



**Economists are predicting** that the recent cannery strike in California will soon be reflected by rising prices of canned goods on the grocery shelf. There's a twofold reason for that. First because costs are increased by the resulting higher wages, and second because of the shortage of those items.

The strike, resulting in the loss of millions of dollars worth of perishable fruits and vegetables, demonstrated the extent to which the public interest is ignored by labor monopolies, and shows the need for speedy enactment of the Thurmond-Crane bills to bring unions under the anti-trust laws. If the Teamster's Union did not possess monopoly power over the work force in the California canning industry, it would not have been able to close down the canneries at the height of the growing season and cause losses of perishable products that can never be recovered.

**The impact of the Teamsters' action in this case is enormous.** First of all there's the fact that fruits and vegetables were rotting in the field while millions of people around the world were starving. Despite complexities of getting food to the needy, it's been the rule that some of our surplus reaches them, but it can't happen when we have no surplus.

Next there's the economic loss to canners who are out of business, to growers who can't sell their product and the farm workers who are out of a job.

**The situation reminds one** of the common situs picketing bill, which President Ford vetoed early in the year in spite of tremendous union pressure. In that case other unions of a big project were required to strike in support when any one union decided to strike. Any group on strike regardless how small, could cause enormous, even ruinous, loss to the contractor and subcontractors, besides idling all other workers.

Well, if that kind of work stoppage could not be tolerated in the construction industry, why should it be allowed in the canning industry?

**One might take note that** the least economic pressure in either case applies to workers. Though not on full pay, they get the benefit of unemployment compensation and food stamps. But industry and the public has to pay... meaning that ultimately the public is stuck for increasing costs. It all makes us wonder why the anti-trust champions are so concerned about industry's monopolistic pressure on the public but so unconcerned about labor monopoly. A remedy for this situation is the goal of the Thurmond-Crane bill. Something needs to be done to protect business people and us consumers from the labor giants as well as the industrial giants.

How to do it is the problem for legislators. Perhaps they can see their way clear to decree that others need to be considered in a labor dispute as well as just the two sides of a controversy. In the cannery strike growers and field workers are involved, along with cannery stockholders and taxpayers who have to provide food stamps... as well as striking cannery workers.

**None of those losses need** to be imposed. Workers could stay on the job, and every faction concerned could have the benefit of business as usual, while labor demands are under consideration. And if the two factions cannot come to an agreement it should be possible to have the issue decided by a special arbitrator.

The difficulty in this solution, of course, is that each side suspects the arbitrator and expects a better settlement by hard headed negotiation. So, they feel justified in their controversy, but do they have the right to settle their own trouble when their squabble is violating your right and mine?

**This same principle applies** to other strikes. Municipal and state workers and teachers, along with postal, hospital or electrical workers, are putting us in a bind when they go on strike. They deprive us of services to which we are entitled. They need to be told they have no right to strike. By all means there should be provision to settle

Other members of the board are Wade Bond of Bowie, Zone 1, Hinds Clark of Nocona, Zone 2, Jerry Hudspeth of Valley View, Zone 4, and Clyde Hale of Sherman, Zone 5.

The district has one election a year rotating from zone to zone, and each director is elected for five years.

## Tiger Schedule Is Tough

Going into their second week of football practice, the Sacred Heart Tigers are beginning to shape up and are looking forward eagerly to their first test Friday night with the Trinity Valley boys in Fort Worth. Coach Eddie Stock said they are in good condition and working hard, however they will possibly be handicapped by a pair of injuries in their first effort. Robert Grewing and Joe Hoedebeck are both doubtful for the contest.

A week later the team will try itself against Fort Worth County Day, rated as one of the strongest independent teams of North Texas. That tussle will give the Tigers a good taste of what to expect in a schedule that looms considerably tougher than last year, in which Sacred Heart ended with a fine 8-1-1 record.

Rated as the most rugged opponent on the list is Bishop Gorman High of Tyler, favorite of District 4 in TCIL. It's a new team on the SH schedule. Also a high ranking TCIL contender is Notre Dame of Wichita Falls, which dumped the Tigers in their only loss last year.

On the non-conference list are more teams deserving of Sacred Heart's profound respect. Era, the first opponent, is ranked as big, experienced and capable, a better team than the one which tied the Tigers in last year's opener and went on to take the 7-B championship.

Bishop Lynch, another new name on the schedule, is one of the big Catholic schools of Dallas, in a higher classified district of TCIL. Without listing specifics, it is sufficient to point out that the school has a big enrollment with big selection of talent.

And Saint Jo will be greatly improved over the team which lost to the Tigers last year. The Panthers have most of the same boys with benefit of a year of growth and experience.

The rest of the schedule includes three teams which are rated about the same as last year when they were defeated by Sacred Heart. Those are S&S, Lindsay and Cistercian, and Alvord appears to be on a par with them. Still another of that general rating is Christ the King of Lubbock, also a TCIL member.

As regards travel by team and fans, the break is going against Sacred Heart. Games will be at Dallas, Lubbock and Wichita Falls whereas the Tyler and Irving teams come here.

## City Gets \$3,083 Sales Tax Check

The City of Muenster has received a check from State Comptroller Bob Bullock in the amount of \$3,083.88 as rebate for sales tax collections through the period ending July 30, 1976. The remittance covers principally the tax paid for June and, along with previous checks of \$8,368.00 and \$541.77, it brings the second quarter collections to \$11,993.65.

The comptroller's statement with the remittance indicates that gross collections were \$3,304.09, the 2 per cent collection fee amounted to \$66.08 and the amount retained was \$154.13, accounting for the net amount of \$3,083.88.

Bullock stated that Muenster is one of 659 cities receiving \$145 million in this mailing, also that the rebates for city sales tax in the year to date amount to \$173.1 million.

Rebates to other towns of the area were reported as follows: Gainesville \$15,112.02; Lindsay \$2,971.72; Nocona \$3,689.34; Pilot Point \$1,695.41; Sanger \$1,561.29; Whitesboro \$2,073.63.

## School Continues Policy on Free or Cut-Price Lunch

With the beginning of the new school term, Muenster Public School announces a free and reduced-price lunch policy for children unable to pay the full price. School officials have adopted a family income scale based on the gross incomes and adjustments for family size below which children can receive the free or reduced price lunch. A copy of the table is sent to each child's parents.

For instance, a 1-child family with income to \$3,680 is entitled to free meals, and with income to \$5,730 is entitled to reduced price meals. Or a 6-child family with income to \$9,240 may receive free meals, and with income to \$14,410 may receive reduced price meals.

Families falling within the scale or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for the free or reduced price lunches. They can do so by filling in application forms sent to parents, additional copies of which are available at the principal's office. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

The form requests information needed to determine economic need based on gross income, number of family members and unusual circumstances or hardship affecting ability to pay for lunches. Information is confidential and used only to determine eligibility.

The form is reviewed and eligibility determined by the principal. If a parent is dissatisfied with that ruling it may be appealed to Superintendent L. B. Bruns.

The policy provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

## School Enrollment Is Lowest Since '52

The scholastic population of the two Muenster schools took another drop this year, plunging to the lowest enrollment figure in 24 years.

Officially it will be somewhat higher after this week when the kindergarten count is made, but on the basis of grades 1 through 12, as they have been until four years ago, the total was 658 at registration whereas it was 654 in 1952.

This means a sharp drop of 32 from last year's 690. However, with 42 in kindergarten last year the official total was 732. Assuming a slight decline in that grade, as in the other 12, the total should be slightly under 710.

A review of past enrollments shows a general increase, with occasional drops, to 703 in 1962. Until '73 the totals remained above 700, the highest being 797 in 1968. From 719 in '73 it has declined

in three registrations.

For the record, here are totals for the past 25 registrations: '52-654; '53-683; '54-675; '55-683; '56-672; '57-669; '58-675; '59-685; '60-667; '61-688; '62-703; '63-713; '64-723; '65-758; '66-762; '67-749; '68-797; '69-786; '70-761; '71-767; '72-743; '73-719; '74-696; '75-690; '76-658.

Most of the loss this year occurred at the public school when the total dropped from 326 to 299. That loss was about equally divided between elementary and high school, the decline being 184 to 171 in the grades and 142 to 128 in high school.

Sacred Heart's total dropped from 364 to 359 and it includes a gain from 110 to 122 in high school but a loss from 254 to 237 in elementary.

Another comparison shows that the combined elementary of both schools lost 30 students and the combined high schools only 2.

## Consumer Concerns Stressed at State Rural Electric Convention

Almost 1,000 Texas rural electric leaders and ladies gathered in San Antonio last week (August 11-13) for the Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives' 36th annual meeting. The meeting theme — "It's a New Ball Game" — referring to new problems facing rural electric wasn't news to the delegates, but the speeches, reports, and other discussions drove the ball home.

Highlights of the sessions included a debate between Jon Newton and Walter Wendlandt, candidates for the Texas Railroad Commission this year, and another debate — on the deregulation of natural gas prices — by Congressmen Robert Eckhardt of Houston and Robert Krueger of New Braunfels, leaders of opposing sides of the issue.

The meeting also featured Texas Public Utility Commissioner Alan R. Erwin, State Representative John Wilson of LaGrange, and Frank Youngblood, former director of the Texas Railroad Commission's Gas Utilities Division, in addition to a number of rural electric leaders.

Concerning fuel prices, consumer unrest, regulation, and other problems for the rural electric, TEC General Manager J. R. Cobb said that 1975 was just a prologue to the coming years. He warned co-op leaders to always provide members with the best service possible, adding: "Even if your power costs are very high, there's no excuse for bad service. It could be the final straw for some already-vexed cooperative member-consumers."

David A. Hamil, head of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D.C., said: "Not only is it a new all game for the electric industry, but there are many new players in 1976."

Utility Commissioner Erwin continued on the theme saying, "There are two teams, and my fellow commissioners and our staff are the umpires. And right now, the other team is looking pretty powerful. They are composed of the elements of our economy which are combining to make our jobs, at times at least, less than pleasant. They have the price of natural gas at first, inflation at second, and misinformation at third. Sometimes I get the impression that the federal and state bureaucracies are pitching."

A panel made up of Representative Wilson; Youngblood, formerly of the Texas Railroad Commission; Bud Hadfield, a member of Bluebonnet Electric Cooperative at Giddings; and Tom Hutchison, general manager of Pedernales Electric Cooperative and newly elected president of the TEC organization, discussed the major problems facing rural electric.

Wilson said persistent work by rural people would greatly influence legislators but few make any effort. Youngblood said that not only are fuel prices going to continue to rise, but natural gas reserves are running out faster than most people realize. And Hadfield said co-ops would have fewer problems with their members simply by doing a better job on educating them about problems facing rural electric.

Cooke County Electric Co-op was represented at the convention by Manager Mike Sloan and his wife; Directors Robert Lewis, Wendell Proffer, Pete Skinner, Jack Crowover and Vincent Zimmerer and their wives; and Home Service Adviser Tula Hickeron. Also attending were Mr. and Mrs. Al Wiesman and Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Klement.





## YOU CAN BANK ON IT!

What is money? Sure, in the U.S. it's dollars and cents in different denominations, but does money have to be paper and metal?

"Money," a Notre Dame economics prof said, "is anything 'commonly used' as a medium of exchange or as a standard of value."

Tobacco, the principal form of currency in Virginia in 1619, was used to purchase wives from England for the Virginia colonists, for example. The price: 100 pounds of tobacco (\$36-\$48 in today's currency).

Corn, musket balls, sea shells, beaver fur, nails, rice — anything "commonly used" was classified as "money" in colonial days because of the shortage of hard coin.

The first recorded instance of official paper money legally created by an American governmental body was in December 1690, when Massachusetts issued bills valued from 5 schillings to 5 pounds.

Money then can be anything if everyone agrees on it as a medium of exchange.



their grievance, but they should be required to stay on the job.

During the week long strike, in which 76 canneries operated by 28 companies were shut down by the Teamsters, it is estimated that losses by the companies ran up to one million dollars a day and

losses by growers to four times that amount. Meanwhile thousands of field workers were involuntarily out of work.

It is further estimated that one third of the apricot harvest, 14 per cent of the cling peach crop, 5 per cent of the pear crop and 2.5 per cent of the processing tomato crop were lost in the strike.
