Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War.

What kind of men were they? Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers or both, looted the properties of Ellery, Clymer, Hall, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge, and Middleton.

At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis, had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. The owner quietly urged General George Washington to open fire, which was done. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.

The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his grist mill were laid waste. Standing tall, straight, and un-wavering, they pledged: "For the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."

According to the man's opinion, "Our great national media, which prates incessantly about the public's 'right to know,' has been keeping a secret from the American people. Were the likes of Walter Cronkite and David Brinkley to let the cat out of the bag it would make the government of Chile look good."

Gallup pollsters have been invited by the government of Chile to take polls of the country twice a year. Gallup conducted them under a clear arrangement that the government would not interfere.

The outcome of the latest sampling, as told by de Toledano, is the opinion of the vast majority of the people, and it is completely different from the kind of mean mouthing we have been hearing ever since the military overthrow of the bloody rule of the Marxist Salvadore Allende.

It's Ironic that in this country which presumably is immensely concerned with survival of personal freedom here and throughout the rest of the world, the media cheers for the communists every time they get into conflict with our friends. They did it in Chile, Rhodesia, Panama, Taiwan, Nicaragua and those several Russian exploitations in Africa. They keep us guessing constantly whether they are on our side or Communism's in the long drawn-out global contest.

One has to wonder, have they already conceded the Marxist triumph, and are they trying consequently to get in good standing with the red monster?

Anyway, some interesting poll results show that conditions in Chile are a lot better than our media and the administration have ever admitted. Regarding present performance of the Pinochet government, 67 per cent of the Chileans say they approve and 33 percent disapprove or don't know. In 1978 the approving count was 60 per cent.

And apparently they are satisfied with their conditions. Slightly more than 70 per cent want no election now, whereas only 25 per cent want in the remaining few say they don't know. As regards the people's personal rating of their president, Pinochet, 70 per cent find him decent and humane, 82 per cent find him capable and decisive, 63 per cent find him fair and 53 per cent find him fair and 53 per cent find him suitable for public office. find him suitable for public

Compared with the ratings received by President Carter, those figures are highly commendable. In fact, they are probably more favorable, than the ratings given to elected leaders of any other country, and many times better than those given to the African dictators who have had the constant support of Carter and Ambassador Young. But in spite of Chile's most impressive record, our administration and our media continue to go along with the Kremlininspired campaign against the country.

de Toledano goes on to say that his personal experience in Chile bears out the favorable outcome of the poll. Speaking to individuals in all walks of life; he was told that if the military had not overthrown the Allende dictatorship there would have been a popular uprising have been a popular uprising of farmers, workers, housewives and professionals. Over all it has been a great season with a good crop and favorable weather allowing the combines to keep going without interruption. Reports of the yield went as high as over 60 bushels per acre and the average is estimated at about 40. Very few reports fell below 30 bushels per acre.



STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Energy domi-nated all issues this week at the State Capitol: how to raand how to find new sources

Faced with short gasoline Faced with short gasoline supplies and long lines at service stations in the Houston and Dallas areas, Governor Bill Clements mandated last Tuesday that stations must restrict sales through purchase limits and a California-style odd-even license plate number plan. The plan (for Harris Dallas through purchase limits and a California-style odd-even license plate number plan. The plan (for Harris, Dallas and Tarrant counties only) restricts gasoline sales to a minimum of \$6 and a maximum of 20 gallons, and allows fill-ups for odd-numbered plates on odd-numbered calendar days, and even for even, etc.

Hours after his announcement, Clements' legal advisors remained uncertain on how much authority the governor's office has—if any—to enforce the mandate.

More fuel-related troubles appeared on another horizon when Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown told Clements Thursday that a truckers' boycott and sporadic violence around the country threatened Texas'

radic violence around the country threatened Texas' \$40 million watermelon and vegetable crop. Brown told Clements his office was swamped with telephone calls from Texas producers in need of trucks to haul their produce to markets. The truckers boycott, a protest of rapidly escalating deisel prices, aims "to empty food shelves in supermarkets around the country" and is slowly bringing Texas agriculture to a "grinding halt," a Brown aide said.

Harry Hubbard, president

Harry Hubbard, president of the Texas AFL-CIO, said he thought refinery workers and truckers who transport gasoline should not have to wait in line for fuel. "Making Texans stand in line for eas is like making Kansans gas is like making Kansans stand in line for wheat," he

Clements came under fire in Austin from conservative State Rep. Dan Kubiak who called him "irresponsible" for vetoing budgeted funds for several alternative enerfor several alternative energy projects. Kubiak, who successfully sponsored a bill allowing gasohol production in Texas, criticized Clements for ham-stringing gasohol and other energies only three days before mandating his gas rationing plan. The Rockdale legislator called on Clements to include "the rapid development of alternative energy" in the Governor's promised special session.

Clements will seek a method to document illegal aliens, stepped up law enforcement to control drug traffic on both sides of the border, and the importation of oil and gas from Mexico's vast reserves at prices acvast reserves at p ceptable to Mexico. at prices ac-

If the four governors and U.S. Ambassador to Mexico Patrick Lucey agree on a plan, they will depart Brownsville with a date for a summit with the governors of Mexico's six border states. If the border state governors agree with the plans, the recommendations will be turned over to the State Department as a guide to an partment as a guide to an international agreement between the two countries.

Clements Calls on LULAC

delegates "You are our
greatest resource" in solving

Saying it is better to rely on
a friend like Mexico for foreign oil supplies, Clements
also brought the 2,000 delegates to their feet when he

said oil companies should be required to either reinvest windfall profits into energy production or be taxed "100 percent—I repeat, 100 per-cent on those above normal revenue."

If LULAC was pleased with Clements' statements, it also is pleased with his 1978 gubernatorial opponent, former Texas Attorney General John Hill. Five days after the convention, LU-AC national director Ruben Bonilla endorsed Hill as the group's choice to replace U.S. Attorney General Griffin Bell, who intends to resign prior to the 1980 primaries. Bonilla said their Hispanic choice, Reynaldo Garza, was recently appointed as 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals judge, but "Hill would be an extraordinary choice" because of his record on civil rights.

Despite a State District Judge's orders to close the unlicensed childrens' homes of evangelist Lester Roloff, the facilities remained open last week. Officials from the last week. Officials from the Department of Human Resources refused to break through a human barrier of about 300 hymm-singing persons clutching Bibles and American flags who stood in front of the entrance to Roloff's Peoples Church. The teen-aged residents of Roloff's Rebekah Home for Girls had been moved from the home to the church next door, and their parents and some 150 pastors from 25 states kept a front-door vigil. Roloff voluntarily closed down his Zapata boys' home facilities on June 19 in obeyance of the court order, but maintained a stubborn resistance at the girls' home near Corpus Christi. State officials, unsure of how to handle the large crowd, said they did not know when or if they would enter the home. Roloff, meanwhile, says he will "never give up." Department of Human Re

American foreign policy in Africa has often contained misconceptions and misunderstandings. Western civilization does not fully comprehend that tribal culture that prehend the tribal culture that pervades African society. Europeans colonized and exploited this continent during the 19th and early part of the 20th centuries. After World War II a wave of nationalism swept Africa and forced many European countries to abandon their former colonies. The move toward independence was sometimes rapid and when the colonists moved out, the permanent inhabitants were left with few leaders able to run a national economy. Rival factions in some countries clashed for power and violence erupted in several ploited this continent during violence erupted in several places. In 1961 a civil war in the praces. In 1901 a Civil war in the Congo nearly forced a Soviet-American confrontation. Too often in Africa there has not been a peaceful transition to majority rule. Human rights and fundamental liberties in many areas have proved an

elusive concept.

We are now faced with one of the most sensitive issues confronting U.S.-African relations — whether or not to lift the economic sanctions against the country of Zimbabwe-Rhodesia. These sanctions were imposed intersanctions were imposed inter-nationally after the United Nanationally after the United Na-tions Security Council designated the government there illegally formed. However on April 22, 1979, nearly two million Rhodesians (64% of the eligible voters) cast ballots for a new government. Based upon the information I have received and studied. I feel that

subsequent government, now installed, constitutes an adequate transition to the majority rule we all favor. In these elections, the balloting was secret, there was genuine competition, and no political parties were barred from participation in the elections.

in the elections.

Though the present situation in Rhodesia may seem to remain somewhat "unfair," I feel that supporting this transition to democracy by lifting the sanctions is a better direction to take than to demand the continuation of sanctions until the proclaimed Marxist forces, called the Patriotic Front, have an equal role in a new government. They refused to participate in the recent elections and seem to prefer the use of force to accomplish their goals. goals.

goals.
Rhodesia is capable of economic self-sufficiency, but we must lift sanctions so that trade can flourish. Economic strength will do much to promote political stability. This country supplies 90% of the world's lithium which is used in space shins. They also mine world's lithium which is used in space ships. They also mine copper, nickel, asbestos, and large amounts of chromium— all of these are important to an industrialized society. Economic self-sufficiency will be to the advantage of all Rhodesians— both blacks and whites.

The newly elected Prime Minister of Rhodesia, Bishop Muzorewa, expressed the situation well when he stated "Why on Earth would the British and Americans not precornize a covernment that recognize a government that has been set up by honest people who have tried to do it on a democratic basis?" It is my belief they should have our support.
