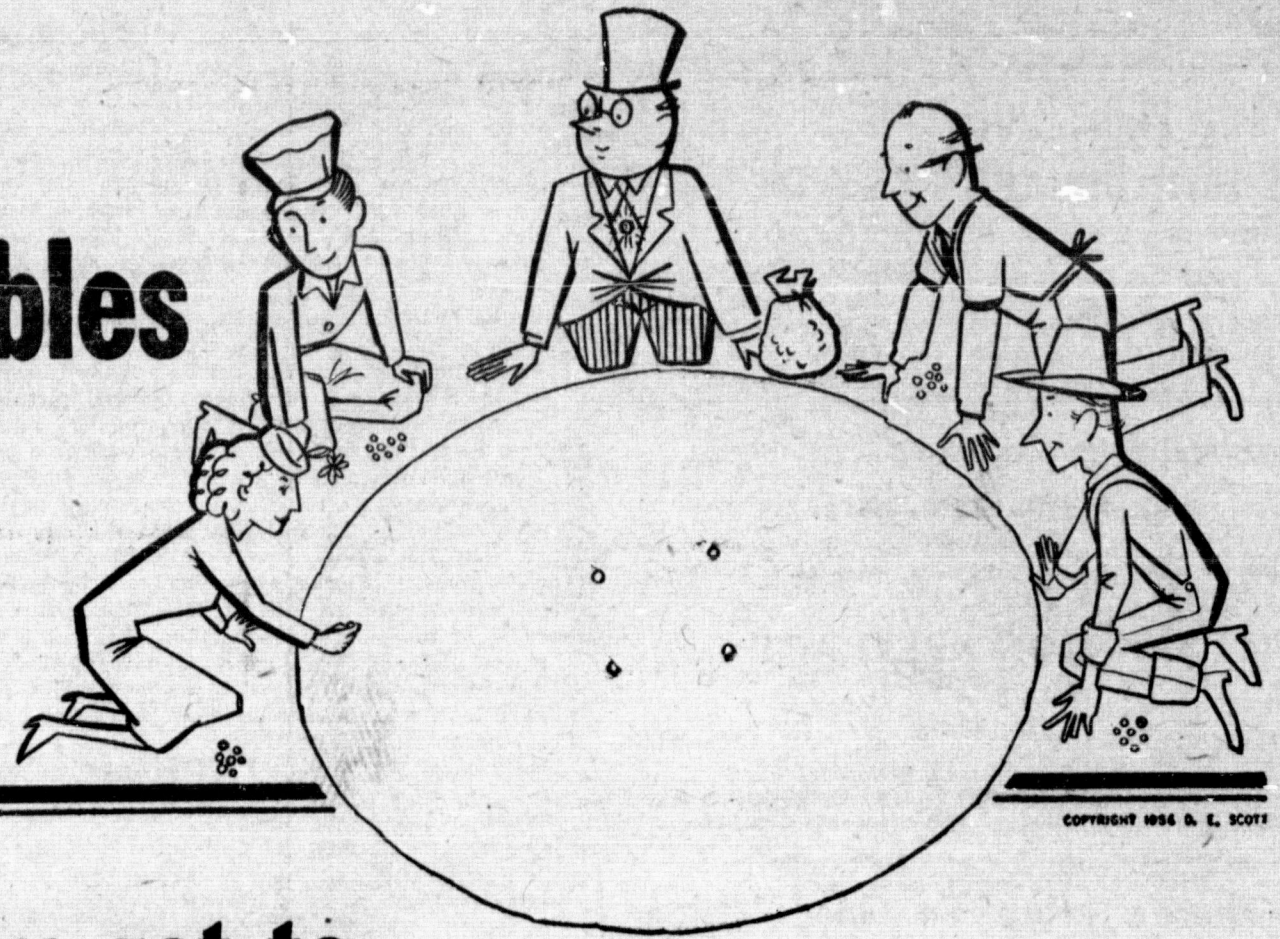
