One of these days the killer, Gary Gilmore, who has been getting so much attention through his much publicized demand that the state of Utah go ahead with his execution, will become enough of a national figure to be glorified in tear jerking songs and movies. He's been doing a fair job of getting sympathy, as indicated by the following item written by a Washington correspondent. "Despite the violence that has punctuated his life in and out of prison, Mr. Gilmore had one side of his personality that showed some sensitivity, and he dabbled in poetry and oil painting." As another writer promptly replied, this kind of description of the cold-blooded murderer is "sentimental swill."

The man has had lots of attention for his suicide attempt, his hunger strike and his jail-house betrothal. Besides, he's remembered for his talent in prison escapes. While he is becoming well known for a variety of activity, it seems that the reason for his death sentence is being forgotten.

On July 20 Gilmore murdered David Jensen in a gas station holdup. Jensen, a young former Mormon missionary was working to help pay his way as a law student and support his wife and baby. He was gunned down in cold blood.

The next night Gilmore pulled another holdup, and his victim was Bennie Bushnell, a motel clerk. Bushnell, also married, with one small child and another on the way, was working for money to get back into school. He followed the robber's instruction to the letter, gave him no problem whatever and surrendered \$120 from the cash drawer. Then Gilmore ordered him to lie face down and fired two shots into his head.

Gilmore is the character for whom the sob sisters are shedding tears. They say it's cruel and barbarous to take his life, but they don't seem to have any feelings for the two widows and their orphaned children. Nor do they have any regard for two honest, hard working young men who had a right to life and the pursuit of happiness.

Don't be surprised if a song or a book comes out praising Gilmore as a sensitive, misunderstood person—even though it is an insult to the entire country.

Despite sentimentality by some of our misguided criminal lovers, there seems to be a glimmer of hope in recent judicial and legislative trends. More killers are being sentenced to death. Apparently society is in the process of discovering that leniency to criminals has brought on an increase of crime. This conclusion is supported by the fact that US had fewer murders when convictions and death sentences were frequent. Nowadays a murderer is hard to apprehend and when caught he is hard to convict, after which his light sentence, if any, is soon subject to parole.

Our country, so eager to give everybody a fair shake, goes to ridiculous extreme in respecting the rights of the accused but neglects the rights of the criminal's victims. This wrong way standard even encourages the criminal to murder. The killer, knowing that his punishment for murder is lenient, reasons that the odds are in his favor if he will eliminate the witness who is able to testify against him on some other charge.

This column earnestly hopes not only that the death penalty will come back, but the police will arrest more murderers and the judicial system will bring more to justice—not so much a matter of an eye for an eye as to make society more safe for decent people. It is self evident that crime can be reduced when fewer criminals are turned back on the public to repeat their wrong doing. And it is to be expected that fewer crimes will be committed when arrest and punishment become more likely.

Council Approves Slight Change in Building Code

The Muenster City Council in regular session Monday Dec. 6, voted to modify its building code sufficiently to permit trimmings and decorations of non fireproof materials.

Fireproof roofs and siding had long been required in order to reduce fire hazard and also qualify for better insurance rates.

Tom Herr and Jerry Wimmer appeared before the council asking approval of a Mansard front of wood shingles on their new building now under construction on Main Street. The council decided that because the Mansard addition is a trimming rather than an essential part of the building it can be allowed. The decision was also in line with the council's policy of encouraging improvement of building appearance.

The council also cooperated with Alvin Fuhrman on his request for a change of ordinance on Cable TV. The change is necessary because of a change of regulations by the Federal Communications Commission. A public hearing on the ordinance will be held at the next council meeting on Jan. 3.

Also okayed was a request by Fire Chief Herbert Knabe for parking space reserved for firemen at the city hall. In the past firemen often found no place to park their cars when they came to take the fire truck out on an alarm. Hereafter parking space for three cars is reserved for the firemen.

Three new members were appointed on the library board. They are Jim Gehrig, John Yosten and Ruth Felderhoff succeeding Bill Bedrick, Mattie Endres and Della Hellman.

Relative to the street sweeper problem, the council has lost interest in a used self powered unit and favors a new low-type sweeper to be pulled behind a tractor. Its sweeping brush and other mechanism are geared to the wheels for power.

Other city business concerns a proposed workshop and warehouse for the water and sewer department, Leo Hess and Ted Henschel were asked to gather data on size, cost, etc.

Hornets Assigned To 21 Positions On Dream Team

The 13-A all district team, released after the Hornets dropped out of contention in the state playoff, listed Muenster with six on the first team, seven on the second team and eight on honorable mention.

As regards the first team, which includes both offense and defense, Holiday dominated with 10. Muenster next with 6, then Callisburg 5, Archer City 3, Lindsay 2 and Petrolia 1.

On second team Muenster led with 7, then Holiday 3, Lindsay 5, Callisburg 4, Petrolia 3 and Archer City 1. On honorable mention Muenster and Petrolia tied with 8, Lindsay had 6, Archer City 5, Holiday and Callisburg each 4.

Muenster is represented on the first team by Tim Wolf as quarterback and secondary defense (two positions) plus Mark Sicking running back, Jim Koessler split end, Mark Mollenkopf wing back, and Danny Fisher defensive end.

Hornets on second team are Bryan Sicking at fullback and secondary, also Bert Walterscheid as guard and defensive tackle, Greg Knabe as tackle and defensive guard, and Calvin Otto as linebacker.

On honorable mention Bryan Sicking is listed as defensive end along with his two positions on the second team. Others are Carl Pangel tackle and defensive tackle, Kim Walterscheid center, Terry Lewis guard, Mark Mollenkopf and Nick Walterscheid secondary and Doug Clerlinebacker.

Quota Topped By County UW

Cooke County's United Way campaign went over the top during the past weekend, partly as a result of oversubscribed quotas in Muenster and Myra.

Chairman of the drive, Mike Arrington, reported that a check for \$3,000 brought total county donations to \$75,164.84, which was \$164.84 above the quota originally set. Along with his announcement Arrington expressed appreciation to all of the 160 workers who labored many hours to reach the goal.

Bill Bedrick, Muenster chairman reported that additional donations have been received here since his report early in November that the \$3000 quota had been topped by \$109.50. The final total is \$3219.50.

The report from Myra is that the quota was \$347, the total of last year's donations, and the amount given was an even \$400.

The two communities combined exceeded their quotas by \$272.50.

New Kindergarten Building Planned at Public School

Construction of a kindergarten building for Muenster Public School was the priority consideration at the school board's regular meeting last Thursday night when the members decided unanimously to employ Parker-Croston Associates, an engineer-architect firm to study the proposal and advise on construction of the building and other improvements.

Superintendent L. B. Brunns said Monday that Merv Croston of the engineer firm was due here Wednesday to begin a survey on needs and costs of the facility as a basis for making his recommendation.

The project had its beginning in a meeting of the school board on October 13 when Superintendent Brunns referred to a change in the school law requiring kindergartens to increase class time from a half day to a full day, beginning in August 1977. To get a clear understanding of all angles the board asked Superintendent Brunns to contact Lyman Ellis, architect engineer of the Texas Education Agency.

Mr. Ellis spent all day of October 28 on a survey of the school and community and met with the school board late that afternoon to report on his conclusions. He stressed the urgency of providing a more adequate kindergarten facility.

In their next regular meeting, on November 10, board members discussed the matter in detail and agreed that a competent architect and engineer firm should be selected. They met with representatives of four firms in making their decision. Then, in their December 9 meeting they announced their selection of Parker Croston Associates.

The two appointees were sworn into office Friday by Judge W. C. "Bill" Boyd of the 116 District Court.

Whether still another appointment is upcoming remains to be seen. The question is, did Freeman's appointment create still another vacancy or did it eliminate the job he formerly held?

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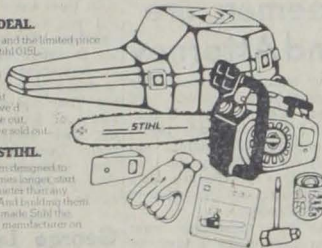
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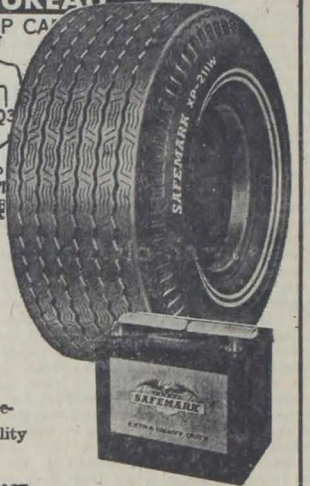
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Letters to The Editor

Who's Who Lists Doris Felderhoff

Doris Felderhoff of Muenster is one of 47 students at Stephen F. Austin State University approved for "Who's Who" Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. She is a senior majoring in health and physical education, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Felderhoff and a graduate of Muenster High School.

Selection for "Who's Who" honors is based on academic accomplishment as well as leadership and citizenship qualities and contributions to the university. A special committee reviews nominations and makes recommendations to the national association. Quota for the number selected is based on the university's enrollment. Biographies of the students will appear in the "Who's Who" national publication for 1976-77.

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Since TP&L began operation almost 65 years ago, providing dependable electric service at a fair price has been a constant aim.

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In 1963 and 1965, TP&L made the eleventh and twelfth general reductions in the price since it began operation. The average price of residential electricity dropped from about 4 cents per kilowatt-hour in 1951 to about 2 cents per kilowatt-hour in 1971.

Costs of producing and supplying electric power began to go up at an unprecedented rate in the early 1970's. In 1972, 1974 and again in 1975, it was necessary for TP&L to ask its customers to pay more for their electricity. The average per kilowatt-hour price rose from about 2 cents in 1971 to about 4 cents in 1976.

In the 1970-1975 period, TP&L's annual expenditures for constructing generating plants, transmission lines and other facilities increased from \$98 million in 1970 to \$268 million in 1975. These expenditures are expected to be several billion dollars in the next 10 years.

Fuels used to produce electricity cost \$26 million in 1970 and \$147 million in 1975. The cost of fuels will be almost \$200 million in 1976.

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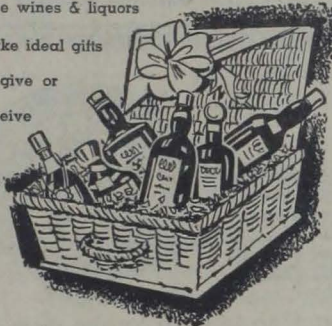

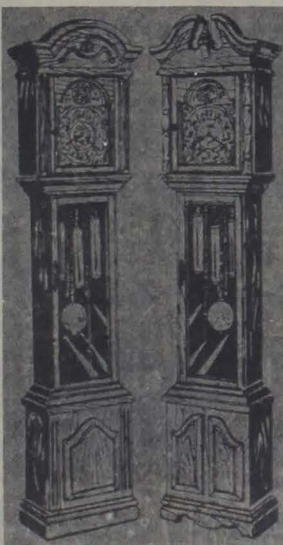

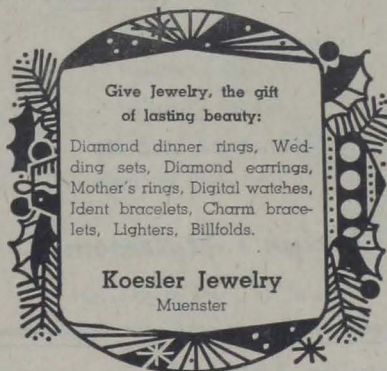

Ten Delegates Represent County At FB Convention

The Cooke County Farm Bureau was represented by ten delegates to the 43rd annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Dec. 5-8 at the Tarrant County Convention Center in Fort Worth. Some 1,500 persons from all parts of Texas attended.

Policies to guide the state's largest farm organization next year were adopted by the more than 1,000 voting delegates representing the 210 organized county units. Also approved were recommendations on national issues. These will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting Jan. 9-12 in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The following are some of the policies favored by convention delegates:

- the use of state sales tax to finance public education in lieu of ad valorem tax;
- a well-head tax on Texas produced gas and oil to be used to lower school taxes;
- oppose labor organizers having access to individual

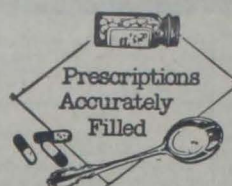

Elm-Red to Have Essay Contest on Soil Conservation

The 17th annual essay contest sponsored by the Upper Elm Red Soil and Water Conservation District has been announced by J. H. Bayer, chairman of the board of directors. Deadline for entry is January 31, 1977 and any boy or girl living in the district who is not a high school graduate is encouraged to enter.

The essay title this year is "Soil and Water Conservation — Present and Future." Bayer said the district will give incentive awards of \$25, \$15 and \$10 for the first three winners, and all will be judged within the three-county district. Bayer urges vocational agriculture and English teachers to use this contest as an incentive for good compositions on conserving natural resources.

The length of the essay is to be 300 words or less. It must be mailed prior to January 31, 1977 to J. H. Bayer, Route 2, Muenster, Tx 76252, with name and address and name of the school plainly written on the front page or attached.

This contest does not jeopardize eligibility in the Interscholastic League.

1 Per Cent Drop In Telephone Tax Coming January 1

Good news for the new year: Telephone customers of the nation are greeted by a reduction of their telephone tax from 6 to 5 per cent, effective on January 1. Though the actual saving will be small for each customer, the welcome and unusual fact is that this tax goes down rather than up.

Suppose one's bill is \$10, the tax will be 50 cents instead of 60. Or on a \$100 bill it will be \$5.00 instead of \$6.00. A rather small saving per individual but, according to Alvin Fuhrman of Muenster Telephone Corp., it will be about \$4,200 saving to Muenster people. Nationwide it will save phone users about \$275 million in 1977. The 1600 companies not in the Bell system are due to save about \$51 million a year.

Congress first imposed the tax on phone bills during World War I as a temporary measure. It was repealed after the war but re-assessed during the big depression — and rates at one time soared to 25 per cent on long distance calls and 15 per cent for local calls.

For almost 20 years the 10 per cent tax applied, then Congress voted to eliminate it gradually at a drop of 1 per cent per year until it ends on Jan. 1, 1982. Through the years the tax has netted many billions to the U.S. Treasury. Amount estimated for next year is \$2 billion.

Education Benefit Of GI Bill Will Change January 1

The President has signed a new G. I. Bill which terminates the existing education benefits for individuals recruited into the military service after December 31, 1976.

Persons currently serving on active duty or who join one of the military services before January 1, 1977, are considered eligible for the present G. I. Bill.

Persons recruited into the military service after December 31, 1976 will be eligible for education aid if they elect to participate voluntarily in a contributory program. Service members would contribute between \$50 and \$75 a month up to a total of \$2700. These funds would be matched by the Veteran's Administration on a two to one basis.

A special feature was Johnny Fisher's showing of a movie, filmed in Fisher's meat processing department, on the several operations involved in producing quarters of beef.

It showed the animal unloaded at the door and directed to the killing room, the skinning, dressing, and division of the carcass into quarters. All along attention is directed to rigidity of inspection by a state licensed man to guard against disease or infection, as well as precautions during the process to avoid contact with anything that might infect, and the sanitary standards that apply all of the way.

The film was made about six years ago, shortly after construction of Fisher's slaughtering plant, by Zubler Mfg. Co. of Minneapolis, which furnished equipment and fixtures used in the facility. It has been used extensively since then as a suggestion to other prospective builders and also to show groups that the operation with inspection need not be limited to the large packing plants. It has been used extensively in Texas and many other places for that purpose, recent requests coming from Idaho, Washington and Oregon. Another use of the film is in a training course for meat inspectors.
