These exhibits will be set up on the 13th of September so that they will be ready for the judging on the 14th at 10:00 A. M. The judge will be from out of the county and a qualified judge.

The individual agriculture exhibits will feature a new part of the fair and any person can enter one farm commodity listed in the catalog in each class; any person might enter a number of different commodities as long as he does not have two entries of the same commodity. This is also true with canned goods, to be canned in glass jars. There will be no premium money on these classes but ribbons will be given for the placings.

The catalog will be off the press in the next few days listing all the commodities that can be shown in this class. The committee would have liked to make the classes much larger but due to field. space they had to limit to the most important for this county.

The poultry department will be a big show this year, and will gress. feature all standard breeds of chickens. The home economics department will feature the home makers in the schools and will pe open to the three schools in the county. The flower show is always a beautiful display and the ladies of the county in charge urge that every one bring flowers to the show and have them in place by nine A. M. on the 14th so that they can be judged by ten o'clock. Ribbons will be given for the placings.

The Donley County show is an approved show and the association will furnish trophies for the winners. The association requires that all horses be registered.

Because of the Conservation Reserve phase of the Soils Bank Bill, there is likely to be an increased demand for all kinds of grass seed next spring. Due to an extended drought over a large part of the southwestern United States, there is also likely to be a below normal grass seed harvest. However some excellent blue grama seed suitable for harvest has been found on J. H. Mc-Murtry's, Faye Scoggin's, and parts of the JA Ranch southwest of Clarendon. The value of this seed could easily run from \$15.00 to above \$30.00 per acre, and it can be harvested by most combines with minor adjustments.
