



The News did not succeed in pleasing everybody during the late unpleasantness, nor could it have done so, since all were not in agreement. To suggest some of the difficulties which the effort to be fair encounters, it might say that it has been denounced, because it has reported the utterances of a candidate for office, and denounced for having published nothing on his side. It has been flooded with communications relating to the gubernatorial campaign, and nine in ten of these have given rise to fancied griev-ances. Many of these have been exceedingly long; most of them rehashed old statements and arguments. Many of them were mere personal declarations of intention to support one or the other candidates. The entire mass on many days would have filled an entire issue of The News. Obviously, for this reason alone, it was obliged to reject most of the communications and to trim others. Many of them were rejected because of the violence of the language employed; or because they asserted as facts things which were merely deductions. Many sides of the gubernatorial contest, denounced it for not publishing their products or for abridging them. Some of them accused it of trying to fool the people. In fact, it has witnessed just such symp-toms of partisan zeal and public excitement in many campaigns throughout its history. But it is comforted by the thought that always in the past, after the "heat of debate," most of its nsorious critics have resumed cordial relations with The News. So it expects and hopes it will be now. At all events, to all of its well-intending, if often unjust, critics, The News carries the assurance of its most distinguished consideration.—Dallas News.


