

## County residents set TTC-I-35 information meeting

Residents of Cooke County who wish to learn more about the proposed Trans Texas Corridor are urged to attend an information-providing meeting on Tuesday, June 6. It will be held at 7 p.m. in the Woodbine School cafeteria. Woodbine School is located on FM 3164.

At 6:30 p.m. a free meal of beans, cornbread, and drinks will be served.

Guest speaker Agnes Vogel will share her knowledge. She is an organizer of an opposition group that led a successful campaign on a proposed highway.

A second meeting is planned for Tuesday, June 13 at 7 p.m. also at the Woodbine School cafeteria. Guest speakers include State Representative Rick Hardcastle, a representative from the Austin office of Texas Farm Bureau, and a representative from the Texas Southwest Cattle Raisers Association (TSWCRA). Texas Farm Bureau and TSWCRA have taken a stand in opposition of the TTC because of the harmful impact on rural areas.

Whether or not a person resides in an area that will be acquired for one of the THREE CORRIDORS planned to cross our County

## Saint Jo group rallies to oppose windmill project

A group of landowners and other interested parties are definitely against a plan by Florida Power and Light (F&L) to put large, electric generating windmills in the area. So much against it that they are organizing a campaign to "get the real picture out" about the potential drawbacks to a large scale project.

An initial meeting was held Saturday, May 27 at the North Texas Properties office

in Saint Jo. About 15 individuals were present and decided to begin the process of organizing public meetings, setting up a website and providing information to the general public about the potential impact in the area. The group also agreed to set up a fund for what they believe could be a fight over public opinion.

While not against green energy, many in attendance felt that windmills may not be the best alternative to energy needs, especially in this area. The group feels that more information is necessary for related parties to make a decision on the value of the project, details of which are still sketchy. Their goal is to get that information out and let the public decide.

There will be more meetings to show opposition to the proposed project.

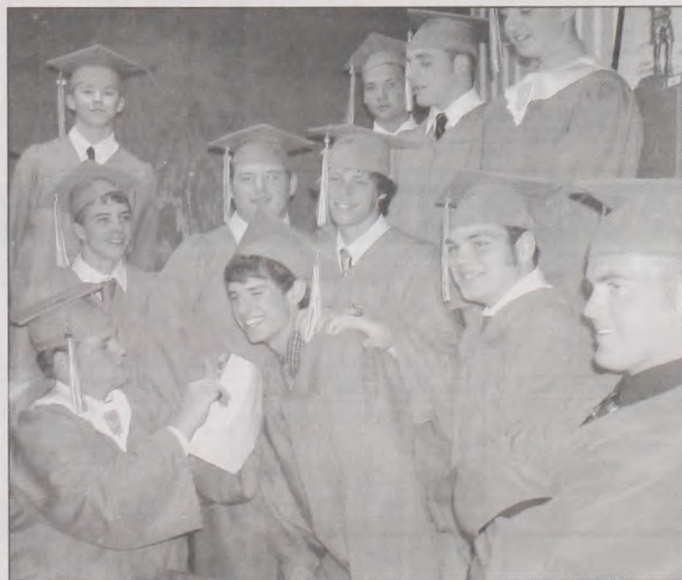
introduced Salutatorian Malcom Martin.

# NCTC Regents approve two-year contract for President Hadlock

Dr. Eddie Hadlock's 32-year career at North Central Texas College will continue for at least two additional years following approval this week by the NCTC Board of Regents of an extension of the college president's contract through August 2008.

The action came in a special meeting of the Board on May 22. As is customary, Board evaluation of the president and consideration of his contract were the only items on the agenda.

"I'm very gratified by this vote of confidence by our Board, of course," Dr. Hadlock said following the meeting, "but moving this college forward is not about me or any other individual or faction. It absolutely must be about what all of us can do, working together, to provide our students with the best education possible."

The NCTC president said he has a number of goals for the college, chief among them the refocusing of the attention of the governing board, the administration, the faculty and staff on what should always be their first and most important consideration in every action and decision—doing what is best for the students.

"Every time we walk into our office, the classroom, or the Board room, that has to be our only agenda," he said. Dr. Hadlock indicated that the two-year term of his new contract is of his choosing, but he did not rule out the possibility of continuing past that

time "if there are still some things I think I can help achieve for the College and, of course, if the Board feels likewise."

The president's new contract included no adjustments to his current salary. Dr. Hadlock told the board members that he preferred they consider any possible adjustment to his pay only as part of a comparable raise for all College employees.

Dr. Hadlock said, "This community needs to know that North Central Texas College is a quality institution. No, everything is not perfect. We have some facilities and technology issues and so forth that we're working hard to address, but we are continuing to grow and so many positive and exciting things are happening at all of our campuses."

The vote on Dr. Hadlock's new two-year contract was 6-0-1, with the abstention by regent Steve Gaylor.

Dr. Hadlock has served as NCTC's ninth president since March 2005, having served for the previous seven months as interim president. His career in education includes two years of public school teaching in addition to his 30-plus years of community college teaching and administration. At North Central Texas College, Dr. Hadlock has served in virtually every area of college operations.

In addition to part-time teaching assignments—one academic (psychology) and

one technical (electronic spreadsheets) and a staff assignment as vocational counselor—he has served in all the following administrative positions: Director of Counseling & Testing, Associate Dean of Instruction for Continuing Education, Director of Admissions/Registrar, Dean of Student Services, Dean of Arts & Sciences, Vice President of Instruction, Interim President, and President.

Prior to completing his undergraduate degree he knew that he wanted to work in a college setting in some capacity. After completing his military obligation with the United States Navy, he began his graduate work which included a minor in community college education.

"Over the years, I have become even more strongly convinced that I made the right choice by focusing my career at the community college level," he said. "Every day, I see what a profoundly positive difference it can make in the lives of those we serve."

"We provide that important stepping stone to a better life, whether it's immediate entry into the work force or up to the university level for more academic preparation. At a public community college like NCTC, that opportunity is both accessible and affordable."

"I like to say that NCTC is a great place to start and a great place to start over."

## Reiter elected president of Lindsay ISD Board

Lloyd Reiter now heads the Lindsay ISD Board of Trustees. He was elected to the position of president at the May 22 meeting. Jill Fuhrmann was elected to serve as vice-president and Danny Nortman as secretary.

Dr. Jason Ceyanes, Lindsay ISD superintendent, reviewed damage caused by the storm the came through the County on April 28. There was damage done to the roof of the new gymnasium, to a storage shed that the Ag students were building, and to the covered trailer that the Booster Club bought and donated to the District.

Dr. Ceyanes presented a brief update on the facility plan for building improvements for the 2005-06 budget year. Discussion featured summer construction items as recommended by Ceyanes.

Review by Dr. Ceyanes on the preliminary status of the 2006-07 budget followed. He noted that Lindsay ISD is going to benefit from the funding, but that the school start date will be the biggest issue in 2007-08.

Athletic Director Cody Bounds announced that the track team finished as the State Runner-up, softball finished as Bi-District Champs, tennis mixed doubles was third at the Regional meet,

and the golf team competed at the Regional meet. The football 7 on 7 is competing at Aubrey, and planning for the basketball summer league is progressing. Bounds said that positive feedback was received from the athletic handbook meeting.

In other business the Board:

- Approved contracts with the Education Service Center Region XI for Basic Contract Services, Instructional Services, Technology Services, Training Services, Administrative Services, Business Services, Win School, Network Support, PEIMS, and the Title II, Part D Shared Services.

- Approved expenditures up to \$23,000 for the renovation of a classroom into an elementary science lab.

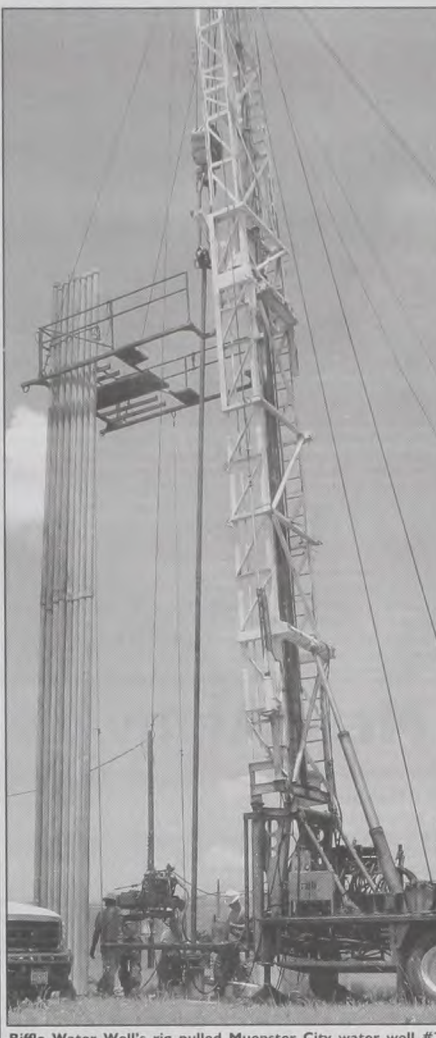
- Approved expenditures up to \$20,000 for roof repairs and maintenance.

- Approved the 2006-07 Supplemental Pay Scale.

- Approved transfer students as presented by the Administration.

- After reconvening from Executive Session, the Board approved the Superintendent's professional employee contract recommendations for Brady Carney and Joe Watson for the 2006-07 school year.

## OIL & GAS STATS

**April permits to drill**  
The Commission issued a total of 1,452 original drilling permits in April 2006 compared to 1,339 in April 2005. The April total included 1,223 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 69 to re-enter existing well bores, and 160 for re-completions. Permits issued in April 2006 included 285 oil, 368 gas, 735 oil and gas, 54 injection, zero service, and 10 other permits.

**April oil and gas completions**

In April 2006, operators reported 281 oil, 676 gas, 33 injection, and one other completion compared to 308 oil, 369 gas, 21 injection, and six other completions during April 2005.

Total well completions for 2006 year to date are 4,390, up from 3,193 recorded during the same period in 2005.

Operators reported 232 holes plugged and zero dry holes in April 2006 compared to 606 holes plugged and 132 dry holes in April 2005.

# BP doesn't have to climb

Over half of Americans over age 60 have high blood pressure, but that does not mean it is part of normal aging, said a Texas Cooperative Extension specialist.

High blood pressure, or hypertension, is sometimes called the "silent killer" because its symptoms are not always seen or felt, said Andrew B. Crocker, Extension gerontology health specialist.

"You can have hypertension and still feel just fine," Crocker said. "However, hypertension is a major health problem. If not treated, it can lead to stroke, heart disease, eye problems, or kidney failure, among other things."

The good news, he said, is high blood pressure can be prevented or controlled.

Whether going in for a check-up or major surgery, having one's blood pressure checked is a standard procedure for health providers.

The top number is the systolic pressure, which tells how much blood pushes against the blood vessel walls as the heart beats. The bottom number measures the pressure while the heart relaxes between beats. This is the diastolic pressure.

"If your blood pressure is normal, according to current recommendations, your systolic pressure is less than 120 and your diastolic pressure is less than 80,"

Crocker said. For older people, the top number often is high (greater than 140), but the bottom number is normal (less than 80), he said. This problem is called isolated systolic hypertension, the most common form of high blood pressure in older people, and can lead to serious health problems.

"If you are diagnosed with hypertension, your health care provider will probably want you to make changes in your daily habits to try and lower those numbers," he said.

The doctor may also ask individuals to check their blood pressure at home at different times of the day, Crocker said. If the numbers are still high after several checks, he or she will probably suggest medication, as well as changes in diet and exercise.

The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute suggests the following healthy habits to help control or prevent high blood pressure:

- Keep a healthy weight.
  - Exercise every day.
  - Eat more fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy foods.
  - Cut down on salt and sodium.
  - Drink less alcohol.
- Drinking alcohol can affect blood pressure, as it decreases the amount of water in the body. As a general rule, men shouldn't have more than two drinks a

day, women not more than one drink a day.

"If lifestyle changes alone do not control your high blood pressure, your health provider may tell you to take blood pressure pills," Crocker said.

"It is important to note any significant changes in your health or level of functioning once you start taking blood pressure medication," he said. "The dose may need to be adjusted to suit your needs."

Other things to remember are:

- All health providers should be told about high blood pressure and steps that are being taken to treat it.

- Health providers should be told about all drugs being taken, even over-the-counter drugs, vitamins and dietary supplements. They may affect blood pressure and how well medicine works.

- Blood pressure pills should be taken at the same time each day. Don't double a dose if one is missed.

- Blood pressure should be tested at home between check-ups. Relax quietly for five minutes, sitting with feet on the floor and your back leaning against something, before taking your blood pressure. The arm should rest on a support at heart level. Keep the results to share with the doctor.

"With a little effort and attention, you can make great strides in preventing hypertension from affecting you and your family," Crocker said.

it is simply better to be yourself, than to fit in with the rest of the world."

Life is not fair was her second lesson. "Things will never totally go our way, but we have learned to make the best of the situation," Leah said. "We must hold our own and roll with the punches that life loves throwing at us."

The third life lesson Leah addressed was, "Wisdom is choosing now what you want later." She said that as high school graduates they had the opportunity to determine their futures. "It is now our turn to take the baton and finish the rest of the race, or jump the remaining hurdles in our paths."

Leah's fourth, and she felt, most important life lesson was, "It's not where you've been, it's where you're going." She added that no matter what a person's financial, social, or educational status has been, all of it is subject to change. "We are about to turn another page in the books of our lives," remarked Leah. "Although it is incredibly scary to think about, it is incredibly exciting at the same time. We are one step closer to leading our own lives the way we want to, which can be a beautiful thing if we make the right decisions. It is comforting to know that we are not alone in this stage of our lives. We MUST rely on God, first and foremost. Secondly, we must refer to our parents and mentors. Thirdly, we must fall back on our friends, whether new college friends or old high school buddies, for comic relief and for companionship."

Valedictorian Abby Endres shared her philosophy of the Class of 2006. "The number three is often used to represent completeness," stated Abby. "A complete paper has an introduction, a body, and a conclusion. A complete life has a past, a present, and a future. Likewise, the Class of 2006 has three outstanding characteristics that make it and have made our years here at Muenster High School complete."

Creativity is what she said was the most prevalent quality of their class. "This quality in itself sets a strong foundation for a successful future, because no matter what happens in each of our lives, we know that we will always live every day to the fullest and make any and all situations fun and exciting."

Strength is the second characteristic that she focused on. "The utter fortitude found in this group of people is remarkable," Abby commented. She said that you must celebrate with them when they excel personally, but also grieve and suffer with them in times of sorrow.

Respect for the world and everyone in it is necessary to be a leader. "Position and title, in and of itself, signify nothing," Barrett noted. Her third piece of advice was to work harder than anyone working with you. She asked, "How can you convince people that accomplishment is important to them if you don't demonstrate by your actions that it is important to you?" Attention to detail was another important thing for a leader. A sense of humor is needed, she said. Maintain an open door policy and make decisions quickly were her last bits of advice.

## Full-Day Pre-K class offered at Muenster ISD starting this fall

Beginning with the 2006-07 school year, Muenster Elementary's Pre-K program will go "all day"; there will be only one section. Children must be four years old by Sept. 1, 2006 to enroll. Pre-K registration was held the week of April 10-13, but will continue until our quota is met. There will be a full-time aide working with the teacher at all times.

A child must meet one of the following criteria to be eligible or qualify for the free pre-kindergarten program:

1. Primary language spoken at home is other than

English.  
2. Be educationally disadvantaged (includes students that qualify for the National Breakfast/Lunch Program).

Since the school district receives funds based upon eligible students, all parents are asked to complete the National Breakfast/Lunch Free/Reduced Program Form.

The 77th Legislature passed Senate Bill 596 which allows a school district to offer a pre-kindergarten program for "ineligible" students on a tuition basis.

Based upon Senate Bill

596, the Muenster ISD School Board establishes a tuition rate for each school year. For students who qualify due to meeting one of the above mentioned criteria, there is no tuition. For students who do not qualify, the tuition is \$13 per day. There will not be any refunds for absentees. School start date is Friday, Aug. 11.

## Getting to the root of the problem

One of the major causes of tree failure is root damage. When a tree's root system has been extensively damaged, the whole tree can fall to the ground (or onto your house). "Most homeowners look up to assess the trees in their landscape," notes Peter Gerstenberger, senior advisor for safety, compliance, and standards with the Tree Care Industry Association. "Unfortunately, a significant amount of the information on tree health and structural integrity lies unseen below ground."

Trees can fall over because the roots can no longer anchor their weight. In the urban and suburban landscape, roots can be lost or damaged by excavation, trenching, soil compaction, excess fill, paving, fungal decay, or environmental stresses such as drought or flooding.

"Some of the indicators of root problems can be detected by homeowners, while others can only be diagnosed by a professional arborist using sophisticated tools," said Gerstenberger. Homeowners should look for signs and symptoms that could indicate root problems.

Common symptoms include decline in the tree canopy, usually starting at the top but occasionally affecting one side or major branches throughout the canopy. A tree with an increasing lean, especially with soil heaving around its base, is another sure symptom of root problems.

Signs of root problems include dead roots, broken roots, and presence of fungal fruiting bodies (mushrooms) at the base of the tree or radiating out from the base.

Roots sustain the live branches and leaves above the ground. When the relationship is disrupted by root disease, decay or loss, leaf cover will thin and branches will begin to die as the tree's energy reserves dwindle.

**On the way down ... causes of root damage**  
Sometimes it is obvious that utility trenches, repaving, grading, or soil compaction occurred in the tree's root zone. To determine how much damage the root system sustained, a professional arborist can estimate how much of the critical rooting area was damaged within the Critical Root Zone (CRZ). The CRZ is a circular area around the stem of the tree, usually

larger than the area defined by the outer reaches of the tree's branches, known as the dripline.

Think of the tree as both a structure and a living organism. As a rule of thumb, up to 40% of the root system can be damaged - causing problems for the living organism - before the tree's structure is seriously impaired. Conversely, the tree can be biologically healthy while the main roots it counts on for support are deteriorated.

It can be difficult to assess damage to the root system. A tree may have a restricted root system because of impervious soils, or limited space to grow due to building or sidewalks. If new curbs or sidewalks were installed or trenches dug for utilities,

essential roots could have been damaged or removed during the construction. If any of the main roots inside the CRZ are damaged or missing, the risk of tree failure is greatly increased.

What can you do? Be on the lookout for the signs and symptoms of root damage. These symptoms can be subtle, even undetectable to the untrained eye.

A professional arborist can accurately diagnose root problems and potentially take corrective action. Homeowners who would like a professional arborist to assess their trees should contact the Tree Care Industry Association (TCIA), a 68-year old public and professional resource on trees and arboriculture. TCIA has the nation's only

Accreditation program that helps consumers find tree care companies that have been inspected and accredited based on: adherence to industry standards for quality and safety; maintenance of trained, professional staff; and dedication to ethics and quality in business practices. ## Alcohol abuse not just a younger generation problem

Underage drinking is a large problem in America and much effort is focused on its prevention, said a Texas Cooperative Extension specialist. However, older adults may be at a higher risk for alcohol abuse.

Andrew B. Crocker, Extension gerontology health specialist, said alcohol abuse among older adults may be attributed to many things, including depression, isolation, grief, and fear.

Studies from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services estimate 17% of those over age 60 misuse alcohol. They also show alcohol-related hospitalization rates are similar to those for heart attacks.

Because aging may change the body's composition and the way it processes alcohol, older adults need to be

especially concerned when consuming alcoholic beverages, Crocker said.

Often the signs of alcoholism in older adults may be mistaken for other common problems associated with aging, he said. Alcohol consumption dulls the senses and balance, which may lead to falling. Confusion, memory loss, and lack of concentration may also be mistaken for dementia.

Another concern is medications can interact with alcohol, leading to increased risk of illness, injury or death, Crocker said. Alcohol-medication interactions are estimated to be a factor in at least 25% of all emergency room admissions. An unknown number of less serious interactions may go unrecognized or unrecorded.

Older adults may be especially likely to mix drugs and alcohol and are at particular risk for the adverse consequences of such combinations, he said. Although persons age 65 and older constitute only 12% of the population, they consume 25 to 30% of all prescription medications.

Alcohol may stop a drug's breakdown in the body, increasing the risk of experiencing harmful side effects from the drug, he said. Long-term alcohol consumption may decrease the drug's potency and lessen its effects, or alcohol may transform some drugs into toxic chemicals that can damage the liver or other organs.

Interactions may also occur with anesthetics given during surgery, antibiotics, blood thinners, antidepressants, diabetic medications, pain relievers, and almost any other type of medication, he said.

While current nutrition guidelines allow two alcoholic beverages per day for men and one per day for women, older adults should still take caution when consuming alcohol, especially in excess,

Crocker said.

The National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism recommends that those over age 65 should have no more than one drink per day. Signs of alcoholism may vary from person to person, depending on their individual tolerance for alcohol, Crocker said.

"Whether you have been a lifelong heavy-drinker or only recently developed a drinking problem, alcohol abuse is a very serious problem," he said.

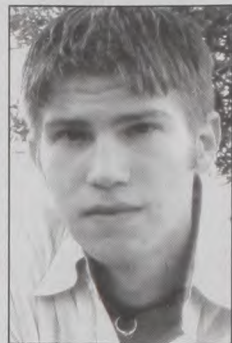
The National Institute on Aging recommends seeking help if someone exhibits some of the following symptoms:

- Drinks to calm nerves, forget worries, or reduce depression.
- Gulps down drinks.
- Frequently has more than

one drink per day.  
- Lies about or tries to hide drinking.  
- Hurts self or others while drinking.  
- Feels irritable, resentful, or unreasonable when not drinking.  
- Has medical, social, or financial worries caused by drinking.

"If you think that you or a loved one has a problem with alcohol abuse, speak to your health provider and share your concern with him or her," Crocker advised. "Hopefully, he or she will be aware of treatment programs or other options in your area that may help you with your alcohol abuse problem."

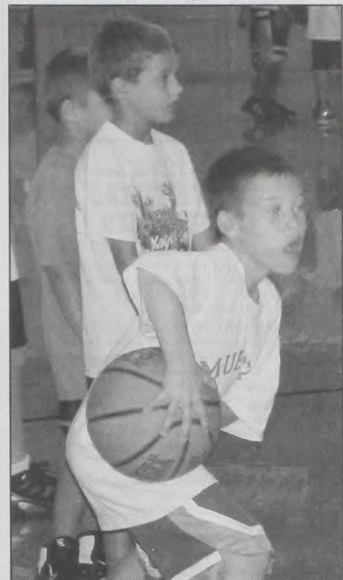

### RAINTREE HUNTING TIPS

**Safety first**  
 Turkey hunting has become very popular and some turkey hunting locations have become very crowded. For this reason, as well as others, hunting safety is a top priority.

Don't wear "gobbler-head" colors — red, white, and blue. Even the top of the white T-shirt behind the open collar of a camo shirt stands out in the woods. Consider exposing fluorescent orange while you are moving through the woods.

Always sit with your back

protected by a tree or rock that's wider than you are. Pick set-up positions that give you a long view of the front and sides. Never carry a decoy fully exposed through the woods.

If you see another hunter approaching your camouflaged location, speak up in a loud and clearly human voice. Never try to signal with your call or wave your hand. Most important, always be absolutely sure of your target and what is behind it before you pull the trigger.

**Game warden helps transport heart attack victim ...** A Chambers County game warden was asked by the sheriff's office to assist in transporting EMS personnel to a camp house on the Trinity River that can be accessed by boat only. An individual had suffered a heart attack and needed assistance. The subject was transported to the hospital and was listed in stable condition.

**Shellfish violators keep wardens busy ...** Two Harris County game wardens caught an oyster boat captain

harvesting oysters in a prohibited area in Galveston Bay. Thirty-eight sacks of oysters were returned to the reef, and the captain was transported to the Chambers County Jail. Game wardens all along the coast have had a busy spring checking oyster boats and returning under-sized shellfish to local reefs.

## Changes in mine land reclamation guidelines benefit quail

New alternatives for reclaiming mined lands in Texas means thousands of acres of new quail habitat could be realized each year, according to wildlife biologists with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A cooperative effort between TPWD and the Railroad Commission of Texas has paved the way for mined lands to be reclaimed into habitat that would support quail and other upland grassland bird species. Texas currently has 13 operating mines and six mines going through the reclamation process. There are about 55,000 acres of mine land reclaimed annually in Texas.

Quail are considered by wildlife officials to be a keystone indicator species of the health of grassland ecosystems. When their numbers fall, other species that inhabit those ecosystems follow in a domino effect. A diverse cooperative, working under the umbrella of the TQCI, is making landscape level conservation progress to help ensure the dominos won't topple.

Throughout their range, bobwhite quail populations nationwide have declined from an estimated 59 million birds in 1980 to about 20 million in 1999.

## TPWD Game Warden Field Notes

The following are excerpts from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

**It's some kind of animal, and someone killed it** — On June 20, a Cherokee County game warden received information from his partner about a deer carcass that had been dumped on a county road. The game warden proceeded to contact a local county constable, who had the person in custody for illegal dumping of televisions and the deer carcass. The game warden interviewed the Jacksonville man, who said he found the deer on his property and just wanted it off his property. The game warden went to the subject's house and found where the deer had been cleaned and found quartered deer meat in the freezer. The subject told the game warden the meat was from a butchered cow. He later confessed that he did not shoot the deer but let his friend clean the deer at his house. The game warden and constable made contact with the friend. He confessed to shooting the deer, but said he thought the deer was a goat. Cases pending.

**The toughest call a game warden gets** — As marine safety enforcement officers, game wardens respond to all Texas boating accident calls and numerous drownings and near-drownings. The most difficult of those cases to work are the ones involving children. In

mid-June, central Texas game wardens responded to a call about a missing eight-year-old boy last seen on a sand bar in Lake Buchanan. Game wardens, LCRA rangers, and area dive teams searched the lake until dark with no success. The next day at daylight, the wardens were hampered by storms for a few hours, then hit the water with drags. A Department of Public Safety helicopter was called in to assist due to shallow and clear water conditions. The young boy surfaced during the search and was recovered by game wardens Saturday afternoon.

**Never was much good at math** — On June 16, Aransas County game wardens apprehended a commercial bait shrimp boat with 2,600 croaker over his legal limit of 1,500. When asked how many croaker he had, the captain stated that he had exactly 1,500. The game wardens asked him if he was sure, because they were about to count them. The captain allowed as how he might have a few over his limit. Cases pending.

**Crowded waterways call for extra care** — On June 4, game wardens from Clay and Wichita Counties responded to a boating accident on Lake Arrowhead involving a five-year-old boy who was swimming next to a boat while holding on to a ski rope. The rope, which was wrapped around the boy's leg, was caught by another

passing boat, causing partial amputation of the boy's leg just below the knee. The game wardens were within 1,000 yards of the accident and assisted the victim and his family off the lake and to the hospital within five minutes of the accident. The victim's prognosis for recovery was said to be good.

**Lunker citation for poacher** — In early June a Coryell County game warden received information about a subject who, although under a license suspension for killing a 200-class white-tailed deer at night, had been participating in fishing tournaments. The subject had fished in a tournament on Lake Belton and won first place, and the game warden found that he was going to fish in another tournament. The Coryell County game warden, along with a game warden from Bell County, both were in attendance at the 2 a.m. tournament weigh-in. The subject gave the wardens a written statement, and a Class A misdemeanor charge of fishing while license suspended is pending.
