



There are also 34,525 acres of old field areas or bare lands that need to be planted to adapted grasses and legumes. These are areas that are producing only a small fraction of the forage that they are capable of producing and because they are bare for long periods of each year they are subject to erosion and drought because they cannot absorb rainfall as can the protected soils.

Grass plantings, just as any other crop, require a good seedbed if a good stand of seedlings

Muenster Mutual storm losses amounted to \$1,248.47. Operating expenses, including salaries, mileage, postage, etc., were \$2,667.52. Claims on losses were somewhat higher than those of the previous year and account for the increase of total cost from 13 to 17 cents per \$100 of insured valuation.

However, that expenditure compared with the assessment of 25 cents per \$100 of valuation, nets the organization a gain of 8 cents per \$100 in its reserve. The secretary's report revealed that the present total of cash and interest bearing bonds is \$46,754.98, a gain of \$4,814.54 over last year.

This large reserve is maintained in compliance with the recommendations of the state insurance commission in order to be prepared in case a catastrophe strikes one of the districts. Accordingly the delegates voted to make another assessment this year, of 30 cents per \$100 of insured valuation.
