CAPT. PAT SWEENEY DEAD

Another Old Confederate Gone to His Reward—Died Suddenly at Home Near Silverton.

Many Clarendon people will be grieved to learn of the death of Capt. D. H. Sweeney, better known to his friends as "Pat" Sweeney, which occurred at his home near Silverton, Briscoe county, on Monday of this week.

It seems that a week or two ago Capt. Sweeney received injuries by falling from a wagon, and while laid off from his usual duties as a result of the fall his injuries were not considered very serious. His death Monday was quite sudden and altogether unexpected. The funeral was held Tuesday at the Silverton cemetery.

Mr. Sweeney was one of the Panhandle's old timers, and one of her most esteemed and highly respected citizens. He was a member of the Clarendon camp ex-Confederate Veterans, and among his old comrades there were none more universally beloved than himself. A frequent visitor to Clarendon, he numbered his friends here by the hundreds, and the Banner-Stockman was proud to be among the number, and joins most sincerely in the universal sympathy now being extended to the family. Concerning the accident which happened to Capt. Sweeney the Silverton Enterprise said:

While crossing the canyon, Saturday morning coming from the railroad, D. H. Sweeney was thrown from the wagon and severely hurt. It seems that when ascending the bank the wagon wheel ran upon

a tussock and by the sudden crenching of the wagon Mr. Sweeney lost his balance and fell out striking on his side and hip. A physician was called who ministered to him. At last accounts he was getting along as well as could be expected.

Jones Will Run.

County Commissioner R. H. Jones, of the Rowe precinct, was here this week and stated to the editor that he had decided after all to make the race for commissioner again. We stated last week that Mr. Jones was out of the race, and for a time, he says, he did think of leaving the county perhaps, but as he has now decided to stay with the good people of Donley he will again consent to serve them as commissioner. Mr. Jones has made a good officer, and will doubtless have no opponent.

TEDDY IS A SPENDTHRIFT X IT RANCH IN LAWSUIT

Requires Over \$100,000 More Annually Than Any of His Predecessors in Office.

Those who fancy that the defeat of the extra allowance of \$25,000 a year for traveling expenses for the President on Mr. Williams' point of order is final, will soon find themselves undeceived. The Senate will be quite sure to add it in the bill, and it will be thus allowed.

It has been made perfectly plain that Mr. Roosevelt is the most expensive official that has ever occupied the White House. Strenuous in all things, he is equally strenuous in the spending of public money. A record-maker in everything that he has taken hold of, he also made a record in running up expenses at the White House to an amount that has never been equaled by any of his predecessors in office. Who wonders that members of his Cabinet have contracted the habit of disregarding the law in this line?

The Brundidge comparison shows the Roosevelt administration to be sadly lacking in the old, outworn virtues of economy. According to the Representative from Arkansas, the total appropriation this year for the White House, including the salary of the president, is \$253,340. The total for the McKinley administration during the year 1901 was only \$152,500. During the last year of the Cleveland administration, 1897, the total White House expenditure was but \$135,200. In short, the pending appropriation for the current year of the Roosevelt administration exceeds the McKinley appropriation by \$100,840, and is in excess of the Cleveland administration by as much as \$118,140. In four years, Mr. Roosevelt would cost the country \$403,360 more than Mr. McKinley cost it, and \$472,560 more than the Cleveland administration cost.

The most startling instances of extravagance are not those cited by Mr. Brundidge. The appropriations for the navy, for pensions and for other enormous increases, and the reckless extravagance indulged in at Panama and in every other instance in which personal favorites and "ten thousand dollar beauties" could be made happy, make up a record of extravagance that has not been equaled by any other nation of the world in a time of profound peace.

At the suggestion of almost any puny dreamer, President Roosevelt will appoint another commission and set a dozen more fat salaries to running, rarely failing to name his friends and ardent admirers to fill the newly created places. The record shows this to be true. This habit has, in fact, become notorious. We would have had a Tariff Commission, with a hundred members, at a cost of probably a couple of million a year, in full swing today if the President had had his way about it. Even the best friends President Roosevelt has in congress agree that it is better not to leave it to him to fix any more salaries. —Dallas News.

Murphy Walker.

Murphy, the 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. I. Walker, died at the family home in this city at 4 o'clock Sunday morning and was buried at the Citizens cemetery at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. J. J. Stanton. The cause of death was given out as slow fever, the lad having been in bed for some weeks. The Banner-Stockman extends sympathy to the parents.

Mrs. Babcock Sues the Farwells and Makes Serious Charges of Funds Misappropriated

Mrs. Babcock, widow of A. C. Babcock of Chicago, has filed suit against John V. Farwell, Walter Farwell and Charles F. Harding, executors of the estate of John V. Farwell, and the Capital Freehold Land & Improvement company, for an accounting. Mr. Babcock was interested in the deal whereby the company above mentioned acquired 3,000,000 acres of land in Texas in exchange for the construction of the Capitol building in Austin. Mrs. Babcock claims that Mr. Babcock was given one-eighth interests, in the land when he should have received one-fourth. She claims that since the company came into possession of the property it has sold 1,357,000 acres, for which it received \$2,800,000. Subsequently a ranching company was formed, and it is alleged that this syndicate not only took all of the profits in payments for the risks of managing the enterprise, but that it conducted a ranch in Montana from which the Farwells reaped all of the profits. It is intimated that this was made possible through the fact that the Farwells and Abner Taylor controlled the action of the board of directors. At the time the 3,000,000 acres of Texas land was turned over to the investment company it is alleged that it was worth only \$2.50 an acre, but in spite of this fact it was put up at an approximate value of \$12,000,000. Mrs. Babcock alleges that the sales of the lands which have been made since the company came into the possession of the company have been made at an approximate loss of \$3,000,000. The petition asks that the transaction of the company for the past two decades be gone over by the court, and that the charges of sharp practices, by which she claims her husband was defrauded of his rightful share, be investigated. John V. Farwell is the only one of the original stockholders who is living. —Fort Worth Live Stock Reporter.

The cause of delay in the matter is that certain land owners along the proposed route of the road have so far refused to give the court a square deal in the matter of allowing the road to pass them. If these parties do not come to terms by the time of the next regular term of court the court will effect a change in the plans and establish a road by another route. 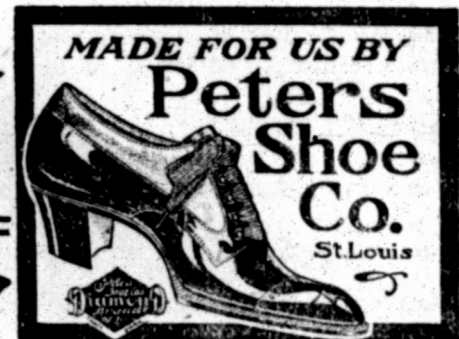

OUR NEXT GOVERNOR.

The race for governor is narrowing down to a Campbell-Bell proposition. Colquitt and Brooks are no longer counted as very strong probabilities. Some peculiar conditions are evident in this race. One, more prominent than the others, perhaps, is the fact that the country press is almost solidly for Col. T. M. Campbell, while the large city dailies as a rule have been supporting other candidates, particularly Bell. A "straw vote" of the editors at the Corpus Christi convention recently showed that about sixty per cent of the country editors were standing by Campbell, even as they stood by Hogg in years ago. Governor Hogg, before his death, expressed a preference for Campbell in this race, and we believe this fact alone will win for the Palestine man many votes among the common people of Texas, with whom no man was ever so popular as Hogg. The Banner-Stockman is for Campbell for Governor, believing him to be the man for the place and for the people.

This week Clyde D. Wright places his name before the people asking their suffrage for the office of county judge. Mr. Wright is a man of ability, a graduate of Clarendon College, a lawyer by profession and qualified by education to fill the position to which he aspires. We feel no hesitancy in saying that if the people give him the nomination and subsequent election he will serve them faithfully.—Silver-ton Enterprise.

Clyde has a host of friends in Clarendon, all of whom will vote for him. If Clarendon votes will elect Briscoe people had as well slip the mantle of Judge Journey on Clyde right now and let it go at that.

CULBERSON ON BAILEY.

In a recent interview with the associated press correspondent Senator Charles A. Culberson had the following to say concerning his colleague in the U. S. Senate, Hon. Joseph W. Bailey:

"In the primary to be held July 28, under the new law, my colleague, Senator Bailey, will succeed himself, as he should. The recent personal and political attacks on him in a magazine article and in an editorial in a New York paper, which is understood to be associated with this magazine, will have absolutely no effect on his return to the Senate. While naturally I have no information regarding the details of his private business and affairs, and, although he needs no defense from me, still it is not improper for me to say, at this juncture, that the people of the great state we represent in the Senate, whose opinion I share, have absolute faith in his personal integrity and honor. His probity is such that an inquiry into his personal affairs to discover dishonorable conduct is absurd, and the suggestion is repulsive to the gentlemanly instincts of any one who knows him. On purely political

questions we have been in entire agreement since we first became candidates for office in 1890, he as a candidate for the House of Representatives, and I as candidate for Attorney General of Texas, and as a matter of course, I do not believe his adherence and loyalty to Democratic principles is open to the slightest doubt."
