NTPA Plant Adds Powdered Milk to List of Products

Another form of milk processing was introduced to this community Monday when the local plant of the North Texas Producers Association sacked up 800 pounds of powdered milk.

The operation, which lasted one hour, was a test run of the recently installed spray dryer, which is one of the only two milk powdering units of its type in Texas. It is a big improvement over the older drum dryer, the type that was first considered for

Of the two the spray dryer is considered the better because it is less likely it leave a scorched flavor in the product. The difference in quality of product results from the methods of procedure.

The drum dryer is essentially a heated drum on which condensed milk is fed and scraped off a moment later after it has been dried. Rate of feed and heat of the drum must be perfectly coordinated so that milk particles will be dry just before reaching the scraper. Too early and the product is a moist gob. Too late and the product is scorched.

Quarterly Report of Parish NCCW Shows Worthwhile Work


A quarterly report of activity of women of Sacred Heart parish reveals a number of worth-while projects for social and charitable welfare, and spiritual development.






