Gruver Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session on October 10, 1995.

The principals of the Gruver I.S.D. met with the board during the October school board meeting to present their campus's improvement plans. The improvement plans reflect the academic goals of the campuses, and they include strategies to be used to improve academic achievement. The principals explained that the committees working to write the plans are composed of teachers, parents of school children in the Gruver schools, and community members.

The principals of the Gruver

schools are Bob Burgoon in the Elementary School, Laura Blasingame in the Junior High, and Lloyd Looper at Gruver High School.

The school board voted to purchase a 1996 Ford F-350 Crew Cab pickup from Gruver ford for use by the agriculture department. They also approved the purchase of twenty four computers and one laserjet printer from the PC House in Richardson, Texas. These purchases will be used to teach high school business subjects.

After reviewing and studying the student handbooks used at each campus, the school board members

approved their contents and adopted the rules of each campus as board policy.

Mr. Lloyd Looper, High School Principal, recognized Mrs. Penny Ralston and the G.H.S. vocational homemaking program during the meeting.

Mrs. Ralston briefly explained to the board her teaching assignment, and the goals she has for her classes this year. She mentioned that the role of the family is changing in today's society, and her classes aim to prepare today's students to be better family members now and more successful parents in the future. Her curriculum also emphasizes informed career choices, nutritious meal planning, cooking skills, and sewing skills.

The board expressed appreciation to Mrs. Ralston for her work.

Before adjourning at 8:40 p.m., the board voted to pay bills totaling \$86,168.89.

At 7:30 p.m., Mayor Buchanan declared a quorum present and called the meeting to order. Benton gave the invocation and Gillispie lead the pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Motion was made by Garner to approve the minutes of the Regular City Council Meeting held on September 19, 1995, as written; and to approve the monthly fire, ambulance, police, Municipal Court, Animal Control, solid waste, recycling

and sales tax reports for September; and to approve the monthly bills payable in the amount of \$184,200.21 and the current cash position; and to approve the revenue and expense report for September, as presented; and since we get to keep the landfill open for at least another two years, all bids received for the sale of the compactor were rejected; and to re-appoint Mike Schnell to the Hansford County Appraisal Board for another two year term. The motion was seconded by Benton. Motion was unanimously carried.

FSA to hold upcoming elections

The reorganization of USDA has brought some significant changes to the former ASCS. As of October 1, 1995, a new agency has come into existence, the Farm Service Agency (FSA), composed of the former ASCS, ag credit elements of the former FmHA, and elements of FCIC. As part of the reorganization of Farmer Committee system that has always been a part of the former ASCS as undergone some changes as well.

This year's election will be conducted to fill all three seats on the Hansford County Committee. In the past only one position on the Committee was filled in each year's election. The other major change is that committee persons will no longer be elected at large.

The current acting Committee was handed the task of developing three local administrative areas (LAA) within the county. The map on the reverse side of this publication delineates those areas. Each eligible voter has been assigned to one, and only one, of these LAA's. The designation of LAA's for voters was made in this office based on county office records of the voter's farming operation. A list of eligible voters and their respective LAA has been posted in the county office. Any voter who feels their respective LAA is incorrect is encouraged to contact the county office to get it corrected.

Nominations for the ballot will be accepted through October 30, 1995 at the county office. The nominee must be an active producer and resident of Hansford County and the LAA for which he/she is being nominated to represent. The nominee must sign the petition certifying their agreement to serve, if elected. The petition must also be signed by three (3) eligible voters within that LAA. All nominations must be filed in the Hansford County FSA Office by close of business, October 30, 1995.

Actual voting for the 1995 election will take place November 27 through December 4. Ballots will

be mailed to all eligible voters and must be received in the County Office by close of business December 4, 1995; or postmarked by 12:00 midnight December 4, 1995 to be counted.

Because of the necessity of electing all three members to a new FSA Committee, it was necessary to stagger the initial terms of the new members. The length of the initial terms were determined by drawing lots. The winning candidate from LAA A will serve a one (1) year term, from LAA B a three (3) year term and from LAA C a two (2) year term.

Elections will be held annually to fill the committee position for one (1) LAA. The persons receiving the second and third highest number of votes in each LAA will serve as the Alternate Committee Person and Second Alternate Committee Person, respectively, for that LAA.

The Farmers Committee System is one of the most valuable assets of the Farm Service Agency. In recent years it has come under attack by several foes of agricultural. Your participation in this process is invaluable for keeping the committee system valid and strong. I urge the farmers and ranchers of Hansford County to

enthusiastically join in the process as candidates and voters. Your standing Committee (Billy Logsdon, Tony Shapley, and Phil Sanders) have done an excellent job over the past several years and we hope to see their names submitted as nomi-

nees in this election; however, the democratic process thrives on friendly and constructive competition, so we encourage all interested persons to give the voters a choice by submitting your names as nominees.

Letter to Editor

On November 7, Spearman voters will have the opportunity to help shape the future direction of community. The voters will go to the polls to decide if the city will be allowed to adopt a 1/2 cent sales tax for property tax relief and a 1/2 cent sales tax for economic development funding.

In this day and age, small cities like Spearman are struggling to keep their quality of life. Larger cities, such as Amarillo, are offering incentives to businesses and industries to relocate to their city. These incentives tempt business owners in small towns to pick up and move to the bigger cities. As more businesses move to the big cities, small town jobs are lost, the small town loses population, and those that remain have to shoulder a greater burden of the cost of local government.

The two propositions on the November ballot will help the Spearman taxpayer in two ways. First, the sales tax to reduce property taxes will take some of the tax burden off the property owners and shift it to all that purchase products in the city. For the past 15 years, the City Council has worked towards more tax equity through a "pay-as-you-benefit" policy; that is, those who receive a public service should pay for the public service.

Passage of this proposition will bring us closer to that goal.

Second, the sales tax for economic development will provide funding for Spearman to keep many of our current businesses while attracting new businesses. Helping current business expand and attracting new businesses will bring new jobs to town and new jobs bring more people to help pay for public services (including youth programs, volunteer activities and civic organizations). The economic development sales tax will provide a foundation upon which to build for our future and our children's future.

I believe that the economic development sales tax and the sales tax for property tax relief will benefit everyone in the community. Businesses will benefit, taxpayers will benefit and citizens will benefit. We will all benefit through more economic growth that is guided by public policies which promote growth while retaining the quality of life that we have enjoyed in the past.

I encourage all Spearman voters to vote for the economic development sales tax and the sales tax to reduce property taxes on November 7. A vote for both propositions is a vote for a brighter future for Spearman.

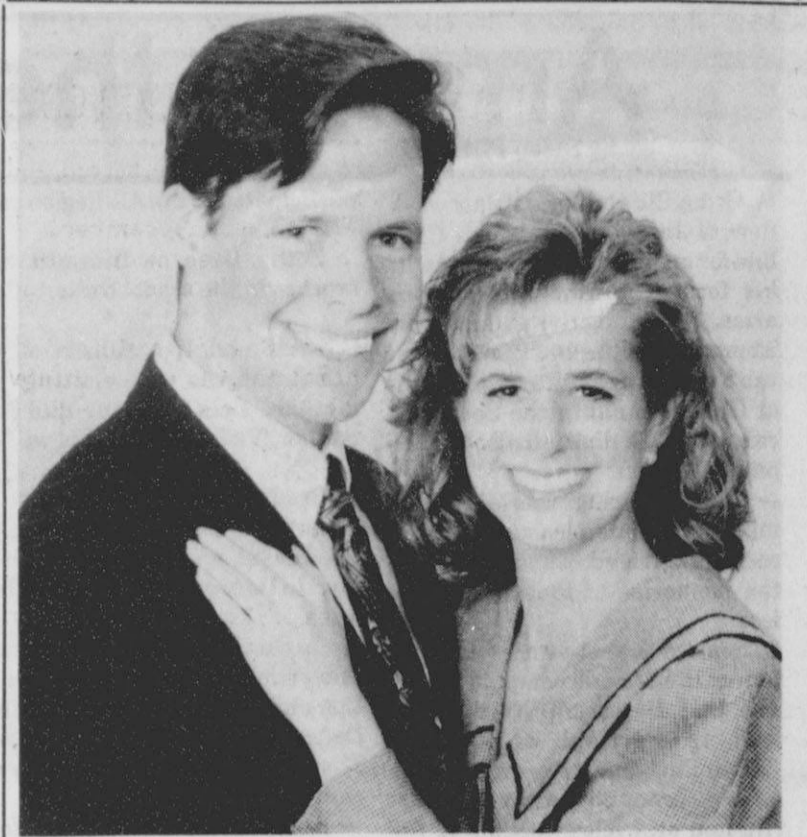
Dad-Lad Cake Bake

Motorists should drive slowly in residential areas, be alert, watching for kids darting into the street between parked vehicles, if you participate in Halloween, leave a porch light on, remove obstructions in the walkways, instruct your children in traffic safety, such as using sidewalks, whenever possible, and advise your children not to eat the candy until you have had an opportunity to check it out.

Extension News

Skeletons aren't just for Halloween! Following are some quick and easy tips for 'boning' up on calcium:

- Use low-fat milk on calcium fortified cereal for breakfast or a snack.
- Grate low-fat parmesan cheese over salad or add seeds or nuts.
- Choose ice milk or low-fat yogurt for dessert.
- Snack on raw broccoli.
- Drink calcium fortified juice with meals.

Currently, we average about three servings of fruits and vegetables a day rather than the recommended five. Try these suggestions for boosting your servings of these important foods.

* Add pureed cooked vegetables such as carrots, corn, and zucchini to ground meat dishes like meat loaf and burgers.

* Try whole pineapple chunk (or rings) and apricot halves as a topping for baked or grilled chicken breast.

* Serve apple, pear, or banana slices topped with peanut butter.

* Add pureed or shredded vegetables and fruits - bananas, carrots, pumpkin, squash, prunes - to homemade muffins, cookies, cakes, and quick breads.

* Substitute shredded carrots, shredded zucchini, and chopped spinach for some (or all) of the ground meat in your next lasagne or casserole.

* Whip up a fruit smoothie for a quick breakfast or snack. Blend 1/2 cup non or low-fat yogurt and 1/2 cup skim or 1% fat milk with one of your favorite fruits (bananas, peaches, blueberries, melon, and strawberries work well). If using unflavored yogurt, add a dash of vanilla extract and a pinch of sugar for extra flavor.

* Mix unsweetened applesauce or fresh apple into hot cereal.

* Add just about any vegetable you find in your refrigerator to a pot of vegetable broth. Throw some beans or noodles into the broth, serve with crusty bread, and you've got a quick, vegetable based meal.

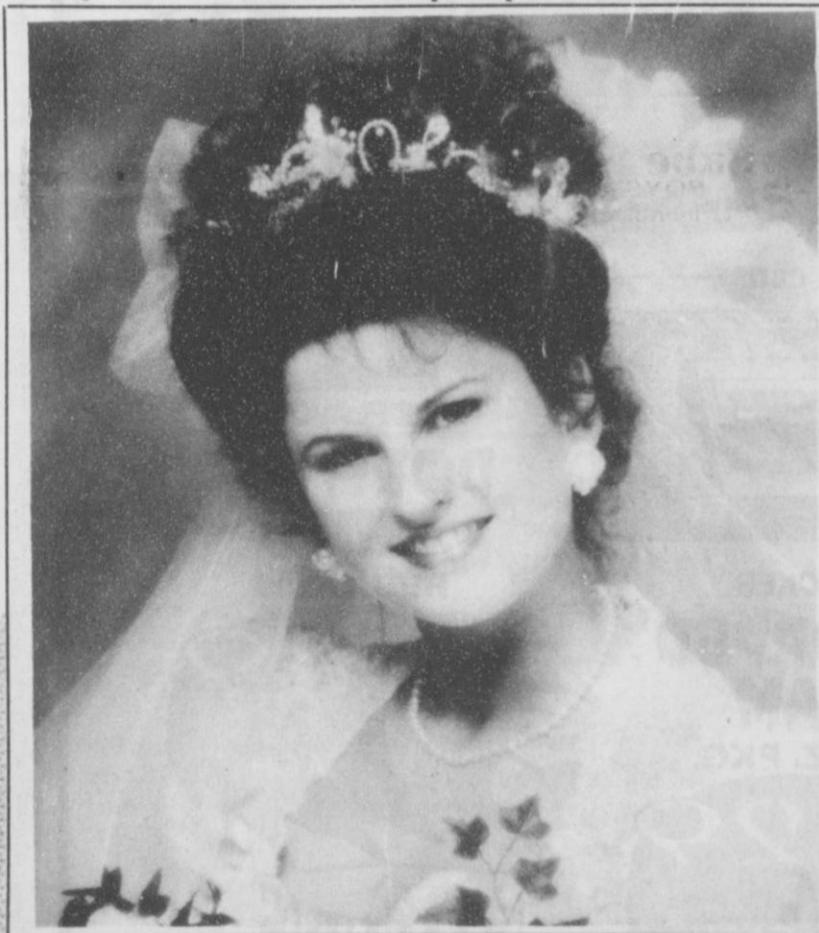

Gruver Hounds fall to Stratford Elks, 18-13

The song, "We Shall Overcome", is an uplifting Negro spiritual, especially of the 1960's in the United States. Despite all odds being stacked against one, the song leads one to believe that perseverance pays off. However, not even Martin Luther King could have overcome the odds that were stacked against the Gruver Greyhounds this past Friday night, October 20, at Stratford Elks football stadium. It is especially frustrating and demoralizing when one puts forth all their efforts, only to be deprived of the rightful gain, and in the case of the Gruver Greyhounds, the thrill of the hard earned victory was stolen from them by an incompetent crew of officials. The stats speak for themselves. Take away the penalty yardage, and this game belonged to the Gruver Greyhounds. One had to wonder whether it was incompetence, or out and out high-way robbery for the home team.

The game started off well for the Hounds. After Stratford received the opening kickoff, they were unable to move, and it was three and out, and a punt. The Hounds set up shop for their first possession in good shape - at the Stratford 46 yard line.

The Hounds proceeded to march

the 46 yards in 12 plays, and with 5:30 left in the first quarter, after the PAT kick by Sammy Renteria, the Hounds led 7-0. A key play in the drive came early, and that was a 17 yard pass from quarterback Bailey Barkley to Renteria. Travis Ferguson, who would be the bread and butter for the Hounds offense in this game, gained 7,6, and 7 yards on his three carries for the Hounds. Ferguson gained 120 yards on 24 carries for the game.

Stratford couldn't move, although they gained one first down, and they were forced to punt. Gruver outdid the Elks in first downs 17-14 for the game, and out did the Elks in total yardage 269-194 for the game. But the Hounds had well over 100 yards of penalty yardage, compared to only 40 yards of penalty yardage for the Elks.

Gruver was then able to move the ball again on their second possession, which started from their own 37 yard line, and the Hounds threatened to take a two-touchdown lead in the first quarter. There was a really nice pass from Barkley to Wylee Maupin on a 4th and 1 play, for 16 yards. Ferguson had a 9 yard gain, and the Hounds had a 2nd down and 1 yard to go on the Elks 27 yard line. But then, the officials must have decided the game was

getting too far out of control for the home team, and they called a critical holding penalty on the Hounds to disrupt their drive, a crucial and cheap call, and the Hounds ultimately were forced to punt. It was a good punt, pinning the Elks at their own 6 yard line.

What followed was heartbreaking. It was a 94 yard, 12 play drive for the touchdown, and the Elks had pulled to within 7-6 with 7:30 left in the half. The kick failed. Two key plays were a 34 yard run by tailback Fabian Cruz, and a 28 yard pass from quarterback T.D. Baskin to Marshall Stifer.

It was at this point, a momentary lapse in the second quarter, that the Hounds lost this football game.

On the kickoff, the Hounds fumbled, and Stratford took over at the Hounds' 21 yard line. Aided by a cheap facemask penalty, the Elks scored in three plays, and took a 12-7 lead. The try for two points failed.

The Hounds looked like they would answer the Elks on their next drive, as they marched from their 29 yard line to the Elks 35 yard line. But the Hounds failed on 4th and one.

Stratford couldn't move, and punted. The Hounds took over on their

own 13 yard line, and on the first play, there was untimely interception of a Barkley pass, and the Elks took over on the 30 yard line. It took them one play, after the Hounds were tagged for a ridiculous, See, HOUNDS, page 8

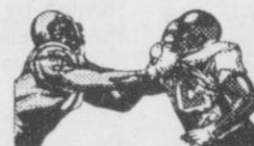

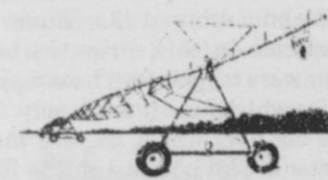

lous 15-yard major penalty, and with 1:54 left in the half, the Hounds trailed 18-7. The try for two points failed.

What a beautiful drive by the Hounds followed. It was an 80 yard, 17 play drive, that ended with a nice toss from tailback Sammy Renteria to Tye Womble for a 20-yard touchdown strike. That play came on a 4th and 11. Gruver did overcome in this series, as twice they were tagged with holding penalties which hurt them deeply. The one big play was a 15-yard major personal foul penalty on the Elks. It was one of the few penalties called on them all night. The try for two failed, and the Hounds trailed 18-13 at the end of the third quarter.

Stratford, with the help of the referees, drove to the 20 yard line of the Hounds, but they fumbled there and the Hounds recovered. But a pass interception killed that drive.

The Elks then drove to the 38 yard line, but fumbled. Gruver took over, but hurt by a holding penalty, could make it only to the 42 yard line, where they failed on a 4th and 9.

The Elks got to midfield, but on the 4th and 14 punt attempt, it was blocked, and the Hounds took over at the Stratford 44 yard line, following the additional yards in re-

turn yardage tacked on by Ferguson.

One almost felt like crying if they were a Hounds fan. There were the Hounds battling to overcome the influence of the referees, and making it to the 3 yard line, before the pin stripes took the game away from the Hounds. Ferguson ran beautifully, and there was a nice 19 yard pass from Barkley to Womble to carry it to the 3 yard line. But the Hounds were tagged by successive holding and unsportsmanlike conduct penalties (they complained to the referees over the calls), and the game was flat out stolen from the Gruver Hounds after a tremendous effort on the field. It was criminal.

The two worst calls were two interference penalties - one a call on the Hounds, and one a non-call against the Elks. The interference came against the Elks on the second to the last play of the game, in the end zone! It was flagrant. That was the problem, not that there were so many penalties, or so many holding penalties, but that the calls and the non-calls were flagrant. There will be better days.

Trooper Beighle notes dangers on winter

Freezing temperatures, ice, snow, sleet; for some it's an opportunity to stay inside near an open fire, but for others, it's a part of driving.

During November through February last year, there were over 19,000 weather related accidents in Texas. Trooper Wayne Beighle with the Texas Department of Public Safety stated that with taking just a few precautions, many of these collisions could have been avoided.

Trooper Beighle went on to say that skidding is always a threat but "Mother Nature's tricks" seem harshest during winter. Forget your summertime driving habits, "replace quick acceleration and quick braking with slow and gradual acceleration and earlier braking."

Try to avoid skids by staying aware of road conditions. Be especially alert to bridges and over-

passes, intersections and areas where windblown snow can hide ice riddled roads. If a skid should occur, "DON'T PANIC!". Back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes and turn your wheel in the direction you want to go. With anti-lock brakes, your reaction will differ. Be sure not to pump the brakes, depress them evenly until you regain control of the vehicle.

When traveling: (1) insure that your vehicle is winter ready by checking battery, tires, windshield wiper blades and anti-freeze; (2) don't be a "peep hole" driver, remove all ice and snow from all windows; and (3) start early; allow time for traffic delays and for rest periods, adjust your speed for the road and traffic conditions. Remember, posted speed limits are for ideal conditions and winter driving may require slower speeds.

From Where I Sit

by Judge Gary Ellsworth

Editors' Note: In the October 5th issue, on the front page, Judge Gary Ellsworth wrote a very informative and interesting article about new laws that are being passed. Since the response was overwhelming, The Reporter-Statesman, along with Judge Ellsworth, has decided to run columns entitled "From Where I Sit".

The 74th State Legislature made juvenile justice reform one of its agenda priorities. Just one of the areas pertaining to minors that received attention was the *Alcoholic Beverage Code*. A new law was passed which now requires mandatory attendance in an ALCOHOL AWARENESS COURSE approved by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse in addition to any fine imposed by a court. This course is mandatory for first and

subsequent convictions of minors for the following offenses: purchase, possession, or consumption of alcoholic beverages. In the *Alcoholic Beverage Code*, "minor" means a person under 21 years of age. Currently, the closest city providing an approved program is Dumas. The program is six (6) hours long and contains information on the following topics: *societal values related to alcohol consumption by minors, the influence of alcohol advertising on young people, the physical, social, and physiological effects of alcohol upon your people; the relationship between motor vehicle and other accidents and alcohol use; relevant laws relating to the purchase, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors, drinking patterns and problems of young people including abuse and addiction and decision making skills.*

The defendant has 90 days from the date of his/her conviction to

complete the course and present proof to the court. If the defendant is under the age of 18, a parent or guardian must appear in court with the defendant. Also, if a defendant is under 18 years old, the court may require the parent or guardian to attend the course. The course in Dumas cost forty dollars (\$40.00).

If the defendant fails to complete the Alcohol Awareness Course or present proof of completion to the court within the 90 day period, the court will order the Department of Public Safety to suspend the defendant's driver's license or permit up to six months. If a defendant does not have a license or permit, issuance of the same will be denied for that period.

This and other laws passed by the 74th Legislature are designed to make individuals responsible for their own actions. We'll look at others in the future. For now, that's the way I see it from where I sit.

with Berger for solid waste. The motion was seconded by Reed and unanimously carried.

Mr. Knauf state there were several places in the City that property owners have allowed bushes, hedges or trees to grow and obstruct the visibility at intersections. That while the City does have the right to remove obstacles within our right-of-way we do not have an ordinance allowing the City to remove obstacles that are out of the right-of-way. This ordinance regulates the height of vegetation and structures within a triangular area located at intersections. The triangular area is defined as beginning at the point where two curbs (streets or drainage ditches in case there aren't any curbs) meet and extending 20' along either curb. The ordinance also prohibits tree limbs lower than 8' from the street gutter flow line in the triangular area.

Any building or structure that was legal when it was built would not have to be removed, but new buildings, fences or other structures in the triangular area cannot be taller than 3' above the street gutter flow line. Mr. Knauf also stated that the ordinance will give the right to fine the property owner who refuses to remove obstacles in the triangular area and the fine could be up to \$500 per day with each day a separate offense. After discussion was held, motion was made by Gillispie to adopt Ordinance #659. The motion was seconded by Garner and unanimously carried.

Cheryl Gibson, City secretary, stated that alternate judge, Pearl Pierce, would not be available for the special election on November 7, 1995 and recommended that the Council appoint Debbie George to serve as the alternate judge to assist presiding judge, Kathy Beck, for the special economic development sales tax election to be held on November 7, 1995. Motion was Townsend. Margie Crockett was present and requested and extension of time on the demolition of the garage at 412 Dessen.

Kelvin Knauf, City Manager, stated that the property owner of 120 Dillon did not want the buildings but did not want to remove them either. Mr. Knauf state that the City had not heard from the property owner of 318 Main.

Two-family residence - \$29.50; Two-family residence on separate water meters - \$14.75 each unit; One-family residence and single apartment on one water meter - \$14.75 each unit; Apartment house with three to ten units - \$12.00 each unit.

Container pickups per week:
Not more than 1.5 - \$20 per container; not more than 2 - \$30 per container; not more than 3 - \$40 per container; not more than 5 - \$50 per container. The motion was seconded by Elliott and was unanimously carried.

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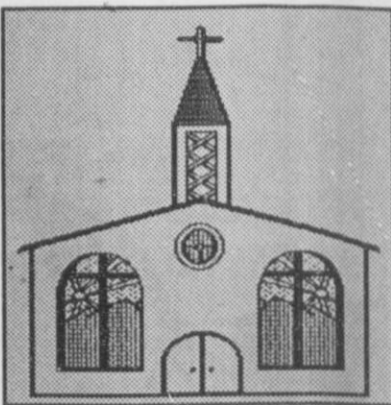
