Gruver Independent School District holds regular July meeting

The Gruver Board of Education, in the July regular meeting, voted to repair the roof on the varsity gym. Parsley's Roofing in Pampa was awarded the job for a quote of \$22,380. The work was required because the leaking roof had damaged a portion of the gym floor. The floor will be repaired later in the summer.

Several bids were awarded during the meeting. Gruver State Bank was named the district's depository for two years in action by the board. Sluder-Evans was named as the supplier of unleaded gasoline and diesel fuel for the 1995-96 year with a bid of \$.049 over the business' cost. Several vendors were awarded portions of the district's cafeteria business. Ben E. Keith was awarded the milk bid because all other vendors refused to deliver milk to the Gruver School.

The tuition for out of district students was set at \$1000 per year per child for 1995-96. The tuition rate has remained the same for the past four years.

The board received two requests for waivers from the High School Campus Committee. They approved both waiver requests. The first waiver will allow some Algebra I students to take the Algebra I curriculum over two year period and receive two math credits for

the course. The other waiver will exempt senior students from second semester final exams if (1) they have an 80 average in the classes and (2) they have no more than three absences during the semester. Both waiver requests will be forwarded to the Texas Education Agency for approval.

Betty Womble's candidacy for Texas Association of School Boards trustee was endorsed by the Gruver board members. Mrs. Womble has served on the Pringle-Morse CISD board for one term. The election will be held at the TASB Convention in Houston in the fall. If elected, Mrs. Womble will represent District 16 on the TASB board of directors.

After a second reading, the school board adopted policy DBBA (local). This policy deals with the mandatory testing of school bus drivers for alcohol and drugs. The policy became necessary because of passage of federal law. Testing will begin after January 1, 1996 in the Gruver ISD.

After a lengthy discussion regarding pay for professional employees and auxiliary employees, the board voted to postpone a final decision on salaries until the August board meeting.

Bills totaling \$54,422.72 were paid before adjourning at 9:30.

Task Force organized to strengthen economy

The Spearman Economic Development Task Force is a recently organized group of Spearman residents who have joined together to pursue the common goal of preserving and strengthening the economic viability of the City of Spearman and the surrounding area to help insure the long term duration of the quality of life currently enjoyed by the residents of this area. The immediate focus of the Task Force is to encourage the calling of an election by the City of Spearman to allow the voters to approve or disapprove the two following propositions:

1. The adoption of a sales and use tax within the city for the promotion and development of new and expanded business enterprises at the rate of one-half of one percent under the authority of Article 5190.6, Section 4B, V.A.C.S.
2. The adoption of a sales and use tax within the city for the re-

duction of ad valorem property taxes at the rate of one-half of one percent under the authority of Section 321.102(b), V.T.C.A.

The City of Spearman has provided in its Budget certain sums of money to be used for economic development. The Task Force believes that the adoption of these propositions could be a factor in the economic development of Spearman by providing funds to encourage expansion of existing businesses or the development of new businesses to provide jobs for the residents of this area.

SPSC Swim Club competes in finals

After several weeks of practice, a zillion laps, and a real long wait, the much anticipated West Kansas Swim League (WKSL) Swim Team Championships were finally held last weekend in Dodge City, Kansas. As of no surprise, the Spearman Swim Club did an impressive job by taking a 7th overall and placing several kids in the top six places.

The girls combined efforts really helped this team of fast swimmers. Jentry Edwards did what she has been doing all year, by taking the 9-10 age group by storm. Edwards took a bronze medal time of 39.87 in the 50 freestyle, another bronze time of 48.27 in the 50 fly, a 5th place time of 50.43 in the 50 backstroke, a silver in the 100 free, with a time of 1:32.40, and to top it all off, Edwards captured the number 1 spot in the 100 medley, with a time of 1:41.87.

Amber Elliott is without a doubt not only one the best 11-12 year old swimmers in the whole league, but also one of the best swimmers period. This quick swimmer brought home honors in the 50 free, with a bronze time of 32.86, the 100 free,

with a silver time of 1:15.16, and the 200 free, with a 4th place time of 3:01.47.

Michele Elliott seemed to have had not a very good day. After all, when the Michele Elliott is mentioned, it is usually thought of as several gold and silver medals. Although, she received only one silver medal in the 100 backstroke, with a time of 1:17.50, Elliott did do her best on that day. She also went on to take a 5th in the 200 free, with a time of 2:37.33, and the 400 free, with a time of 5:37.70. What ever the case may have been, nervousness, sick, or fatigue, don't judge Elliott by this one meet, she is still one of the best.

Several things could be said about the awesome Cheryl Gibson. This 9-10 year old age group swimmer took a 5th place time in the 100 free, with a time of 1:36.91. However, her best event was the 50 fly, in which she blasted away the competition and grabbed a gold medal glory time of 46.26.

World famous Rodeo Clown, Texas Bill, will be on hand, which should provide some unusual and different entertainment.

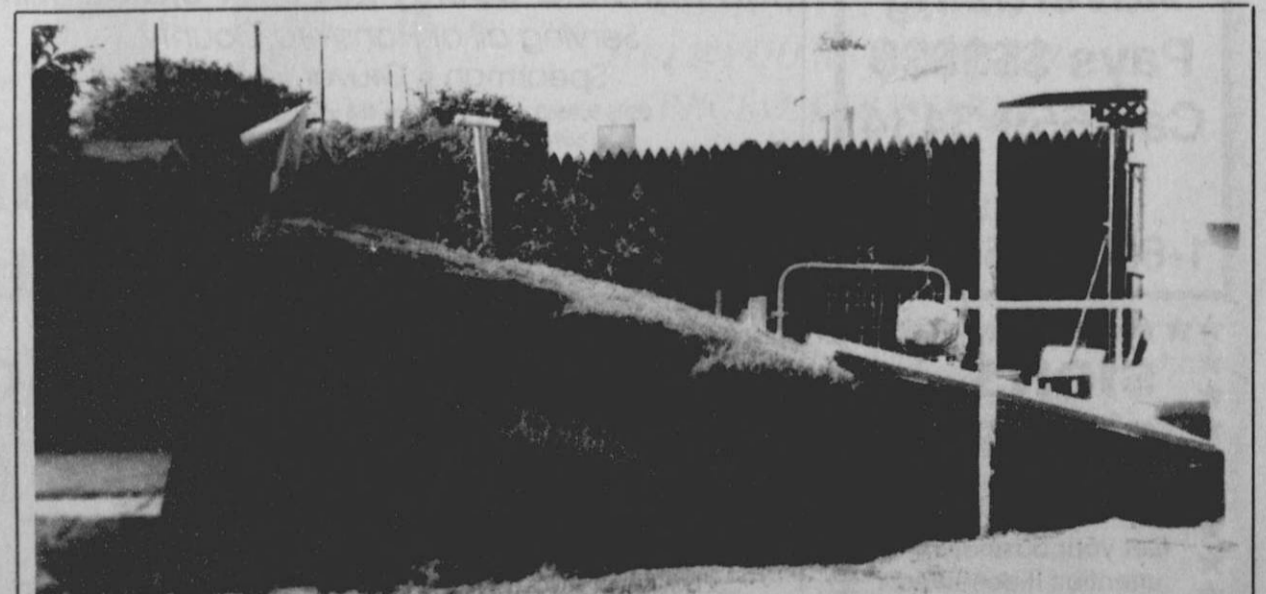

Rodeo brought Texas Bill from the Texas Panhandle, Dumas, to Florida in 1980. Spending 10 months of the year travelling the country to rodeos, the warm winters of Florida have made the ideal home base for the Thorpe's New comedy routines, animal training, and booking show for the next year occupy much of Bill's time in the winter. Besides being a full-time rodeo performer, Texas Bill is the Florida Spokesman for the International Professional Rodeo Association and helps young performers get in contact with associations and stock contractors to get a start in the rodeo business.

Extension News

We all say we are going to change our eating habits but this is easier said than done! Here are some quick reminders.

*Make one change at a time. Do not expect to change everything in one day. Take one day at a time and don't stop just because you slip one day. The next day you should start again.

*Move an extra mile. By taking a brisk one mile walk each day you can burn off 10 pounds of fat in a year. This speeds up your metabolism helping to burn calories better.

*Don't depend on the scale. Think about how your clothes fit and the way you feel instead of being stuck on the scale.

*Use small serving dishes. This makes you limit your amounts but your container is full.

*Go slow. If you eat too fast you will eat too much. There is a 15 minute lag between eating food and triggering your blood sugar that makes you feel full. Wait before you take seconds and most likely you will not want them.

*Never eat on your feet. It is easy to lose track of food eaten on

the run. Also you have a tendency to eat fast.

*Be a smart shopper. If you don't buy it, then you won't be tempted.

*Don't go carb crazy. The mistaken belief that cutting fat gives you free rein to eat all the pasta, bagels, bread, rice, etc. is wrong. You still have to watch your overall calorie intake. Some of the fat free desserts and crackers still have more calories than you expect.

*Try to eat at the same time every day. This will help you to train your body to be hungry at specific times of the day.

*Don't skip breakfast. Studies show that breakfast-skippers who become breakfast-eaters, tend to eat less at night. Start slowly getting into the habit with juice or a piece of fruit. Of all meals, breakfast is the easiest to be low fat. This will give you other meals for most of your fat calories.

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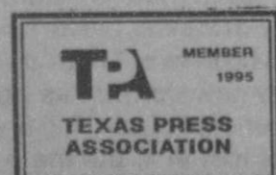
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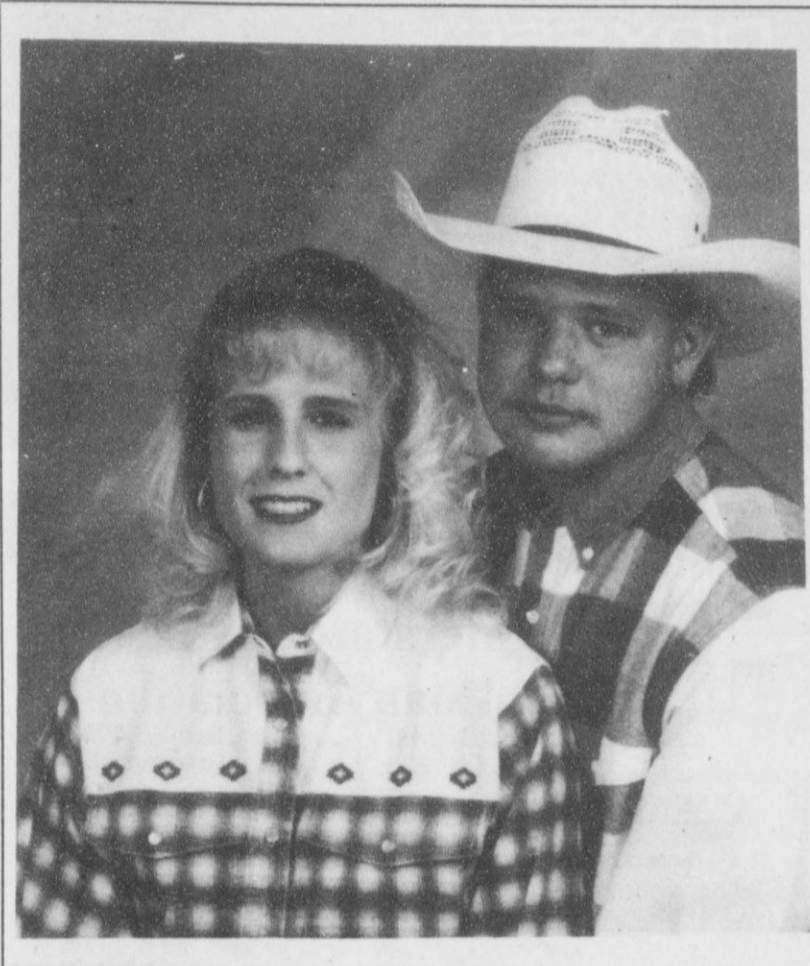

Now that I know these Tiger Salamanders are found from Canada to Mexico through the mid-section of our country and fall into the same category as frogs, toads, and newts they are somehow interesting.

The adults lay their eggs in fish free ponds and springs. As frog eggs hatch into tadpoles, the water dog young have a similar stage where they have gills and stay in the water. Later, as with other amphibians, they come out on land and the gills go away. Claudine

says that when they reach that adult stage they are not good for fish bait. They are such slimy little creatures, she refuses to bait her own hook with them.

To finish up with a bang, Simpson not only took home the gold in the 50 back, but she also set a new pool record with a time of 36.07.

Brooke Trantham, yet another fine 15-18 year old swimmer, did her fair share of point gathering for Spearman. She took a silver in the 100 fly, with a time of 1:14.95, a bronze in the 100 breast, with a time of 1:29.41, and a 6th place time of 2:37.99 in the 200 free.

Kaylee Golay finished with a terrific bronze in the 100 medley with a time of 2:16.84, and she also placed 5th in the 100 free, with a time of 2:02.45. Also placing was Keilee Goodheart, who placed with a 5th place time of 52.98 in the 50 breast, and Abby Winegarner, who

placed a 3rd place time of 25.76 in the 25 backstroke.

The girls definitely outnumbered the boys in this best of meets, but the boys did do their part in helping out the squad.

One could say that Colton Miller could and should be put in the ranks of great swimmers like Mark Spitz and others. That is a bold statement to say, but after Miller's all-gold performances in the Championships, a statement like that is really not that far fetched. He did drown everybody in each event he was in by taking 5 gold medals. He captured fame in the 50 free, with a time of 36.02, 50 fly, with a time of 42.11, the 50 breast, with a time of 48.90, the 100 medley, with a time of 1:36.92, and the 100 freestyle, with a time of 1:22.27.

Colton's older brother Landon is nothing to look over either. This Miller had a 5th place time of 1:25.29 in the 100 fly, a 4th place time of 1:28.84 in the 100 breaststroke, and a 6th place time of 2:39.90 in the 200 free.

Taylor Simpson was the only

other boy to make it into the top 6 places. He took a 5th place time of 47.03 in the 50 fly.

The team of Keilee Goodheart, Cassie Luther, Cheryl Gibson, and Jentry Edwards combined their efforts to capture a bronze in the girls' 9-10 200 freestyle relay, with a time of 2:53.13.

The 3rd place winners of the girls' 11-12 200 freestyle event, Audrey Winegarner, Kara Pipkin, Adrienne Simpson, and Amber Elliott, finished with a time of 2:27.70.

In the girls' 8 and under 100 medley, the team of Abby Winegarner, Kali Luther, Kaylee Golay, and Christen Ferguson, finished with a silver medal time of 1:58.09.

Another group of silver medal time winners was the team of Jentry Edwards, Keilee Goodheart, Cheryl Gibson, and Cassie Luther. This fine group of girls finished with a silver medal time of 3:17.18 in the girls' 9-10 200 medley.

The oldest group of girls to do well in the relays, Amber Elliott, Audrey Winegarner, Adrienne Simpson, and Kara Pipkin, finished with yet another silver in the girls' 11-12 200 medley, with a time of 2:47.15.

One boys' team, Clayton Manross, Ryan Ramon, Jarick Howard, and Wayne Gibson placed a 5th place time of 2:03.22 in the boys' 8 and under 100 freestyle.

Most of these swimmers will hang up their fins for the summer, but there will be some to make it further down the road with the Regional Competition, after qualifying in this meet.

Here are the answers to the three trivia questions from last time:

The first one was easy. The father-son combination that starred as coach and player for the 1966 Gruver Greyhounds State Championship team was, of course, Wayne and Sam Tipton. Dad Wayne was named Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame Coach of the year; and son Sam was named first team Class A All-State.

The second trivia question was not so easy, though. The mother-daughter combo that played for consecutive Lady Hounds playoff teams, separated by a 21-year

drought, was Lanetta and Cami Shapley. Lanetta Blankenship played for the 1964 Lady Hounds team that won district and advanced to the Regional finals; and her daughter, Cami Shapley, played for the 1985 Hounds' team that made the playoffs, and for the 1986 Lady Hounds' team that won district. Between 1964-85, no Lady Hounds' team made the playoffs.

The answer to the third trivia question, the greatest Hounds' football team ever, is based on won-lost record. Many people would have guessed the 1961 team that finished 11-1, and lost to Kress in a

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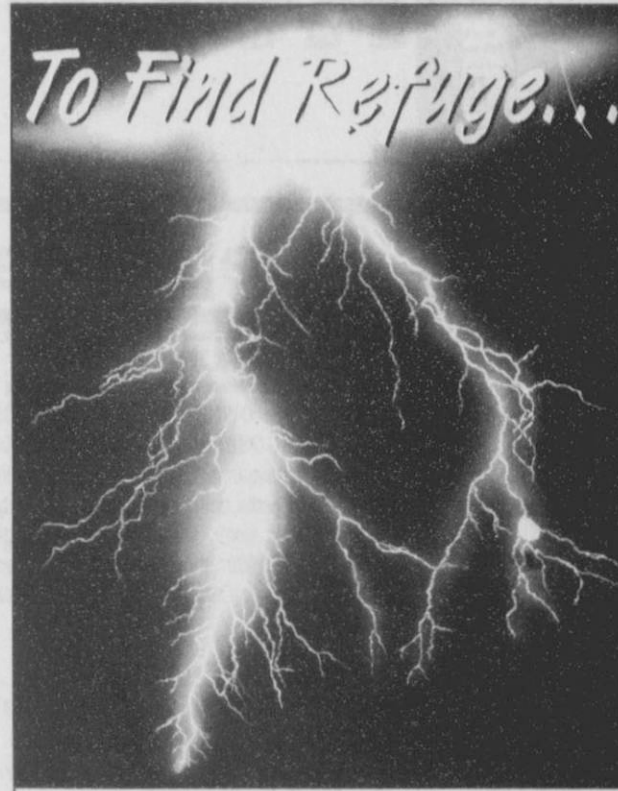
