DEATH OF MRS. BROWNING

Wife of Governor J. N. Browning Passes Away at the Family Home in Amarillo.

Regarding the death of Mrs. Browning, wife of Hon. J. N. Browning, which occurred at Amarillo Saturday, the Daily Panhandle of that date says:

After bodily weakness extending over a long period of years and after suffering for months with scarcely a moment's rest, Mrs. J. N. Browning passed away this morning.

The end has been momentarily expected for several days and her husband and her children were with her for the last farewells. Mrs. Browning's cheery spirit throughout the long suffering never failed her. She has realized for some time that death was inevitable and with a soul perfectly at peace with God and man, she has patiently waited for the end.

Virginia Irene Bozeman, as Mrs. Browning was before her marriage, was born in Fort Griffin, Texas, May 20, 1860. Twenty-six years ago she was married to James N. Browning, then the young "cow-boy" lawyer, at her home in Fort Griffin. Shortly after their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Browning moved to Mobeetie which was then, with the exception of Tascosa, the only town in the Panhandle. At Mobeetie, their three older children,

J. N. Browning, Jr., J. B. and Morris were born. With the building of the Fort Worth & Denver road through the Panhandle, the family moved to Clarendon where they lived until 1896 when they moved to Amarillo which has since been the home.

There are seven living children of the union and all are here in Amarillo.

For several years Mrs. Browning has been an invalid and has received every attention that skill and thought could give. During the last year the eldest daughter, Miss Mary, has devoted herself unsparingly, to the sacrifice of her student work at the university, to the care of the mother, and has accompanied her to various health resorts in the vain attempt to stay the malady. The efforts proved useless and just before the holidays Mrs. Browning was brought back to the home where she has since remained in the care of her husband and children.

In addition to her own children, her sisters, Mrs. J. F. Carder, Mrs. Rhoderick, of Clarendon, Mrs. B. J. W. H. Sides, of Amarillo, and her brother, J. N. Bozeman, of Amarillo, are here. There are two other brothers that are not here. Her step daughter, Mrs. Mattie Stevenson, reached here from her far away home in Durango, Mexico, a short time ago, and has been here to the end.

Throughout the long and busy public life of Mr. Browning, Mrs.

Browning's life has been closely knit with her husband's. She was one of the first women to bring home life into the great plains country and her influence has always been quietly but steadfastly and surely on the side of the home. In the Methodist church, in which she was a life long worker, she took a leading part in the affairs that can best be done by women. She was, up to her last illness, the president of the Mothers' club and never even in the last days, lost her interest in the welfare of those about her.

The funeral services will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Methodist church by the pastor, Rev. C. N. N. Ferguson.

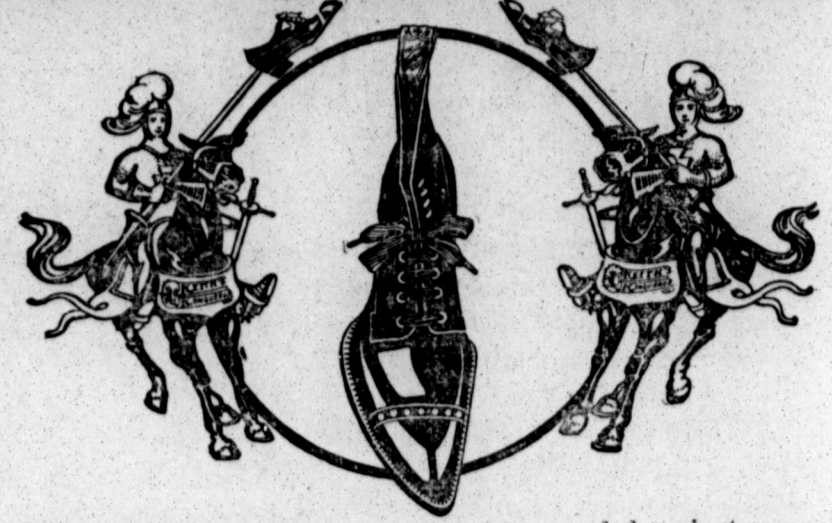

THE Senate on last Friday "got even" with the press. It has for some time been understood that the newspaper men were to be punished for their work in having the demand for anti-pass legislation incorporated in the Democratic state platform. The bill came up Friday and by a decisive vote of 25 to 4 it was decided that newspapers and railroads could no longer "swap dollars" by exchanging space for mileage. It was plainly stated in the debate that the newspapers were responsible for the demand for anti-pass legislation and they must therefore "take the consequences." The house has yet to act.

THE COMING CONVENTION

Judge Nelson Says Roswell is Ready to Give Royal Entertainment to Visiting Stockmen.

Amarillo Daily Panhandle.]

"I have just returned from a trip to Pecos Valley," said Judge O. H. Nelson, of the Western Stock Yards Company this morning, "and I want to tell the people of the Panhandle that Roswell is going to give the visitors the time of their lives at the convention of the Panhandle Cattle Raisers' association there in April. The Pecos Valley town has already begun preparations for the event and they are going to turn the city over to the visitors, with plenty of provision for their entertainment.

"I am preparing for the fine stock sale which the stock raisers of the Panhandle and eastern New Mexico will conduct in connection with the convention. Fine stock breeders will offer some exceptionally good specimens of Hereford and Shorthorn cattle and the interest in the sale already assures its success."

In the Roswell Daily Record the other day the judge gave some interesting predictions of the convention as follows:

"As to the convention, I look for a great attendance. For the past three years there has been an average of 3,000 people at the convention at Amarillo. It should be much larger at Roswell, for the reason that it is coming to a new place and to a place which the members and their families would naturally want to visit. They will come, too, if the T. & P. gives the rate it has partly promised. The association now has 800 members. It is understood that enough applications for membership will be received at the Roswell meeting to bring the total up to 1,500. That does not include the ladies."

Continuing the Record recounts some of the attractions of the convention:

"W. P. Anderson, of Lakewood, livestock agent for the Santa Fe, reports that the Lakewood country will send a feature to the Roswell convention that could not be secured elsewhere in the world. It will be a delegation of 100 cowboys, dressed in the native garb and mounted. All will bring their ponies, and G. M. Slaughter, W. M. Atkinson, and others have promised entertainment for the horses during the convention. These 100 cowboys right off the range, will be a show worth coming to see. Mr. Anderson says they will hold a tournament for fancy riding, instead of the usual roping contests. This tournament will be carried on according to the ideas of the old time riders as described in Scott's "Ivanhoe." Riding with lances and catching rings will be one of the contests. Levi Joy, who is said to challenge the world in this kind of riding, will be here to enter the list.

"Another feature will be a revival of the expert rifle marksmanship contest. Several contestants of world wide fame will be in attendance. One of these will be A. H. Bogardus, Jr., of Springfield, Ill. However, he will have a worthy opponent in the person of a local product. Homer Wilder, of Lakewood, will be put up against the best."

The Rufus Rastus Minstrels, an organization of colored folks, well known on the minstrel and vaudeville stage, will be at the Clarendon opera house next Wednesday night. The organization is said to provide an entertainment that is a little above the usual standard of like companies.

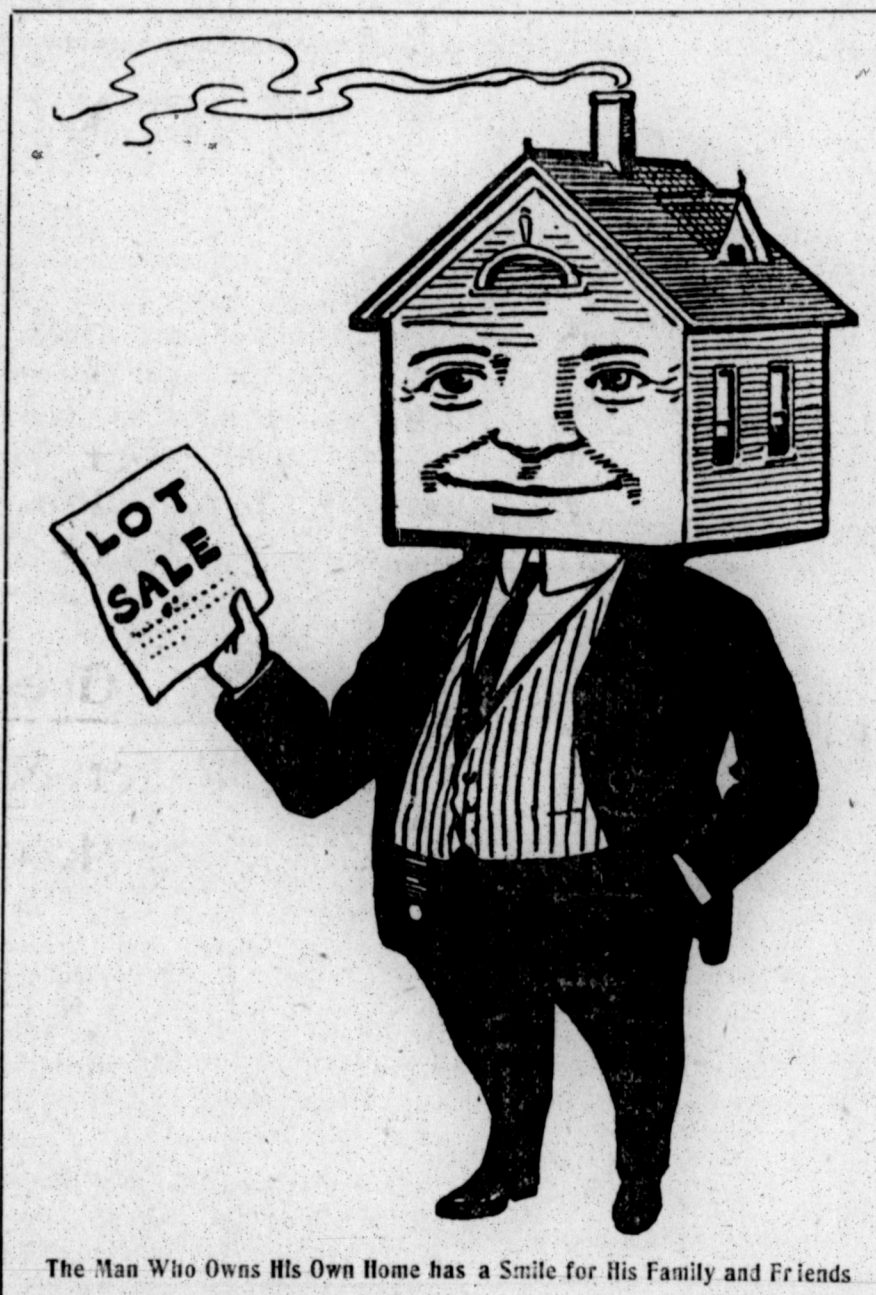

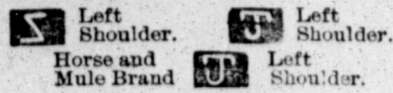

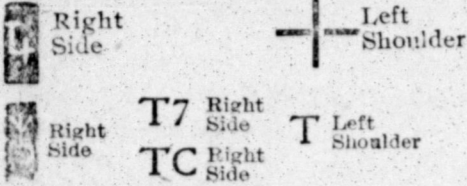
