Beedy named Men's Academic Player of the Year for the Lone Star Conference

Abilene Christian University's Kevin Beedy was named Men's Academic Player of the Year to lead the list of Lone Star Conference tennis academic awards announced in June by league officials.

Beedy, a repeat selection on the LSC All-Academic Team, follows Jason Ray as the second straight Wildcat to take top honors for his work on the courts and in the classroom. The junior accounting major helped ACU to championship matches in both the LSC Postseason Championship and NCAA Division II Central Region tournaments.

Beedy was joined on the men's All-Academic Team by teammate Casper Steenkamp of East Central's Felipe Lopez, both repeat selections as well. Other picks were ECU's Matt Folsom, MSU's Charles Van Swelm and Central Oklahoma's Christian Haugen.

On the women's side, Midwestern State's Michelle Beukes was named Women's Academic Player of the Year honors for a second straight year as she led a group of seven players on the All-Academic Team. The others were Alicia Cummings from Tarleton State, Cecilia Muller and Brenna Jackson of MSU, holly Lindloff from Abilene Christian, Carolina Vera-Vera of Cameron and Amanda Rhynes from East Central.

In addition to these six men and seven women being named to the LSC's All-Academic Teams, three men and 13 women were named to the LSC Commissioner's Honor Roll in recognition of their excellence in the classroom. In all, 29 student-athletes were recognized.

To be eligible for LSC academic honors, student-athletes must carry at least a 3.20 grade point average and have reached sophomore status both athletically and academically. The Academic Player of the Year award and All-Academic Team are selected from the list of academically qualified players, with the league's sports information directors voting on the basis of both academic and athletic achievement. All qualifying student-athletes not selected for the All-Academic Team are then named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Tyler earned All-around Cowboy award for the finals and for the year. He was also the champion saddle bronc rider of the year.



More than drought affecting wheat yields

Wheat producers have more than the drought cutting into their yields this year, said two Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers.

Dr. Tom Allen, Experiment Station assistant research scientist and plant disease diagnostician, saw more than 150 wheat samples sent to the Great Plains Diagnostic Network lab this growing season, in addition to 400-plus samples the plant pathology staff gathered across the Panhandle.

Ninety-five percent of these samples were diagnosed with the wheat streak mosaic virus. In addition, 50 percent of the samples contained maize red stripe virus, more commonly known as High Plains virus. Both diseases are vectored by the wheat curl mite, Allen said. And so far, there's no treatment for either the viruses or the mite.

The Great Plains Diagnostic Network is a part of a national plant disease monitoring system, which is divided into five regions. The Amarillo facility, a satellite lab to one at Kansas State University, is operated under the Experiment Station's plant pathology program, headed by Dr. Charlie Rush.

Samples came by mail, through Texas Cooperative Extension agents or were dropped off by producers, Allen said. They came from as far north as Nebraska and as far south as Dallas and the Hill Country, Rush said, making this

crop would have more problems than normal was the arrival of samples in the middle of October, Allen said, "which is pretty rare to see virus that early. "We've had quadruple the number of samples as any previous year," he said.

Once a crop is diagnosed with one of the viruses, there is little the producer can do, Allen said. Widespread cases can reduce yields enough that only grazing or making silage from the crop can salvage any income. In many cases, the crop is "zeroed out" by insurance companies and plowed up.

This year's virus started early because of last year's crop, he said.

A hail storm across much of the region shortly before harvest knocked the grain from the heads, Allen said. These seeds germinated into a heavy volunteer wheat crop, which went uncontrolled through the summer.

The wheat curl mite over-summered on this "green bridge" and moved into the new crop.

Control of volunteer wheat this summer will be key to controlling the wheat curl mite that vectors the things working in the field that disease, Allen said.

FUMC receives new pastor

An early indication this wheat Conservation Reserve Program grasses throughout the region also might harbor the wheat curl mite.

"We don't have a good understanding of the wheat curl mite and its ecology," Rush said. "It holds on some grasses, but there's lots of work to be done to understand what happens with these mites during the summer."

Right now, he said, the only other advice they can give to producers is to plant as late as possible to reduce chances of severe wheat streak problems again.

"We're trying to develop some cultivars that can be resistant to wheat streak mosaic and could be planted early and then grazed out," Rush said. "They would be popular in this region and serve an important purpose."

The problem now, he said, is any resistance breaks down in high temperatures. And not enough is known about the wheat curl mite to tell producers when or what to spray.

"There are big gaps in our knowledge," Rush said. "But we are making progress and have should provide answers in the next



Words from Faith & Grace by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

In the fifth week of Pentecost, we study Ezekiel 2:1-5, Psalm 123, 2 Corinthians 12:2-10, and Mark 6:1-13. Ezekiel is before the Lord God who tells Ezekiel that "Mortal, I am sending you to the people of Israel whether they hear or refuse to hear (for they are a rebellious house), they shall know that there has been a prophet among them...do not be afraid of them". The Psalmist sings to the enthroned Lord, longing for mercy asking the Lord with longing eyes for His favor. The mission of the Old Testament prophet was not to magically predict the future; the prophet's mission was to deliver the "Word of the Lord" to an often rebellious people

Paul is again defending his ministry to the Corinthians. Against those who were claiming "secret knowledge" and "special" powers, Paul points out that he could boast of such things, but such boasting does not advance the cause of Christ. Paul reflects that his "thorn in the flesh" which makes him sometimes weak, sometimes unappealing to others, also acts to keep Paul from becoming too proud, too elated. Paul asked the Lord to remove his "thorn" three times, but the Lord tells Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness". When we consider the accomplishments of Paul's ministry, the obstacles and difficulties that Paul overcame, the weakness of his body, then we must conclude that Paul's accomplishments were because of the active presence of the Holy Spirit. Thus, when Paul was weak, his reliance on the Spirit was strong. It has been said, "It is the glory of the gospel that in our weakness, we may find this wondrous grace, for always man's extremity is God's opportunity".

Jesus after the series of miracles and healings that we have studied, goes to his home town. There He begins to teach in the synagogue; and all the people are offended. In his hometown, Jesus is viewed as only a 'craftsman", a person of common roots with brothers, sisters, family residing nearby. How can this local boy now claim to know heavenly things? New Education Program Is Offered by North Plains Water District

Conservation District (NPWD) has added a new program to its list of presentations available for groups and civic organizations. Interested parties can now request programs on Xeriscaping or Water-Wise Gardening through the NPWD office. NPWD has previously offered Xeriscaping classes once each year in the Spring, but the program is now available by request at any time. Program attendees will learn more about how to select native and drought-tolerant plants that will provide year round color and texture, as well as use less The principles of water. Xeriscaping, or making the home landscape more water efficient,

North Plains Groundwater will be a feature of the program, and attendees will receive printed materials to help them in implementing the principles of xeriscape at home, as well as free computer software to help in planning their landscape. With the continued importance of water conservation for the state of Texas, and the necessity of maintaining home landscapes in dry, drought-like conditions, learning about ways to reduce water consumption in the home landscape will be more important to Texas residents. Not only do Xeriscaped landscapes or Water-Wise landscapes require less water, a well designed xeriscape landscape can require as much as 50% less maintenance.

A common misconception about xeriscaping is that it involves paving turf areas of the landscape with gravel and planting cacti. What this presentation will clarify is that Xeriscaping is not "Zeroscaping", and that Water-Wise gardening can produce home landscapes that will provide year-round color, lush growth, and that will be attractive to butterflies and birds, all the while requiring less water and less maintenance. Hay, Cattle Supplementation Among Topics At **Texas A&M Beef Cattle Short Course in August**

by Dr. Jason Cleere

Forage and beef cattle nutrition management will be the topics of several Cattleman's College seminars at the 52nd Texas A&M Beef Cattle Short Course. The short course will be Aug. 7-9 at Texas A&M University in College Station.

These topics are timely since keeping cattle in good condition was a challenge to Texas beef producers last summer and this past winter, said Dr. Jason Cleere, Texas Cooperative Extension beef cattle specialist.

Scarce rainfall during the 2005 growing season, as well as last fall and winter, resulted in very little available grazing forage, he said.

Forage alternatives will be discussed at the Cattleman's College seminars.

"During the past year many producers were searching for cheap alternatives to hay, and many looked toward the potential use of byproduct feeds in their operation," said Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension

beef cattle specialist.

Cotton gin trash and corn gluten are some of those alternatives, he said. Many producers have been successful in utilizing byproducts in their operations and have benefited from reduced feed costs. However, they understand the positives and negatives of feeding these products, McCollum added. The nutrition session will also present a simplified approach to controlling feed costs, important to producers at all times, McCollum said. "Little to no hay reserves from 2005 and below normal hay production early in the 2006 season indicate that hay supplies may be short for next winter," said Dr. Larry Redmon, Extension forage specialist. "During the Forage Session of the Cattleman's College, Texas A&M faculty will address methods to stretch hay supplies." New to this year's Cattlemen's College will be a session titled "Managing Cattle and Wildlife in One System.

ment, and managing deer and cattle together in one system will be highlighted.

The short course will have a total of 15 specialized workshops as part of the Cattleman's College. A general session will include discussions of the cattle market, climate and issues affecting landowners. Numerous opportunities for Beef Quality Assurance and pesticide applicator continuing education units will be available.

Registration by July 31 will be \$120 per participant and includes admission to the conference and the Cattleman's College, a copy of the proceedings (a 300-page publication), trade show admittance, tickets to the special Aggie prime rib dinner, and additional meals and breaks.
