

Soil Conservation Notes

Soil saving practices went on as usual around Muenster even grasshoppers were eating every- P. Embry have all completed field, and Joe and Al Hess have thing that was green.

This is the time of year when protection of terraces to help stop soil and water losses. Terraces serve to shorten the slopes and make the water walk instead of run off the field. New terraces are being built. Old terraces are being plowed up to increase their effectiveness.

Tim Stormer has completed construction of 6000 feet of channel type terraces on his farm one mile north of Muenster. The terraces outlet onto pasture grasses and will aid in preventing soil losses on some 30 acres of sloping

Ray Sicking is working on 4, 850 feet of field terraces on his farm near Myra. He is using a three-disc plow and the island method of construction to build wide, easy-to-cross terraces. The terraces outlet onto a wide Bermuda grass waterway that was sodded three years ago to afford a safe terrace outlet along a natural drain.

Meanwhile the combining of soil improving legume seed continued as cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation district worked night and day to get the elusive clover and vetch seed into combine hoppers.

Catching up on my reading, I noticed three news items you might like to know about.


First, a farmer whose milk had a trace of garlic flavor is feeding his cows chlorophyll to sweeten their breaths.

Growers have asked, "Who is eligible to vote?" the answer is, any farmer who would be subject to the quotas. Farms will be sub- Palestine. ject to the quotas if the wheat harvested for grain in 1955 is more than 15 acres.

"If quotas are in effect, what will be the penalty for failure to comply with acreage allotments?" The penalty on excess wheat will be the rate of 45 percent of the May 1, 1955, parity price.

A frequently asked question is, 'How does the referendum affect 1955 price supports?" The answer: If two-thirds or more of the voting farmers favor quotas, the full level of price support which is authorized for the 1955 cropapparently somewhere from 75 to 90 percent of parity-will be available for those who comply with their wheat and other acreage allotments. 
