Palo Duro River Authority... receives bids on dam projects

Palo Duro River Authority met Tuesday, May 12, to accept bids for the paving project and the water and waste disposal system.

The paving project involves the paving of the three and three tenths mile rode that leads to the pump station, said Palo Duro River Authority, General Manager, Johnnie C. Lee.

Ed Baker of Borger received the project. He had the low bid, stated Lee. He added that Baker's bid was for approximately \$39,000 while Happin of Hereford bid approximately \$92,000 and Lewis Construction of Dumas bid approximately \$49,000.

Baker is already on the job said Lee. The project should be completed within ten days, Lee added.

Several bids were received for the water and waste disposal system, stated Lee. However, there was an adding mistake in one of the bids; so, the Palo Duro River Authority will be holding a special meeting to reconsider the bids. This meeting is set for Tuesday, May 19, at 4 p.m. in the meeting room of the Palo Duro River Authority.

The board also inspected the dam

and facilities. Lee said, "Everything looks really good. The park looks nice. We planted about 50 trees and they're all doing good."

Lee stated that the Texas parks and Wildlife had put in 125,000

large mouth bass, but people are not allowed to fish yet. He added, "If anybody sees anyone fishing out there we'd like to know because they're not suppose to be fishing."

Lee also said that there are some

Other business at the meeting was considering and approving payment of April bills, approving the minutes from the last meeting and giving the treasure's report.

Gruver amends 1991-92 budget

Gruver City Commission discussed 1991 - 1992 budget amendments on Wednesday, May 13 meeting.

Budget changes were as follows for the Administration Department - Personal Services (fee basis salaries) from \$4,500 to \$7,000; Capitol Outlay - Buildings from -0- to \$1,000 and Office Equipment from \$500 to \$1,500.

Police Department changes were maintenance of other equipment from \$350 to \$850 and office equipment from -0- to \$150.

The Sanitation Departments contractual services of tire and tube expense changed from \$200 to \$700 and maintenance of auto equipment went from \$1,000 to 8,000. Their capital outlay for auto equipment changed from \$28,000 to \$21,000.

The capital outlay for dumpsters changed as well. It went from -0- to \$1,500.

Changes in the Financial Administration Departments capital outlay were as follows: office equipment from \$500 to 3,500 and buildings from \$4,000 to \$5,500.

Other changes in the budget were in the Gas Department. The Gas Departments contractual services of maintenance improvements was changed from \$2,000 to \$1,000 and the budget for maintenance of auto equipment changed from \$700 to \$1,500.

Other budget changes were in the Sewer Department. The contractual services of state permits went from \$400 to \$1,120 and the capital layout for improvements

changed from \$2,000 to \$17,000.

A motion was made by Mayor Keith Gibson to approve the budget amendments and Buster Davis seconded the motion. It carried.

In other business, Mark Irwin made a motion to place the Resolution of Intent on the next next meeting agenda. This resolution deals with a new law passed by the federal government. It is a resolution to participate in the PRPC and Americans with Disabilities Act Compliance said City Manager, A.J. Ratliff. The motion was seconded by Davis and carried.

The minutes from the last meeting were read and approved and the bills for the month of April were approved as presented.

Library Book Notes

Over 400 elementary students will tour the Hansford County Library on Wednesday, May 13, to learn more about the library and the 1992 Summer Reading Program. The theme of the program this summer is DISCOVER THE NEW WORLD OF READING, and it is designed to encourage exploration through books. The program will run for six weeks with entertaining and informative programs held at the library each Thursday morning, June 4 through July 9, from 10:45 to 11:30 a.m. there will be prizes galore for those who achieve their reading goals. We will be counting minutes read again this year since we feel that this has been shown to be a much better system for all types of readers.

Children in grades K-5 are encouraged to come by the library and register for the reading program beginning Monday, May 18. Each child must have a library card to check out books. Applications for cards are available at the library and the cards are free, but a parent or guardian must sign each application for anyone under sixteen. New cards will not be issued on program mornings due to the number of children checking

out books at that time. Summer reading motivators will include the following:

1. A "Passport to Discovery" participation bulletin board. When a child has read for five hours, he or she will receive a passport. We will stamp that passport each time they read for five hours or attend one of the programs.
2. When a child has one stamp on his or her passport, a prize will be awarded. When three stamps are collected, another prize will be received. When five stamps are collected, there will be another prize awarded. but at least two of the five stamps must be for reading not just program attendance. If a child collects ten stamps on his or her passport, he or she will receive an additional prize. There is a limit of one prize in each category per child. In the ten stamp category, at least five of the stamps must be for reading.
3. After reading for ten hours, a child will receive a certificate from the Texas State Library. Those receiving certificates will be awarded a one day pool pass in lieu of the usual pool to be used at the Spearman swimming pool on any regular business day.

4. Each child who has read for at least five hours may enter the Design-A-Bookmark contest. Forms will be handed out to these children, and, using original artwork, they may design bookmarks illustrating the theme of this year's reading program. Two winning entries will be chosen and professionally printed for distribution to libraries throughout the Panhandle area.

Parents are encouraged to become involved in their children's reading this summer. Younger participants may be read to as well as reading on their own. We hope that parents will take time to visit the library with their children, and take an active part in this program. Parent involvement stimulates children's reading habits. Studies have indicated that children who participate in a summer reading program are more inclined to retain their reading skills over the summer than those who do not participate.

Library hours are Monday - Friday, 10 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. For more information on the summer reading program, please call 659-2231.

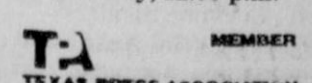

"White Men Can't Jump" is rated R.

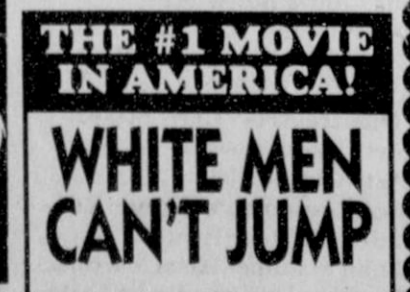

conversation and relaxing around an old black pot bellied stove.

In 1955, J.C. married Faye Fuller while in Sunray and started their family, one son, Elbre Ellis. J.C. had acquired his own building now, which also served as their home. The business soon began prospering.

J.C. built the Hickersons first Jewelry store building in 1963. It served as a jewelry store on one side and he rented out the other side as a restaurant, "Tasty Kitchens."

He became quite diversified in his ambitions. He owned the local ice house, which served ice to the railroad and Shamrock plant, he ran a snowcone shop in the summer, he also sold 45 lp records and

the latest Hi Tech 8 Track Tapes. He tried many ways in making an honest living in Sunray, after 20 years, the Hickersons moved to Spearman.

Spearman offered many things to the Hickersons. It was three times the size of Sunray. There were several other industries getting started there and it served as the county seat for one of the richest counties in the state of Texas. In June of 1977, Frosty completed the necessary requirements at Paris Jr. College at Paris, Texas, in Jewelry Technology. He offered new services jewelry fabricating, major repairs and custom jewelry casting. After further studies, Frosty attended and completed the G.I.A. (Gemological Institute of America) diamond classes, and received his Diamond Certificate (resident) in New York City.

In September of 1985, Frosty married Liz Loomis. Liz, Frosty and J.C. are currently enjoying their modern facilities located

south of Plains Shopping Center. Their repair department contains the most modern equipment in use today, said Frosty. He added that their inventory is one of the largest in the Texas Panhandle.

Charlotte Martin and Regina Vernon currently work for Hickerson Jewelers and will be happy to assist the customers with any jewelry needs, stated Frosty.

Hickerson Jewelers is a member of the Texas Jewelers Association and the Jewelers of America.

Frosty stated that being a member of these groups is an honor.

J.C. Hickerson states, "Living in the Texas Panhandle for the past forty-five years and serving the people with jewelry, and jewelry and watch repair services, has made our business what it is today. 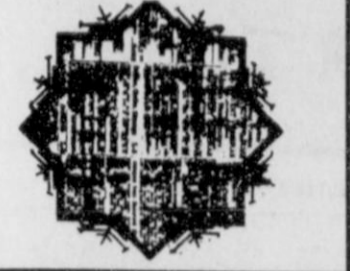

GARDEN TIME

Easing Into a Greater Garden

How does your garden grow? It could be in a way that turns your neighbors green with envy if you heed a few gardening hints.

1. Don't plant tall-growing shrubs in front of your windows. Flowers or ground covers may be used to advantage there, or the area can be left unplanted except for the lawn.

2. When your lawn is new, water with a fine mist so as not to dislodge the seeds or sprigs but still keep the soil moist. An uncovered seeding may need watering two to three times a day for the first few weeks.

3. Keep in mind a handy "gardening tool" you may never have thought about; a can of that popular lubricant WD-40. According to Bruce Asakawa, host of the West Coast Garden Line, a popular radio program, you can use WD-40 to:

- remove grease and grit from metal garden tools, while protecting them from fertilizer and garden chemicals.
- prevent rust and facilitate easy cleaning by spraying it on garden tools and outdoor furniture.
- lubricate shears and pruners.
- clean and lubricate the blades of a rotary lawn mower.
- prevent grass clippings and leaves from sticking to the underside of a lawn mower and clogging it up.

- lubricate lawn mower throttle cables.
 - clean contacts on an electric weed eater.
 - clean and lubricate sprinklers.
 - lubricate and rust-proof hedge trimmers and other tools.
 - lubricate chain saw chains.
4. For flowers most likely to last, cut them in the evening, not the morning. That way, the plant will have had all day to store up food. Keeping these tips in mind can help make it easier for you to get your garden to grow in beauty and you to look like a blooming genius.

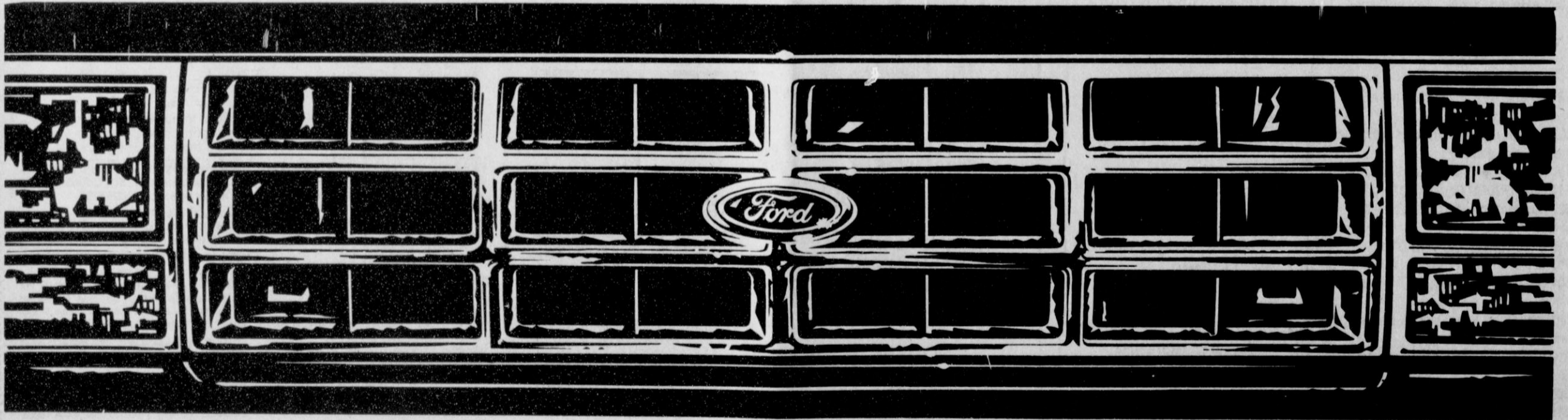
