Most winter wheat was still fair to good, but ratings of range and pastures declined to poor. Fieldwork, primarily the spreading of manure and compost, continued. Producers began fertilizing and irrigating wheat. Reports of green bugs in wheat increased. A few Russian aphids were also found Cattle were in good condition but not gaining much weight because of colder weather.



· Increasing funding for higher education incentives and funding for nursing education.

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





Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister



As we continue to seek revelations of God's glory, we study Isaiah 40 21-31, Psalm 147:1-11, 20c, 1 Corinthians 9: 16-27, and Mark 1: 29-39 In our Isaiah passage, the people are confused. They thought the purpose of God's covenant was to bring blessings to them; they thought it was God's job to protect them. Now they are in captivity, what's wrong here' Isaiah asks, "Have you not known? Have you not heard? God existed before the foundation of the earth. God created everything. God allows men to come to power as princes and God brings these rulers to naught God gives power to the faint and strength to the powerless. Those who wait on God (those who have faith in God), "shall renew their strength they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint". In times of distress and uncertainty, we must be faithful and "wait on God". If we have faith, God wil renew our strength and restore us.

Next, the Psalmist sings of the power of Almighty God and his concern for the down-trodden and for all his creation. The Song passage ends the Lord takes pleasure in those who fear him, in those who hope in his steadfast love...Praise the Lord." In times of distress and uncertainty, we must remember that God loves us and will strengthen us.

Paul conveys to the Corinthians his dual concept of ministry. 1) To work for Christ is a privilege. Paul does not preach for pay so that the gospel may be freely delivered to all. 2) To work for Christ is a duty. Paul states that his hard work is not a matter for boasting, because it is his duty; he is called by God and he must work for the kingdom. In times of distress and uncertainty, we have the privilege to work for Christ by sharing the gospel; we have the duty to share the gospel with others who are also in distress and uncertainty.

Paul then shares his 'method' of ministry. He "becomes all things to all men". This does not mean that Paul becomes a hypocrite or deceives others as to his true nature. Rather, Paul has been given the ability to understand the feelings and motivations of others, which enables Paul to lead others to faith in Jesus Christ. In times of distress and uncertainty, we cannot bring the hope of the gospel to others if we look down upon them and do not empathize with them.

In Mark, Jesus has just exorcised a demon from the man in the synagogue. When they leave Jesus, James and John go to the house of Peter and Andrew. Peter's mother-in-law is in bed with a fever. Jesus heals her and she begins to serve them. In this time of distress and uncertainty Christ heals a follower, and immediately she gets up to continue to serve

In our time of distress and uncertainty, we all want to be well physically and emotionally; we all want to be able to support ourselves and families. Yet, we cannot find comfort and strength in a president, a con gress or in a potentate. It is only by faith in Jesus Christ that we shall be strengthened and restored.

May the Holy Spirit deliver you from your fears that you too may

His bill would create a grant program to encourage the private sector to develop new efficient and environmentally sound technology, especially for stationary emission sources, such as power plants. It would also create a grant program to encourage businesses to install energy efficient appliances, and would offer a \$4000 tax credit to those who buy a plugin hybrid vehicle.
