Te streets upon which such improvements are made in such district and the amount charged against all such abutting property shall be deemed and held to be a tax against and a lien upon said abutting property, and the Legislature is required to enact laws prescribing the means for ascertaining the amount properly charge-

ascertaining the amount properly charge-able against each parcel of abutting property, and providing for the enforce-ment of its collection."

Heretofore it has been impossible for cities and towns not having special char-ters to force the building of sidewalks as the city government could not build them and make the tax to pay for same a lien against the property.


