

Enforcement phase of new booster seat law begins June 1

Are you ready for the next phase of the new booster seat law? Starting June 1, law enforcement officers may issue citations for violations of the recent changes to the child passenger safety law.

The law requires all children younger than eight years old – unless already taller than 4'9" – to be in the appropriate child safety seat system anywhere the child rides in a passenger vehicle.

The law also requires that all safety seat systems (safety or booster seats and safety vests) be installed according to the manufacturers instructions – including age, height, weight requirements, and the proper placement in the vehicle. (Some manufacturers prohibit using their products on the front seats of vehicles).

The law was passed last year during the legislative session and went into effect on Sept. 1, 2009. Officers could only issue verbal or written warmings for the first nine months – but now the enforcement phase is in effect.

Fines are \$25 to \$250 plus court costs...potentially much more than the cost of a safety or booster seat.

Safety seats and booster seats not only save lives: they save families. Consider the impact to your family if your child isn't buckled up properly and is injured or killed in a crash. Many times the injuries an improperly restrained child receives are life-long. Are you ready for the consequences of not securing a child?

MHMRST helps people combat the voices of schizophrenia

Childhood abuse can be linked to persons who suffer with schizophrenia. Joanne (not her real name) was one who was physically, sexually, and emotionally abused throughout her childhood years. Her father was physically and emotionally abusive, but it was one of his friends who raped her when she was around the age of eight. She was fortunate that she had a supportive grandmother and grandfather who took her in when her father physically beat her. Her grandfather was her best friend who believed in her. He would listen to anything she had to say. He told her she was special and would one day find help. She also has a brother, an uncle, and two aunts who take special interest in her well-being since she has begun working hard to be compliant with her treatment for her mental illness through Mental Health Mental Retardation Services of Texoma (MHMRST).

Joanne states, "Thad invisible friends and heard voices beginning at five years old. I told my grandmother about the voices, but she did not know how to help me. Finally at age 16, my grandmother took me to a counselor, but I was reluctant to tell him exerything. I did not give him enough information, thus it was impossible for him to really help me. As I got older, I dropped out of school and began taking street drugs. Like many people with mental illness, I was self-medicating and thought the drugs were helping me. Of course, they were not helping, they were making things worse.

"I have been married four times to abusive husbands. I have one 16 year old son who has not lived with me since he was five. He lived with my grandmother until

she passed away. After my grandmother's death, one of my aunts was court-appointed as his caregiver. Recently he has been diagnosed with bi-polar disorder and is being seen by a professional. I will not let him experiment with street drugs the way I did. I want his life to be different than mine. When he turns 17, he plans to live with me. We want to be a family again," she continued.

"For years, I rejected help. I have been in jail twice. My last stay was three months in the county jail and eight months in a state facility. I tried to seek help with MH-MRST earlier, but I was not compliant and did not get better. Then in 2007, I was in trouble with the law again, received help from MH-MRST, became compliant, and now I am not the same person. I have tried to commit suicide several times in the past because the voices in my head were telling me to do it. Without MH-MRST, I would be dead, strung out on drugs, or in a mental hospital," said Joanne.

"My caseworker, Sandy Haverkamp, has really made a difference in my life. I owe her and MH-MRST everything. She helps me with my problems and has taught me how to deal with my illness. I am trying to enroll in GED classes, and I want to work. The psychiatrist told me that I would always hear voices, but they will become less and less. I have an uncle who helps keep me in reality. I can tell him what is going on with the voices, and he assures me it is not really happening. One of my aunts is my

overseer and makes sure I keep my MHMRST appointments," ended Joanne.

MHMRST is the local MHMR community center and has served Cooke, Fannin, and Grayson counties since 1974. Mental health centers are located in Cooke County at 301 West Broadway, Gainesville, 940-665-3962; Fannin County, 1221 East 6th Street, Bonham, 903-583-583; and Grayson County, 315 West McLain, Sherman, 903-957-4701.

Services available are: 24 Hour Emergency Services, the Assertive Community Treatment Team (ACT), Case Management, Cognitive Behavior Therapy, Community Based Assessments, Crisis Intervention, Medication-Related Services, Respite Services, Skills Training, Small Groups, Supported Housing, and Transportation. For more information and help, call your local mental health center.

For the week ending May 8, feeder cattle price trends at Texas auctions were again mixed, from \$4 lower per hundredweight to \$5 higher compared to a week ago. Calves weighing less than 600 pounds showed the most decline as many buyers have likely met their needs for summer grazing while tight supplies and higher fed cattle prices supported the market for heavier feeders.

Cotton and grain prices were mostly lower on concerns that the debt crisis in Europe and a stronger dollar would weaken export demand.

Many locations across the state recorded rainfall last week with amounts ranging from a trace to one inch. Topsoil moisture levels remain mostly adequate to short with surplus or very short conditions reported in some areas.

Winter wheat is now 72% headed, slightly behind average, with the crop reported in mostly good to fair condition. Corn planting progressed to 85% complete, equal to the normal pace, but ahead of last year. Sixty-seven percent of the crop has emerged. Planting was also active and ahead of the normal pace for grain sorghum, peanuts, rice, and other crops. Crops and pastures were reported in good to fair condition with most showing an overall condition rating much higher than at this time last year.


