GUBERNATORIAL RACE GETS SCRAPPIER WITH NOV. 7 ON HORIZON

With 40 or so days between now and Election Day, candidates for governor are punching hard.

Gov. Rick Perry's reelection campaign accused opponent Carole Keeton Strayhorn, in her role as state comptroller, of allowing insiders to secretly set tax policy.

But Strayhorn's campaign countered that the comptroller's tax policy committee conducts open meetings and discloses its actions.

In another salvo against all opponents, Perry touted himself as the only candidate who is thinking big enough to prepare Texas for its future transportation needs.

Strayhorn's counter to Perry has been to appear around the state at public hearings on his proposed Trans Texas Corridor project.

In these forums "One Tough Grandma" regularly knocks the incumbent governor for signing a "secret" deal with CINTRA, a Spanish roadbuilder that has partnered with San Antonio-based Zachry on the Trans Texas Corridor contract.

Strayhorn's camp has in effect called the multi-billion dollar project fiscally irresponsible and a problem for homeowners, ranchers, farmers and businesses that would find themselves displaced in a new superhigh-

After calls by open government advocates to make the Trans Texas Corridor construction contract public, Attorney General Greg Abbott ruled the contract is public information. But the contract is still under wraps because CINTRA has sued to keep certain parts of it confidential. Meanwhile, Hill Country independent Kinky Friedman was admonshed by the Texas NAACP for using racial slurs in an old standup com-

edy routine and as recently as a year ago on the campaign trail. Also taking Friedman to task for racially insensitive language were Strayhorn, Perry, Democrat Chris Bell and state Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston.

Also, Perry's camp blasted Friedman for changing his position on border security many times, and criticized Bell for wanting to appoint a panel of experts instead of giving details on how he would improve public education.

DECISION TO COME ON MONEY GIFTS People who hold public office must report gifts they receive to the

Texas Ethics Commission.

But what if a gift is a check? Presently, reporting rules are vague: vague enough to allow an official to report that he received a check from Jane Doe, but not the dollars and cents written on it. The Texas Ethics Commission, the state agency that handles such mat-

ters, has been asked to decide if check amounts need be disclosed. A decision on the matter is not likely to occur until after the election, if at all. Why? With the Texas Legislature convening in January, lawmakers will be able to rewrite the state election law, where campaign

finance tuning takes place. State Reps. Fred Hill, R-Richardson, and Elliott Naishtat, D-Austin, plan to file legislation requiring disclosure of amounts.

CHILD IDENTIFICATION EFFORT BEGINS

From now through October, 2 million Texas school children in grades kindergarten through sixth will bring home child identification kits and

letters to parents or guardians. Each kit will contain an inkless fingerprint card, two swabs to obtain a child's DNA from their saliva, and a laminated wallet card to keep an

updated photograph and physical description of the child, according to a governor's office news release. Funding for the program comes through a \$1.8 million state grant to

the Sheriff's Association of Texas, plus private donations.

HURRICANE RITA'S FIRST ANNIVERSARY

Sept. 24 marked the one-year anniversary of Hurricane Rita. The storm, clocked at 120 mph when it hit Sabine Pass, pushed a wall of water inland from the Gulf of Mexico.

Rita inundated communities from the shores of the gulf and many counties inland, taking lives, and more than \$10 billion in property.

Words from Faith & Grace

by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister

This week we study Numbers 11:4-29, Psalm 19, James 5:13-20, and Mark 9: 38-50. The Israelites are murmuring again against God and Moses. They remember the "good" food of Egypt, and forget the "bad" things of Egypt. Moses, frustrated, learns the lesson of delegation. The individual believer regardless of faith and of energy, can only be one place at a time, act on a limited number of problems at once. Hence, we must encourage all who possess gifts of the Spirit to use them for the good of the faith community, so that we may all be blessed and none exhausted in good works. The Psalmist sings a song of the goodness of God's law and precepts, prays that he may not be insolent. Heed his song Dear Christian, "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable to you, O Lord, my rock and my redeemer."

James gives practical advice to the early faith community. Let those who are suffering pray. Let those who are happy sing songs of praise. Let the ill be prayed for by the elders and anointed with oil in the name of Jesus. For prayer will save the sick and allow for sins to be forgiven. James recommends that the sins of a believer be confessed to the person wronged and to the faith community so that the prayer of the faith community will heal the broken relationship between man and God, man and man that sin causes. Consider the power of prayer Dear Christian, please pray for those of our faith who are under attack and physical oppression around the world and please pray that their attackers and oppressors will discover the true nature of God.

Jesus tells the disciples that any who cast out demons in Jesus' name are not to be stopped just because they are not among the immediate followers. No one who does a good deed in the name of Jesus can speak ill of Him. Jesus warns that if anyone leads a little one away from Him, it would be better for that one to be drowned. He then warns that if we have parts of our "bodies" which tend to separate us from God, we must remove those parts to avoid hell. Jesus is not advocating this text be taken literally, otherwise the faith community would be a community of the maimed. Jesus is saying in an Eastern fashion, that we must remove those things from our lives which separate us from Him. The "salt" sayings are not related but are remembered here by Mark. All will be "salted" with fire means that every Christian will be tested by life experience. If the "salt" has lost its savor, indicates that we as Christians must maintain our purity just as salt was a preserver and "purifier". To have "salt" in ourselves again refers to that purity which is indicative of the believer who abides in Christ Jesus.

May the Holy Spirit keep you from murmuring and grant you the strength and purity to abide in Christ Jesus.

2. Recognizing a leak:

By Sight: A pool of liquid on the ground near a pipeline, a dense white cloud or fog over a pipeline, or discolored or dead vegetation surrounding the pipeline may be signs of a leak.

By Sound: An unusual noise coming from the pipeline, like a hissing or roaring sound, may be a sing of a leak.

By Smell: An unusual smell may accompany a leak. You may contact Crystal Wuest at (806) 371-4450 to receive a free BP pipeline safety brochure with a scratch-n-sniff mercaptan area that will give you an indication of the odorant smell.

3. What to do if you suspect a leak:

Leave the leak area immediately. Do not light a match, start an engine, use a telephone, switch on/off light switches or do anything that may cause a spark in the vicinity of the leak.

From a safe location immediately call 911 and the BP Hotline number (806) 948-5167 and report exactly what you have seen, heard or smelled and where this incident took place. Warn others but do so without entering or re-entering the area where a pipeline leak is suspected. Do not drive any vehicle into a leak or vapor cloud area.

In case of an emergency call: BP Hotline (806) 948-5167.

If you own a gas line from BP operated gas well. BP recommends that each homeowner have a back up source for heating their house, water heater, appliances in case the well goes down or if their gas tap line freezes up.
