The Spearman Rotary Club, like many across the nation are hosting an exchange student here. Recenlty club members and their spouses, along with honored guests, welcomed Nira Pena from the Canary Islands in Spain to Spearman.

Pena will be living here in Spearman throughout the 1994-95 school year. The first semenster she will reside at the home of Rick and Cheryl Sanders, and then in the second semester she will move in with Larry and Susie Morris.

Some guidelines concerning the exchange student's school attendance are given to those people who have the most contact with the student, to the student himself, and also to his host family, school, and Rotary Club These guidelines are not complete, of course, and they will not necessarily be suitable in all circumstances exactly as they are. Hopefully, however, they will be helpful.

The main responsibility for the student, in addition to his own responsibility for himself, belongs to the local Rotary club. The club has to share this responsibility with the host family and the school. In order to succeed, all parties have to cooperate intensively.

The youth exchange counselor represents the Rotary club in all matters concerning the student. At school there should be a contact person appointed for this purpose. In this way cooperation between the host family, the school, and the club will have every chance of suc-

The exchange program, in order to be successful, needs mutual understanding between the school and the cub. Each party must know what to expect from each other.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE When the student left his/her country for this exchange program, they promised to attend school regularly. They are to be treated as any other student in your school. Good attendance increases the opportunities of meeting more people in the host school, which in turn offers more opportunities of learning the English language.

There will be times when the exchange student should be excused from school to attend various events such as: Rotary meetings (no more than twice a month), speaking engagements, District Rotary Conference, and events that have been approved by the local Rotary Club. These events should be cleared through the appropriate school officials as soon as they are known about. (School officials will find it helpful to schedule their exchange students in classes during the lunch time that are easily made up).

SUBJECTS

Most exchange students will range in age from 16 (sixteen) to 18 (eighteen) and should be placed with students of their own age. The school will find it helpful to offer a larger choice of subjects regardless of whether they are compulsory or optional subjects. Students should be counselled into which subject areas that interest them and fit their understanding of the English language. As language skills improve, subjects may begin to be changed offering a more challenging curriculum. English, math, science, and history are core subjects that allow flexibility as to the level of: academic competence, grade level, age level, and language competency. Electives could include: foreign language, business, computers, or home economics. Rotary exchange students are eligible for U.I.L. activities if they meet all other requirements.

The lake level was 23.5 on Monday morning.

The hot, dry weather has limited the use of the lake and facilities the past week. However some families and fisherman relaxed there during the week-end.

Further history of the lake shows that John and Adeline (Smith ) O'Bright, natives of Minnesota, came to the Texas Panhandle with the belief they had bought prime farmland from Joe Woods in 1906. The 1907 tax assessment showed a farming operation rather than ranching. The enumeration showed seven horses or mules, one cow, 20 hogs, and \$100 worth of machinery. The machinery consisted of a hay rack, a McCormick binder, a corn planter, a Deering mower, corn sled, one-horse cultivator, two walking plows, a one-row binder and a gang disc plow.

The O'Brights lived on what became known as the Gibner place foe only one year before he died, leaving a widow and five children ranging in age from newborn to 7 years. He was buried in row 14 of the original part of Hansford cemetery. His stone has weathered and is hard to read, but seems to show that he was born in 1870 and died February 11, 1908. However the probate proceeding show that he died May 28,1907. At that time Section 66 was appraised at \$6.00 per acre and Section 64 at \$12.00 per acre, indicating that O'Bright may have enlarged the small adobe room already on the site by the addition of a large adobe room on the east.

After her husband's death, Mrs. O'Bright made some attempt to carry on, leasing the land to John O'Loughlin in 1908 and renting out the improvements to tenants. She had asked Ace Powers to act as executor to the estate, but "he told me he had more than he could do to tend to his own business, and Mr. Aitkins (a neighbor) talks like he can't so I gave up asking the neighbors". This according to a letter she

With no options left, Adeline O'Bright and her five little children returned to Minnesota where she married her deceased husband's brother Andrew O'Bright. Mrs. O'Bright died in 1968 in Fergus Falls, Minnesota.

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
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

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

It begin on February 17, 1897, when 2,000 women and a handful of men met in Washington, D.C., at the invitation of efforts as: Alice McLellan Birney, a former journalist and wife of a prominent Washington lawyer, and her ally, Phobe Apperson Hearst, widow of a wealthy California Senator, mother of William Randolph Hearst, and a founder and supporter of kindergartens in many areas of the na-

During that time the plight of many american children clouded the future. Three - Fourths of them dropped out of school before reaching the 5th grade; many were forced to work in mines or factories under dangerous conditions; and vast members of children and youth, illhoused, hungry and poorly educated, were barely able to read or write. Disease, mal-nutrition, and accidents also took a heavy toll on too many of the nation's youth.

Those attending that first meeting, among them Mrs. Adlai Stevenson, wife of the Vice-President of the United States, and the wives of several Cabinet Members and the Postmaster General, feared that the country's children were at risk and that as a consequence, the country was at risk. They believed that if the next generation were to be able to assume a constructive role in society in the new century, parents needed to be helped to understand the importance of their role and to develop skills in rearing their children. They also believed that to ensure the nation's future, all caring adults needed to mobilize to act on behalf of all children.

The founders established the organization as a nationwide movement and called it the National Congress of Mothers, but almost immediately recognized the need to reach out to everyone if it's goals were to be achieved. Theodore Roosevelt was one to the many men ing and after his presidency. After a series of name changes that reits membership, the name National among many accomplishments. Congress of Parents and Teachers was offically adopted in 1924.

Since its founding, the National PTA and its state branches, districts, councils, and local PTA units, which constitute its constituent organizations, have played as important, often leading role in such

the juvenile justice system. Supporting compulsory public ducation, including kindergartens. Creating a National Public Health Service.


Demanding adequate and equitable funding for public education. Assuring that public funds are used only for public schools that are

accountable to the taxpayers. Since 1909, National PTA has been represented in every White House Conference dealing with the various problems faced by children and youth. It was one of only three educational organizations to be consulted to the U.S. Delegation that helped create the United Nations and assisted in framing the first Hoover Report, leading to the creation of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. National FTA was singled out for its "unprecedented participation in the development of preventive measures against paralytic polio and its leadership in achieving record acceptance of the salk vaccine.'

The National PTA and its constituent organizations have shown remarkable foresight in health and safety areas such as campaigning to reduce infant mortality, encourageing traffic safety education, conducting the first national conference on alcohol and other drug use among minors and in establishing nationwide projects on smoking and health, seat belt and child reflect the widening composition of straints, and AIDS education,
