There is no denying the fact that young people on an average can handle a car better. Some situations that older people blunder into might often be met successfully by a youngster. On mystery and romance. the other hand it is doubtful whether the oldsters could pull through half the capers that the kids try. And that makes the end effect all the more tragic. Despite more ability, more young people are killing and crippling themselves. The only explanation is an appalling lack of judgment.

That fact makes an excellent subject for boys and girls to ponder in connection with safe driving day. So many are trying to show off their driving ability On SAL All-State but they have not realized that they use the wrong way to make Grid, Cage Teams an impression. Nobody disputes their ability to do more tricks durance. They are wasting time showing off in that manner. while they could be making some really big impressions by exercising better judgment at driving. What a record they could have if they used their young skill in combination with the average driving habits of a 50-yer-old.

If it were possible to sell that one thought to the younger generation accident statistics would improve miraculously. By the same token, if the idea can be sold here it will decrease driving hazards tremendously, perhaps also prevent one or more tragedies.

And if an appeal to reason is not enough, perhaps the memory of past traffic horrors will leave a stronger impression. Youngsters who like to drive fast or carelessly are invited to think of some of their acquaintances who made mistakes in automobiles. Some died suddenly. Some died after days, weeks or months of agony. Some finally lived through the physical ordeal to carry injuries the rest of their lives.

It's a mighty ugly picture, one that can happen to anybody, and one that is more likely to happen to drivers who disregard courtesy and common sense.

PROCLAMATION Designating Thursday, March 15, as Safe Driving Day THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF COOKE

MARCH 9, 1956

Whereas, on the 7th day of March, A.D. 1956, the members Jimmy Lehnertz officially an- of Sacred Heart High Press Club and other citizens of Muenster, Cooke County, Texas, filed a petition with the Mayor of the City of Muenster, in wording substantially as follows:

"We, the undersigned, hereby petition of Mayor Urban Endres that Thursday, March 15, be designated as Safe Driving Day in Muenster and that he request all citizens of Muenster to observe this day with fitting respect for all traffic laws," and,

Whereas, upon consideration of the merits of said petition, being in the nature of an appeal to the drivers and operators of all motor vehicles to give more serious thought to the result which may be caused by violations of traffic laws and regulations, and,

Whereas, the violators of these laws not only jeopardize the individual operators of such vehicles but also jeopardize the life and property of all citizens,

Now, therefore, I, Urban J. Endres, Mayor of the City of Muenster, do hereby issue this my proclamation, declaring and designating Thursday, March 15th, 1956 as Safe Driving Day in the City of Muenster, and appeal to all citizens of this city to observe, especially on this day, all traffic laws and regulations, with a view to promoting safer and a more respectful driving in the future in this locality.
