

The medicine prescribed for getting the sick soils in better physical condition was the use of biennial sweet clovers, white blossom and yellow blossom, alfalfa and deep rooted prennial grasses such as King Ranch Bluestem, Indiangrass, Little Bluestem and Big Bluestem coupled with good crop residue management to leave crop remains on top of the soil as a mulch. A good top growth for organic matter and a good root growth to break hard pans is necessary for good soil condi-


