



It is well known that it is easier to add to the cost of government than to reduce it. The Texas Legislature is brought to realize that fact again in the fight to reduce the expense of the Texas judicial sys-Cutting Court tem.

Two measures for reduction Expense in judicial expense are before the Legislature. One of these would redistrict the judicial districts and reduce the number of district courts by about eleven. The other would eliminate the eleven courts of civil appeals, and add six justices to the supreme court, making that body composed of nine members. Already the Legislature has increased the salaries of district judges from \$4,000 to \$5,000 annually.

Announcement of the plan of the Legislature has brought a storm of protest from over the State, largely from lawyers. Wherever they have been interviewed, lawyers. hav indicated that the number of districts should be increased rather than decreased. It is to be presumed that they will bring enough pressure on the Legislature to prevent any redistricting, or any reduction of expense along this

The other measure, abolishing the court of civil appeals, should have a more popular appeal. Not only does it reduce the expense to the state, but it also offers a reduction in expense to the litigant. As is pointed out by Penrose Metcalf, author, no court of appeals is bound by decisions of other courts, and a large percentage of the cases tried by the court are reviewed again by the supreme court, adding expense to the litigant.

It is extremely doubtful if either of the two money-saying proposals will meet favor with the Legislature.

Representative Coke Stevenson's proposal for the State to purchase the 788,000 acres which would make up the Big Bend National Park is attracting favorable attention. Typical of the editorial expres-

The bill provides for the appropriation of \$1,400,000 to purchase land for establishment of the Big Bend National Park. Already the state owns 140,000 acres of the 788,000 acres outlined for the park. Since Washington does not purchase land for this purpose, it is necessary that the state buy the land and deed it to the government after which the National Park Service will improve and maintain this huge recreation and sightseeing area.

Transformed into a national park the area would become a valuable asset to the state. It will give Texans a vacation spot comparable to other national parks in the Far West, so near at hand s to greatly reduce the expenses of travel and increase the time available for camping and sightseeing.

It will attract visitros from outside the state. Mr. Stevenson, citing estimtaes that the average tourist spends \$5 a day, points out that if only 50,000-an extremely small attendance for a national park-visited the Big Bend Park each year and their stay averaged four days, a million dollars would be spent annually in Texas that otherwise would go elsewhere.

The park will be unique in that it will be continued into Mexico. It will be linked by bridge across the Rio Grande with a national Park Mexico is taking steps to establish. Together the two areas would comprise the projected Big Bend International Peace Park.

The law is not designed to materially lessen the number of persons operating cars-it is designed to force them, if need be, to become reasonably competent and careful. Undr the terms of the law applicants are givn an examination on traffic rules and a driving test. If they fail the first time they may take the examination again later. Ultimately, only a small percentage of drivers fail to earn licensesand all licensed drivers are more capable pilots of automo-

But the law does prevent the licensing of persons whose presence at the wheel of a car would constitute a menace to life, property and health. These include persons under the legal age limit, habitual drunkards, narcotic addicts, the congenitally reckless and incompetent, etc.

Today many states have no provision whatsoever for examining drivers. Other states have outmoded or ineffective restrictions. In these states thousands of men and women are legally entitled to drive cars who are mentally and physically incapable of operating their machines safely and prudently. That is largely responsible for the automobile's horrible annual harvest of 36,000 lives.

In a plea for reorganization and consolidation of Federal bureaus, Senator Byrd of Virginia, recently pointed out some astounding instances of duplication and overlapping. For example, at least 24 agen-Twenty Bureaus cies have been created to deal

For One Job with lending government funds, and five similar agencies are now in liquidation.

At least 3 agencies have been concerned with insuring deposits and loans.

At least 10 agencies have been concerned with government construction.

At least 9 agencies have been concerned with credit and finance.

At least 12 agencies have been concerned with Rome and community planning.

At least 16 agencies have been concerned with wild life conservation.

So it goes, down a long list. Every one of the purposes for which these agencies have been created may be beneficial and legitimate-but certainly there can be no excuse for setting up 20 bureaus to do one bureau's job. Nor can there be any excuse for permitting bureaus to grow unchecked and to eat up tax funds in unimaginable quantities. Senator Byrd also points out that one bureau has 13 addresses in Washington alone.

Untold millions of public dollars are thrown away annually through duplication. Congress can have no excuse for failure to adopt at once a reorganization plan such as the President recently proposed.




