Local Third Order Ends Yearly Triduum

Taking Part in a Modern Miracle

On Laetare Sunday, which is March 11th, American Catholics in all of the 19,000 parishes throughout the US will answer the annual Catholic Bishop's Relief Fund Appeal with a total of five million dollars. At least, according to Msgr. Edward E. Swanstorm, executive director of Catholic Relief Services — National Catholic Welfare Conference, this has been the goal each year of the last decade — and the campaign has never been under-subscribed!

While this general campaign to aid the hungry, homeless and needy in all parts of the world starts on March 4th, and occupies only a single week, the children's phase began on Ash Wednesday and continues throughout the 40 days of Lent. This latter activity, conducted among the 3,800,000 students in Catholic schools across the nation whose personal sacrifice during the "forty days campaign" is represented by the pennies and nickels and dimes that would otherwise have gone for candy and sodas and bubble-gum, has added up to more than a million dollars in recent years.

The assistance distributed world-wide—last year to 32 million needy men, women and children — by the Bishops' agency of mercy is given solely on the basis of need and regardless of race, religion, creed or country of origin. As a result of participating in the US Government's surplus food programs, conducting an annual Thanksgiving Clothing Campaign (ten million pounds of clothing were distributed last year) and receiving assistance from philanthropic foundations and other agencies, the priests, nuns and volunteer workers of the Catholic Relief Services have been able to multiply every dollar contributed to the Bishop's Fund some 35 times!

In the words of Francis Car-

dinal Spellman, Archbishop of the New York and Military Vicar for the Armed Forces of the US, "... nothing like it has ever been done before. So those who contribute, contribute and participate in a modern miracle, a miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes. . ."

But this mighty and continuing crusade is doing even more than feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, aiding in resettlement and immigration, health and welfare and conducting shelter and sanitation projects. It is building a bulwark against the encroachment of Communism that threatens us all, that is described by Cardinal Spellman as "the lava-like approach of this monster which now overshadows and oppresses such a great portion of the world."

Whatever our faith, we can admire and applaud the sacrifice and devotion — and the efficient administration — that make possible this mighty labor for all mankind.

We have seen how the words "liberal" and "democratic" have been debased by the Socialists and Communists, respectively.

The word "anti-labor" is just as thoroughly misused by the unionists.

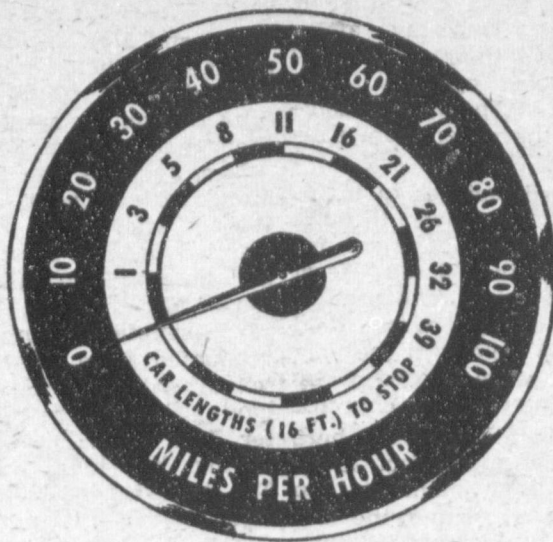
Here, for instance, is the reported statement of a high CIO official on the occasion of his recent visit to Los Angeles:

"There are more anti-labor professional firms — law firms and management firms — in Southern California than anywhere else in the country."

Of course, what this CIO official was complaining about is that it is easier in Southern California than elsewhere for a person to get a job without being forced to join a monopoly union. And that is a high compliment to Southern California — as well as to the thousands of workmen who constantly flock there.

But what this union official said is that many Southern California firms are "anti-labor." The facts, of course, are the other way around. To provide employment without forcing employees to knuckle under to goon squads in order to obtain or retain their jobs is pro-labor, not anti-labor. And I think we should insist on this proper use of terms. For the deliberate and habitual wrong use of language is as immoral as any other kind of dishonesty.

Teen-Agers Take TV To Task

THE AMERICAN teen-age boy and girl spends about two or three hours a day watching TV. For the most part they are intelligent and discriminating viewers, alive to the moral quality of the programs.

This fact is revealed in a survey conducted recently among 13,141 high-school students across the nation. The survey shows that the teen-age viewer won't allow television fan-clubs to control his TV preferences. He is independent in his likes and dislikes, being critical of suggestive jokes and scanty costuming.



THE SURVEY Conroy also reveals that most youngsters can be critical of the moral weakness in many of the leading TV programs, while full of praise for good, wholesome entertainment. The count was more than 2-1 that some programs offended against decency and 3-1 that some shows advanced religion and high ideals among youth while not being strictly religious programs.

The Loretta Young show was highly praised for the good example it showed, while Youth Wants to Know was praised for promoting good citizenship. On the other hand, many top entertainers were criticized for suggestive jokes and immoral costuming.

WHAT DOES this survey prove? For one thing, it shows that TV is being watched with critical eyes in many American homes. TV producers who know that many viewers object to immoral programs will be careful if only from the view-point of Hooper-ratings.

The survey had a less encouraging feature however. A fairly large number of students failed to answer the questions about the decency of programs and about inspiring, non-religious shows.

IT IS disturbing to think that some American young men and women—minority though they may be—can look for hours and hours at a television screen without judging whether the entertainment is morally good or bad—and whether or not it should be turned off. Youngsters oblivious to the moral value of their TV entertainment can hardly be zealous Christians.

Parents can and should make their children vigilant TV viewers. In his pamphlet, TV and Your Child, Msgr. Edwin Broderick suggests that parents ask their children after watching a program, "Did you like that show? Why? Did it uphold virtue? Was your sympathy on the side of virtue. Did it impart a worthwhile lesson?"

Children who are asked, or who ask themselves, these questions, will be intelligent TV viewers. They will also be good Christians, using God's gifts such as television, to take them to Heaven.

**IT HAPPENED
15 YEARS AGO**

March 7, 1941

John Yosten home is destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. Street lights are likely to go out in Muenster on the first of next month, says city council, declaring the need of cutting city expenses. Arthur Endres is sworn in as temporary postmaster. Final debt is paid on parochial high school building; completed in 1938, it has been cleared of debt by community benefits and individual donations. Henry Spaeth replaces Arthur Endres as bookkeeper at Endres Motor Co. Study club activities are resumed here during Lent. Community has mild epidemic of measles. 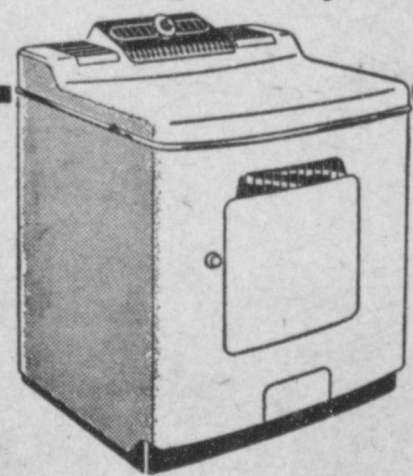
