

Panhandle Crisis Center Report by Mary Frances Ellzey

Since October is Domestic Violence Month, I thought it appropriate to run two PCC reports. The following material was garnered from the information imparted at this week's noon-time meetings at the Perry Memorial Library. Those who missed these meetings missed an attention-riveting opportunity to become better informed on the entire situation, from personal stories of battered women through information on recent, more appropriate laws, to how do our policemen and deputy sheriffs deal with a domestic violence call. (By the way, though some of us brought a sack lunch to ward off hunger pangs, many of us either ate before 12:00 himself. noon or lunched after the meeting

Both the two ladies who gave us their personal stories tolerated their situations for quite some time: five and six years. Often we ask, "Why does she put up with it? Why doesn't she leave?" We on the outside of these situations don't understand the subtle psychology. Nor, for that which he must be alert is the possimatter, do the persons involved, bility of violence from some other neither the batterer nor the victim. direction. For example, on one such The victim truly thinks that he won't occasion, the young son, when he do it again. Or after a few times of being physically abused, a victim develops a certain psychological helplessness. Usually the physical abuse is accompanied by verbal threats. This is a most effective way to drain all the gumption a woman has. All too often her cultural and religious background for- this bids her to leave her husband. "If she would just do what he wants her to do (what he demands!) all would be well." Occasionally the batterer is such a charming person outside the home that no one will believe her if she seeks outside help. Sometimes the batterer threatens that she'll never see her children again, and she fears that he'll carry out his threats. Or even that he'll kill her.

The two women who talked to us were trapped in a similar situation. Had they not by some fluke learned of the PCC, they would still be in there making the same mistakes over and over.

What mistakes? Believing that this time he'll keep his promise not to beat her again. Or thinking that she'll be so careful to do what he wants that she won't trigger another beating. Or she is so starved for love that she is willing to take the risk. Or she is so afraid that she can't make it on her own, especially if she has children, that she won't take the risk.

One of the very first things we must learn if this problem is to decrease is that as yet, no effective way of rehabilitating a batterer has been discovered. The sooner the wife can understand this, the sooner she can take the steps to free herself of risk of another battering. These men are dangerous and will remain dangerous. They themselves are almost helpless when their wrath is triggered. Realization of what they are doing or have done never reaches them. One tragedy that most of us remember is that of a man whose wife had frequently called for police assistance. On this particular day, the officer

on duty said, "I'll take it - I've can learn how to avoid developing handled him before" - they were acquaintances, for goodness sakes! But when he walked up to the car wherein the man was sitting, instead of exchanging the usual comments, the man raised his rifle and shot the officer in the face. On one knows what triggered this unusually violent action.

In another instance, the wife had taken the proper steps, had divorced the man, had even moved to another city. One night, maybe as much as a year later, he knocked on her door and entered her house, whether at her invitation or not, I don't know, and shot her then killed

Officers now undergo fairly extensive training in how to answer a domestic violence call.

Very carefully!

Always, no matter what might be the officer's goal at the moment, when a domestic violence call comes in, he answers it immediately. And cautiously. One of the things to saw the officer taking his handcuffed father to the car, went into the bedroom, picked up the rifle and shot and killed the officer.

And very often, as soon as the abuse - showers of name-calling, heat has passed and rescue has sary. 
