dopted by the U.N. Security Council on Friday to end the war between Israel and Hezbollah: · The resolution calls for the "full cessation" of fighting, under which Hezbollah would stop all attacks and Israel would end offensive military operations.

· Once the fighting ends, the U.N. force in south Lebanon. UNIFIL, would be expanded from 2,000 to 15,000 troops to help coordinate the deployment of 15,000 Lebanese troops and the withdrawal of Israeli forces. The two nations' forces would move "in parallel."

• The resolution spells out a series of steps toward a permanent cease-fire and lasting political solution. Those steps include the disarmament of all armed groups in Lebanon and respect by both parties for the Blue Line, the U.N.-demarcated border separating Israel and Lebanon.

 Stresses the importance for Lebanon's government to be the only armed force in the country, a provision that is meant to exclude Hezbollah militias from retaining weapons. Measures to enforce that would include banning foreign forces beyond UNIFIL and arms sales without the government's consent.

• Requests the international community act quickly to extend financial and humanitarian assistance to the Lebanese people. including funds needed for helping the tens of thousands of displaced Lebanese to return.

• Makes all parties responsible for ensuring that no action is taken that would endanger humanitarian efforts, including the safe passage for convoys to distribute food and

LEBANON **RESPONSE REPORT**

Humanitarian Assist.

· US Government Response: On July 24, Secretary Rice committed to provide up to \$30 million in response to humanitarian operations in Lebanon, up to \$20 million of which will come from USAID's Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/OFDA).

On July 26, USAID/OFDA contributed \$7 million toward the U.N. Flash Appeal for Lebanon to WFP, the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC), UNICEF, and OCHA. This is in addition to more than \$294,000 for emergency relief supplies, including transport. On July 31, USAID/OFDA provided \$3.3 million to Mercy Corps for water and sanitation services, psychosocial activities, and the distribution of food and emergency relief supplies. As of July 31, the DART has received proposals from Catholic Relief Services (CRS), and anticipates a proposal from International Medical Corps (IMC) soon.

· On July 25, the U.S. Military airlifted to Beirut two health kits, each of which contains medicines, intravenous fluids, reusable equipment, and other medical supplies to treat 10,000 people for three months. The U.S. Embassy consigned both to ICRC for delivery to affected populations in southern Lebanon. A third kit arrived in Beirut on July 26.

TSgt. was released from humanitarian support on August 7th. He returned to Germany on August 3rd, where he will be stationed for three more years. He is scheduled to deploy to Guana, Africa the first of September for a 17-day joint medical exercise.

· In this extraordinary case, the State Department has waived the requirement for American citizens departing Lebanon to reimburse the U.S. Government for travel costs.


Words from Faith & Grace by Cecil R. Biggers, Lutheran Lay Minister


In our continued search for God, we study Proverbs 9:1-6, Psalm 34: 9-14, Ephesians 5: 15-20, and John 6: 51-58. Proverbs introduces us to 'wisdom" as a female who invites even the simple and immature to "eat of her bread" and thus walk in the way of insight. Compare this "wisdom" with the "Logos" in John 1:1-4. Notice the resemblance of these verses to Luke 14:15-24. Understand that "wisdom" is defined as fear of the Lord which means knowing and obeying the Lord rather than terror. The Psalmist sings an exhortation to "fear" the Lord whereby the believer has no want and is protected from evil.

Paul exhorts all in the faith community to be careful how they live. The Christian should live filled with the Spirit, singing and thanking God for everything in Jesus' name. In our world today, many spend billions of dollars each month on alcohol and drugs such as methamphetamine and cocaine, seeking happiness in their miserable lives. Many sing songs which extol only sexual love. Yet, these things in excess lead to death of the body and death of the soul. Sexual love, in itself not wrong, by itself does not last. We as Christians need not fake wisdom, we need not fake rejoicing in God's love; for we have these things as God's gifts to us through grace and faith. Living as "wise" people we abide in Christ Jesus.

In studying John, we must grasp and never let go of the true humanity of Jesus. Today's lesson is set in the synagogue at Capernaum. The Jews could not understand Jesus as the "bread of life" and they fail to grasp what He is saying about "eating his flesh and drinking his blood". The words Christ used for "eating" meant "eating as a wild animal gnaws a bone". In John the concept of "flesh" may be seen as Jesus' true humanity, the concept of "blood" may be seen as "life". So the ravenously hungry Christians eating the flesh and drinking the blood of Christ are actually ingesting the manhood and life of Christ into their being. Said another way, in the eucharist (Lord's Supper) we as Christians celebrating this sacrament become "connected" to Jesus Christ, we abide in Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them". Meditate on this, grasp this, and it will change your life. John is so cognizant of the presence of Christ in the bread and wine of even an everyday meal that he feels continuously "connected" to Christ.

May the Holy Spirit enable you in your life to see and experience the living presence of Jesus Christ.





Stacie discussed preparing individual baskets with goodies to be presented to the new patients and possibly bereavement baskets. Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) will soon be provided at Hansford Hospital. For years, patients needing an MRI had to travel to neighboring communities for this basic diagnostic test. But with the addition of this service locally, those days will soon be a thing of the past.

MRI provides an unparalleled view inside the human body. The level of detail we can see is extraordinary compared with any other imaging modality. MRI is the method of choice for the diagnosis of many types of injuries and conditions because of the incredible ability to tailor the exam to the particular medical question being asked. By changing exam parameters, the MRI system can cause tissues in the body to take on different appearances.

CAT Scan & MRI - What's the difference?

Cat scans are a specialized type of x-ray. The patient lies down on a couch which slides into a large circular opening. The x-ray tube rotates around the patient and a computer collects the results. These results are translated into images that look like a "slice" of the person.

Sometimes a radiologist will decide that contrast agents should be used. Contrast agents are iodine based and are absorbed by abnormal tissues. They make it easier for the doctor to see tumors within the brain tissue. There are some (rare) risks associated with contrast agents and you should make sure that you discuss this with the doctor before arriving for the examination.

CT is very good for imaging bone structures. In fact, it's usually the imaging mode of choice when looking at the inner ears. It can easily detect tumors within the auditory canals and can demonstrate the entire cochlea on most patients.

MRI is a completely different animal! Unlike CT it uses magnets and radio waves to create the images. No x-rays are used in an MRI scanner.

The patient lies on a couch that looks very similar the ones used for CT. They are then placed in a very long cylinder and asked to remain perfectly still. The machine will produce a lot of noise and examinations typically run about 30 minutes.

The cylinder that you are lying in is actually a very large magnet. The computer will send radio waves through your body and collect the signal that is emitted from the hydrogen atoms in your cells. This information is collected by an antenna and fed into a sophisticated computer that produces the images. These images look similar to a CAT scan but they have much higher detail in the soft tissues. Unfortunately, MRI does not do a very good job with bones.

One of the great advantages of MRI is the ability to change the contrast of the images. Small changes in the radio waves and the magnetic fields can completely change the contrast of the image. Different contrast settings will highlight different types of tissue.

Another advantage of MRI is the ability to change the imaging plane without moving the patient. If you look at the images to the left you should notice that they look very different. The top two images are what we call axial images. This is what you would see if you cut the patient in half and looked at them from the top. The image on the bottom is a coronal image. This slices the patient from front to back. Most MRI machines can produce images in any plane. CT can not do this.

Contrast agents are also used in MRI but they are not made of iodine.
