I watched a movie this week about Gary Ridgway, the Green River Killer.

In November of 2003, Ridgway pleaded guilty to 48 counts of aggravated murder. He said that he had killed over 90 women.

He would take his victims to his house, where he would often show them his son's bedroom. Then he would strangle them to death.

He is currently serving a life sentence in Washington state.

Ridgway did not receive the death penalty, as a result of plea bargaining. Most folks would say that if anyone ever deserved to die, it was Ridgway.

On December 18, 2003, he was sentenced to 48 life sentences with no possibility of parole and one life sentence, to be served consecutively. Then, he was sentenced to an additional 10 years for tampering with evidence for each of 48 victims. This added 480 years to his 48 life sentences.

Words from Faith & Grace

In this season of Epiphany, we discover that God reaches out to the gentiles, to the unclean, to the outcast, as we study 2 Kings 5: 1-17, Psalm 30, 1 Corinthians 9: 24-27, and Mark 1: 40-45. In 2nd Kings, we see the powerful king of Aram send his commanding General to the King of Israel to be healed of leprosy. Imagine if you will, the same situation today if Putin in Russia sends President Obama his commanding general to be healed of AIDS! The King of Israel feared that the King of Aram was setting him up for war; in our time, we could think the same thing. Yet, Elisha the Prophet tells the king not to fear. Gen. Naaman is sent to Elisha. Elisha tells Gen. Naaman to bathe seven times in the Jordan river and he will be healed. The General is a little miffed at the thought, but is persuaded to comply. Gen Naaman is healed. God's mercy, God's healing and restoration is given to a gentile, an enemy of Israel. Later in the scripture we find that Gen. Naaman converts to the worship of the true God.

The Psalmist sings of God's power to heal and restore when the Psalmist asks. Like many of us the Psalmist sings that when he was in prosperity, he felt that he would never be moved; he would never see another bad day. God "hides" his face from the Psalmist and he is dismayed. But note that the Psalmist asks God to help him, expects God to help him and God does help him. My family gets aggravated at me if I don't do something for them that they haven't told me about. My response is, "You didn't ask." Think about this in your relationship to God.

Paul tells the Corinthians that we must have self-discipline if we are to win the prize, our place in God's kingdom. Life is a battle, we must have discipline of mind and body if we are to achieve our goal. But to achieve our goal we must be able to define it and know what it is. If our goal is to live eternally with Jesus in His kingdom, then we must pray and ask and discipline ourselves to meet that goal. We cannot teach what we do not know; we cannot lead others to Christ if we have not yet found him.

Jesus performs a public healing. A leper begs to be healed. "Jesus, if you will you can make me clean". Jesus stretches out his hand, touches him and says, "I do choose. Be made clean!" This is revolutionary and is an Epiphany because the nature of God is presented for all to see. The leper was a social outcast. The leper could not live with his family; could not engage in trade with other people. As he walked near people, the leper must shout "unclean, unclean" as a warning. The leper's clothes were rags so that people would be warned of his disease. A strict Jew would not be closer than six feet upwind and eight feet downwind of a leper. The leper was foul and smelled of disease, and Jesus touched him! The God who was well touched the one who was sick, and he was healed. Think of this and then think of the cross. The cross is where the "God who is well touched the sins of this world, our sins, and in this cross we are healed!"

May the Holy Spirit heal and restore your spirit that you may achieve the goal of His Kingdom.

State Capital HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Gov. Rick Perry on Feb. 3 declared emergency items for lawmakers to focus on in the first 30 days of the legislative session, which began Jan. 13.

Perry's emergency items call for legislation that would:

• Provide supplemental appropriations to state agencies and institutions related to hurricane response and recovery associated with the hurricanes of 2008;

• Assist public and private entities with recovery from the hurricanes of 2008;

• Reform the Texas Windstorm Insurance Association and fund the related Catastrophe Reserve Trust Fund;

• Improve state schools and centers operated by the state of Texas; and

• Appropriate funds to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for screening and detection devices for contraband and personnel, and security equipment.

FEMA extends deadline for help

The Federal Emergency Management Agency extended to Feb. 20 the deadline for Texas homeowners, renters and business owners to apply for federal and state disaster assistance for damages and losses caused by Hurricane Ike.

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management requested the extension, citing a continued flow of new applications from Texans for disaster assistance.

Homeowners, renters, and business owners who choose to register may be eligible for:

• Grants to help pay for temporary housing needs;

• Essential home repairs;

• Serious disaster-related expenses not covered by insurance or other sources; and

• Low interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) to repair or replace real or personal property.

"If you've delayed registering for FEMA assistance, please do it now," said federal coordinating officer Stephen M. De Blasio Sr.

"FEMA wants to help Texans who need and qualify for assistance, but we can't help you if you don't register."

Reps request broader access

One hundred and two Texas House members on Feb. 2 sent a letter to Texas cable and satellite providers asking them to televise legislative sessions across the state.

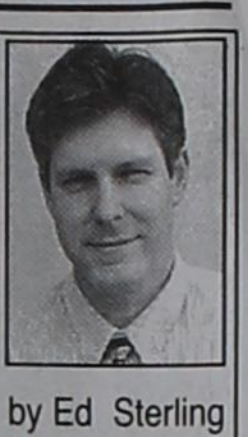
"This is the logical next step in making state government more transparent and accountable," said Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-San Antonio, who led the effort to collect lawmakers' signatures.

Lawmakers file tax-capping bills

Already this session, many lawmakers have filed bills to limit property taxes and appraisal increases.

Most of these bills specify appraisal caps of 103 percent, 105

percent or 110 percent. Some of the bills would amend state law and some would be in the form of proposed constitutional amendments that could end up on the Nov. 3 election ballot.

House members that have filed such legislation include Republicans Debbie Riddle of Houston, Bill Callegari of Katy, John Zerwas of Houston, Betty Brown of Terrell, and Jim Nichols of Carrollton, and Democrats Patrick Rose of Dripping Springs and David Leibowitz of San Antonio.

Callegari's HB 979 and HJR 49, a proposed constitutional amendment, would limit annual appraisal increases for commercial properties to 10 percent.

Unlike residential homestead appraisals, which are capped at 10 percent, appraisal increases for commercial property taxes are not limited by law, Callegari explained.

In the absence of any limitation, the property tax appraisal values for

Texas' businesses can increase substantially from year to year. Callegari said, for example, one business in his district reported a 67 percent tax increase over one year.

"Any business that receives a higher property tax bill is faced with two options: either pass the costs onto the consumer or absorb a loss to their investment."

Ex-speaker's information deleted

The Texas Legislative Council, the state agency with duties that include information technology management at the Capitol, purged former House Speaker Tom Craddick's computer hard drive, according to an Associated Press story.

Rep. Pete Gallego, D-Alpine, said he would file legislation to prevent such destruction in the future to "preserve the public's right to know about legislative information when a legislator leaves office."

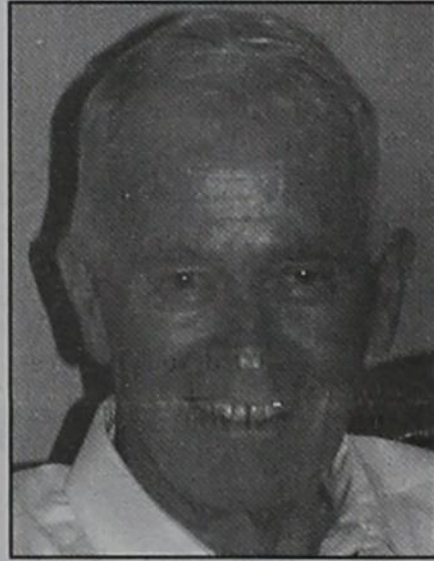
EVELYN I. BURCH

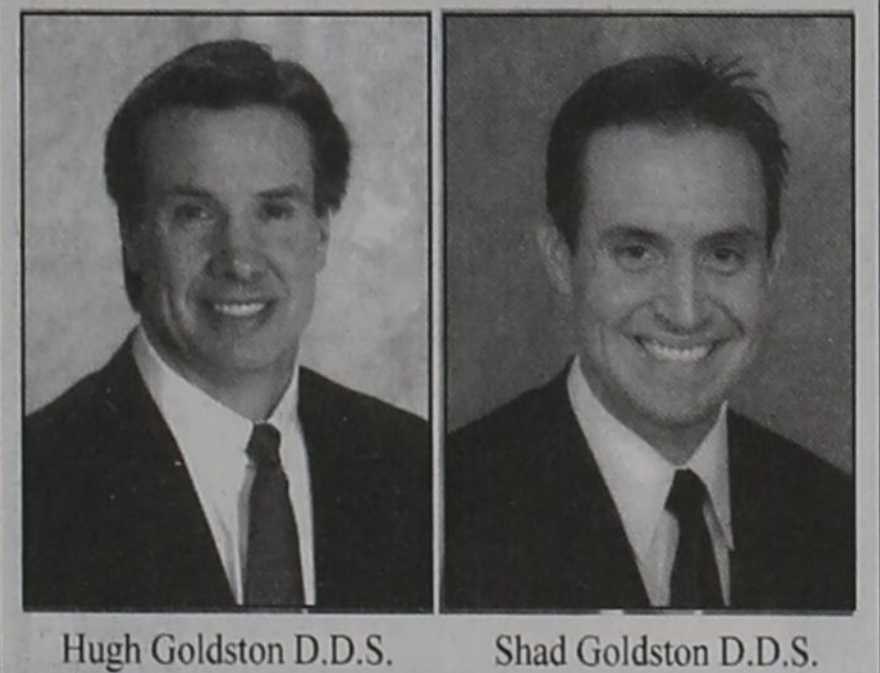

Texas Senate Review

Week of February 2-5

The Senate Finance Committee began public hearings on the state budget this week, considering how to pay for services in the face of a national economic crisis. The fiscal picture for Texas isn't as dire as other states, but decreases in state revenue will make the budget tighter this session. Lt. Governor David Dewhurst and Speaker Joe Strauss sent a letter to state agencies Monday, requesting a 2.5 percent cut in budgets for this fiscal year. While education, health care, and criminal justice agencies are not part of this request, Dewhurst said other agencies need to find areas where they can save money. "As the agencies come before us in Senate Finance we're going to want to understand what they've been able to do, and if they can't come up with savings, explain to us why," he said.

John Helleman, Chief Revenue Estimator for the Comptroller's office, briefed Finance Committee members Monday on the current state of the Texas economy. He said that state revenues have decreased, with sales tax collections slowing and less money coming in from the new franchise tax than expected. The housing market in Texas isn't as bad as elsewhere; home sales are down, but not at the level seen in other states. Texas can expect to lose about 110,000 jobs through the third quarter of the fiscal year,

said Helleman, mostly in oil and gas, construction and the retail sector. According to projections, he told Senators, the state can expect slight economic gains in 2010, with a full recovery expected by 2011.

Wednesday, the committee began hearings on Article III of the state budget, which funds public education. The cost to the state for education will be less in the 2010-2011 biennium, according to the Legislative Budget Board, due to higher than expected property value growth, combined with student growth under projected levels. The state will also have to make one less payment to the Permanent School Fund this biennium, to correct for past payments deferred one biennium ahead in past sessions.

Texas Education Agency Commissioner Robert Scott appeared before the committee Wednesday, laying out agency priorities for the biennial budget. At the top of the list is \$64 million for training teachers how to administer and teach for the new end of course exams. He also wants more money to improve adult remedial education. Scott told members he would like to use this session to better define the scope and goals of his agency. "I would like to use this session as an opportunity to discuss the role of the agency, its size, its mission, and its duties," he said. "I'd like to have a discussion with

everyone of you on what you expect from the agency and how we can better focus our agency resources on improving student performance."

Thursday saw Senators grilling representatives from the University of Texas Investment Management Company (UTIMCO), after the board of directors unanimously approved \$2.3 million in bonuses, including a million dollar bonus for UTIMCO CEO Bruce Zimmerman. The controversy arose because the endowment lost 27 percent during the economic downturn. UTIMCO Board Chairman Robert Rowling said the bonuses were paid based on gains made the previous year, when the fund outperformed expectations. Given the current economic situation, some members thought paying Zimmerman the bonus showed a lack of political sensitivity. "It shatters the trust in government. We're in serious times. Most people out there in the street are scared to death, and we just paid you a

million dollar bonus, and the fund is down 27 percent. It's not right. It may be technically right by the contract, but it's not right," said Senator Kevin Eltife of Tyler.

Finance Committee Chair Steve Ogden of Bryan told UTIMCO to appear before the committee again in thirty days, and to come with suggestions on how to change the current compensation arrangement, and also ways to ensure the independence of the board. "UTIMCO is a creature of statute, and it can be changed by statute, and it will be changed by statute if there are not changes down there," he said.

Friday, the committee continued deliberations by hearing testimony related to two major state pension funds, the Teachers' Retirement and the Employee Retirement Systems. These funds, which pay for retirement and health care for teachers and state employees, have also posted losses during the fiscal decline.

HANSFORD COUNTY



Joel David Stavlo

Joel David Stavlo was born four miles west of Gruver, Texas, on May 16, 1918. He was the seventh of eight sons born to Ed and Betsy Stavlo but the first born in Texas as his family had moved from Alcester, South Dakota the year before. Joel graduated from Gruver High School in 1935 as the salutatorian of his class; his older brother Eddy was valedictorian.

After finishing high school, Joel farmed for two years to earn money for college. He graduated from Clifton Junior College at Clifton, Texas in 1939. Then he enrolled at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota and earned a Bachelor's Degree in English in 1941.

Anticipating that he would be drafted, Joel had returned to Hansford County to farm. In addition, he and his brother Gunder worked as trappers. They lived in the old rock, two-story Tyler house on the Palo Duro Creek north of Morse and ran a trap line of a hundred traps. The going rate was \$12.50 for a coyote hide, \$2 each for skunks, and \$12 for a badger pelt.

As they were checking their traps on Sunday, December 7, 1941, they heard on their Model A's radio that Pearl Harbor had been attacked. At first they thought it was a joke, but the next day they were in Amarillo ready to enlist in the Navy. Gunder

was unable to pass the physical for the Navy. Later he joined the army and was killed a week after the landing on Normandy.

Joel was accepted as a Naval Air Cadet and trained at the Naval Air Base in Corpus Christi, Texas. He enjoyed flying over the King Ranch several times during his training. On December 15, 1942, he was sworn in as Ensign Joel David Stavlo and given his wings. His assignment was Patrol Bomber Squadron 204, Fleet Air Wing Three.

The Patrol Bomber Squadron was new. It had been commissioned in October of 1942 as one of the answers to our heavy losses in the Battle of the Atlantic. By midsummer of that year the U. S. had lost thousands of men and over 260 ships with 4.5 billion pounds of material destroyed. In exchange, our forces had sunk 8 German submarines. And the German factories were turning out ten new submarines each month.

By the end of December 1942 the Squadron with their Martin Mariner planes had moved to their new base in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Later PB-24s were also added. Both airplane models were patrol bombers that could land on water. Joel was the Squadron Historical Officer, and the narrative he wrote is now in the Navy Archives. He kept an abridged copy of it in his family papers.

"Our training period in San Juan lasted until March 1943. During this time we emphasized night flying, strafing, bombing, instrument flying—any and everything that would smooth out the squadron and make it a highly efficient and effective anti-submarine weapon."

Joel could serve both as a navigator and a pilot. As a youth he had challenged himself to learn astronomy while he was the night driver in the Stavlo Brothers custom farming operation. That coupled with a keen sense of direction and a minor in math, had given him an edge in learning celestial navigation. The bombers generally flew triangular routes, and Joel knew when it was time to turn around and go back

when conditions were adverse.

As a non-smoker, Joel gave his ration of cigarettes to the mechanic who was responsible for his plane. He felt it would be checked over a bit more carefully. Joel generally flew with a crew of 5 to 7, but sometimes there would be 9 on board.

During his time in the Navy, Joel flew from bases on islands in the Caribbean as well as from bases in Central and South America. He had a brief visit with his brother Harold, also in the Navy as a submarine crewmember, at a base in Trinidad off the coast of Venezuela. One of Joel's favorite bases was the one at Coco Solo in the Canal Zone. He spent extra time there after the War was over; his job was to ferry supplies to Ecuador and on to the Galapagos Islands. The drawing card at Coco Solo was the golf course, and Joel became quite an accomplished golfer.

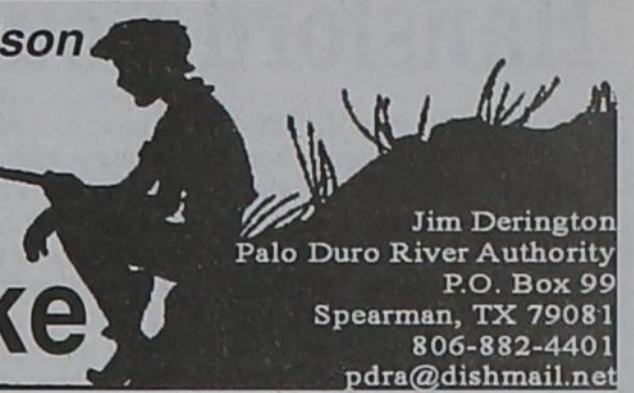
Lieutenant Joel Stavlo was given a furlough at the U. S. Naval Separation Center, Camp Wallace, Texas on November 8, 1945. He was released from active duty at midnight a month later on December 9, 1945. Joel then became a member of the Naval Reserve. After serving some years on inactive duty status, he was formally discharged from the Naval Reserve on October 15, 1954.

Upon his release from active duty, Joel returned to Hansford County to farm and ranch and lived here for the remainder of his life. He married Leona Knutson on April 4, 1948. Joel died January 2, 2000, at age 81. He was a lifelong member of the Oslo Lutheran Church and is buried in the Oslo Cemetery. He is survived by his wife Leona, four children—Mary Ann Andersen of Sioux Falls, SD, Alice Satrum of Parker, CO, Paul Stavlo and Amy TeBeest of Gruver, and twelve grandchildren. His oldest son John Mark Stavlo died in 2003.

Editor's note— This narrative was compiled from memories of stories Joel told his family, his history of the Patrol Bomber Squadron 204, and his military papers.

Buffalo Hunters

After writing about Bob and Jim Cator coming to the Palo Duro

Creek to hunt buffalo in December of 1873, I began to wonder if any hunters had come ahead of them. Research showed that the Moar Brothers, J. Wright and John, claimed to be the first to break the Medicine Lodge Treaty with the Indians by coming to the Panhandle of Texas to hunt buffalo.

In July of 1873 John Webb and J. Wright Moar made a quick survey from Dodge City, Kansas through the upper Panhandle and saw immense herds of the shaggy buffalo. When they arrived back at Dodge, John Webb said he did not plan to return South, as it was too risky, but Moar was anxious to go back. He and another hunter felt a need to talk to General Dodge, the commanding officer at the Fort, to see if the army would stop their return. The General, however, was supposed to have said, "If I were hunting buffalo, I would go where the buffalo are."

That fall the Moar brothers with eight other men, took 4 wagons, each pulled by a team of 4 mules, and headed to the Canadian River in the Panhandle. After their arrival, they had trouble with a band of comanches. The Moar Outfit then pulled back to the head waters of the North Palo Duro and camped about where Jim Cator would later live. They camped there all winter.
