A recent release by US Press Association calls attention to an article in which syndicated columnist Ralph DeToledano refers to a Gallup poll showing that students polled in 57 colleges estimated that American business earns an after-tax profit of 45 per cent.

First, let's make note of the fact that the item said college students, not high school students. These students, who presumably are informed, whom we can expect to understand the fundamentals of business, actually do not have the faintest idea of what is going on. The figure they estimate would be out of line for gross profit before deducting the usual expenses of labor, management, rent, taxes, etc., but these economic illiterates apparently think it is the amount a retailer has left for himself out of a sales dollar.

Actually the figure is a tiny fraction of 45 per cent. Latest available statistics show industry profit at 4.3 per cent and retail profit at 1.2 per cent. It means that the average store operator gets about \$1.20 out of \$100 of sales.

The crazy estimate of the college students points up the fact that American business has a problem on its hands. American students' minds have been poisoned by leftist professors and leftist textbooks which are dedicated to wrecking our free enterprise system. The plotters behind the scheme know very well that the communist goal of global control cannot permit individuals to operate their business any more than it can allow them to go and do and speak as they wish. Some of the people spreading the message probably do not realize the extent of their disservice to the nation, nor their own possible future under red dictatorship.

The great irony about all this is that the false gospel preached by left wing instructors and textbooks is indirectly endorsed by the very organization which ought to be cracking down on it, State and federal government, which ought to be dedicated to our government's survival, have allowed the principle of academic freedom to be so grotesquely twisted that it completely defeats its own purpose.

Educators have long held the principle that ideas of all kinds deserve a hearing. For instance, the views opposing free enterprise may reasonably be presented and refuted in order to increase understanding and appreciation of our own system. But it should be presented for what it is, a false theory, instead of gospel truth. And the wild statistics which support it, such as the claim of 45 per cent net profit, should not be tolerated by the government. Instead we have the absurd predicament of vicious lies being presented with official approval.

We sincerely hope that government before too late will come to realize how it is headed for disaster. Allowing false teachers and false textbooks to keep going can be of service only to the evil forces which seek our destruction.

Also involved in this predicament are American businessmen who allow the misinformation to spread by just doing nothing. They are to blame for not presenting their side of the story forcibly and intelligently to the American public. Really, it seems absurd that so many ideas and products can be successfully presented by the high pressure public relations people, but this one vital feature of the American way gets little if any attention. On the contrary it seems that the promotion is devoted to spreading the false story while the truth is ignored.

It is indeed time for business leaders, both large and small, to shake off their unconcern and start seeing that their story gets told through booklets, pamphlets, brochures, films, advertisements and whatever else they need to do the job.

Furthermore they ought to use their influence to help rid high schools and colleges

Parade and Drawing To Open Yule Season

The Muenster Chamber of Commerce and Muenster Jaycees are set for the annual big parade and drawing and Santa visit which will usher the Christmas season into town Saturday afternoon.

First event of the triple occasion is the parade, which this year has a number of prizes as special inducement for entries. Awards of \$60, \$30 and \$10 will be given for outstanding floats, and awards of \$30, \$10 and \$10 will be given for other units, such as riding clubs, antique cars, decorated car, etc. Also an award of \$10 will be given to every band and drill team.

Prize money was provided by Jr. Elite, Cooke County Distributing Company and the Chamber of Commerce. Judges are Edgar Dyer and Mmes. David Bright, James Walterscheid, John Mosman and B.J. Swirczynski.

The parade will assemble at 1 p.m. on Mesquite Street between Wilde's and Muenster Butane. Beginning at 1:30 it will move west on the highway to Main then north to Sixth Street where it will break up. After that Santa will return downtown for his visit with the kiddies.

While the parade is assembling another new feature is provided for the waiting crowd on Main Street. It is a presentation of Christmas songs by the Muenster Choral Group.

Santa's visit will be very similar to those of recent years. He will have goodies for the little ones and will also welcome them for serious Christmas talk.

Meanwhile adults will turn their attention to goodies provided for them by local business people. Several hundred dollars worth of prizes will be given in about 50 separate drawings sponsored by participating merchants. In each case the sponsor will have a box of registration forms from which a name will be drawn to receive the prize he gave. Some sponsors will have prizes for two or more winners.

Both the drawing and the Santa visit will be held on Main Street between First and Second.

Committee members for the big event are Bertha Hamric, general chairman; Al Hess, music; Jewel Otto, pickup of registrations; L. B. Bruns, PA system; Mr. and Mrs. Len Endres recording prizes, Steve Mosier, traffic control; Willie Walterscheid, announcer; U. J. Endres, providing truck platform for drawing. Muenster Jaycees, with Jim Endres as general chairman, will be in charge of the parade and Santa's visit.

KC Free Throw Contest Set for December 7 at 7

Muenster Knights of Columbus again this year are cooperating with their state council in sponsoring a state wide contest in basketball free throws. All boys and girls in 11 to 14 year old age groups, as of July 1, 1976, are eligible to enter. Actually there will be eight contests... that is for boys and for girls in each of the four age groups.

The contest will be held in four stages: council, district, regional and state. The first, to be completed in December, is scheduled here for next Tuesday, December 7, at 7 p.m. in the Muenster High School gym. All youngsters of the eligible ages from Muenster, Saint Jo, Forestburg and Rosston are invited to enter.

Each contestant will be allowed 15 free throws from the foul line. If two or more are tied for high score they will go to the second round in which each gets 5 free throws. As long as a tie continues they will continue shooting, 5 throws per round until a winner is determined.

W. Walterscheid's \$10,000 Collection Of Guns Stolen

A gun collection with value estimated at \$10,000 was stolen Friday night from the home of Willie Walterscheid. The theft occurred while the family was attending the Muenster-Whitewright regional football game in Sherman and was discovered as soon as they returned home.

Until Monday no clues had been uncovered in the burglary which was efficiently carried out by entering the gun cabinet with its proper key and leaving no fingerprints. Possible fore knowledge was also indicated by the fact that the thief went into the rooms of the two sons and took their guns also. The only other item missing is a hair dryer.

Walterscheid's 26 piece collection consists of shotguns, rifles and pistols, including two shotguns of special sentimental value which used to belong to his father.

This is the second time the collection has been burglarized. The other was several years ago when it was considerably smaller, and was later recovered.

MHS Meets De Leon In UIL Quarterfinal

The Muenster Hornets, already farther than they have ever been in UIL competition, are fully determined to keep going Friday night in their encounter with the defending state champions of DeLeon. Kickoff time is 8 o'clock in Weatherford.

The Bearcats were 32-7 winners over Clifton last week while the Hornets eliminated Whitewright 28-14, leaving them as two of the eight teams presently serving the Class A state playoff. The game is the quarter final after which two more games will be needed to determine who is Number 1 in Texas.

As seen by Coach Don Jones, De Leon will be Muenster's toughest opponent to date. With hold-over talent from last year's state championship, it is a solid team about equal to the Hornets in size and speed, and also matching the MHS record of 10-2.

Hornets Win Regional Title in 28-14 Win over Whitewright

The Fighting Hornets of MHS did a great job last Friday night in winning the school's first regional football title. They were district champions three times before, then lost bi-district to Lockett and lost the regional to Coalinga in two consecutive years.

Their 28-14 win over Whitewright's Tigers was even more decisive than the score. Muenster dominated for more than three quarters, whereas the famous Tiger offense did not start to click until the fourth and a half minutes when its inspired effort came too little and too late.

Those final minutes, however, gave the disappointed Whitewright fans something to cheer about while they gave Muenster fans a taste of tension. The Tigers operated with professional efficiency. During the fourth and a half minutes they scored 14 points and barely missed another TD.

Until then Muenster led 21-6 in first downs and 386-99 in total yardage besides 28-0 in score. But then the Tigers exploded with a 79 yard kick

return followed by a great passing attack for 109 yards and five first downs.

On the first play after opening kickoff Stan Smith gave a sample of his work by zig-zagging 19 yards to the Tiger 42. As the game went on he accounted for almost all of his team's rushing yardage.

However the second series did not go well for the Tigers. Two tries gained 3, a pass went incomplete, and Whitewright had to punt.

Starting from their 32, the Hornets put on a fine drive of 68 yards in 11 plays, overcoming 10 yards of penalties along the way. Eight of the plays, including a 30 yard gain by Mark Sicking reached the 5, where a holding penalty moved the ball back to the 20. Sicking gained 10 in

two tries and the next one got nowhere, so Nick Walterscheid came in for a field goal try. On that play Whitewright was offside giving Muenster 5 free yards. With only 5 to go, Coach Don Jones decided to go for it. Mark Sicking made it easily on a pitch-out from Wolf and a sprint around left end. Nick Walterscheid followed with the first of four extra point kicks.

Mark Sicking's running was an outstanding feature of the game. He gained 153 the first half and 80 the second for a total of 233. Also his brother, Bryan, gained 62 and Tim Wolf gained 63.

Starting from the 20 following the second kickoff, the black streak, Stan Smith, proceeded with his part of the show. He carried on five of the six plays which advanced 51 yards to the MHS 29. There the Hornets called a halt as two plays netted a loss of 1. However, a pass from Steve Hodge to Walter Daniels barely made first down distance to the 19.

From there Smith went 6, a pass was incomplete, Smith was stopped at the line and another pass failed to connect. The drive died at the 13 where Muenster claimed possession.

Sicking gained 7 in two tries, then Mark Mollenkopf sailed around right end on a reverse for 20 yards to the 40. After that 4 by Wolf and 28 by Sicking reached the Tiger 28 where the ball was lost in a fumble.

Two incomplete passes followed by a 2 yard loss led to a Tiger kick which put Muenster back to its 30. Twelve plays were enough for the 70 yards as Wolf, Gary Hermes and Bryan Sicking alternated with Mark Sicking in the carries. The big gain was the TD play in which Mark Sicking used a block in breaking through and some fancy footwork on the 18 yard score.

Following Walterscheid's extra point the Hornets had 14 points as the clock showed 3:25. And they got back in business on the Tigers' second scrimmage play. Hodge's pass intended for Tillett was perfect for an easy interception by Nick Walterscheid, who returned it 32 yards to the Tiger 23.

Christmas Lights Installed by City

When the Christmas season opens here Saturday with parade, drawing and Santa's visit, it will find the city holiday lighting in use. Installations on Main Street and the Highway were completed Friday and were turned on that night. The water tower display featuring "Noel" was turned on Monday.

The tower lighting was serviced by Ricky Walterscheid and the street installations were made by TP&L service crew members assisted by city employees.

Arrangements are identical with those of last year, with five strings of lights across Main and Six across the highway. At either end of the strings on Main are large illuminated stars and at each end of the strings on Highway 82 are clusters of 6 lights on a bracket. Total number of 25 watt colored bulbs is 35 per string across Main and 47 per string across the highway. That adds to more than 450 on the two streets. In addition, the water tower display, with 5 strings around the tank and more than 60 spelling out "Noel" has more than 235 bulbs. That's near 700 bulbs in all.

Lights are located at intersections except the highway at Main and the highway at Hickory, where traffic lights are in operation. The purpose is to avoid diverting a driver's attention from the traffic lights.

Sacred Heart JV boys will start Thursday at 5:30. If they win it the second is at 11 a.m. Friday; if they lose the second is at 2:30 Saturday.

SH Varsity girls play their opener at 7:00 Friday. If they win they advance to the champ game Saturday, 7 p.m. If they lose they will try for third place Saturday at 4.

SH Varsity boys start at 8:30 Friday night. If they win their next is the champ final Saturday at 8:30. If they lose they will play for third place Saturday at 5:30.

Temperature Falls To 16 in Coldest Of Early Winter

Another pre-winter cold wave, complete with snow and plunging thermometer, came to Muenster during the past weekend. It differed from that of two weeks before in that there was less snow and more cold.

According to Steve Mosier's record, the snow measured only about 2 inch and its moisture content was .02 inch. But the accompanying cold wave hit a low of 16 on Mosier's high-low thermometer reading Sunday morning and again Monday morning. High on Sunday was 33, and on Monday it was 50. By Tuesday the figures had moderated to 27 and 62. Lowest temperature for the big snowfall was 25 degrees.

Along with .02 inch of moisture in the snow, the community had .10 inch of rain during the week, bringing the November total to .54. Total for the year to date is 33.28 inches.

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
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First Communion Received by 46 Parish Children

gained 4 and Wolf connected with Neil Walterscheid for 16 yards to the 3. Two plays later Sicking went in for his third TD as the clock showed 37 seconds.

It seemed that tension was tighter as the teams started mixing after intermission. To begin, Muenster fumbled the kickoff, and two plays later Danny Fisher got the ball back for Muenster in a fumble. Next play Muenster fumbled again but fortunately recovered it. The series failed to gain and Wolf had to make his only punt of the game.

It was partly blocked giving White Wright good field position on the Hornet 35. But that did not last long. Two plays later Calvin Otto intercepted for MHS at the 20.

In the eight plays that followed Muenster gained 52 to the Tiger 28 and three more reached the 15, after which a holding penalty put them back on the 30. At that point Wolf's pass, intended for Jim Koelzer, was intercepted by Ballard at the goal line and run back to the 25.

Three plays after that Doug Cler retaliated with an interception that put MHS back in business at the 40.

With the Sicking's alternating the totting job, three tries gained 25 to the 15 but the next four tries were 2 inches short of first down yardage.

Tigers got back to the 25 on a pass to Strader and had to kick on their next series. Following a good return by Hermes, the Hornets got going on another sustained drive, with 46 yards to go. The Sicking's used eleven plays ending in Bryan Sicking's double and triple effort for 9 to the end zone.

That is when the Tigers finally got the spark. A high kickoff into the wind was short and was over-run by some Hornet defenders. With good blocking Smith had no problem getting loose for his 80 yard romp to pay dirt. A pass to Tillet upped the score to 28-8. Time remaining was 4:18.

On next possession Muenster made a first down and fumbled the ball away on second series. With 2:11 left, the Tigers turned on their prolike passing attack using sidelines to stop the clock after each completion. With 54 to go Hodge completed to Strader for 22 and to Tillet for 17 to the 15. That was followed by three incompletions, and the fourth try connected with Ballard for a TD. A pass for bonus points was bad. The score was 28-14 with 1:08 showing on the clock.

On the final kickoff the Tigers made an on-sides try that worked, and they were back in possession on Muenster's 49, starting another spectacular air attack. After a setback for offside, Hodge passed to Daniels for 10 and to Ballard for 30 to the 15. A short pass gained 3, a quarterback sack lost 5, and a completion to Ballard gained 12 to 4. Two more incompletions finally ran out the clock.

A great factor in the contest, according to Coach Jones, was the line work, both offensive and defensive.

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
