ducing those crops which as yet have not been thoroughly proved viz: cotton and wheat. C the first of these to receive consideration and it was the concensus of opinion that, with precaution in selecting the seed and proper cultivation, this staple would be a suc-

The work of procuring seed was left to a committee composed of W. H. Rayzor, chairman; J. M. Svpert, and O. M. Daniel. The purpose of this committee is to investigate, the seeds used in the cotton districts of Oklahoma and other sections whose seasons are similar to our own. It was thought best by those present to go as far north as possible for seed to plant. Since the cost of shipping would be considerable, a committee composed of Judge Gough, A. J. Lipscomb and D. R. Gass was asked to use its influence with railroads in securing free transportation for what seed the farmers would need this year. A third committee, composed of B. A. Keithley, G. A. Hughes and W. F. Stimson was appointed to confer with the business men of Hereford in soliciting their aid in procuring seed.

Take, for instance, the eost of the trees of the Black Locust and Russian Mulberry varieties necessary to plant one acre-1360, 680 of each variety. The former can be purchased at \$1.00 per thousand and the latter at \$2.00, thus making the cost less than \$3.00 per acre. By clubbing the orders, neighboring farmers can lay the trees down at Hereford at a much less figure than the above. Surely our farmers can afford an annual outlay of cash sufficient to plant one acre each year in forest trees. What most of us lack is the time to plant and care for the trees after they have arrived. but a perusal of Mr. Dixon's les will disprove such a plea.


