FAITH!

In Matthew 17:20, Jesus says: "I tell you the truth, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." This faith is a life saving, life changing, and life arranging power that will help us grow into a new creation. By using the letters of the word "faith," I want to show what that faith is like.

"F" stands for **find our foundation**. In other words, who are we? The Bible teaches us that we are created in the image of God, that we are the salt of the earth, that we are the light of the world, and that Jesus died for us. The very foundation of our faith is that God loves us and that God has a plan for our life. (Read John 3:16 and Matthew 5:13-14.)

"A" stands for **adjust your attitude**. Some people live life in a garbage can with the lid on. They think life stinks. Now what would happen if they took the lid off and looked around through new eyes? They would discover just as we would discover that our attitude about life is dependent on what we think about. Paul challenges us in Philippians 4:8; "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."

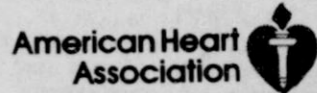
"I" stands for **imagine the impossible**. How many times do we simply give up and exclaim that it's impossible? Maybe we should take our dictionaries and cut out the word impossible. After all, Paul says in Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

"T" stands for **turn your troubles over to God**. If we can begin to see trouble as an opportunity to trust God and an opportunity to see God's power work, then we will view trouble differently. I Peter 5:7 states this principle clearly. "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you. (Also read Philippians 4:6.)

"H" stands for **hold fast to God's hand**. Several years ago, I came across the story of a ship that had sunk in a shipping channel. They tried to raise her with the most powerful tug boats they could find, but she wouldn't budge. Then they hit upon the idea of placing a barge over her and running cables around her. Then they waited for the tide to come. Slowly but surely the forces of nature lifted the ship. If we will hold fast to God's hand, then no matter what happens, he will lift us up. In the words of John 15:5, Jesus says, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing."

Now listen to the words of Matthew 17:20 again, but this time let me paraphrase it. "If you have enough faith, all difficulties can be solved, and even the hardest task can be accomplished."

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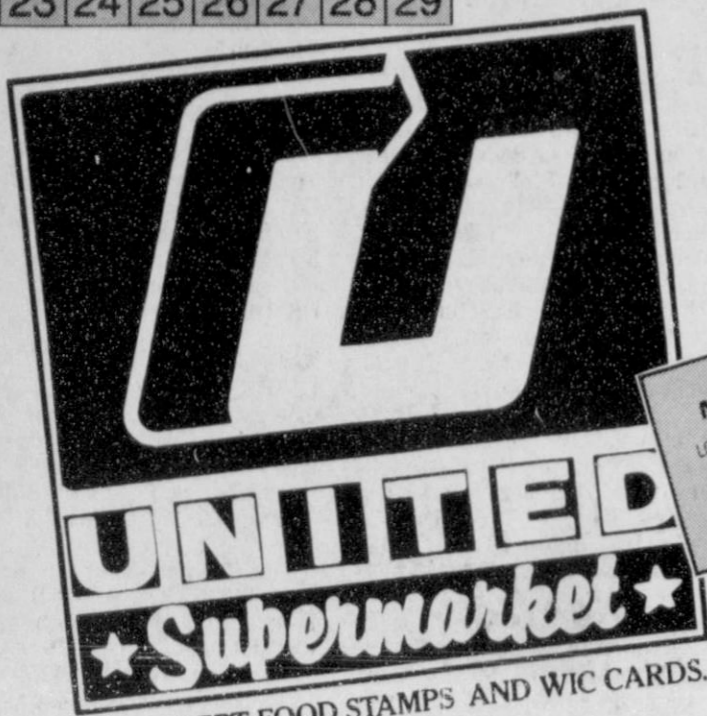
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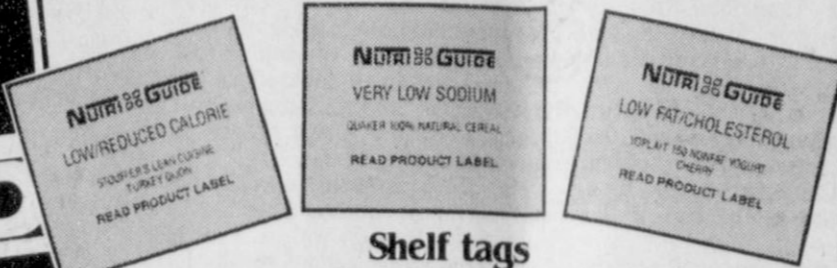
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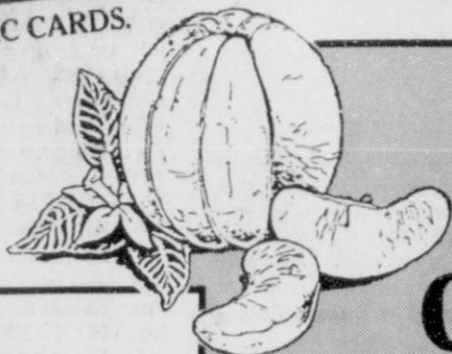

ing (from his birthweight of just over seven pounds to 12 pounds, two ounces), smiling, waving his arms, and following his sister with big curious eyes as she romps across the room. Once a month, his parents take him to a Texas Tech satellite clinic in Amarillo where his progress is carefully monitored by medical specialists.

Kerri admits that she has changed her lifestyle somewhat to ensure that Jake has no setbacks. The breast-feeding mother stays home full-time to care for him and Alicia and has only recently begun getting out and about a bit more. She and Barry try to keep the baby away from large groups of people, because viral and bacterial infections would endanger Jake's recovery. As both admit, this isn't easy, when so many admirers would like to become acquainted with Jake!

Twice daily, the Barkleys take the

baby's pulse and stay on the lookout for any illnesses. "We're more watchful—little things seem to bug us more," Barry says. Kerri chimes in, "Like if he sleeps too long, we want to make sure right away that he's okay. We just don't take Jake for granted at all!"

Adding to the Barkley's good fortune is the fact that the medical costs not covered by Barry's health insurance plan have been paid by an organization called "Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Services." Barry says this program is designed to make up for the gap between a patient's medical bill and what his/her insurance will pay on that bill.

According to the Barkleys, "the drama isn't over," because Jake has some catching up to do, but one look at the obviously-thriving infant seems to indicate that Jake is well on his way.

The Beggar at the Embassy
by Charles Ridge, M.D.

The elderly beggar had come to Rangoon in search of a better life. He was from India and had been born into the "Untouchable Caste." To escape his extreme poverty, he had walked from India, through the jungles of Burma to the capital. Unfortunately, due to the language barrier and his lack of skills, life was no better for him in Rangoon. He spent the rest of his life as a nameless beggar.

Finally, he made his home in a cardboard box which he placed on the sidewalk in front of the American Embassy. Begging was more lucrative there. One morning, when the Embassy staff came to work, they found him sitting stiffly in the box where he had died the night before. The local officials were called several times before they finally came, three days later, to remove the corpse.

PAMPA - If you have Medicare, it is important that you keep your Medicare card handy. The Medicare card is proof that you have medicare protection, so keep it with you.

Doctors, hospitals, and other Medicare-service providers need to see your Medicare card in order to be sure that you have coverage and that the Medicare number is correct. Otherwise, Medicare payments may be delayed.

What if you lose your card? Don't worry. All you have to do is contact Social Security and we will help you get a replacement. You can call us at 1-800-234-5772 weekdays between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

It usually takes four to six weeks to get the new card. And, remember there is no charge for the telephone call or the replacement card.

The local Social Security office is located at 125 South Gillespie, Pampa. The office hours are 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday except on national holidays.

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
