PROF. PILE AIRS HIS IDEAS

In Regard to the Duties Devolving
Upon Pedagogues, Pupils
and Patrons.

I have lately been thinking about
writing a series of articles for the col-
umns of your paper on the success of
our schools.

I am always interested in our public
schools, and having read Prof. Silvey's
school notes with interest and apprecia-
tion, I deem it not inappropriate to say
that my observations convince me that
there is much truth in his remarks and
justice in his strictures.

The perpetuity of our free instituti-
ons depends largely upon a well regulat-
ed system of free schools, therefore the wel-
fare of public schools can not be too
much agitated in a population like ours,
and a great many articles to our county
papers should be on this subject dissemi-
nating the seeds of learning which will
bear fruit to be garnered by coming
generations. There are enough children
that need mental and moral training to
furnish employment to every teacher in
the country; and no bonafide instructor
need to feel that another is treaping upon
his toes if he will go to work and do his
duty. Teachers, pupils and patrons are
alike responsible for the success or failure
of our schools. Each in his sphere has
his duty to perform, and is responsible
for results. Some schools are organized
for the benefit of the pupils, others
seem to be organized for the benefit of
the teachers. Some directors are lacking
in backbone, not daring to act with an
eye single to the advancement of the
child, and again, some patrons (I hate
to say) seem to be moved more by ig-
norant prejudice, silly whims, or a latent
partisanship or sectarian spirit than the
hope of any good results that may ensue
from the labors of a hard working teacher.

While traveling around on business
I have incidentally discovered what I
have long suspected, that some districts
are incompetent to distinguish a real,
live progressive teacher from an indiffer-
ent one; and the chief, if not the only
consideration is to hire the cheapest
teacher regardless of qualifications, or
consequences. But if this same cheap
teacher should happen to come from the
same state that many of the influential
patrons do—then that is a glorious coin-
cidence and supersedes any other quali-

fication. Some districts fail to appreci-
ate a good teacher until he is beyond
recall. Blessings, like the birds of
bright plumage, show best when they
take their flight. Truly it may be said
that some do not understand the true
relation of teachers to a school. It is
not boards of directors, superintendents,
nor visiting committees that decide the
character of our schools; it is the teacher
and the teacher should be the center of
dignity and the depository of power.
One of the most fatal mistakes possible
in any administration is to impose re-
sponsibility without conferring power.
It is unjust to make a man accountable
for that which he does not control. As a
rule, the teachers are the persons on
whom rest the blame or praise. They
are responsible for results, and to them
should discretionary power belong.

We sometimes speak of the abuse of
patronage, but no abuse can be greater
than to demand reckoning of a head of
a department, yet give him no power to
select or remove his assistants and sub-
ordinates, or to devise or adjust his own
methods. Such are the impediments
prevailing in our city schools, and not
very prevalent in the common country
schools. If a teacher has not sense
enough to perform his school duties, the
remedy is to dismiss him and not make
a rule that shall control his actions.
That does not put brains into his skull or
honor into his blood. The teacher is a
public servant, hired by the community
through the school board, but a servant
to whose discretion much must be trust-
ed, a servant who serves them through
his intellect, and to whose judgment
much must be left; who is responsible
for results in the intellectual development
of the pupils, but whose methods are not
to be dictated; who is to be consulted,
who may be advised, who may be dis-
missed, but who should never be ordered.

In a well arranged school, in a well
instructed community, there is no clash-
ing of authority. The board of directors,
teachers and patrons respect each other
and work together for the common good.
Any other course is suicidal. It is
strange there should ever be any other
course.

When patrons and teachers work to-
gether in harmony, all bearing them-
selves as ladies and gentlemen, the ma-
chinery of school work runs much more
smoothly, teaching is much easier, and
the pupils are better instructed.

Do not parents, patrons and teachers
alike see that in all these jars and dis-
cords the children are the real sufferers?
Whatever lowers the dignity of the
teacher injures the status of the child.
Yet, it is astonishing how silly and
frivolous are the captious objections and
censures of some parents, who seem to
think they will sink entirely out of
notice if they don't trump up some whin-
sical and abusive complaint. But Sam
Jones says: "It takes less sense to criti-
cize than to do anything else. There
are a great many critics in the asylum."

Never will our schools be placed on a
higher plane, until the people learn this
fact: that the more our free schools are
left entirely under the management of
those expert in the business, and the
less they are meddled with by those
who know more about everything else
than they do about a system of training
and educating, the sooner will our schools
be productive of good in suppressing
illiteracy, and advancing intelligence.
But as it now stands the tree school in
some districts is often a bone of conten-
tion, and, unfortunately, the school
meetings are too often, only a display
of the smothered feelings of prejudice,
neighborhood strifes, bickerings, jealousy,
envy, hatred, malice, and all uncharitableness.

In this short article I have pointed out
only a few of the obstacles to be sur-
mounted; in my next I shall touch upon
the requisite qualification of the teacher
and province of the pupil.
