Gentlemen:- Appreciating the fact that at my
time of life when discussing time of ans life when dimess of the pas which appeal strongly to my heart,
mind and soul, I am somewhat mind and soul, I am somewha impassioned and thus speak un-
advisedly, I will ask your inadvisedy,
dulgence for using my manuscrip in addressing you.
I propose on this occasion to try to interest you for a short time by recalling to your attention certain conditions and questions
existing in the South beforeand at the beginning of the Civil war which
greatly interested and vitally congreatly interested and vitally con
cerned the people of the South Before entering upon this line however, I will say to you that I appear before you at the age of
seventy an unreconstructed rebel seventy an unreconstructed rebel. It may appear to some of you
strange that a man born in Alabama and who has lived in Texas the past eleven years and who has
lived forty years of the seventy in lived forty years of the seventy in
the South since the civil result of which (war) was to open up the benighted(?) South to the illuminating garish light of Yankee civilization, could be so deluded as to be willing to acknowledge
himself still to be one of that much himseff still to be one of that much listen to me while I tell why and and how this is so.
First let me tell you that I glory
in the word "Rebel," in whe word "Rebel," and 'my pleagure and pride to be so called and classed. Whenever I hear
that dear old word "Rebel" prothat dear old word "Rebel" pro-
n. uinced, instantly flashes through my braini is panoramic procession ${ }^{2}$ mighty host of heroes marching on to war, "he inverthy to unloose" shoes I am unw?

- men who, during juitit years of war-real war, displayeda heroísm, a courage, a steadfastness in the disclarge of duty, to their counkry triumphis and defeats, amid carnage and slaughter, to the very last when Johnston and Lee surrendered their armies-altogether presenting a picture unparalleled in the history of war in any age or in any
country-these were the men country -these were the men
called "Rebels." Men, who in called "Rebels." Men, who in
their day glorified humanity and hence became a transfigured host of God in the realms of bliss beyond. Do you wonder that I glory in
being one of this host? The being one of this host? The
wonder to me is that I dare wonder to me is that I dare
publicly to proclaim, unworthy as I am, that I was one of them, it matters not what they be called.
But the unreconstructed Rebel, But the unreconstructed Rebel,
what of him? I glory also in still being him, too. Why? I will tell you. During the forty years of my life, living in the South with the light of Yankee civilization pouring in upon her pros-
trate people since the war ended trate people since the war ended
and the cyclone of Yankee rule passing over them, I have seen no reasons to swerve from the positions announced by that peerless
Confederate soldier and represenConfederate soldier and represen-
tative American, Gen. Robert tative American, Gen. Robert E
Lee, than whom no age or country ever produced a loftier spirit, or more clear sighted, conscientious
christian christian gentleman, who in referring two days before surrender to these immortal words:
"We had, I was satisfied, sacred principles to maintain and rights to
cefend for which we were in duty cefend for which we were in duty
bound to do our best, even if we perished in the endeavor." Upon these words I stand and with my last breath will so believe and de-
clare.
clare.
The period from 1820 to 1860 , particularly the last 20 years of
that epoch, affords many things
which we of the South may look
back upon with pride and pleasurable, gratification. For during
these years the South reached her greatest power and grandeur, and the beauties, attractions and charms of her civilization shone with great-
est splendor. During that time est splendor. During that time
she practically controlled and she practically controlled and
directed all the policies of the directed all the policies of the
United States. She had maintained the institution of slavery at the very doors of the United States
Congress, and made every great Congress, and made every great
acquisition of slave territory she had insisted upon, and maiutained a declining tariff tax for revenue only, pursued a wise and strong
foreign policy refraining fromiter oreign policy refraining from inter-
meddling with the affairs of other medding with the affairs of othe one line only-the acquisition of territory by legitimate means. In her land hunger she was insat-
able. This was ever present with able. This was ever present with
her and a fear that slavery would be hedged in and thus destroyed became a craze with her leaders and had much to do with her final

lowed the entire state of Texas, lowed the entire state of Texa
