Timeline of U.S. Attacks in NYC, D.C.

Tuesday, September 11, 2001

8:45 a.m. EDT: A commercial jet that authorities suspect was hijacked by terrorists whose identity remains unknown crashes into one of the two 110-story towers at the World Trade Center in New York.

9:03 a.m.: A second commercial jet, also thought hijacked, crashes into the second World Trade Center tower.

9:05 a.m.: President Bush, visiting Sarasota, Fla., to promote his education program, is informed about the two crashes by Chief of Staff Andrew Card.

9:20 a.m.: Bush, preparing to leave Florida, acknowledges that the crashes likely are the result of a terrorist attack and vows it "will not stand." He boards a plane that carries him to Barksdale Air Force Base

9:21 a.m.: Tunnels leading into New York are closed. 9:40 a.m.: Federal Aviation Administration grounds all domestic

flights and orders all planes in the air to land at the closest facility. 9:45 a.m.: A third commercial plane, also hijacked, crashes into

the Pentagon in Arlington, Va. Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, who is in the building, escapes unhurt.
9:50 a.m.: The White House and the Capitol are evacuated after

bomb threats are received. Other federal buildings in Washington are 10 a.m.: The South Tower of the World Trade Center crumbles to

the ground.

10:10 a.m.: A section of the Pentagon collapses.

10:10 a.m.: A fourth plane crashes near Somerset, Pa., southeast of Pittsburgh. A passenger, using a cell phone, contacts an emergency dispatcher shortly before the crash and says, "We've been hijacked. We've been hijacked." Officials believe that plane was headed toward Camp David, the presidential retreat in Maryland.

10:29 a.m.: The second World Trade Center tower falls.

11:04 a.m.: The United Nations building in New York is ordered 11:18 a.m.: American Airlines confirms that two of its planes have

been hijacked and presumed crashed. 11:59 a.m.: United Airlines reports that two of its planes have

been hijacked and presumed crashed. 1:04 p.m.: Bush makes a second appearance and vows to "hunt down and punish those responsible for these cowardly acts." He pro-

ceeds to Offutt Air Force Base in Omaha, Neb. 1:27 p.m.: A state of emergency is declared in Washington, D.C.

1:44 p.m.: Two aircraft carriers are deployed off the coast of New York while five battleships are sent out to sea.


3:47 p.m.: Karen Hughes, counselor for the president, says Bush has convened a meeting of the National Security Council.

4:30 p.m.: White House announces that Bush is returning to

5:30 p.m.: Reports of explosions near Kabul, Afghanistan, a sus pected terrorist hideout, are circulated. The United States denies it is combing Kabul.

6:42 p.m.: Rumsfeld convenes a news conference and vows that the Pentagon will be open for business on Wednesday.

6:55 p.m.: Bush returns to the White House via Marine One. 8:31 p.m.: Bush tells the nation the terrorists attack "can shake the foundations of our biggest buildings but they cannot touch the foundaion of America

Rumors Fly Following **Terrorist Attack**

Late Tuesday afternoon, rumors began circulating about the possibility of fuel shortages following the terrorist attacks Word quickly spread of stations at different sites around the country that had raised the price of gas

to as much as \$5 per gallon.
Upon hearing this, many Spearman citizens drove to one of the local gas stations to fill their car up with gas. Hansford County businesses did not take advantage of the fears, and did not raise prices.


Texas Attorney General John Cornyn said price gouging after the attacks in New York City and Washington, D.C., violated the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act. He promised legal action against violators.

Gov. Rick Perry issued a declaration extending the protections of the act. He warned gasoline retailers, car rental agencies, and hotels and motels against price

This week will live forever in the minds of Americans. The devastation and loss of life following the terrorist attacks in New York and Washington, D.C. are catastrophic.

The events of Tuesday have been likened to several in history, including Pearl Harbor, the Civil War, the death of John F. Kennedy, etc.

Throughout my life I have heard people talk about the day John F. Kennedy was shot. They remember exactly what they were doing and the sorrow they felt when they received the news.

The closest I have come to such events is the Space Shuttle Challenger explosion and the Oklahoma City bombing.

I will, however, always remember Tuesday, September 11, 2001.

I had just arrived at class at Panhandle State when my professor told us that an airplane had crashed into one of the twin towers of the World Trade Center. I assumed that it was a small plane that had lost control, or had technical problems. After class someone told us that a plane had crashed into the other tower. At that instant it hit me, "That means it was not an accident!"

I never imagined that someone could or would deliberately fly a plane, much less a commercial plane, into a building with so many innocent people beginning their workday.

I immediately called our daughter, Jennifer, who lives on Andrews Air force Base in Washington, D.C. She said that they were fine, and that they had locked down the base and put the military on

I cannot begin to express the pain and sorrow I feel for those involved - I can only pray. I pray that they will feel the presence of God with them as they grieve and try to begin to put their lives back together.

I pray for the cities of New York and Washington, D.C. as they try to recover from these tragedies.

I also pray for our government officials as they try to sort through the debris to find who was behind these brutal attacks, and then decide how and when to respond.

May God bless and keep you; May He make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; May the Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace. Numbers 6:24-26

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Blowin' In The Wind

Southwestern Pioneer Windmill Association members put up two windmills on Saturday before Labor Day. The mills erected were a ten-foot Samson and a six-foot Currie. Both mills are from the J. B. Buchanan collection and are in the windmill park.

The Samson mill is one that Mr. Buchanan had restored but never had put up. It was brought to the SPWA's barn and some additional work done on it, and a tower was

The Samson is a brute of a mill, living up to its namesake for strength and durability. The mill has two very large, heavy gears that mesh with the drive gears. The two large gears drive a large rocker arm that gives the sucker rod its pumping stroke. The Samson is open geared and is a remarkable addition to the Windmill Park.

The second mill erected is a 6foot Currie that was originally put up by Mr. Buchanan at his farm. It was brought to Spearman as one of the first mill erected in the park. It was decided that it needed to be rerestored so it was taken down in May, the wheel and pumping mechanism were rebuilt and mounted on a new tower. The tail was re-lettered by Wanda Reed.

The other Currie in the park, an eight-foot mill, was taken down on the same day as the two mills were put up. It will be rebuilt and reerected in the park.

There are presently eleven mills in the Windmill Park, one at the corner of the windmill barn, one at Prairie Motors, one each at First National and First State Banks, and one at "Crazy Corners" that are part of the SPWA's collection. Individuals have erected four mills around town, and the museum has a mill. There is a mill on the Gruver Highway at Burch Contract Pumping so there are presently twenty-two mills in the Windmill City.

I am also seeing more and more of the small scale mills, both metal and wooden, being displayed around town.

An Aermotor mill will be erected in the park across the street from the high school, hopefully this fall. The Currie will be re-erected, a Chandler mill is in the restoration stages, a Duplex mill has been adopted, a John Deere is being restored, a Woodmanse is nearly ready to go up, just to name a few of the mills that are in the Windmill City's future.

If you have mills to give to the SPWA, particularly Aermotors, please let a SPWA member know.

Again, remember that the International Windmillers' Trade Fair is in Spearman June 5-8, There's much to do in preparation for that event.

The family suggests memorials be to a favorite charity.







Canadian's scores all came in the second half when the Cats took advantage of their superior line size, injuries to key Hound players, and Gruver fumbles.







The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commercial purposes.'

PROPOSITION 11

Proposition 11 would amend the constitution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school administrator who serves as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town, or other local governmental district, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a governing body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensated directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service.

Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction. acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

for veterans cemeteries.

Proposition 8 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for construction and repair projects or for the purchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Texas Commission, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the






