Christmas Decorating Rules Announced

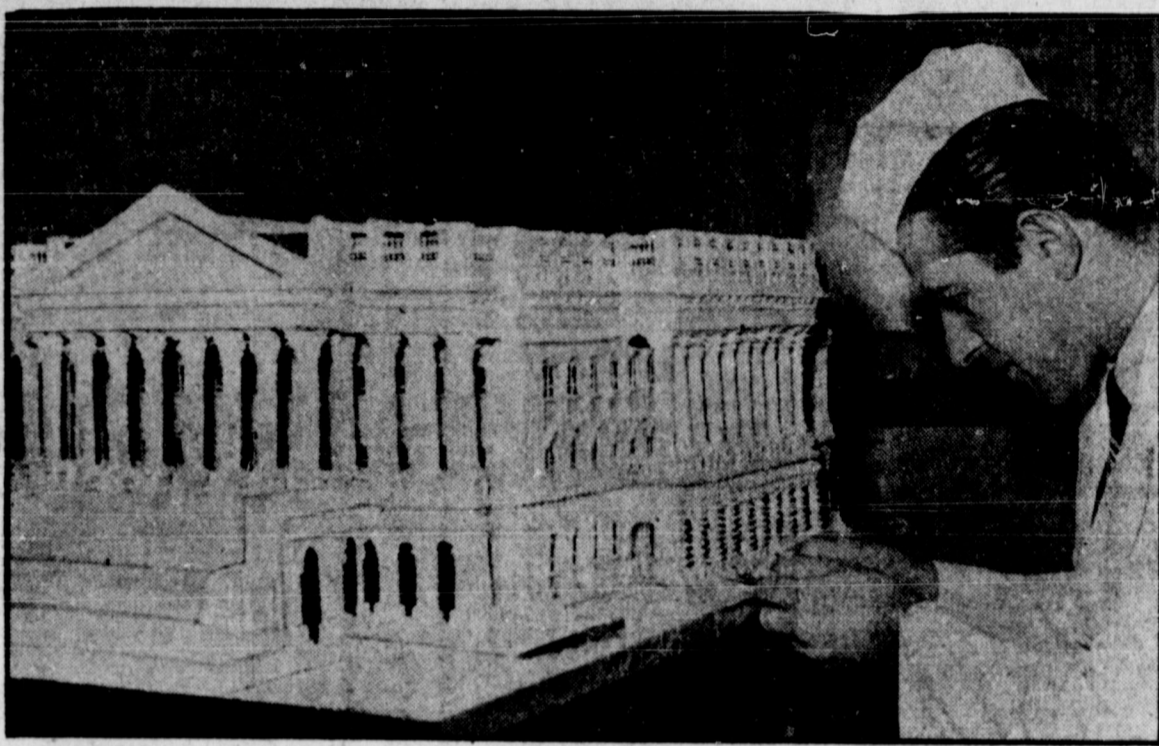
Jimmy Faulkner, Chamber of Commerce manager, made public this week complete details concerning the "Residential Christmas Decorating Contest" and the "Commercial Front, or Store Window Contest", as have been formulated by the Chamber of Commerce committee.

"The rules are simple, almost the same as last year, and we hope that a lot of people will decorate again this year during this Yule season," Faulkner said. "It is not the aim to have a few very expensive entries, but just in a fashion to show our neighbors across the street and in the surrounding towns that we've got the Christmas spirit and a lot of civic pride in our town," Faulkner added.

The rules set by the committee for each division are: (1) Three

prizes will be given in each contest division; (2) Judges will be from out of town, if possible; (3) All awards will be made on the basis of attractiveness and originality, without regard to financial outlay involved; (4) Entries must be left intact till December 25th, (in both divisions); (5) Awards will be announced, in the Christmas edition of the LEADER; (6) All judging will be done at night; (7) All entries must be entered by December 19; (8) All entrants in either division must fill out and mail, or bring, their contest entry slips to the Chamber of Commerce office on or before 6 P. M. December 19th.

(Last year's winners of cash awards will not be eligible for cash awards in this year's contest).

Santa's Coming to Town Saturday Morning

Quail Season Opens With Many Bangs

The 1952 Quail season got under way with thunderous barges and a plentiful supply of hunters here Monday. The bird crop had been reported smaller this year due to the drouth and most hunters reported less than the allowed bag limit. Birds were reported plentiful where ample water, feed and coverage were available.

Up through noon Wednesday, no hunting violations had been reported to either the county court or the Justice of the Peace. This is a mighty good record to start the season off with. Members of the Donley County Game Association have been patrolling the areas belonging to Association members and hunters are respecting all laws in general.

Hunters in this area are reminded to abide by the laws governing the 28-county Panhandle area which is some different from the state laws. The state law reads: shooting hours from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset and with a bag limit of twelve per day and not more than thirty-six per week or in possession. The 28-county Panhandle group (which includes Donley) has a twelve bird per day bag limit with a possession limit of twenty-four. Shooting hours are only from sunrise to sunset. The season runs from December 1st thru January 16th.

The main thing to remember is to be careful. Your family had rather you would return home safe and sound in preference to a bag of all the birds in the county.

"Children from the entire trade area surrounding Clarendon will be on hand Saturday to see Santa Claus as he comes in aboard the southbound Ft. Worth & Denver streamliner," Bob Moss, Chamber of Commerce President said yesterday.

Santa Claus will be met at the train with the big red fire truck and the Clarendon School Band where a parade will form that will move up Sully Street to the courthouse, move east to Main Street and follow Main Street back to the depot parking lot where it will disband.

The Retail Promotions Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and the civic minded citizens of Clarendon have joined forces to make the visit of Santa Claus to Clarendon possible.

The beautiful, multi-colored Christmas lights will go on Friday night for the first time of this season and even though they show lots brighter at night, they will be left burning all day Saturday to add some color and the Christmas spirit to the occasion.

"The Chamber of Commerce and the merchants of Clarendon extend a special invitation to all the little kiddies of the Clarendon area to come to town Saturday morning and see Santa Claus," President Moss concluded.

"We are asking the cooperation of all dog owners to please see that their dogs are kept off the school ground. It is a difficult problem to keep the dogs from going inside the buildings. This naturally excites the children and keeps them upset.

The children want to play with the dogs and sometimes they antagonize the dogs to the extent that an accident occurs. Last week a child in Elizabeth Stevens building was bitten, so if you will please see that your dog does not come to school, we will appreciate it very much."

Funeral services were held at Valliant, Oklahoma Saturday, November 29th for Henry Hester Gillham, age 71, father of John R. Gillham of Clarendon.

Mr. Gillham died suddenly at his home at Valliant Wednesday, Nov. 26th. He had been a resident of the Panhandle area for a long number of years prior to moving to Oklahoma. He moved to Randall County in 1905, and taught school for two terms, farmed in Armstrong county and then moved back to Canyon. He had lived at Hughes Springs, Texas and Valliant, Oklahoma since 1932 with the exception of a year that he spent here in Clarendon with his son, J. R. Gillham.

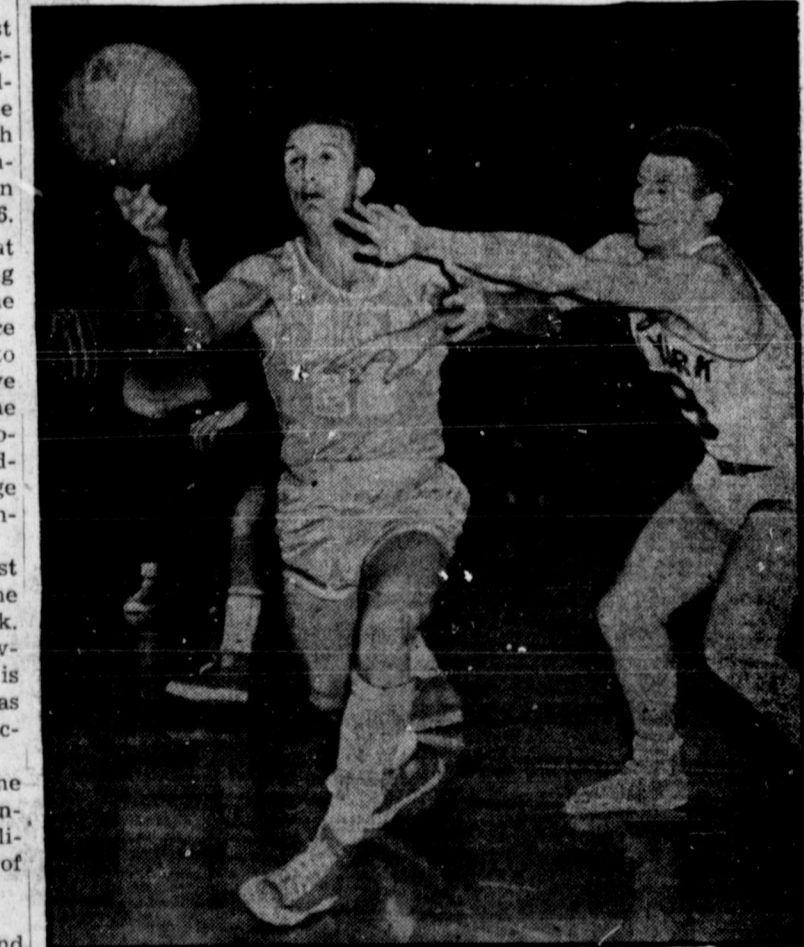

To The People of The 18th District

ORGANIZATION OF THE 83rd CONGRESS:

The nation's Capital is rife with rumors as to possible fights in the organization of the 83rd Congress. Most of these rumors concern the Senate. There was discussion for a time as to whether or not the Republicans would be able to take over and control the organization since Senator Wayne Morse, of Oregon, refused to say whether or not he would join with the Republicans in the organization of the Senate. Actually, there is no doubt but that the Republicans will organize the Senate because if Senator Morse does not go along with the Republicans in the organization, they will still have a majority because the Vice-President will cast the deciding vote. The chances are that Senator Morse will stay with the Republicans in the organization of the Senate, although he has been non-committal when the questions were put to him. Everyone here recognizes this fact and the parties are conducting their business at the present time on such assumption. If there is a fight, it will be within the Republican Party as to who will be the Majority Floor Leader. I sincerely hope that such a fight will be avoided because it could cause delays and obstacles in getting on with the work that must be done by the Congress. Such a fight would re-open many of the wounds of the convention that grew out of the Taft-Eisenhower fight. Many of these wounds have measurably healed and it would be silly for them to be re-opened and aggravated. General Eisenhower is the duly elected Presi-

dent of the United States, and it is the duty of everyone, regardless of party or faction, to lend all possible assistance to a speedy and peaceful organization of the New Congress. Some sources here think that Eisenhower may use his influence to name a floor leader with whom he is friendly and closely related. However, the senators who are most likely to take over this job have stated that they do not expect the President-Elect to intervene. Some of their statements have gone far enough to indicate that they would consider it undue interference by the President if he should enter into the floor leader controversy. However, it will be remembered that Roosevelt intervened in such a transaction and obtained the election of Barkley to that position, the same Barkley who is now Vice-President. The truth is that the members of the Senate deeply resent interference from the executive branch of the government in the organization of their body, and rightfully so. Although the executive and legislative branches must cooperate, they are still separate and distinct branches of the government and must remain independent of each other.

There is little likelihood of any kind of fight shaping up in the organization of the House of Representatives. Congressman Joe Martin, of Massachusetts is slated to be Speaker. He was Speaker in the 80th Congress and there is little doubt but that he will become Speaker of the 83rd Congress. A move was started to promote Representative Charles Hallgren out of the Taft-Eisenhower job. Both Mr. Martin and Mr. Halleck are fine gentlemen and able representatives, and could ably fill the Chair. The move behind Mr. Halleck originated be-

cause Mr. Halleck was one of the earliest supporters of General Eisenhower. Representative Martin was a strong supporter and ardent admirer of General MacArthur. Present indications are that Martin will be the Speaker. However, this could easily change within the next few weeks. Organization of the House, both on the Republican and the Democratic side, should be peaceable and the House of Representatives should be about its work soon after it convenes.

THE BIG HEADACHE:

How to cut the budget is the big problem that is facing the incoming administration on the domestic front. If this country is to operate on a balanced budget, there must be some trimming. The present budget is in excess of the income of the Federal Government. Therefore it follows that a cut in the budget does not necessarily mean early reduction of taxes. A sizable cut in the budget is an indispensable predicate, not only to balance the budget, but to create a means of eventual tax reduction. The budget must be cut to around 60 billion dollars before there can be any tax reductions. Tax reductions brought about by reducing the budget to 60 billion dollars would not be much help to the individual. The

tax reduction would actually be less than ten percent. There could be sizable cuts in the budget without any appreciable tax reduction to the lower income groups. That is, the over-all tax structure could be reduced by the reduction of certain phases of that tax structure applicable to the higher income groups and the corporations. If such policy was followed, it would mean that the lower income groups would get very little or no benefit from such reductions. It has been my hope and desire that the first tax reductions go to the lower income group, as they are certainly sorely in need of it. The fastest way to obtain this result is to increase the personal and dependent exemptions. I introduced a bill last session of Congress that would do this, and I intend to re-introduce the bill in the coming session of Congress.

1952 COTTON ACREAGE CARDS:

We appreciate your immediate response on the cotton acreage cards. The sooner the cards are returned, the better it is. If some of you producers have not finished harvesting your crop, keep the cards until you know the approximate number of bales. Those of you who have lost the acreage cards, please come to the county office and fill out some more cards. Remember, as soon as you have completed harvesting your crop, fill out the cards, and drop them in the mail box.

1953 ACP SIGN-UP DAYS ARE ENDED:

The days of 1953 ACP sign-ups are over. In every letter published and sent to producers for the past 2 months there has been an article about the 1953 ACP program. Every producer who planned to carry out practices under the 1953 program was told to sign up with his committeeman or come to the county office. We are in hopes that everyone did that, because December 1, 1952 was the deadline date.

Farmers and ranchers who failed to sign up by that time will not be participants in the 1953 ACP program except in special cases where the farmer or rancher was out of the county during sign-up, acquired an interest in a farm after closing date or failed to sign-up because of prolonged illness. Only a small reserve will be held back by Committeemen for these special cases.

CHISELING OR SUBSOLLING:

Some producers in Donley County are under the impression that chiseling is a 1953 practice. It definitely is not. It is approved for the remainder of the 1952 program year. Several approvals have been issued for chiseling, and if many more producers plan to chisel, remember that this practice has to be completed by December 31, 1952.
