Pringle-Morse CISD holds meeting

On July 5, 1995, the Pringle-Morse School District held a special session Board Meeting.

Present members for the meeting were Ron Womble, Betty Womble, Charlie Kiser, Lonnie Clemmons, Clyde McCloy, Clay Reid, and Pete Schuman. Paige Speck, Business Manager, was also present.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 P.M. A Superintendent Workshop was conducted by Board Member Betty Womble.

The Board entered into a closed session at 9:11 P.M. The Board unanimously decided to have the law firm of Henslee, Ryan, and Groce, P.C. to send a letter to Mr. Sears regarding missing resource materials.

The Board also unanimously voted to refund the \$200.00 deposited on the superintendent home to Mr. Sears.

This meeting was adjourned at 1:15 A.M.

The Pringle-Morse CISD Board of Trustees reconvened in regular session at 7:36 P.M. on July 6, 1995.

At the call to order, Ron Womble, Betty Womble, Lonnie Clemmons, Clay Reid, Pete Schuman, and Paige Speck, Business Manager were present. Charlie Kiser and Clyde McCloy joined the meeting later.

Guests for this meeting include Lisa King, Sadie DeLaCruz, Carla Martin, Sue Schick, and Burl

Buchanan.

After the minutes were approved for the June 13 regular meeting, the Board voted to pay July expenditures.

The Board also approved the Pre-Kindergarten Guidelines as amended, 6-1. Also, the building of a reading loft for the kindergarten room was approved by the Board.

Cafeteria bids, as recommended by the Cafeteria Manager, will go to Lowe's, Ben E. Keith, and Mrs. Baird's. Other approved items include the approval of the Fire Hawk recommendation to bring the cafeteria kitchen up to code and the decision to purchase a convection oven for the kitchen. No decision was taken on the electrical wiring at this time.

Additionally, the Board approved a plumbing evaluation to solve the sewer odor.

The motion passed to purchase step cover from Amstep Products at a cost of \$639.36. Other financial action includes the acceptance of the fuel bid from Morse Implement. Also, the Board decided to keep the above-base amount for teachers salaries at \$2500.00. The Board has also decided to purchase Plan AA from Dwight Jones Agency for the student insurance plan. Plan B will be offered to parents.

The applications for incoming transfer students were also approved.

The Board named Robert Goodwin as the District's Integrated Pest Management Coordinator. Another personnel decision was to approve the 1995-1996 substitute bus drivers list. Also, the Board adopted the custodian job description as written.

The decision was also made to approve the Hansford County Appraisal District Contract.

The motion passed on the addendum item to the table guidelines for riders on school transportation routes.

The Board approved measures for the improvement of the parking lot.

No action was taken on playground equipment or installation, on the office computer system, on the air-conditioning units in the library and science room, on District vehicle insurance, on repairs to school houses, or on the Budget Hearing Date.

The Pringle-Morse Board also heard several discussion items. Burl Buchanan presented proposals on a self-funded pool for medical insurance. Paige Speck gave the financial report. Also, the District Goal Setting Workshop is tentatively scheduled for September. Ron Womble reported on the termite situation, sidewalk replacement, school keys, and the extra office help for July.

The Board entered into a closed session at 1:07 A.M., and the meeting was adjourned at 2:04 A.M.

Tx-NM looks for new power sources

FORT WORTH--Texas-New Mexico Power Company today announced that it has issued a request for proposals (RFP) for purchased power resources in the 1996-2004 time frame. The RFP also requests proposals for resources to satisfy the company's reserve requirements, demand-side resources and control area services.

According to Randy Ownby, assistant vice president-resource acquisition and management, the RFP is an important step in the company's effort to lower its customers' costs.

Ownby said the power requested in the RFP will be used to meet both short-term and long-term power needs. He explained that the company is looking for three different categories of power resources. The first category is 100 megawatts (MW) of short-term peaking resources from 1996-1998 to meet load growth in the company's South-Western Region. The second category is 500 MW of long-term power resources, beginning in 1999, increasing to 700 MW in 2004, to replace power currently purchased from TU Electric in the company's North-Central and South-Western Regions. The third category is for potential additional resource requirements of 115 to 345 MW that may arise from 1996-1998 depending on the resolution of contractual circumstances with the company's existing wholesale suppliers.

Ownby said the company prefers that bids on control are ser-

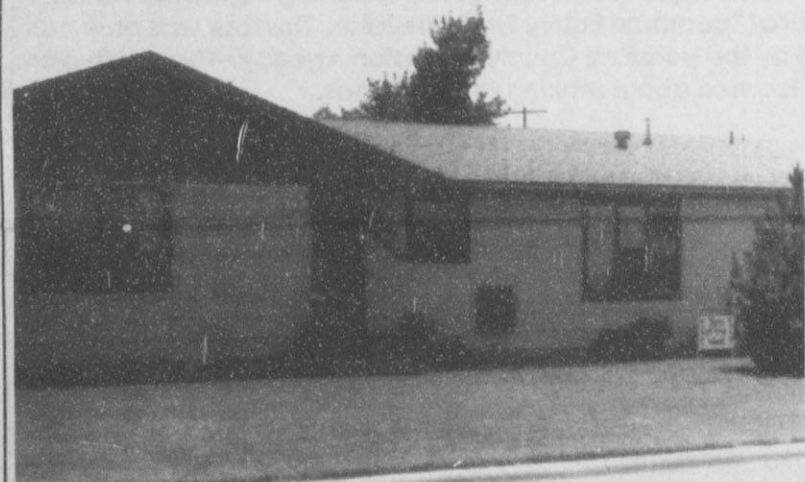

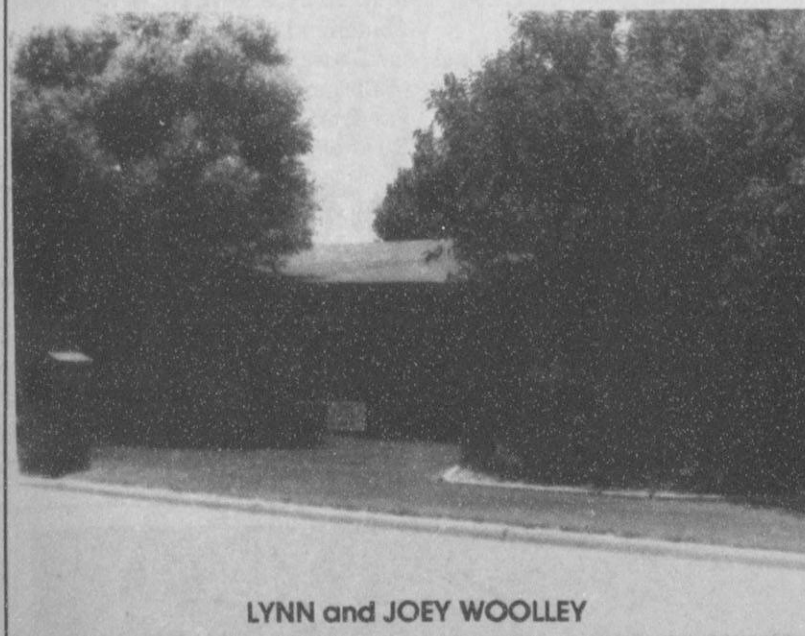

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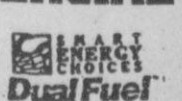
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Local students attend Farm Bureau Seminar

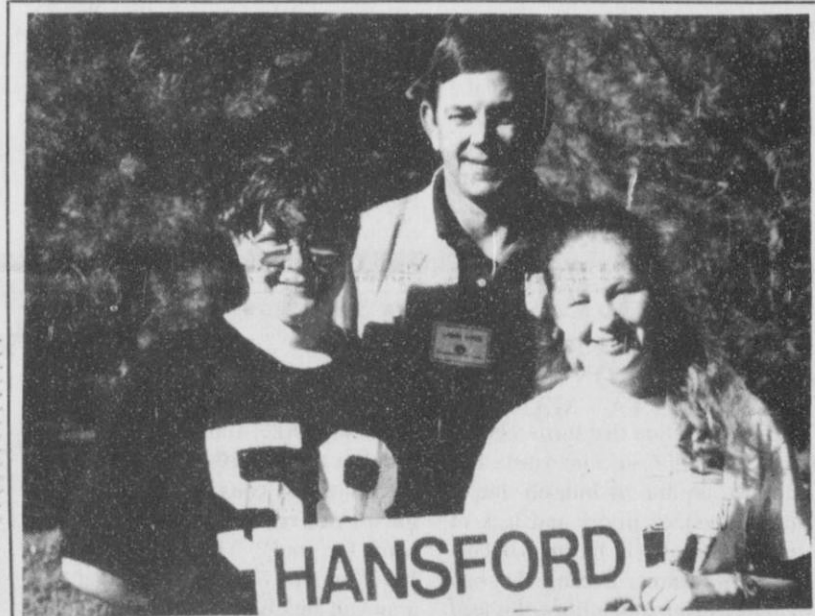
Sister meets new doctor

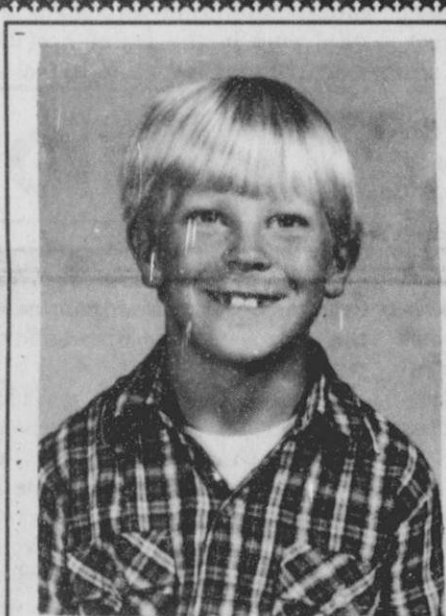
Members of the third place team also shooting a 13 under par 58 were Don Schroeder, Keith Hight,

City Lights

Last month, the City staff gave the City Council a forecast for the next five years. This forecast estimates how much revenue the City will receive and how much money the City will spend for each year until the year 2000. When putting the forecast together the staff looked at different issues facing the City such as our financial condition, the need to replace equipment, public improvements needed, and staffing needed to carry out the City's services.

Some of the financial issues facing the City are: a declining tax base; no increase in sales tax; unfunded state and federal mandates (including environmental mandates that will force us to haul garbage to Borger); the need to maintain and improve public facilities (such as streets, sidewalks, parks, the airport, and the swimming pool); and the impact of the sale of the Texas-New Mexico Power Company's Panhandle properties to Southwest Public Service. These issues will have a big impact on the city's revenues and expenditures over the

next five years.

The staff also looked at the need to replace equipment over the next five years. We looked at the police cars, fire trucks, ambulances, utility vehicles and street maintenance vehicles. We found that the City's vehicles and equipment are not in good shape, particularly the street maintenance equipment. Over the next five years, the City may have to spend a lot of money replacing vehicles and equipment.

The public improvements we looked at included the improvement we have to make under the Americans With Disabilities Act and the improvements to the parks. We estimated the cost of these improvements over the next five years.

Finally, the staff looked at personnel issues. The City will need to provide salaries that attract and keep good, motivated employees. In looking at the next five years, the staff does not expect to add any more employees unless the City takes on additional services.

Our forecast shows that the next five years will be difficult ones for

the City. In each of the five years, the expenditures are expected to exceed the revenues. Therefore, the City will have to make some very difficult decisions in each of the next five years. The City Council will be faced with three options: 1) increasing taxes and fees to pay for the increased expenditures; 2) cut services to keep expenditures in line with revenues; or 3) use reserve funds to help pay for the increased expenditures.

Within the next few weeks, the City Council will be reviewing the Proposed 1995-96 Budget. Unless there is improvement in the local economy or a change in State or Federal regulations, the City Council will have to make some painful budgetary decisions. The Council will have to weigh carefully whether to raise taxes and fees or whether to cut services. I don't envy the Council in this task. However, on behalf of the staff, I pledge our best efforts to provide the City Council with the advice and information they need to make the best decisions for the community.

In most of our small Texas cities, the Main Streets are in serious states of decline. Due to the automobile, suburban housing, and the growth of local and regional shopping centers and malls, the traditional role of Main Street as the principle center of economic activity has been greatly reduced. Many federal government programs, such as urban renewal and various city beautification programs, have failed to halt the decline of Main Street.

In the last 14 years a new philosophy for revitalizing central business districts has evolved. The concept is simple: rehabilitation of existing structures capitalizing on the unique character of the buildings, and development of progressive marketing and management techniques. Preservation and rehabilitation of the historic commercial buildings in the central business district provides the necessary image for the downtown area and serve as unifying factors to encourage area merchants and building owners to reinvest in the downtown.

The program will provide to the community assistance and supervision in design, restoration, marketing, parking, and other areas where the community does not have such expertise on its staff. The program is pledged to work with

each community for three years, developing more local initiative and expertise in the second and third years.

The Main Street Program has developed a cooperative effort with other state agencies to work with the Main Street cities. The Texas Department of Commerce, the Governor's Office, and the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs play an ongoing and vital part in the training of the program managers and in techni-

cal assistance to the cities.

The Spearman Chamber of Commerce is in the process of applying for the Main Street Program to be implemented in Spearman. We are requesting that property owners on Main Street contact the office for the needed information we will need. In order for us to qualify for the program, full support of property is required.

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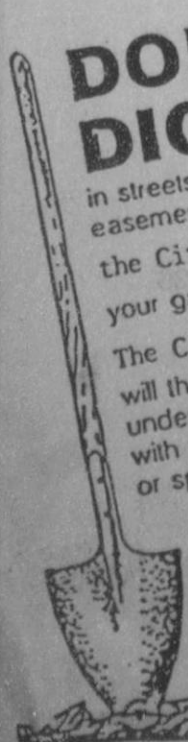

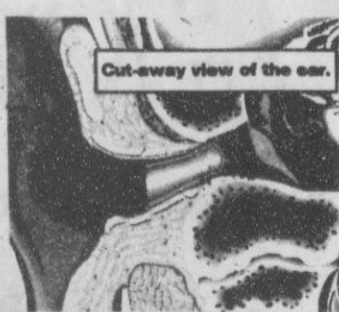

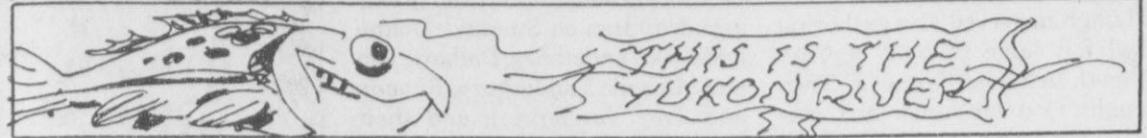
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Spearman Swim Club has one final meet before championships

Services be separate from the power supply bid. Control area services are services provided to insure that the company's power resources are properly scheduled and delivered within the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) system.

Ownby explained that demand-side resources are those that reduce demand and conserve energy during Texas-New Mexico Power Company's peak periods. Examples of demand-side resources are programs that assist customers in purchasing energy-efficient equipment.

In the area of demand-side resources, Ownby said the RFP seeks proposals from energy services providers that would deliver up to 20 MW of demand-side resources by 2004. He said the company prefers demand-side resources that result in improved on-peak energy efficiency, direct load control programs that shift load to off-peak hours.

The company will hold a bidders' conference on July 19 and 20 in Fort Worth. The July 19 conference will address questions regarding supply side resources, control

area services and provision of operating reserves. The July 20 conference will address questions regarding demand side resources. Ownby stressed that persons interested in receiving a copy of the RFP or in attending either of the bidders' conferences must respond in writing by July 14, to Barbara Ellis, Texas-New Mexico Power Company, P.O. Box 2943, Fort Worth, Texas, 76113, or by fax at (817) 737-1384.
