"We had a lot of applicants, and took a lot of time in selecting a teacher for this position," said Charles Coffey, Muenster superintendent. The school board has also hired

Celine Dittfurth, city secretary, administered oaths of office to three aldermen elected Saturday. Pat Dennis received 126 votes to win Place 1, incumbent Aubrey Tuggle received 122 votes to win Place 2 and incumbent Claude Klement won Place 4 with 130 votes. None of the positions were contested. A total of 142 ballots were cast in the election.

New business for the Council began with Steve Gilland of W. Scott Whaley, an auditing company in Bowie, reporting on Muenster's financial operations from October 1986 through September 1987.

Included in Gilland's report was the fact that general revenues of the city during the fiscal year were \$485,151 but expenditures were \$482,593.

"But your sales tax income has

the city during the fiscal year were \$455,151 but expenditures were \$482,593.

"But your sales tax income has been very stable, and that's good for the city," Gilland said. "I've seen some (cities) lose as much as 25 percent."

Also appearing before the Council was Ronnie Felderhoff, a manager of Muenster Milling Co. Felderhoff said construction on a new mill for the business on South Main is set to begin within eight weeks. He requested that the Council consider granting a five year tax abatement for the new facility similar to tax relief given by the Council in 1977 for construction of Valenite Metals on West Hwy. 82.

"I'm not asking you to cut my taxes out all together," Felderhoff said. "Just help me hold them down for a little while."

The tax abatement would save the business about \$7,500-\$10,000

Tax transfer: how it will affect Muenster

While county officials are getting ready to take over property
tax collections from the Cooke
County Appraisal District,
Muenster city officals are still
waiting to see how the transfer will
affect the collection of Muenster

In 1981 when appraisal districts were created by state legislation, the city was forced to allow the CCAD to appraise its property. Dittfurth said there was confusion over tax rolls and records for several years. Since the county is control of the county is only obligated to handle collec-tions for two years, they may decide to hand things back to the

1990. After that time, the City of Muenster may again decide to collect its own taxes, or may choose to contract with either the CCAD

Because of the successful Nov. 4
referendum which mandated that
the county take over tax collection, the City of Muenster will lose
the authorty to collect its own
taxes. That means Muenster taxpayers will have to travel to
Gainesville beginning Oct. 1 to
pay their city taxes along with
their county and school taxes.

Since the city has used its own
personnel to collect its own taxes
over the years, the city expects to
pay more for tax collection now
that its out of their hands, said City Secretary Celine Ditfurth,
bis incharge of city tax collection.

"I'm just trying to keep all my

As you are well aware, we are in the middle of a very confusing and complicated State Senate race with many unique rules and deadlines. I want to take this opportunity to explain exactly what is going on each which it se

and why it is going on.

This is not a news release. This is an information sheet that I hope will be helpful to you in the repor-

is an information sheet that I hope will be helpful to you in the reporting of this race.

1. Former State Senator Ray Farabee filed for re-election of his Senate seat in early December 1987. This put him on the 1988 November general election ballot. Because no one else filed for this seat, Farabee is unopposed.

2. Ray Farabee was offered, and accepted, a job as vice chancellor and general counsel of the University of Texas System in late February 1988. Because of this he had to resign from his Senate seat, which he did in early March 1988. That left a vacant Senate seat for District 30 for the remainder of Farabee's current term. His term ends on Dec. 31, 1988. However, his name remains on the November general election ballot. The Democratic Party requested that he leave it on there until the Governor called the special election to fill Farabee's vacant seat.

3. The Governor is responsible

3. The Governor is responsible for calling a special Senate elec-tion to fill the vacant seat as soon as possible. A special election must fall on a uniform election

date. The Governor had a choice between May 7 and Aug. 13. He chose Aug. 13.

4. The winner of the August special election will be the State Senator only for the remainder of Earabee's current term, which

ballot for State Senator for District 30. In cases like this, the law says that a Democrat must be nominated for the November ballot by the Democratic County Chairs of the district and a Republican be nominated by the Republican County Chairs. This must take place at least 60 days

County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

Chinch bugs are causing some damage in fields in Cooke County. They feed on the plant at the ground line or below the soil, about ½-inch deep. They suck plant juices from the plant, giving the plant the appearance of drought stress. They may be in spots in the field and also may be found near borders of the field. As the plants grow, the infestation of chinch bugs moves up on the leaves and feeds behind the leaf sheath or in the whorl of the plant. Chinch bugs are about ¼-inch long with black bodies and milky white wings. They young are red when first hatched, then following a molt they become dark colored

when first hatched, then following a molt they become dark colored to black with a white line across the back. Chinch bugs will continue to feed on plants all summer. Wet damp weather slows their increase in numbers.

Insecticides must be placed at the base of the plant rather than up on the leaves. Ten to 20 gallons of water must be used to obtain control. Aerial application has proven to be ineffective for chinch bug control.


