

The Farmer Who is Interested in the Raising of Cantaloupes Should Attend the Meeting Tomorrow at Court House

LAND AND CATTLE SALES

M. T. Howard Gets Top Price For Steers—J. C. Knorpp Sells Bar V Steers—Land Deals.

M. T. Howard this week established record prices locally on grass steers. He sold to John Dorr, of Des Moines, Iowa, 113 2-, 3- and 4-year-old steers at \$23, \$30 and \$35 with a 10 per cent cut. The stuff was delivered Wednesday and shipped out the same night. Mr. Dorr expressed his opinion of the cattle by saying it was the best bunch of steers he had seen in the Panhandle this season. Mr. Howard is a believer in the better class of range cattle and has been breeding up his herd for several years.

J. C. Knorpp was here Wednesday on his return from the meeting of the Texas Cattle Raiser's Association at Dallas. He reports having sold while there all of the Bar V steers from two up to Lewis & Molesworth of this city. The prices were \$19 for twos and \$23 for threes. These are New Mexico cattle and will be delivered in September when the purchasers will remove them to their pasture near Canyon City. Mr. Knorpp says the cowmen were having great times in Dallas. The Clarendon delegation were all sober and were

attending the big revival meetings as regularly as the convention sessions.

J. W. Knorpp, of Boydston, was here this week, and was feeling pretty good over the result of a bit of feeding he had indulged in this winter. He sold on the Ft. Worth market on the 14th inst., two cars of 5-year-old steers, averaging 1200 pounds, which netted him \$50 a head. The steers were fed 120 days on the plains near Boydston, the diet being principally crushed kaffir corn. Mr. Knorpp was entirely satisfied with his venture.

Wednesday J. C. Knorpp signed deeds for thirteen tracts of his ranch lands, situated in Donley, Gray and Armstrong counties. The tracts varied in size from 160 to 640 acres, the price ranging from \$8 to \$11 per acre.

Knorpp & Roeder, the real estate firm at Groom and Boydston, report having sold last week fifteen tracts of plains land in that section of the moral vineyard to fifteen different parties. The tracts ranged from 160 to 320 acres in size, and the price totaled the tidy sum of \$32,000, or a little better. The purchasers are northern men from Iowa and Nebraska, and all are actual settlers.

A VERY SAD OCCURRENCE

Child Given a Dose of Carbolic Acid Through Mistake, Resulting in Almost Instant Death.

A mistake in medicine bottles resulted in the death of the 5-day-old baby boy of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Montgomery Tuesday night at the residence of G. W. Smith, father of Mrs. Montgomery. The child was born last Friday and was a fine little fellow, giving every promise of developing into strong and healthy childhood. The attending physician had left some simple drops to be given the child for a slight kidney trouble, and on Tuesday night about ten o'clock one of the family in giving the medicine got hold of the wrong bottle and gave the infant a teaspoonful of pure carbolic acid. The result was almost instant death, the child dying before a physician could be summoned.

The accident is one of the saddest which has ever occurred in Clarendon, and the mother is prostrated with grief and in a very bad condition as a result. Mr. Montgomery, who was out at his farm at the time was sent for and got in at an early hour the next morning. The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community in their grief.

City Candidates, Take Notice.

In order to fully and authoritatively settle the question of how the names of candidates for municipal offices may get on the official ballots in April since no primary election has been decided upon, Attorney C. M. Chambers submitted the matter to the attorney general's department at Austin. The reply, in substance, is that where there are no nominations a candidate may get his name on the official ballot if a number of qualified voters equal to five per cent of the total number of votes cast in the last preceding general election ask by petition that the name appear. The petitions may be prepared at any time, the only requirement made by law being that reasonable time be allowed in which the ballots may be prepared by the printers. According to the new law, each man who signs a petition tacitly makes oath that he is a qualified voter in the election named, but does not by placing his name on such petition in any way obligate himself to support such candidate at the coming election. In order that the matter may be handled with a reasonable amount of trouble it is probable that a single petition will be prepared containing the names of all the candidates for city officers, before the matter is presented to the voters for approval.—Clarksville Times.

AS TO FIRE PROTECTION.

While Matters Have Been Unavoidably Delayed Business Section Will Soon be Protected.

The new fire mains of the water company were flushed out the first of the week and the water turned in permanently. Everything was found in good shape and Manager Gleason says he is now prepared to furnish plenty of water in case of a fire in the business district, although the system is not yet complete and will not be until the large reservoir is erected. The contract for the reservoir has been let to a Dallas concern, to be completed by April 15. The water company has installed a Standard Underwriters' five pump which is now in place and in working order.

Fire protection is now being delayed by the failure of the hose bought by the city to arrive. It has been shipped but seems to have been laid out somewhere on the road. The hook and ladder truck is here, and is said to be a good one. The receipt of the hose and hose cart will complete the apparatus.

Mr. Gleason says that by the 15th of April Clarendon will have as complete and satisfactory a system of fire protection as any other town of the same size in the state.

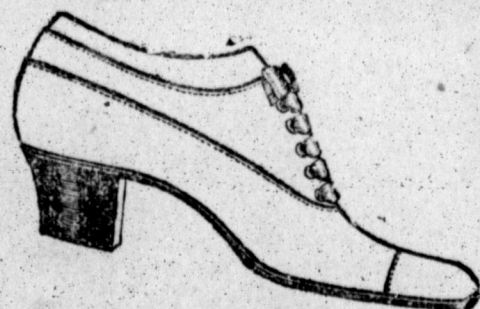

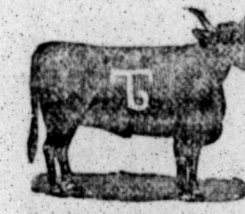
