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Dr. George Benson in his nationally syndicated column, "Looking Ahead" refers to the Panama Canal issue, which continues to be one of the hottest under discussion in Congress, as the strangest he has ever witnessed. This is not a matter of trying to correct a big boner, because our handling of the canal from the beginning has been a credit to our country. Then why all this urgency for taking control away from US and turning it over to a small, weak country, run by a dictator under communist pressure?

As Dr. Benson presents the case, America negotiated for the Panama Canal Zone with Panama very shortly after that country gained independence from Colombia. US paid \$10 million to Panama for the Zone and then went farther and bought every foot of the area from the individuals who owned land. After that America went still another step. Realizing that Panama had recently revolted against Colombia, and that Colombia had not recognized Panama's independence, our country negotiated another deal to clear the title just in case there was a doubt. US paid \$25 million to Colombia in that negotiation.

After all that, certainly no one can challenge the validity of our country's claim. To avoid possible problems about a clear title it paid both disputing parties and then respected private rights of individuals by paying them as well.

But that's only the beginning. After buying the land, our country took on the expense of building the canal and paying Panama \$250,000 a year for the privilege of operating the canal. That payment was upped to \$430,000 per year in 1936, and to \$1,900,000 a year in 1956. As Benson figures it, our country has paid out, in addition to the original purchase, a total of \$5,695,745,000 for construction, upkeep and defense.

So, it would seem more appropriate for Panama to be buying the canal from us, and paying handsomely, instead of expecting to receive it as a gift.

But wait. The treaty as proposed isn't just to give the canal to Dictator Torrijos but to pay him big money for accepting it.

It is interesting to note that some of America's largest banking interests have branch banks in Panama which have loaned large sums of money to Dictator Torrijos. Reported amount of that debt is \$2.7 billion, which will have to be written off unless a way is devised to help the dictator out of his financial strain.

The question is, can this debt be related to the recently negotiated Panama treaty which agrees to turn over control of the Canal to Panama in 1999 and to increase the annual payment from \$1.9 million to \$50 million a year until 1997? Also is it perhaps related to another treaty, a companion to the canal treaty, which would grant aid to Panama in the amount of \$345 million apart from the canal treaty? These are deals which the Senate is currently being pressured to approve, which political prognosticators say will be approved even though the polls show the nation opposed by a 3 to 1 ratio. By coincidence, Dictator Torrijos' debt and treaty amounts plus interest until 1999 are fairly even. If it could be arranged to have US payments turned over to US banks, the banks would about recover their loss.

It's highly disappointing to note that some of the reports about the Panama affair have shocking implications. There have been efforts to show that we never had a proper title and that we only invite sabotage and violence by holding on to it. Also that it's inadequate for big ships of the future. But even that line of talk, emphasizing reasons to get rid of the canal, do not show that we have good reason to pay all that money to give it up.

Above all, this country's best interest is to keep charge of the ditch and continue operating it with fairness to all ships. Nothing could be (Continued on Page 12)

Also to be determined soon is the selection of an assistant chairman to join Miller on his job. First concern of the Chamber is to have a well organized and well conducted event that will do credit to Muenster. Enjoyment, comfort and good will of the visitors take precedent over financial consideration.

Beware of Pet Poisoners

At least a dozen reports around town in the past week can serve as a warning that some person or persons in Muenster has declared open season on pets. The animals are victims of poison, some apparently fed to stray dogs and cats but some given to pets that are under proper supervision in their yards.

A few cases are believed to result from the nuisance caused by dogs that roam the town, often dumping garbage bags and scattering the contents. The other victims, however, were pets under proper control that could have been killed only by someone throwing poisoned food into yards.

Pet owners of the town are urged to be on guard to avoid this agonizing end for their four footed friends and playmates of their children. Keeping the animal indoors is advisable especially at night. So is a check-up of the yard when the animal is turned out.

A more horrible thought is what can happen to a child. The bait that's intended for a dog might appeal to a toddler.

Tigers Take Top Tournery Trophy

Sacred Heart Tigers were champs of the tournament held during the weekend in Saint Jo with successive wins over Pilot Point, Aubrey and Saint Jo, and they sweetened the record by placing Glen Walterscheid and Joe Hoedebeck on the all-district team.

Their best performance was in the opener with Pilot Point in which they rallied after a 29-18 halftime deficit and won on Ken Felderhoff's sensational shot 3 seconds from the end. That gave them a 48-47 decision. Their best effort was in the third period when they outscored the Pointers 20-10 ending the period only 1 point behind. Scores were Glen Walterscheid 14, Joe Hoedebeck 12, Gene Luttmer 10, Ken Felderhoff 8, Bob Hartman 4.

TFB Convention Declines Approval of Farmer Strike

With 1,144 voting delegates representing more than 214,000 Texas families, the Texas Farm Bureau convention Nov. 27-30 in Houston provided a forum for airing the controversial farmers' strike issue.

A motion presented from the floor that would place TFB in support of "the American Agriculture movement" and direct the state organization to "encourage the membership to back the movement on an individual basis" sparked some two hours of heated debate.

No mention was made of a threatened Dec. 14 strike if demands for 100 per cent of parity income for farmers and ranchers are not met.

Pointing out that a guaranteed high subsidy would stimulate more surplus production and destroy foreign markets, the delegates overwhelmingly voted the resolution down. The issue was resolved orderly with no disruption of the convention.

The delegates were near unanimous on several resolutions pertaining to education. They went on record as favoring "an increase in the selective state sales tax to help finance public education with a corresponding reduction in the ad valorem tax." They also approved a resolution to "challenge the legality of funding by government of educational programs involving aspects and advocacy of secular humanism," insisting that "such use of tax money constitutes preferential funding for humanistic value over Judeo-Christian values." They called for a "return to traditional concepts of teaching basic academic skills."

Pointing out that "there are too few of us" farmers and ranchers to "do well in the legislative arena," the delegate body directed the TFB to set up a legal fund "that would be used to insure the protection of Farm Bureau philosophy and policies." An advocate of the fund pointed out that challenging laws in the courts may eventually (Continued on Page 7)

Discount Drug Sets January 1 as Probable Opening

Muenster's newest business, a discount pharmacy, will be in operation about January 1, according to present planning by its three owners, JD Hanna, Bob Pels and Don Woodruff. The location is that formerly used by the barber shop in the Tom and Jerry Building.

As shelves and equipment were being moved in Saturday, Pels said the opening is delayed by the red tape of securing licenses and permits, most of which have to be in order before the stock can be ordered. And after its arrival the merchandise has to be put on the shelves.

Pels also called attention to the fact that Muenster then will have two prescription drug stores, both owned and operated by the Hanna, Pels Woodruff trio. Muenster Pharmacy will continue in the Medical Center, with the same prices and complete prescription service, as before. That service includes charge accounts, welfare prescriptions, and third party prescriptions, in which the charge is made to someone other than the one receiving the medicine, such as an insurance company.

To compensate for cut prices, the discount pharmacy will not offer those services. However it presents an opportunity to save on all regular prescriptions, including refills on prescriptions formerly filled at Muenster Pharmacy.

A recommendation calling for "complete control and ownership" of the Panama Canal by the United States was overwhelmingly approved.

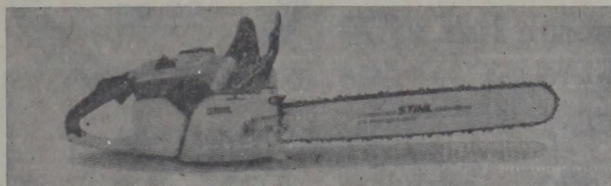

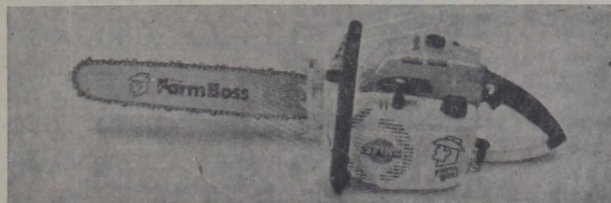

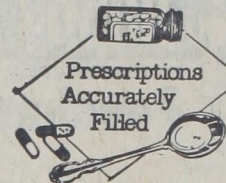
Reception

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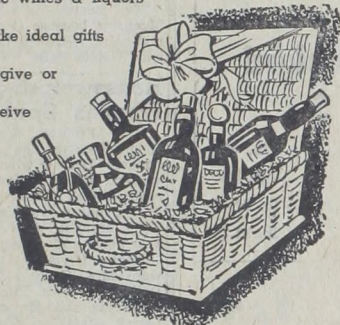

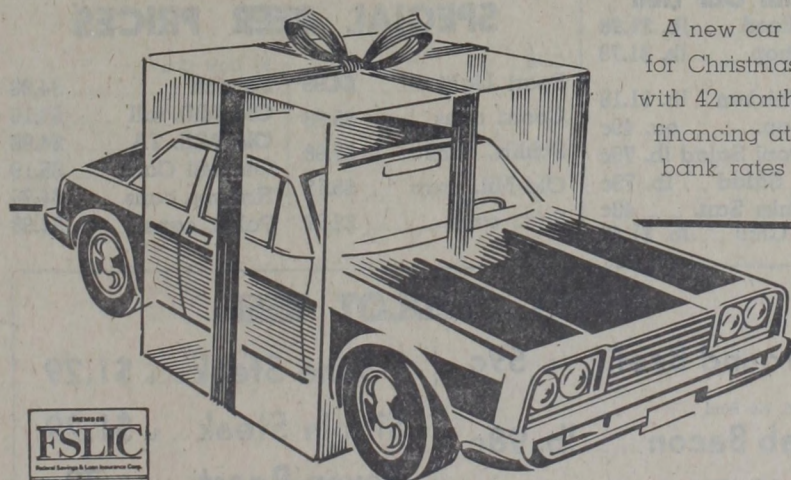
