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Occasionally the word gets out that certain elements of our country, including some people in our government, are still trying to turn over the Panama Canal to the government of Panama. This scheme has been brewing since more than 20 years ago when Alger Hiss, identified as a secret member of the communist party, while in the employ of our State Department, sought to scuttle our control of the big ditch. Among other things he sent an official report from the State Department to the UN referring to the Canal Zone as "an occupied territory."

A recent survey by Opinion Research Corp reveals that the nation certainly does not favor this give away. Of the responses received, 66 per cent want US to retain possession of the canal zone and only 12 per cent favor turning it over to Panama's military dictatorship.

Another angle of the issue revealed by the survey is that 42 per cent of the people questioned heard very little about the give-away scheme and 38 per cent heard nothing at all. As practically all of us are aware, this subject does not get the attention it deserves from the media, in spite of well known efforts in the State Department to put the deal over. To make matters worse, left wingers of the mission are reported to have the support of Henry Kissinger.

This kind of thinking defies comprehension. Contrary to the Hiss reference on "occupied territory", this is not a matter of holding another country's property. Rather the Canal Zone is a piece of the US. It was bought with hard cash, and many more millions of dollars were invested there to provide passage of US shipping from one coast to another, plus a passage for international shipping. Anyone who thinks our title to the Zone is not valid must also wonder whether Russia still has a claim to Alaska, or whether France has a claim to a number of Central US states.

Where do left wingers get the idea that a fair-and-square deal by US isn't valid, whereas Russia could take most of Europe by conquest?

The only possible justification for the give-away is to grant independence to a people who have been under our protection for a number of years, like the Philippines. But the comparison does not hold up here. This is not granting independence. Rather it is turning the area over to a dictator. No matter how we look at it, idealistic considerations are strongly in support of keeping the Canal Zone.

And the practical considerations are far more important. In view of Panama's very unstable history, how can we feel assured that the canal, so vital to us, will remain in friendly hands? The present dictatorship is already hostile and might be inclined at any time to deny use of the canal to us. It's hard to imagine that any officials in our government would be willing to jeopardize the security or the economy of this nation to that extent.

Could it be that this scheme is somehow related to the current efforts at detente? We have to make every effort at "relieving the tensions" which exist or may develop between this country and the USSR. We go along with their terms in arms limitation. We rescue them from the failures of their agriculture and industry. We tolerate their insults and their spying on us. We ignore their frequently repeated aim to take us over. And here we are thinking about turning over a vital national asset to a dictator who can be assumed to already be in cahoots with Moscow. How far do we have to go in the spirit of detente to remain on good terms with the communists?

The implications behind proposals like this are frightening. Considering validity of our title and dangers inherent in the give away, the idea seems completely absurd. But it is receiving serious official thought. Why? Has the Soviet influence infiltrated the State Department to that extent? Or has the red conquest advanced far enough so the Soviets can make this kind of demands on us?

And a special attraction will be the Jaycee tennis tournament, which will reach its finals Sunday afternoon. Early arrivals will have the opportunity to see some of the action.

Along with the fried chicken, the menu has coleslaw, potato salad, baked beans, bread, butter and iced tea. Price of a ticket will be \$3.00.

The supper is a benefit for two of the Jaycees' current projects. One is a special relief fund for helping people of limited means through financial distress resulting from serious accident or extended illness.

Herbert Knabe and Ricky Stewart at Firemen's School

Fire Chief Herbert Knabe and Ricky Stewart, were the two representatives of Muenster's Fire Department attending the 46th annual Texas Firemen's Training School last week at Texas A&M University.

The school, attended by 2,326 persons from all areas of the state — and including women for the first time this year — reviewed established procedures of rescue and fighting fires and introduced new developments in each subject. Since Muenster has no rescue squad the attention of its two delegates was centered on fighting fires and caring for equipment.

The school, which is fast becoming the best and largest of its kind in the nation is sponsored jointly by A&M and the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association. Attendance of the local firemen is sponsored by the City of Muenster, and everyone in the city reaps the benefit. In addition to more efficient fire protection, local residents receive a 3 per cent credit on their key rate.

Firemen at their first meeting were told that the School has an investment of about \$4.5 million at A&M and additionally about \$650,000 worth of new equipment would be brought in by various manufacturers and fire companies for demonstration and display.

Denton Team Gets Champ Trophy in Slo-Pitch Tourney

Muenster's Schlitz team came close to winning the top trophy in the slo-pitch softball tournament it sponsored here but a determined outfit from Denton had other ideas.

The Denton Merchants survived the losers' bracket to qualify for the final and then beat Schlitz 12-6. That gave each team one loss after which they would have to play a tie breaker. And the Denton fellows did it again, this time by the slim margin of 7-6.

That achievement earned the champ trophy for the Denton team and Schlitz, as the other contender in the final game earned the runner up trophy.

Progress of these two teams in the tournament went as follows. Schlitz beat Muenster, Martindale, Dutchman and Jackson Concrete to become the survivor of the winners' bracket and a contender in the final. Denton Merchants beat Budweiser then lost a close one 6-5 to Mugg and Pitcher. That meant going into the loser bracket where the championship required winning all remaining games. The Merchants then beat Denton County, Jerry's Marine, Mugg and Pitcher and Dutchman. At this point the Merchants and Jackson Concrete each with a loss had to determine who would take on Schlitz for the title. The Merchants won and finally earned their trophy the hard way by beating Schlitz two in a row. In all, the champs played nine games, losing only one. Schlitz played six, losing two.

Third place trophy went to Johnson Concrete, which reached the final of the win bracket; and fourth place went to Dutchman, which reached final of the loser bracket.

Sportsmanship trophy was awarded to Montague and individual trophies for most valuable player were awarded to Lee Dawson of the Denton Merchants and Randy Wolf of Schlitz.

On their way to the third place trophy, Jackson Concrete beat Montague, Jerry's Marine and Mugg and Pitcher then lost to Schlitz and Denton Merchants. Dutchman beat Muenster Independents and Grady Jones, lost to Schlitz, beat Martindale and lost to Denton Merchants.

Hospital District Expansion Approved by Strong Majority

Voters of the Muenster, Myra, Hood, Rosston and Leo gave strong approval on Saturday, July 19, to expansion of the Muenster Hospital District.

Muenster voted by a ratio of almost 14 to 1 to admit the additional area into the district. At the same time the other areas voted by more than 5 to 1 to join the district. The balloting was done in four locations. Muenster had a total of 280 votes cast, 259 of them favoring the expansion and 19 opposing. Two votes were improperly cast and had to be disqualified.

Meanwhile Rosston, the polling place for that community and Leo, had 76 votes with 60 approving and 16 opposing. Hood had 41 votes and favored the merger 38 to 3. And Myra had 68 with 58 for and 10 against.

Voter turnouts was considered exceptionally good in all of the areas in view of the fact that approval was taken for granted and many persons felt that their votes would make no difference. About 25 per cent of Muenster's qualified voters were there but the other areas were better represented.

To the people of those areas the vote amounted to a choice between the Muenster Hospital District and the proposed Gainesville Hospital District. The legislative act which permits establishment of that district specifies all of Cooke County which is not included in the Muenster district. People of the area to be annexed were in effect excluding themselves from the proposed Gainesville district.

Muenster Blanked In Sales Tax Pay

Muenster drew a blank in this month's distribution of city sales tax collections. A report from Comptroller Bob Bullock dated July 15 reveals that \$11.4 million had been remitted for the period ending July 3, but a number of cities did not receive the pay because their accumulation had not reached the minimum of \$500.

The record shows that the total collected for Muenster through the cut-off date was \$370.02 and the 2% service fee was \$7.40, leaving \$362.62 for the city. That amount will be included in the next remittance.

Other cities of the area receiving no payment were Saint Jo and Sanger. North Texas area cities receiving checks were Gainesville \$11,381, Bowie \$9,402, Nocona \$1,738, Lindsay \$1,288, Pilot Point \$940, Whitesboro \$911.

Muenster High Changes from Semester to Quarterly System

Students registering at Muenster High School on August 15 will find significant changes to comply with a recently passed law converting the semester system to the quarter system.

As pointed out by Superintendent L. B. Bruns, the school now operates on four quarters instead of two semesters. Three quarters of 60 days each will be the same length as the previous two semesters, and a fourth quarter, also 60 days, will be summer school, if held, otherwise vacation time.

The new system permits more flexibility in schedule and also a more convenient method of recording the work completed by a student. A credit, which formerly represented one year of two semesters in a subject, now becomes three quarters. The local requirement of 22 credits for graduation now becomes 66 quarters.

As before, some of those quarters will be mandatory for graduation but many more are on the list of electives. The total of 141 quarters available at MHS is listed as follows. Three quarters each in four years of English; 3 each in two years of typewriting; 3 each in shorthand, bookkeeping, speech; 3 each in four years of band; 3 each in two years of Spanish; 3 each in choral, general crafts, general drafting, general woodworking machine woodworking, fundamentals of math; 3 each for three years of algebra, 3 quarters in geometry, 1 in trigonometry and 2 in elementary analysis;

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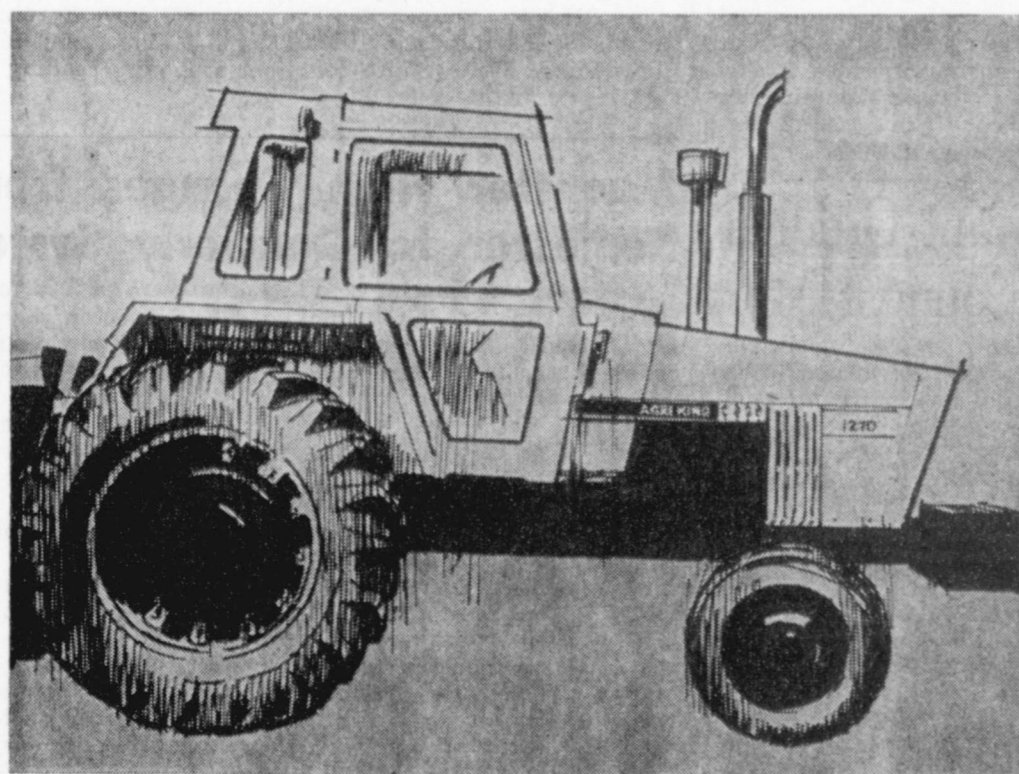
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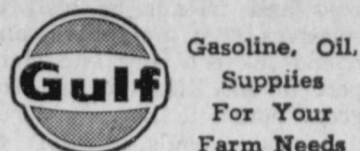
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Student Aid Grant Received by CCC

They saw the world's largest copper mine in Bingham Canyon, Utah, also Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks in Utah.

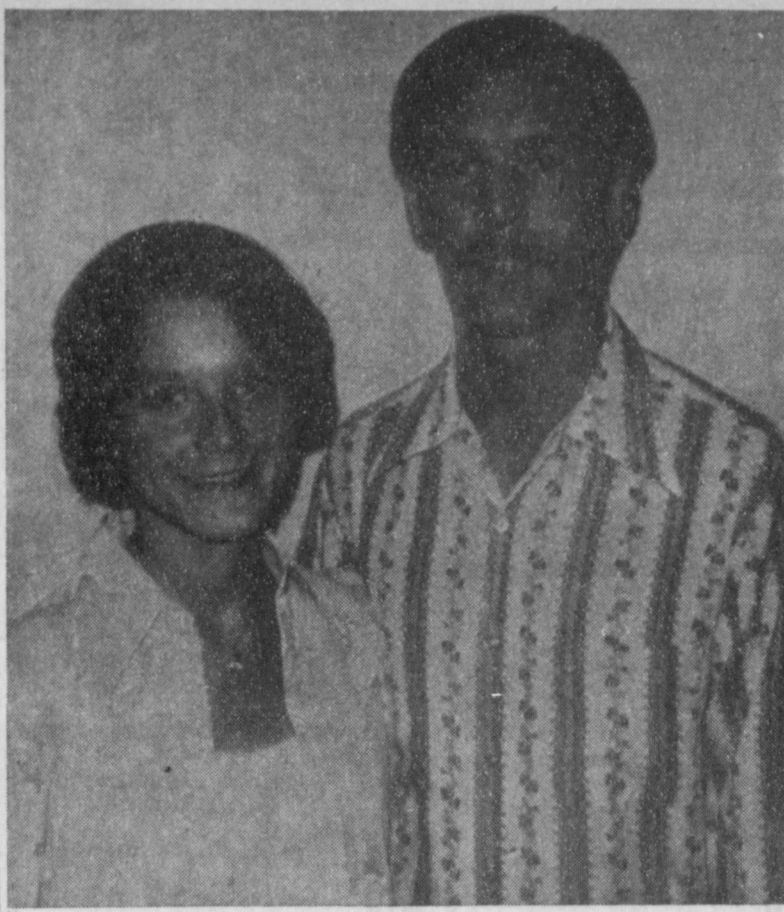

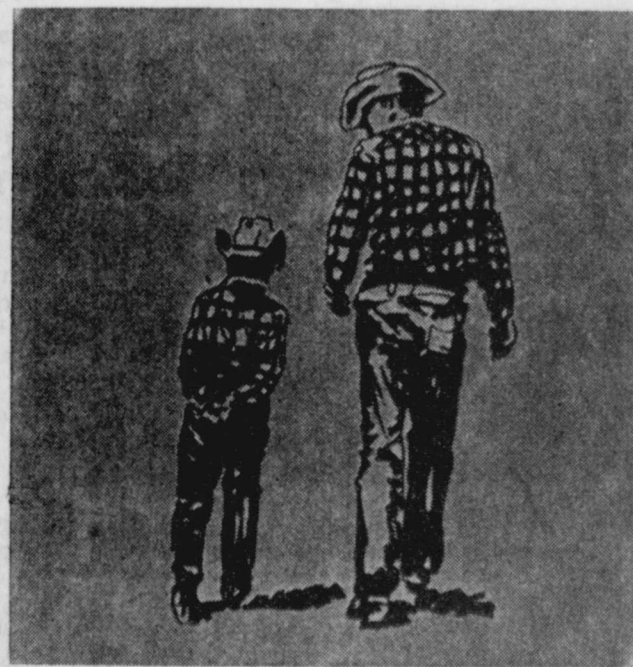

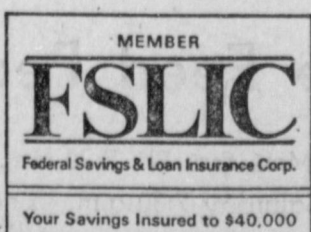

Year Round System Of Car Licensing Adopted by State

AUSTIN — "There must be a better way!"

Surely that thought must have crossed the mind of every Texas motorist forced to stand in line at motor vehicle registration time.

Well, now there is a better way. At least, beginning January 1, 1978, there will be. If all goes according to plan, the traditional long waiting lines prior to the registration deadline (April 1) will be a thing of the past.

As if to complement the "multi-year" license plate adopted this year, Governor Dolph Briscoe recently signed House Bill 1924 providing for a year-round vehicle registration system in Texas. The bill was authored by State Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo, and passed by both houses of the 64th Legislature.

Under the new licensing system, there will be 12 registration deadlines, instead of one. No longer will Texas motorists be forced to register within a 60-day period. Depending on the date assigned each motorist, vehicle registration will occur during every month of the year, similar to the safety auto inspection.

According to Bob Townsley, Director of the state's Motor Vehicle Division, "Eighteen states now follow this 'staggered' system of motor vehicle registration and have proven it successful."

"Not only will it relieve some of the pressure on motorists," said Townsley, "but it will also relieve the all-too-familiar burden placed on the county tax assessor-collectors."

He added, "By effectively distributing the registration workload evenly throughout the year, county tax officers will be able to conduct other phases of their work, such as voter registration and preparation of property tax rolls, without interruption."

For all practical purposes, April 1, 1978 will be almost everyone's vehicle registration renewal deadline — for the last time. Renewal notices will inform motorists as to their renewal date thereafter. Fees will be calculated on a prorata basis to that date.

Upon registration, motorists will be issued two license plate stickers — one for the year and one for the month of the subsequent renewal. Once a vehicle is assigned to a particular expiration date, it will remain on that annual renewal cycle thereafter. The month sticker first issued for a vehicle will remain on the license plate, and new month stickers will not be issued each year.

Also, the month payable sticker will serve as a reminder to the motorist, just as the windshield auto inspection sticker does. Since renewal notices will be mailed during the month preceding the month in which renewal fees will be due, motorists should have no problem in renewing registrations in plenty of time.

SS Beneficiaries May Have Checks Deposited in Bank

"Beneficiaries who receive Social Security or Supplemental Security Income checks have the option of having their checks deposited directly to their checking or savings account," according to Gus Jones, District Manager of the Sherman Office. "To arrange for the deposit of their checks, beneficiaries should take their check or their award certificate to the financial organization of their choice and ask for a direct deposit form SF-1199. Those who want to continue to receive their checks mailed to their present address need to take no action," Jones said.

According to Jones, there are several advantages to direct deposit. They are: Beneficiaries don't have to go to their financial organization and stand in line to cash or deposit checks; even if away from home, money is available in beneficiaries' accounts instead of sitting in their mailbox; there's no problem in cashing checks; and beneficiaries needn't worry about losing their checks or having them stolen.

Beneficiaries who contact their financial organization soon after August 1 can expect their September check to go to their account at the financial organization. The Sherman Social Security Office is located at 810 N. Travis. The phone number is 893-4301. Office hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday, except national holidays. A representative may be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Federal Building. Those people living in Gainesville may call the Sherman office toll free by dialing "O" and asking for ENTERPRISE 6-2528.

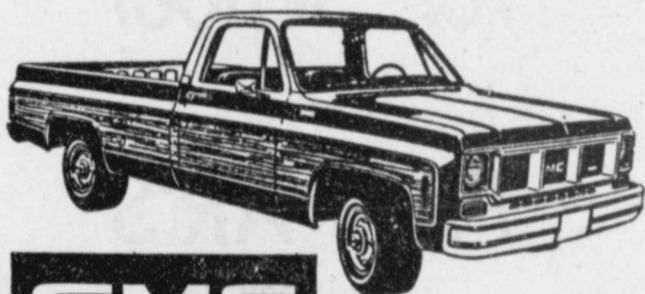

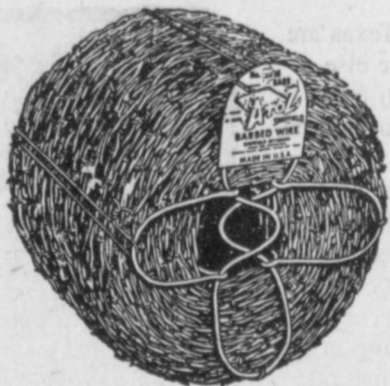

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A simple lesson in cooling for less.

Keep equipment in proper working order. A qualified serviceman should check it at least once a year. Check the filter about once a month and clean or replace if dirty.

You can help your cooling equipment operate efficiently if you keep the outside part of window units and the compressor of central systems free of obstructions. Close draperies or blinds to block out the sun's heat.

Other ways to increase efficiency are to clean the cool air outlets and returns and keep furniture and draperies away from them; keep fireplace dampers closed; weatherstrip around doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.

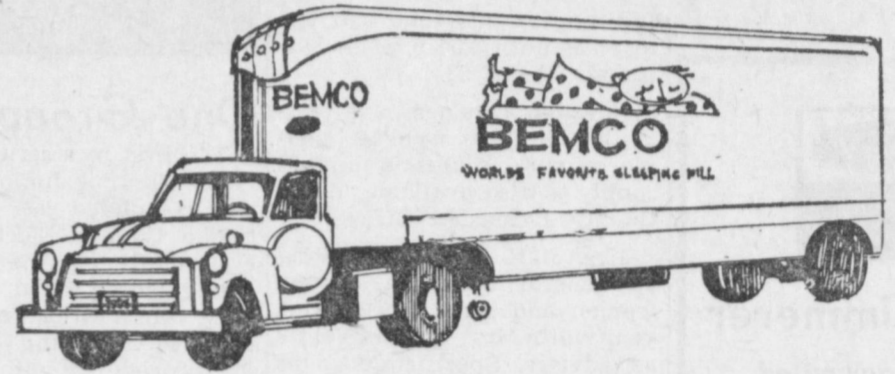

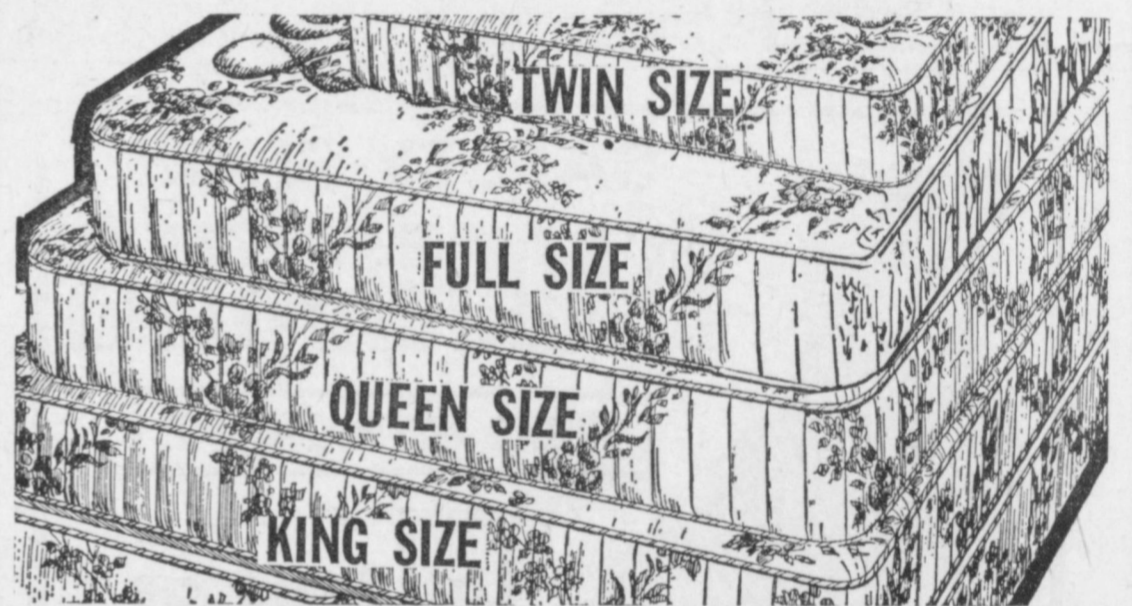
