'Non-Campaigners' Make Speeches As President's Popularity Drops

WASHINGTON (AP) - Gerald Ford makes speeches and public appearances and works with an organization called the American Enterprise Institute as he doesn't run for president

Ronald R agan makes speeches and public appearances and works with an organization called Citizens for the Republic as he doesn't run for president.

Bob Dole makes speeches and public appearances and works with an organization called Campaign America as he doesn't run for president.

It is hard to find a Republican who will admit running, but just the hope of making Jimmy Carter a one-term president has lots of them tripping over one another trying to campaign by not campaigning.

The presidential primaries are nearly two years away. Nobody has announced a candidacy yet; it would be unseemly. But there is no shortage of candidates to be candidates: "We must have 20 of them out there," says one Republican

The list is long and luminous, including senators, congressmen and governors.

There is Sen. Howard H. Baker of Tennessee, who got a national image as ranking Republican of the Watergate committee; former Texas Gov. John B. Connally, who turned Republican after heading Democrats for Nixon; and George Bush, who has done most everything else for the GOP, as former envoy to China, CIA director, U.N. ambassador and party chairman.

Newer names include Reps. Philip Crane of Illinois, Jack Kemp of New York and John Anderson of Illinois.

and Ford's against Carter in the election have kept their partisans dreaming of what might have been. Recent polls showing either leading Carter in hypothetical rematches rekindled the

Party insiders believe Ford still commands the loyalty of the traditionalists; that no new mainstreamer has a serious claim to the mantle.

Reagan keeps himself in the forefront of candidate talk through Citizens for the Republic, which he formed from the remains of his 1976 organization. It supports one of the busiest speaking schedules in politics. Reagan also writes a newspaper column and has a radio

Ford has benefit of the staff provided all former presidents, but he leans even more on his position as "distinguished fellow" of the American Enterprise Institute, a conservative think tank based in Washington.

Ford spends a lot of time speaking on behalf of the institute, largely to college audiences, but he also is busy maintaining party fences at rallies and fundraisers across the country.

In a recent speech, Ford listed the people he thinks are the Republican contenders. He included his own name. But when pressed on his intentions, he says only that he is keeping his options

Dole, who commands a lot of party loyalty for his 1976 campaigning, has formed Campaign America, a committee to support his political activity. He has been to at least 35 states this year, (See GOPS, Page 2)

Mosquito **Spraying** Postponed

Expected high winds have delayed aerial mosquito spraying over Hereford until Saturday or Monday, according to

Mayor Bartley Dowell Mosquito Control of the Southwest, a Plainview spraying service, was to have begun aerial operations over Hereford early this morning, but the company notified Dowell Thursday that probable high winds would postpone any flying.

The company has received approval from the Federal Aviation Authority to spray over Hereford. FAA regulations stipulate that permission for mosquito spraying must be obtained on a

city-by-city basis. Dowell said the plane would spray one time over the city. "In the past, once has been enough to kill the mosquitoes."

Dowell said. The city has been spraying mosquitos with trucks for the last four weeks--with minor success. City Manager Dudley Bayne said the delay in contracting an aerial sprayer has been due to the Plainview company having to obtain FAA and approval and because a Savannah, Ga., company, which has been used by the city in the past, has all its planes in South America.

The mosquito outbreak in the Panhandle is one of the worst ever. according to state health department officials in Canyon.

The health department recently told The Brand that no cases of encephalitis. commonly called sleeping sickness, have been reported in the area, but the large infestation of mosquitoes increased chances of the disease showing up.

But he said major property tax relief and a constitutional limit on state expenditures required detailed study and should be left to the 1979 regular session.

Hill also said he saw no hostile motives in Briscoe's special session talk.

"I really don't think Gov. Briscoe and House Speaker Bill Clayton are sitting around trying to conjure up trouble for me," said Hill, who beat Briscoe in the May 6 primary.

Loan Rate for Wheat May Be Raised 10 Cents

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government's loan rate for 1978-crop wheat is expected to be raised early next week to \$2.35 a bushel, up 10 cents from what it is now, informed sources say.

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland is expected to announce the increase Monday in Kansas City where he is scheduled to speak at a meeting of the American Seed Trade Association, the sources, who asked not to be identified, said Thursday

The loan rate is what farmers can borrow from the government by using their crop as collateral. They have the option of paying off the loan if market prices are higher or letting the government take over the commodity if market prices are below the loan. The loan rate also is a factor in

determining the amount of direct government payments that may be due farmers when market prices fall below target levels.

It also plays an important part in determining how high wheat prices have to go up before farmers can begin selling grain stored under long-term contracts

Houston Job Market Continues To Expand

HOUSTON (AP) - The job market in the nation's fifth largest city is expected to continue expanding, but many of those who are looking for work have no. marketable skills, according to a report by the Texas Employment Commission.

The report also indicates that although average unemployment in the metropolitan area is expected to drop from a projected 4.2 percent in 1978 to 4 percent in 1979, unemployment among blacks will remain significantly higher.

According to the 1970 census, about 24 percent of the city's 1.7 million inhabitants are black while the Hispanic-surnamed population is estimated at around 20 percent.

Job opportunities in Houston, says the TEC, are "overbalanced" towards those who have specific training, skills or experience. And trainee positions, once the avenue of the unskilled into the job market, are less common as firms tend to promote more within the organization.

The report says white collar workers will continue to hold the bulk of the jobs in Houston, followed by those in professional, technical and related fields.

Approximately one-fifth of the population lives below the poverty level. The report notes that the need for job training programs will grow. But it goes on to say that many who have participated in a federally funded program prefer to wait until another comes along rather than take an entry level job which usually pays less.

Hill Rejoices Over Decision on Estate

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - California - in cahoots with Howard Hughes' heirs made an end run to win the right to tax the billionaire's estate but failed.

Attorney General John Hill says.

Hill jubilantly held a news conference Thursday after the U.S. Supreme Court refused to decide whether California or Texas was Hughes' legal residence.

The reclusive industrialist died aboard a plane en route from Acapulco to Houston in 1976 and was buried in Houston.

This was just an end run by California to entice the Supreme Court," Hill said. "This decision obligates California to go through their own courts."

At stake are millions of dollars in inheritance taxes on the estate, valued at between \$166.8 million and \$1 billion.

"We feel that \$160 million to \$180 million is very low and based on faulty premises," said Hill, who personally argued Texas' case in Washington in March. "The state comptroller and the IRS Internal Revenue Service are trying to ascertain the true value, and it could be as much as a billion dollars."

The comptroller's office has almost finished field work on the estate valuation, spokesman Bill Collier said Thursday.

Carter Lauds Egypt's Mideast Peace Efforts

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter praised Egypt's determination to pursue Mideast peace talks Thursday, while one of Israel's staunchest congressional backers criticized the Jewish state for failing to do enough.

It was Carter's first public comment on the stalled Middle East peace negotiations since the Israeli Cabinet refused Sunday to make a specific commitment on the future of occupied Arab territories on the West Bank of the Jordan River and the Gaza Strip.

Carter's statement preceded a Senate speech by Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., who said that Israel should come up with specific responses to outstanding peace issues or risk having the Carter administration propose a peace plan of

The president praised Egypt's reaction to the Israeli Cabinet's decision as "very constructive, very moderate."

Carter made the observation while opening an Oval Office meeting with Sayed Marei, speaker of the People's Assembly of Egypt. Marei is leading a parliamentary delegation on a one-month

The president, referring to comments made by Egyptian President Anwar Sadat on the Israeli stance, said, "We appreciate his willingness to continue the peace process."

Sunset Committee May Nix Commission

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - The Texas Sunset Advisory Commission takes a tentative vote Friday on whether the Texas Good Neighbor Commission should be abolished.

The sunset commission, composed of eight legislators, also plans tentative votes on the Texas Board of Barber Examiners, the Texas Cosmetology Commission, the Texas Structural Pest Control Board, State Motor Vehicle Commission, the Texas Board of Public Accountancy and the Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administra-

Final votes will be taken in the fall on the group's recommendations to the 1979 Legislature, which will decide whether the agencies should be preserved or eliminated.

The Good Neighbor Commission was created to smooth relations with Mexico during World War II. At a public hearing last month, former Gov. Price Daniel said during his administration, 1957-63, the commission helped fight discrimination against migrant laborers.

'If I were governor again, I assure you I would recommend the continuation of this good commission," Daniel, now a Texas Supreme Court justice, said.

By Stumped Dental Researchers SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) - Some of the nation's most eminent dental researchers, frustrated in the attempt

to produce more lifelike facial prostheses for disfigured patients, are turning to Hollywood makeup maestro Dick Smith.

Smith, famous for his extremely realtistic makeup that transformed Dustin Hoffman into a 121-year-old man in the movie "Little Big Man," is conducting a two-day symposium on his makeup techniques at the University of Texas Health Science Center here. "We just don't have the perfect

prosthesis. I hope that by exposure to someone who has created the perfect disguise, we might be able to develop something," said Dr. Steve Parel, head of the center's Division of Maxillofacial Prosthetics.

Articifial facial parts are created for patients disfigured by birth defects, accident or cancer who are unable to undergo plastic surgery to rebuild their features with living tissue.

But these devices, usually constructed from rigid, durable, silicone-based material, do not blend well along the edges with surrounding skin, seldom produce an exact color match and

aren't pliable enough to appear truly

Makeup Artist Being Used

"We really don't have a material that will give a lifelike mobility, texture and color that he (Smith) does," said Parel.

"The drawback of the traditional approach is that by trying to attain durability, you limit the realism," said Smith, who created the makeup for "The Godfather," "The Exorist" and other movies and television shows.

"I can do it very easily with foam latex, but it would last only a day," he added. "The crazy thought I have is that maybe in some of the extreme and difficult cases, the individual himself might be taught to make his own applications daily or that they might be mass-produced/so that they could be worn one day and thrown away."

"It might relieve some of the really tragic cases from their hideousness.'

Smith molded foam latex into realistic facial portions that were attached to Hoffman and covered the actor's entire head, tranforming him into a stooped, bald, wrinkled old man for the movie.

That makeup took three months to develop. Smith said, and required five hours to apply each day.

But Smith said he thinks the application of one facial part - a nose, for example - could be simplified to where the disfigured patient could do it himself in about an hour.

"I don't honestly know if what I'm proposing would be practical. I'm thinking more of a young patient who has been terribly disfigured, but who would still have the dexterity and desire to apply it," said Smith. "All of this is just in the very beginning thinking stage. It would take a lot of work to develop it.'

Parel, however, is encouraged by the idea. In fact, he seized upon the idea of inviting Smith to the symposium after his 9-year-old son purchased a Smith-designed gorilla toy makeup kit with molded facial parts simple enough for a child to

"Just from what I've seen today, I intend to try some of this on a trial basis," remarked Parel, who said it's the first time he's heard of dental researchers turning to a movie makeup man for help. "It's has realistic possibilities for the right patients. It's a little far afield, but it has some definite applications.'

Pamphlets May Be Political

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court Thursday approved the right of labor unions to hand out on company property pamphlets containing political material.

In a 7 to 2 decision, the court rejected arguments by Eastex Inc., a paper products company in Silsbee, Texas, which claimed its property rights were violated by the union's distribution of the political leaflets.

Justice Lewis F. Powell said for the majority that the company's claim to a property right in this case was "largely misplaced.'

Powell said the company must show that the union activities posed a threat to management of the company or were disruptive in order to justify a ban on distribution of literature "during non-working time in non-working areas" of the company's property.

"In our view any incremental intrusion on petitioner's the company's property rights... would be minimal." he said.

Justice William Rehnquist, who has joined in a dissent by Chief Justice Warren Burger, said, "Congress never intended to require the opening of company property to the sort of political advocacy in this case. Thus, the employees' effort to distribute their leaflet in defiance of petitioner's wishes would clearly be a trespass."

In 1974, workers at Eastex sought to distribute leaflets that urged workers to oppose a

proposed "right to work" provision in the Texas state constitution, and attacked then-President Richard M. Nixon for vetoing a minimum

wage bill. Two other sections of the circular pertained directly to union organizing activities and were not in dispute in today's court case.

The Supreme Court noted today that Texas already had right-to-work legislation. However, it said that a proposal to incorporate it in the state constitution would make it that much more difficult to repeal and thus affected workers' interests.

The court also noted that Nixon's veto of a proposal to raise the federal minimum wage to \$2 an hour could affect the plant workers even though their own minimum wage at Eastex was already \$3.86 at the time because federal minimum wage law provides a floor for wages

It is commendable that so many are willing to accept the challenge of trying to find ways to maintain our high levels of

WE KNOW that wastefulness has contributed to the present problems of short supply. This includes our continuing demand for so much more than we need. plus the self-evident carelessness so many of us display in so many different ways. We are told that we eat too much, that we make excessive use of other resources, that we have too much of too many things, that we go too much, that we demand too much entertainment, etc. We can probably agree, in a general way, that

'Less is better" STEWARDSHIP REQUIRES a very sensible approach to the evaluation, the use and the management of things. From this viewpoint, the facts of life support the conclusion that Less is better"

WE MAY HAVE to back away from the attitude which describes and defines our aims for living by the notions that everything must be bigger, and faster, and more and more. Presently, circumstances are forcing us to make some changes of this kind; and it seems certain that we will be forced to make other similar

changes. WE MUST CONTINUE trying to do all that needs to be done. but this does not require wild. unrestrained, excessive desires and actions. With wisdom in full control, we will be better off in sincerely admitting that f'Less is better".

Texans, with their affinity for making jelly out of any and every thing, may want to try one of the following recipes. suggests Marilyn Haggard. foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

PYRACANTHA JELLY 2 cups pyracantha juice **

2 cups sugar Using about one-third ripe

berries, place equal parts of washed fruit and water in a non-metal container. Let stand overnight.

Boil for five minutes. Then, mash, strain and squeeze to remove juice.

If fruit is very ripe, use commercial pectin.

Sew loosely, pulling thread through the fabric smoothly. Jerking and pulling too tightly causes thread to snarl or break, she adds.

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Supreme Court Shoots Down Dallas Election Law

WASHINGTON (AP) - The open on remand, and we deem it a, as unconstitutional the way Dallas elects its City Council.

Supreme Court. by a 6-3 vote. appropriate for the court of refused Thursday to invalidate appeals to deal with these questions," Justice Byron R. White wrote in the court's main

> The court set aside a ruling by. an appeals court which last year had invalidated the city's election system as racially discriminatory.

The effect of the lower court's ruling had been held in abeyance pending today's decision, and it appears that the

challenged system will remain in effect until the 5th Circuit reaches a new decision.

White said the appeals court had applied too stringent tests. in deciding the case.

Only Justice Potter Stewart joined fully in White's opinion. But Chief Justice Warren E. Burger and Justices Harry A. Blackmun, William H. Rehnquist and Lewis F. Powell Jr. concurred in an opinion the voting system was a "legislative plan" that should not have been

subject to such strict scrutiny. Justices Thurgood Marshall, William J. Brennan Jr. and John Paul Stevens voted to

strike down the City Council voting system. The appeals court had ruled that Dallas' 11-member City Council election system resulted

in a dilution of minority voting

Eight seats on the City Council are selected on a district basis - with candidates having to meet residency requirements in a specific district. The voting for those candidates is limited to

district residents. The other three seats, including the mayor's job, are selected on an at-large basis, with no residency requirement in a certain district and providing for city-wide voting.

All elections for Dallas offices are non-partisan, with candidates running on slating groups rather than as Republicans, Democrats or members of some other political party.

The 5th Circuit had ruled that only the major's job could be filled by a city-wide vote, and that the other 10 council seats would have to be decided by single-member district votes.

Then-Dallas Mayor Wes Wise and other city officials appealed to the Supreme Court.

Black and Mexican-American residents of Dallas first sued the city in 1971, when all 11 council

seats were selected by city-wide

That system was struck down as unconstitutional under the "one-man, one-vote" constitu-

Sixty-five percent of Dallas' voters are white, 25 percent are black and 10 percent are Mexican-Americans.

1907, three blacks have been elected to the City Council.

The city's 8-3 election system was devised by city officials as Since an alternative to the system

struck down by U.S. District Judge Eldon B. Mahon. Mahon found the 8-3 system constitutionally satisfactory but the 5th Circuit disagreed.

Medallion Purchased For \$2.22 Million

medallion depicting the Angel of Charity was sold for a stunning \$2.22 million at the von Hirsch auction Thursday, setting a record price for any work of art other than a

painting. There were gasps in the crowded showroom and side galleries at the Sotheby Parke Bernet auction house when the bid went up. The sale was completed in 80 seconds.

It was the most sensational purchase so far in the six-day sale of the Robert von Hirsch collection, which is being talked of in art circles as the biggest art auction of all time.

The sum was paid by West German dealer Reiner Zietz of Hannover, who was buying for the Staatliche Museum of Berlin, according to a spokeswoman for Sotheby's.

The medallion, nearly six inches in diameter, is made of

blue, green and white enamel with a gilt background. It dates from around 1150 and is attributed to the Belgian goldsmith Godefroid de Claire.

The piece was made for the Abbot Wibald of the Benedictine abbey in Stavelot, Belgium, and shows the winged angel Operatio, or Charity, with his right hand over his heart. The medallion is one of a pair, the other being in the Kunsthandwerk Museum in Frankfurt.

Since the auction began on Tuesday, Sotheby's has taken in \$8,063,040 for 98 drawings. watercolors, medieval miniatures and paintings. It ends next Tuesday.

Sotheby's chairman, Peter Wilson, has upped his original estimate of the total to be realized from \$14.8 million to \$22.2 million.

The estimate is nearly double the previous record of \$11.8 million paid in at the auction last

Wednesday's sales totaled \$2,925,405 and included a record \$925,000 which the Norton Simon Foundation of Los Angeles paid for the 15th century "Branchini Madonna" by Giovanni di Paolo.

Again, it is attributed to Godefroid de Claire or another medieval Mosan enameller, and is believed to have been presented by the emperor to a Russian prince visiting the imperial court in Aachen in

Mosan refers to the district between the Mosel and Rhine Rivers where medieval enamellists had their workshops.

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60 Minutes' Done In By Revamped ABC Try

NEW YORK (AP) - ABC's revised "20-20" newsmagazine jumped 22 places to 17th in the ratings, and the impressive performance helped the network win the week's battle for the prime time television viewer, A.C. Nielsen Co. figures show.

The show's premiere the week before was No. 39 in the ratings, and took plenty of heat from the television critics.Between installments, ABC dumped the program's two hosts in favor of Hugh Downs and changed portions of the format.

The resulting "20-20" did better in the ratings for the week ending June 18 than CBS' consistent hit, "60 Minutes." The CBS version, composed mostly of rerun segments, was

CBS did have reason to cheer. The network's "One Day at a Time" was the most-watched TV show for the second week in a row, and two other shows finished high in the ratings -"M-A-S-H," No. 2, and "Lou Grant," No. 4.

ABC's "Three's Company" was No. 3 for the week.

Nine of the week's Top 10 shows, in fact, were reruns, and movies fared well in the ratings. "The Lords of Flatbush" on ABC was sixth, "Love is Not Enough" and "Earthquake" on NBC 12th and 13th, and "Play it Again, Sam," on CBS

ABC finished the week with a rating of 15, followed by CBS at 14.2 and NBC at 13.6. The networks say that means in an average prime time minute, 15 percent of the homes in the country with television watching

The rating for No. 1 "One Day at a Time" was 23. Nielsen says that means of all the homes in the country with TV, 23 percent saw at least part of the show.

Consumer Credit Shows Big Rise

NEW YORK (AP) - It isn't the especially concerned. An induring of cash registers but their silence that's bothering analysts of retail sales, which have been holding up more strongly than many had anticipated.

The seeming paradox results, as you may have suspected, from the use of credit cards and other instruments of delayed payment that permit the luxury of purchases now and the worries of payment later.

Consumer credit has been soaring in recent months, and some retailers are concerned it soon will reach its limit, leading to a pronounced slowdown in sales later this summer or fall.

Furthermore, they say, some of today's purchases are in anticipation of higher prices later. In other words, today's good times could be at the expense of tomorrow; the sales, in effect, may be borrowed.

While the level of outstanding credit had been growing at a \$2.6 billion rate for many months, it surged to \$4.1 billion in March and \$3.7 billion in April, considered by many to be unsustainable rates.

Perhaps à more significant surge has occurred in the amount of new credit extended. That rate surged 7 percent in March and 2.4 percent in April. the latter amounting to a total of \$22.1 billion.

Citibank's "Economic Week" observes that since December. "extensions have grown at an astounding 33 percent average annual rate," nearly twice the average growth during the

economic expansion. The surge has focused the eyes of economists on the consumer's debt burden, measured as the ratio of credit extensions to personal income. It reached 15.8 in April, despite increases in personal incomes.

Many economists feel that level is near the limit of consumer endurance and that it foreshadows a downturn, as was the case when it reached that level early in 1973 before

WASHINGTON (AP) - A standby gasoline rationing plan, then be required to purchase that would distribute coupons on the basis of the number of cars a family or business owned was announced Thursday by Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger.

Schlesinger told a news conference the plan would only be used in the event of a major supply disruption like the 1973-74 Arab oil embargo.

The standby plan, on the drawing boards for several months, was required by a 1975 law passed by Congress to deal with an energy emergency.

Under the plan, which Schlesinger said he anticipated would be sent to Congress early next year, the government would mail ration checks to motor vehicle owners every three months.

These checks, in turn, could be cashed in at banks and other financial institutions for actual ration coupons, Schlesinger

He said the coupons would gas at service stations.

The decision on how much fuel would be allocated for each vehicle would depend on how serious the supply shortage is, the energy secretary said.

However, Schlesinger said that a cutback in petroleum products of 25 percent - which he anticipated might be the effect of another Arab embargo - would probably mean that the average automobile would be permitted two gallons per day.

Schlesinger said the plan would also permit a so-called "white market" under which motorists could obtain additional supplies of coupons by finding someone willing to sell

The energy secretary called the program "a form of insurance. It is not intended to be utilized except in the event of a major supply disruption.'

Weightlift Coach OKs Girls As High School Grid Players

CANTON, Ohio (AP) - Henry McGhee Jr. contends half of the 300 women he has trained in weightlifting could play high school football.

"If a girl had taken the proper weight training and wanted to play football, I'd encourage said the Canton YMCA's weightlifting coordinator, a star high school football player him-self in 1966.

"A girl with the same muscle mass as a boy will be as strong as a boy," said McGhee. "Her leg is even slightly stronger, pound for pound.

McGhee said his observations are drawn from experience and the findings of Jack Wilmore, a California physiologist.

Seven high school athletic directors were surveyed after a Dayton federal judge ruled girls could participate on boys' contact sports teams. Each director said he doubted girls could play football.

"Some of their remarks were emotional and unresearched," charged McGhee.

The YMCA official said, "Dr. Wilmore's findings say high school boys are at only 75 percent of their developmental po-tential. High school girls have reached about 100 percent of this potential.

"Because of the hormone testosterone, guys will eventually be larger. But in high school, girls are developed to the point that they could com-

pete in contact sports."

four years of play.


"My dad threw balls to me in the driveway," she told The Mini Page.





"It's crazy on the road," he told us.


"We often whip up things to eat in our room," he added.

With such a large family, the group "triples up a lot."


Japan is his favorite place to travel. He was in his first gig (show) there when he was 7.
