



'Among the most vital questions before our little city just now that of our school facilities is pressing upon us for solution. The census now being taken indicates a large increase in the scholastic population; and, as all are aware, our school building has been packed to overflowing during the sessions just closed although the children under scholastic age have practically been excluded because of the need of room.

"Then, there is the question of out-door exercise for the children.

More than 500 boys and girls confined on a single block of ground during the hours allowed for recreation carnot, under any circumstances, be made conducsive to best results from any point of


