Richard Edmond Growing, native of Muenster and longtime civic leader, died at age 61 in Muenster Memorial Hospital on May 17, 1988 at 3:55 p.m. following a long illness.

He was born on Oct. 13, 1926 to John Growing and Hattie (Bindel) Growing in Muenster. He was married to the former Florence Moster on June 15, 1950 in Muenster.

Survivors include his wife, Florence Growing; seven daughters, Janice Bayer, Carol Frost, Barbara Fanning, Mary Kay Sicking, Sharon Growing, Phyllis Serna and Laura Harrison; and one son, Wayne Growing, all of Muenster; also 24 grandchildren.

Also two sisters, Angie Barnhill and Doris Growing; and five brothers, Steve Growing, Walter

Growing, Joe Growing, Hermie Growing and Anthony Growing.

He was preceded in death by his parents; one daughter, Teresa; and one sister, Mildred.

An independent oil producer, Richard Growing was self-employed. He was a veteran of WWII and served in Japan. He was a charter member of Muenster Memorial Hospital Board of Directors; a former City Councilman and Mayor of Muenster. He was a member of the Board of Directors of Muenster State Bank; a Director of the Sacred Heart Trust Fund and a member of Sacred Heart Church.

Muenster Jaycees named Richard Growing the "Outstanding Citizen of the Community" as part of their 25th anniversary observance in May 1987.

Muenster welcomed a new business and its owner fulfilled a long-cherished dream of becoming a part of this community when Corinne Qualls, owner, and her daughter Sheri Brawner, store manager, held Open House Friday, May 13, at Mom's Pie Company. They are assisted by Anna Herr and Stephanie Bynum.

Located on Highway 82, just south of AMPI, a ribbon cutting ceremony at 11 a.m. on May 13, hosted by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce, marked the official opening. However, planning, preparation, assembling and minor construction had been going on for quite some time.

"Mom's Pie Company" was chosen as the name of the new business, "in memory of my grandmother," said Corinne Qualls, "and the result of an inspiration one long night when searching for a specific item, I turned up an antique keepsake from my grandmother, a small tin tray, used as a wall decoration, carrying the inscription: 'Mom's Pie Company.' ... 'My grandmother started teaching me to cook when I was four years old, and I had loved food preparation ever since.'"

Although she had been a registered nurse for 40 years, her interest in foods never changed and her interest in crafts widened into more than a hobby. She has a practice of taking an annual week's retreat in Santa Fe, and it was there she saw shops such as the one she has now opened in Muenster.

When she discovered her present location available, she says she felt the opportunity was the result of prayer and the answer to a need.

Mom's Pie Company accepts consignments from local artisans and wants to represent all ages of area craftsmen. Many locally-made items are already on display for sale.

Hundreds of items have been gathered from travels through states all the way from Texas to the East Coast, paying particular attention to areas in Arkansas, Missouri, Tennessee, Alabama, the Virginias and up the East Coast, where good craft items were available.

Store hours are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The long day keeps Corinne Qualls occupied with baking sweet rolls, whole pies, fried pies of several varieties and a new, low cholesterol, sugar-free pie, and her own German butter roll. Proudly she says, "My heritage and ancestry from both sets of grandparents are German."

## Law enforcement: It's a way of life

They patrol the streets of Muenster at all hours of the day and night. They warn students at our schools of the hazards of drug abuse. They investigate scenes of crimes and enforce the laws of our land.

They're Muenster's woman and men in blue, and Mayor Ted Henscheid declared May 15-21 Police Officers Week in recognition of their efforts.

"Our police officers are outstanding, and it's only appropriate to recognize the fabulous job they're doing," Henscheid said Tuesday. "I hope they can continue to have the force they have. We're proud of them."

Police Chief Helen Tompkins has been a police officer at Muenster since 1980, serving as head of the department for the past seven years. Her post at Muenster is her first law enforcement job.

"I've been called a lot of things - everything from Helen to Hawkeye to that ole kooky-blank," Tompkins said Monday. "What people call me just depends on what's going on at the time."

"Overall, the people do appreciate us. You can't please everybody all the time," she said. Robert Stovall, who served as Chief of Police at Nocona for six years, has been a Muenster police officer since 1981. David Boyd Jr. has been a police officer at Muenster since 1985, formerly working with the Amarillo Sheriff's Department.

Calling alcohol consumption by minors and hot-rodding Muenster's biggest law enforcement problems, Tompkins estimated that the three officers handle 85 percent of crimes committed in the city. She also figured that in nine out of 10 arrests the

# Malicious crimes strike city

A surge of vandalism swept through Muenster this weekend, hitting a school, church and business and leaving a frustrating trail of damage and destruction.

Seventeen tires on five Muenster Public School buses were slashed with what Police Chief Helen Tompkins suspects was a medium-sized lockblade pocket knife.

Some of the tires were steel belted, she said, and some were slashed up to four times.

A passenger window on a bus was also broken. Only three buses ran Monday morning.

"That act was serious. It was stupid and ignorant," Tompkins said. "The person who did it didn't get a thing out of it. The

kids are going to be the ones who suffer the loss."

A car belonging to Arthur Tuggle, also parked in the MPS lot Sunday night, was vandalized with one slashed tire and a broken mirror and radio antenna.

Tompkins estimated that the cost of each bus tire was about \$300. The total amount of damage was \$3,400.

The act will be filed as criminal mischief, which is a third degree felony in this case. Punishment is restitution for damages, up to a \$10,000 fine and between 2 and 20 years in the penitentiary, she said.

A reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered for information leading to the arrest of persons guilty of the crime.

At the First Baptist Church, letters on a brick sign in front of the building were broken Sunday night. Lights shining on the sign had apparently been kicked and broken, as well. Tompkins estimated damage there to be several hundred dollars.

A reward of up to \$500 is being offered in this case.

Two small entry and exit signs shaped as milk cows at Mom's Pie Co. were also destroyed one day last weekend. Broken wine bottles were found in the area.

Tompkins said she does not know if the incidents of vandalism are related.

Burglary also was committed this weekend with the theft of a chain, boomer and spare tire from Harvey Lamkins's pickup truck.

Tompkins said the value of the stolen items was about \$150.

## Ray Farabee to remain on ballot

Former State Senator Ray Farabee announced that he will remove his name from the November General Election ballot on Aug. 14, the day after the special election for State Senator.

By waiting until this date, Farabee's action guarantees the people of District 30 the opportunity to vote on all the candidates for State Senator.

"If I remove my name any sooner, there may be an attempt to deny voters their rights. The integrity of this Senate seat is being severely threatened, and I cannot stand by and merely watch."

"I know the county chairs join me in saying that the people should be allowed to vote on all the candidates for State Senator," he said. "The Democratic party has always been a strong proponent of letting the people have their say. Furthermore, Texas has clearly endorsed the public election of judges and of our State Board of Education. Surely, the public election of our State Senators is just as important, if not more so."

Currently, there are four candidates interested in filing for the Senate Seat in the August election. Because Ray Farabee is waiting until Aug. 14 to take his name off the ballot, all four candidates and any other interested person can put their name on the August ballot before the county chairs can be forced to choose the candidate for November. "This allows the August election to take place with all interested candidates on the ballot," Farabee explained. "My primary concern is to let the voting public be heard and not ignore their rights."

"I'm disturbed by talk of bypassing the summer special election," Ray Farabee said. "Without such an election to act as a 'primary,' the 30 Democratic county chairs are forced to pick one candidate and the 30 Republican county chairs are forced to pick one for the November general election ballot without any input from the voting public. This is outrageous. Not only is it an unfair burden to put on these chairmen, it is extremely unfair to the 300,000 people who have a right to vote."

"No matter how many votes Helen Farabee gets or how many her opponents get in the August election, the important thing is that the people get to vote on all the candidates. I give you my word that my name will come off the ballot the day after the August public elections," Farabee continued.

## Taxpayers must protest property values by May 31

AUSTIN - Property owners have an earlier deadline for filing a notice of protest with the local appraisal review board (ARB). Effective for the 1988 tax year, a property owner must file the protest by May 31 or no later than 30 days after an appraisal notice is delivered, whichever is later.

The filing deadline is one month earlier than the old one of June 30. The earlier deadline gives a local review board more time to hear and decide property owners' complaints about value.

Appraisal notices are not sent to all property owners. The chief appraiser must send a notice under three circumstances: for a new property, for a property where the owner rendered a lower value than the appraisal district's value, and for an increase in value over the prior year.

The ARB will schedule a hearing when it receives a taxpayer's protest in writing. The ARB will then mail a written notice to the property owner listing the date, time and place of the hearing. The property owner will have at least 15 days notice of the hearing.

The ARB must schedule a single hearing for property owners who own property in undivided or frac-

tional interests, including owners of mineral interests.

Appraisal districts have official notice of protest forms for property owners to use, or they are available from the State Property Tax Board at P.O. Box 15900, Austin, Texas 78761-5900. Although an official form is not mandatory, the notice must be a written document that identifies the property owner, the property in question and indicates some dissatisfaction with the property's appraisal record.

Property owners must present evidence and information that supports a different determination than proposed by the appraisal district.

Any property owner who acquires property after Jan. 1, but before the filing deadline, may protest an appraisal. Property is appraised as it existed on Jan. 1.

Property owners who intend to have an agent represent them at the protest hearing should make sure they have a completed agent authorization form on file at the appraisal district. Appraisal districts and the State Property Tax Board have these forms available for the public.

## Farabee expresses concern over ruling

Helen Farabee, Democrat for State Senator, has reacted to the Secretary of State's ruling against Representative Steve Carriker.

"The Democratic Party cannot afford to give away any House seats to the Republicans this November," Farabee said.

This week the Secretary of State ruled that Rep. Steve Carriker cannot be on the November general election ballot simultaneously as a candidate for both State Representative and State Senate. The ruling stated that since Carriker has a Republican opponent in his State Representative race, Carriker would be turning his current House seat over to his Republican opponent if he runs for the State Senate in November.

The GOP candidate for this House seat is Fredonia businessman Rod Wall.

"Many Democrats in this district feel reluctant and nervous about gambling on this House seat in court," Farabee explained. "No one knows for sure how that will turn out, but all indications are that we will lose. The Secretary of State has already ruled against it. And, the last thing we need to be doing is spending our Democratic dollars in a drawn-out, expensive court battle that we are probably going to lose anyway."

Some Democratic Party officials predict that the State Democratic Party will end up footing the bill for Steve Carriker's legal expenses.

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## TEAMS tests in Muenster goes well

Muenster students fared well on this year's Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills Test (TEAMS).

The TEAMS is a basic, minimum skills test given annually to all students in Texas public schools in grades 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9, and an exit-level test in grade 11. First-grade results will come in later. Exit-level results have already been reported.

Muenster students did about as well as they have done in the past, said Charles Coffey, Muenster superintendent. The writing section of the test, which includes both information about punctuation and grammar plus a written skills section, continues to be somewhat lower, he said.

"The writing is the toughest test in the bunch, and the fifth-graders seemed to have some trouble with it," Coffey said. "Overall, though, we've already made great strides in the writing over the last three years," he said.

In the third grade, 96 percent of the students mastered the math section, 88 percent the reading, and 84 percent the writing section.

In the fifth grade, 92 percent mastered the math, 100 percent the reading, and 54 percent the writing.

In the seventh grade, 100 percent of the students in the class mastered the math section, 97 percent the reading, and 94 percent the writing.

In the ninth grade, 94 percent mastered the math, 97 percent the reading, and 94 percent mastered the writing section.

## Lindsay City Council hires new judge

The Lindsay City Council has hired Christopher Kepler as the new municipal judge.

Kepler is also the Muenster municipal judge. Lindsay municipal court sessions are held the first Saturday of the month at City Hall.

During their regular May meeting, Robert Walterscheid, health officer, told council members about an attempt by the state to better inform the public about possible lead contamination of water supplies. A letter will be sent to all customers on the Lindsay water system this month with general information about lead

contamination and what to watch out for. Older structures which may have lead pipes could be a possible source of contamination, Walterscheid said.

Lindsay Mayor Don Metzler said there's no real concern about lead in the town's water supply, but if anyone has a concern after receiving the information with their water statement, they should contact him.

The council denied a request from John Pagel that the city pay for the installation of sewer lines to the planned Community Estate Addition located at the intersection of U.S. Hwy. 82 and FM 1199. Members did agree to pay

for four fire hydrants to be installed in the residential development.

In other business, the council:

- Canvassed the votes of the May 7 council election. Don Metzler was re-elected mayor with 72 votes and council members re-elected were Wilbert Block with 73 votes and Jerry Kneupper with 76 votes.

- Elected Kneupper as mayor pro-tem.

- Presented a plaque of appreciation to former longtime mayor Joe Bezner for his many years of service to the town.

- Discussed but took no action on changes in water and sewer rates. Metzler said the town is

breaking even on town services except for the trash dump which is losing money. The town will probably have to do some repair and expansion work within the next five years, so rates may be raised this summer to begin building reserve funds to pay for improvements to the services.

- Began preliminary discussion about the possibility of expanding the town's city limits. Since Lindsay's population is below 5,000, people must voluntarily ask to be taken into the city limits. Metzler said council members may talk with some property owners who live just outside the city limits and see if they are interested.

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## City receives May check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on May 11 sent Muenster, which is one of 1,041 Texas cities that levy local option sales taxes, a check for \$13,085.10. This amount is down 4.9 percent from the May 1987 payment.

Lindsay's payment of \$4,449.57 this month was a drastic 13.77 percent fall from one year ago. Gainesville's check for \$134,830.97, on the other hand, represents a 1.1 percent increase for that city from May 1987. The city of Gainesville received 83.34 percent of the \$154,367.21 sent to Cooke County cities this month.

While Bullock sent a total of \$111.4 million to Texas cities in May, Houston received the largest allocation - \$19 million.

Muenster's 1988 payments-to-date total \$42,904.40, a decrease of 5.11 percent from 1987. The county total of \$566,554.28, however, is up 11.98 percent from last year's May payments-to-date.

May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 21.



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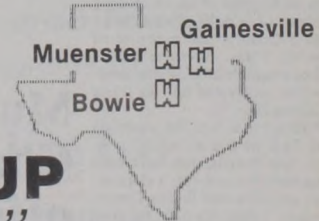

## A.G. Edwards reports...

Stocks recommended by A.G. Edwards outperformed the recommendations of nine other major brokerage houses for both the three-month period and the 12 months ended March 31, according to a Wall Street Journal study released earlier this week.  
 According to the study, conducted by Zacks Investment Research Inc. of Chicago, Edwards was the only firm to show a slight (0.3 percent) gain for the 12-month period; the other firms' recommendations would have produced losses over the same period.  
 The next best 12-month period results (a loss of 2.4 percent) came from Shearson Lehman Hutton's recommendations; Merrill Lynch's recommendations, which would have produced a loss of 5

percent, ranked third.  
 This study put Thomson McKinnon in the fourth place slot for its recommendations over the 12 months, followed by Dean Witter, Paine Webber, Smith Barney Kidder Peabody, Drexel Burnham and Prudential-Bache.  
 For the first quarter, A.G. Edwards' recommendations gained 15.1 percent, followed by a 14.1 percent gain from Merrill Lynch's and 11.87 percent on Shearson Lehman Hutton's recommended stocks.  
 A.G. Edwards Director of Securities Research Terry Dessent attributes Edwards' research success to "concentration on a value orientation" and an overall conservative approach. "At the core of our buy list were high-dividend paying stocks, which we believed

would provide a cushion to volatile market action," he explained.  
 Last month the Wall Street Journal characterized A.G. Edwards as probably the "most cautious" among 10 of the largest brokerage firms with respect to asset allocation advice.  
 A.G. Edwards advised clients to put only 35 percent of their money in stocks at the start of last year, and before the crash, the recommended amount was lowered to 30 percent.  
 In a previous study that tracked 10 major firms' research performance for 1987, A.G. Edwards ranked fifth.  
 The Journal reported on the ability of A.G. Edwards' stock recommendations to weather the October stock market crash. During and after the market plunge, "stocks selected by St. Louis-based A.G. Edwards & Sons, Inc. held up best," the paper reported Feb. 5.

Ayers, Sherman, Texas, Grayson County; David Brooks, Honey Grove, Texas, Fannin County; Mary Ethyl Praetz, Sherman, Texas, Grayson County; Virgil Welch, Gainesville, Texas, Cooke County.

## History research unveils interesting facts

Researching Muenster's past for the Centennial History Book continues to bring new-old information about our town. Mr. Francis Weise of Gainesville shared with the history committee a copy of "The Mercantile Agency Reference Book," printed in January 1910. The book lists, by town or city, all businesses, their estimated money strength, general credit and a classification of trade done by each business.

Muenster had a population of

467 with four saloons, two blacksmiths, two general stores, a restaurant, mill, gin, lumber yard, plus six specialty businesses. The complete list will appear in the history book.

Other local towns of interest included: Forestburg, population 372, with six general/grocery and drug stores, two blacksmiths and a gin.

Rosston, with 229 residents, had two general stores, one drug store, blacksmith and gin. With

236 citizens, Marysville had two groceries, two general stores, a blacksmith and a gin.

Myra businesses included five grocery/drug/general stores, a furniture/hardware, restaurant, bank, blacksmith, lumber yard, mill, and telephone exchange for the 204 citizens. With a population of 210, Era had three general stores, two gins, a blacksmith and a drug store.

The booming town of Valley View boasted four grocery stores,

three dry goods, two gins and a mill, two lumber yards, two hardware stores, a furniture, a livery stable, publisher, blacksmith, and restaurant for its 378 people.

To the east, the colony of Lindsay, with 151 citizens, consisted of two saloons, a general store and a mill.

Researching family and Muenster history has turned up lots of fascinating stories and pictures which will fill the Muenster Centennial History Book.

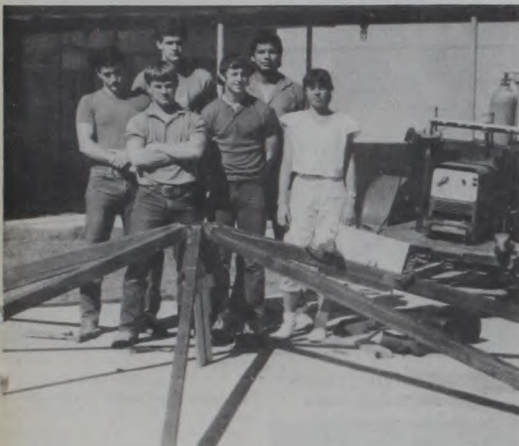

## Lindsay TEAMS scores good

by **Elaine Schad**

The Lindsay School District has again logged excellent scores on the annual Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills Test (TEAMS).

The TEAMS test is a basic, minimum skills test given to students each year in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and an exit-level test to grade 11. First-grade results have not yet been received, and the exit-level results were reported earlier this year.

Lindsay's scores were among the top in the state last year, but there was noted improvement this year by Lindsay students in the writing section, said Henry Schroeder, Lindsay principal. "Some areas went up and some went down, but there was a big surprise this year in that there was a marked improvement in the writing performance," he said.

The writing section is divided into both the mechanics of grammar, punctuation and spelling, as well as a composition section.

Students are ranked 1 to 4, with 1 as failure, 2 as average, 3 as above average and 4 is excellent.

In the third grade, 100 percent of the students mastered the math section, 95 percent the reading section, and 84 percent the writing section. In the writing, 11 percent of the students scored a 4 and 32 percent scored a 3.

In the fifth grade, 100 percent of the students mastered both the math and writing, while 96 percent mastered the reading. In the writing, 38 percent received a rank of 4 and 46 percent received a rank of 3.

The seventh-grade class showed 100 percent mastery in all three sections. In the writing, 16 percent of the class ranked a 4 with 80 percent ranking a 3.

In the ninth grade, 97 percent of the students mastered the math and reading, while 94 percent mastered the writing. In the writing, 4 percent scored a 4 while 56 percent had a 3 ranking.

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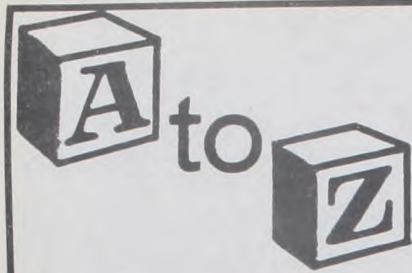

## Texas hay supplies getting short

Hay supplies range from adequate to short across most of Texas, reflecting the less than perfect growing season last year and the extremely dry conditions this spring.

Hay prices have averaged \$3 higher per ton this season than last over most of the state, said Dr. Robert Schwartz, economist in dairy marketing with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

In South Texas, the first cutting

of hay has begun in irrigated areas or locations that received rains this spring, Schwartz said. Producers along the Upper Coast are planting their hay crops. Moisture is reported adequate in most of the Upper Coast, East, Northeast and Panhandle areas, but the remainder of the state is short on moisture. Those areas with adequate moisture expect good hay crops, he said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's hay harvesting intentions suggest that Texas growers will harvest 3.4 million acres of hay in 1988. This is up 5 percent from last year, Schwartz said.

Oklahoma growers expect to

harvest 5 percent less and New Mexico producers 2 percent less than last year. Producers in Kansas report no change in harvest intentions from year earlier levels.

Only a slight increase is anticipated nationally this year from previous levels in hay harvesting situations.

"Despite the expected increase in local hay supplies, prices likely may remain strong for hay during 1988. The current nearly depleted supplies and the apparent reduction in hay harvest indications in states that normally ship hay into Texas may create a brisk demand and consequent strong prices," Schwartz said.

## County Agent's Report

This week Dr. Dale Pennington, Extension Soils Chemist, was in the county visiting with producers on the efficient use of various nitrogen sources. Several items of interest that were discussed should be beneficial in making fertilizer decisions.

All sources of nitrogen, whether anhydrous ammonia, ammonium nitrate, urea, or liquid nitrogen, are very effective when properly used. To be available to plants, nitrogen sources must convert to the ammonia form. Several conditions in nature can cause a loss of ammonia. Some of these include wet fields and extreme heat. Water standing in fields that have been recently fertilized can cause the loss of nitrogen. Water standing on fields for three to four days will cause this nitrogen loss. Also, high temperatures in the range of 85-plus degrees F. can cause some nitrogen loss if the fertilizer is not covered by soil.

The most volatile forms of nitrogen include urea and anhydrous ammonia. Liquid nitrogen sources would also fall in

this category due to the fact that a large percentage of their composition is from urea. When temperatures are above 90 degrees and the nitrogen source is placed on the soil surface, we can lose as much as 30 percent of the actual nitrogen. We do not lose as much ammonium nitrate in this particular situation. However, even in the nitrate form, we can lose 15 to 20 percent.

In deciding on nitrogen sources, the first consideration should be cost. Evaluate the cost per pound of actual nitrogen in making fertilizer decisions.
