

Cooperators of the Upper Elm-Red soil conservation district know the importance of growing deep rooted grasses and legumes for soil improvement and protection from erosion damage and are going forward in installing these conservation practices on their lands.

The legumes also pay off in providing extra grazing at a time when it is badly needed. Second year clover and alfalfa are proving their worth as a grazing plant by providing a lush top growth of high protein forage at this time. Vetch is also making a rapid growth this spring and furnishing greens to many cattle.
