resolution requesting commissioners to endorse his attendance of a session that will apparently be held in Austin for the purpose of discussing possible violations of the Legal Services Corporation charter by TRLA offices in the Rio Grande Valley, in addition to the Hereford area.

A delegation of TRLA attorneys and supporters rapidly questioned McPherson's participation in the meeting, and whether he was asking to attend at county expense.

McPherson responded that he would attend at his own

expense, but was requesting county backing of proposals to eliminate funding for TRLA offices, based on allegations that TRLA has violated the terms of its charter.

TRLA attorneys Bill Bear-

dall and Edward Tuddenham then became engaged in a running debate with Mc-Pherson over the purpose of the mysterious Austin session and other allegations against TRLA, after which a local delegation headed up by Rumaldo Garcia of Hereford presented approximately 1.000 signatures on petitions supporting the presence of the TRLA office here to the

county commission. Under questioning about the session he proposes to attend. McPherson reported that the session will be held before the Texas Advisory Council, and added that he had been invited to attend by the law firm of Fullbright and Jaworski.

TRLA supporters zeroed in ` on McPherson's comment that the session is being held. by the Texas Advisory Council.

"Who is the Texas Advisory Council? What do they stand for? For all we know they coudl be representing the Ku Klux Klan or the Nazi party. If the county commissioners are to be asked to participate in an activity on behalf of all the citizens in the county. they ought to be better informed on just what's going on. commented Tuddenham in remarks to McPherson.

"Has the county already decided to participate. Are you requesting the county to endorse you?" Beardall queried.


Beardall then charged that TRLA has not been consulted over any recent actions by the commission seeking to have funding for the agency done away with.

'Mr. Beardall, you didn't ask the county to participate in any way before your agency filed suit against us."

McPherson fired back. Tuddenham then remarked. "I don't think it's proper for the county to endorse your participation in the meeting without knowing

what the meeting is for." McPherson responded. "I think the meeting will inform us of possible violations of the Legal Services Corporation charter. I charge that TRLA has gone. out and recruited and has sought frivolous lawsuits. TRLA also continues to encourage cases on behalf of illegal aliens and that is not in keeping with the charter of your organization which is

Armour Meeting is Disrupted; Union Will Decide Tomorrow

Members of the United Food and Commercial Workers union employed at the Armour Foods Hereford plant will "have it out," as one union member put it. during a closed union session Wednesday to determine if there is sufficient interest between the union and Armour Foods to renegotiate a contract to keep Armour's beef slaughtering plant/here

That development comes in the wake of an information meeting that almost wasn't Sunday afternoon at the Bull

Sunday's session was. called to give union and prospective union members an opportunity to express their opinion on the status of the announced shutdown of Armour's plant here and their views on the possibility of renegotiating a contract with the Phoenix-based

The afternoones ion was brief. frequently disrupted, and revealed only the dissatisfaction of union members with the way things

of Armour for 14 years, took the floor during a question and answer period and commented: "I feel like we're just wasting our time. The Chamber of Commerce in Memphis Tennessee did the same thing the chamber here is doing and it didn't change a thing: The best thing that can happen is for

Albert Garza, a seven-vear member of the UFCW. pleaded with Armour employees for reason in attempting to resolve the issue of a wage scale relative. to the Hereford Armour

"If we don't try to act reasonably we can't accomplish anything. We have to get together and discuss this thing so that the union can do something for us," claimed

Garza then became involved in a running debate with Paul Dennett, president of the local UFCW, concerning the role of the union here and Armour's interest in the fate of the local plant." oil operations.

"This whole business is between Armour and the Union. The city shouldn't be involved. They didn't give a damn about Armour until they found out how important we were, until it hit them in the pocketbook." charged

Garza countered, "We are all union members and we have a right to be protected by the union. Shouldn't the union try and help us if we want to keep the plant open

Reed again became involved in the conversation, asking questions of Jesse Alaniz, a 20-year employee with Armour who worked at a -San Angelo plant that was -closed down by the firm.

Alaniz maintained that the local plant will be closed down despite what is done locally to keep it open.

"Are you saying that the union did everything it could in San Angelo to help the Armour plant there stay open, and that the company still closed it anyway?" asked

"That's right." Alaniz answered, adding, "If you want to put up \$2 million of your own money here you can save the Hereford plant. otherwise it's gone.

World Oil Cartel Displays Signs of Split Over Prices

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) -Iran and Iraq got into a shouting match at the OPEC meeting during the night, Qatar stalked off and Saudi Arabia stayed away, another sign the world oil cartel is so badly split it won't be able to compromise on a uniform

But conference sources said even without a .compromise that prices would stay about the same for the rest of 1980.

The sources said during the session Monday night that Iranian Oil Minister Ali Akhbar Moinfar accused Iraq and Saudi Arabia of "serving American imperialism by raising production rates."

They said Iraqi Oil Minister Tayeh Abdel-Karim shouted back that Iraq was the first power in the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries to nationalize Western-owned

The sources said Saudi Arabia's minister did not even attend and Qatar's walked out of the hall in the middle of the session. However, all 13 ministers are to meet today to take up the pricing issue in detail.

Iraq has proposed that all OPEC nations charge \$32 a barrel for their oil. Under the proposal, OPEC hawks including Iran - would have to drop present prices by \$3 a barrel, middle-of-the-roaders would raise theirs \$2 and Saudi Arabia, which produces one-third of all OPEC oil, would increase

prices \$4. But Moinfar said "there was no way" Iran would decrease prices, that he was "sure" there would be no agreement and that along with Algeria, Libya and Nigeria, Iran will continue to sell oil for as much as it can get for it.

Iraq and Iran are at ideological odds and recently, have engaged in sporadic fighting along their shared border. Iran accuses Iraq of being a stooge of the United States.

For different reasons than Iran, Saudi Oil Minister Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani is resisting the Iraqi plan. which would raise the world's oil bill and boost U.S. gasoline and heating oil costs more than 7 cents a gallon.

Yamani told reporters he was "very pessimistic" the pricing-structuring plan would succeed. The Saudis oppose the plan in hopes that a slackening demand on world oil markets will force other OPEC nations to charge less for their oil later this year, conference sources said.

Yamani recently predicted oil prices will collapse by fall because of reduced demand caused in part by the U.S. recession.

Members of the 20-yearold organization have not been able to agree on a uniform pricing policy since February, 1979. Several previous efforts to restore uniformity have failed, most recently at the organization's meeting last December in Caracas, Venezuela.

MIAMI (AP) - President Carter says he did to Sotice the rocks and bottles tossed at his motorcade by a jeering crowd, but the mayor of this racially torn city is worried that the incident could spoil any benefits of the president's visit to a riotscarred neighborhood.

It was one of the most violent encounters in Carter's presidency.

One photographer was hit with a bottle, but no one was reported hurt - or arrested when 600 people scrambled for safety late Monday as the motorcade was bombarded. Carter had waved to the crowd, at which point the crowd began booing

the rocks and bottles came, Carter ducked into his car and sped off. Dade Metro Police Cmdr.

Douglas Hughes said "a few kids at the back of the crowd" had thrown the debris. The incident, which

followed demonstrations by blacks and Cuban exiles, occurred as Carter left a meeting with black leaders in Liberty City, the neighborhood burned and looted last month in racial riots that claimed 16 lives. Police in riot gear cleared the block and the only damages were broken reported windows another

and shouting insults. When motorcade vehicle. Carter's car was nicked by a beer "I think the bottle-

throwing incident is a natural expression of people who are frustrated," said Mayor Maurice Ferre. "Most of the crowd wasn't involved...I don't think they were throwing bottles at Jimmy Carter, but at the presidency. This is a continuation of the other - it is an expression."

Ferre said he feared "this one little incident that took five seconds" would detract from Carter's attempt to soothe raw nerves in the black and Cuban communities with promises of jobs, justice and compassion.

AMARILLO, Texas (Ap) - One woman said her house swayed, but no damage or injuries were reported from a small earthquake that rumbled through the Texas Panhandle and

western Oklahoma Monday evening. The U.S. Geological Survey's Earthquake Inforamtion Center in Golden, Colo., said the 5:37 p.m. CDT tremor registered 3.6 on the Richter

The National Weather Service here said the quake, which lasted only a few seconds, was felt 70 to 80 miles from the epicenter in the Miami area of the eastern Panhandle.

It shook parts of Gary, Hudson, Carson and Potter counties," a NWS spokesman said.

KERMIT, Texas (Ap) . The West Texas sinkhole, apparently satisfied with a 50-foot by 8-foot chunk of earth it had for breakfast Monday, was quiet

CWA Strike Will End

SAN ANGELO, Texas (Ap) -Communications Workers of America pickets will end Wednesday, and strikers will start returning to work at General Telephone Sunday.

The strike termination, announced jointly by representatives for the Union and General Telephone Co. of the Southwest Monday, came after negotiators reached a tenetative settlement in the three-week strike.

Union spokesmen said the strike will end at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday. Members will receive ratification ballots in the mail, and CWA officials said they expected the vote to take two or three weeks.

Workers will be called back by seniority beginning Sunday, and by June 30, all workers should be back on the job, the spokesmen said.

Commissioner Vincent Guy of the Federal Mediation Service announced about 3:30 a.m. Monday that the two sides had reached a settlement.

Pryor Given

1 in 3 Chance

SHERMAN OAKS, Calif. (AP) Comedian Richard Pryor, burned over 50 percent of his body when a cigarette lighter exploded, remained in critical condition early today with only a one-in-three chance of surviving, a hospital spokesman said.

Only 33 percent of third-degree burn victims injured as severely as Pryor recover, according to physicians treating the celebrity at Sherman Oaks Community Hospital.

Prvor, 39, was severely burned over his chest, back, face and arms, Grossman said.

Sgt. Hal DeJong of the Los Angeles Police Devonshire Division said officers were called to Pryor'shome in Northridge when the accident occurred and were told he had run screaming from the house when his clothes caught fire.

Beardall responded that the issue should be allowed to be resolved in the courts and Tuddenham then stated. "I would arge the county to be very careful about going on record in support of any meeting without knowing more about who is behind the meeting. The county should be very careful in who and what it endorses. . .

TRLA supporters expressed concern over efforts to cut off funding for an agency whose primary purpose is to represent those who cannot afford private attorneys in civil matters.

"If there is concern over TRLA's violating the charter of the Legal Services Corporation, there is a forum in which it can be Beeided before an unbiased judge

stated Beardall. County Judge Glen Nelson eventually intervened in the debate between the TRLA attorneys and McPherson and asked a series of questions of his own.

Speaking to Beardall he stated. "Do you feel TRLA has exceeded its authority in Deaf Smith County? Who tells you what action to take?

Beardall replied, "We represent clients in essentially the same manner as regular private attorneys and explain the alternatives open to them. It is up to the client as to what line of action we

Nelson: "There have been charges TRLA has solicited. clients in the Deaf Smith County Jail.

Beardall: "There have been instances where clients we have been representing have been in jail and we have met with them there if the . need arose

Nelson: "I believe you'll recall that when your office opened here. I was there and spoke with you then, stating that I felt both your purpose and our own was to see that: fair and equal justice is administered. But when these rumors come around about your soliciting eases here. I have some doubts."

Beardall: "L don't think there have been any instances where we have advised people criminally. We have assisted in getting. them referrals to criminal

attorneys. Nelson: "Some of these accusations have been made in an attempt to determine if TRLA has actually violated its charter.

Beardall: "If you have information indicating that we (TRLA) violated our charter. I would encourage you to pursue it. As long as there is full disclosure of information to the public concerning the purpose of organizations and the identity of the agencies holding meetings in that regard. If you have complaints over alleged violations of regulations by TRLA I urge commission members to come around to our office here. As a matter of courtesy I would encourage you to

invite any of us to either public or private meetings with you to discuss such matters."

Nelson: "That's the way it ought to be done, but we don't seem to have had the opportunity to meet beforehand with TRLA before you filed suit against the county.

Beardall: "That's left up to

the discretion of our clients. whether there are any negotiations. It is our responsibility to outline their alternatives to them. I urge the county to allow the legally established process to deal. with the issues, rather than to take action which would deprive those who are entitled to legal representation of their right to be heard

Following the exchanges between McPherson, Judge Nelson and the TRLA spokesmen. Commissioner Bruce Coleman moved to table the issue of endorsing McPherson's participation in the Austin session over continued funding for TRLA.

Bryant Claims Gain

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas, said Monday he had a "significant net gain" of votes for speaker as a result of the Democratic run-off primaries for the Texas

House on Saturday. He termed the results of the 14 run-offs a "major setback" for Speaker Bill Clayton and for Rep. Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth, the

leading conservative candidate to succeed Clayton if Clayton drops out of the speaker's race,

"I had a significant net gain in terms of certain votes next January while Mr. Lewis sustained a noticeable net loss of votes, including those of three incumbents who were defeated," Bryant

County-Commissioners voted to award a contract to R.W. Taylor

Consruction Co. for the installation of a sewer system at the San Jose Labor camp south of Hereford.

The firm submitted the low bid of just over \$276,000 at the commission's previous meeting and the commissioners had to seek the express approval of EDA and HUD before making the award.

Word of approval from those two agencies was received Monday, and the action of the commission will set the actual construction process in motion.

Commissioners also granted Warner Lawson and Jake Diel permission to install 500 feet of curb and gutter on a property line on Progressive Road at owner expense.

In another matter relative to the San Jose community, commissioners voted approval of a Community Action Corporation Self-Help Grant for San Jose, which will involve weatherization and rehabilitation work on residences at the

labor camp. -Roy Rogers of the Panhandle Community Action agency appeared before the commission to explain the ramifications of the program, pointing out that PCA will handle the funding for such projects for the San Jose area in the event that a grant is approved.

"People would do the work themselves under supervision" on the houses we feel could be brought up to standard by this program. The PCA is willing to supervise if the residents are willing to do the work." Rogers stated.

Rogers reported that there are 210 families at San Jose and that approximately 52 families' would be eligible for the self-help program.

He estimated an average of \$2,000 per house in rehabilitation expenses. . "Even if we don't get a grant we'll try to do weatherization

on some of the houses at San Jose," stated Rogers. Monday's action concerning the self-help program marked the latest in a long string of actions by the county commission over the past two years aimed at improving living conditions

in the San Jose community. Foremost among the efforts has been the installation of a \$600,000 water system at San Jose through grants obtained for the project, and the sewer system, to be constructed with grant funds obtained through the efforts of the county

commission and other groups. In a period of discussion on seal coating and paving of county roads. Commissioner Bruce Coleman moved that the precincts divide revenue sharing transportation funds

amounting to \$187,000. The motion, which was approved, gave each precinct

approximately \$46,000 for seal coating and road work. In subsequent actions, the commissioners approved seal coating of six miles of roadway in Precincts 2 and 3, and four miles of seal coating plus road work in Precinct 1, all to be

paid for out of those same revenue sharing funds. Precinct 4 Commissioner James Voyles reported that he is from Page-1

still assessing the areas in need of seal coating in his precinct, and will make his request for an appropriation at a subsequent commission meeting.

In other matters relative to revenue sharing and other areas of the budget commissioners heard a request from Mike Moon of the Hereford Family Services Center for continued financial support for that agency through revenue sharing, and a report from County Extension Agent Juston McBride on the condition of the pickup used by his office and a request for consideration of adding the purchase of a new pickup to the budget for the Extension office.

Sherry Hoover reported on the selection of Bill McCarley as a new member of the county child welfare board, to replace Lewis Montano, who resigned.

Mrs. Hoover also reported on various activities of the board.

Commissioners approved Mrs. Hoover's recommendation concerning the new board member.

Q. I bought one of the first 1980 Ford Mustangs out last fall and it has never produced the mileage projected on the sticker. in fact, I barely get the estimated MPG for in town when I take it on the highway. Are there any adjustments I can make to improve the mileage?

A. Gas mileage performance figures posted by manufacturers are estimates attained in the laboratory under ideal conditions. Weather and road conditions and driving practices affect fuel consumption, as well as mechanical conditions. Excessive speed, prolonged warm-up and jackrabbit starts and stops waste fuel lots of it! To find mechanica problems, look first for fue eaks around fittings and gaskets if necessary. Then check the air cleaner. A restricted filter blocks air, forcing the engine to run on an unnecessarily rich mixture. Replace dirty filter.

Those hot flashes

DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm a 67-year-old female and for years, ever since my menopause, I've been getting these terrible sweats. My whole upper torso from my head down to my waist is drenched with sweat. Sometimes these occur every hour. It's very uncomfortable and my clothes get soaking wet. I have friends with the same problem, too, and our doctors can't help us. Will you?

DEAR READER - I wish I could help but it's difficult to treat this problem. Anyone who continues to have such a disorder certainly should have a medical examination. Hot flashes with sweats associated with the menopause phase of life really shouldn't last more than a couple of years at the

I'm afraid the general understanding of this problem is limited. There is some new information, however, that suggests that these attacks are associated with some abnormal function of the thermostat in your brain that regulates your body temperature. Whenever your body needs to be cooled, there is a whole heat-loss mechanism that is turned on that causes increased circulation to the skin and sweating. This area is located very close to the pituitary gland in the floor of the brain that's associated with your hormone system. Apparently that's why the whole mechanism gets out of whack at the menopause time. Some doctors are now test-

ing the use of progesterone,

the other common female hormone besides estrogen, to see if it can help control these.

There's also some evidence that these are associated with the release of adrenaline. That can be associated with stress or perhaps other factors. For this reason, some doctors are now treating such disorders with Inderal. Normally this medicine is used for high blood pressure and irregular heartbeats and a

variety of other disorders. You might ask your doctor about this. If he's willing, he might want to try you on Inderal and see if that will relieve your problem for you. Inderal is not a medicine that everyone can take, but it just could be the answer to some women's problems with recurrent episodes of hot flashes and sweating. You can take my column along to your doctor. He won't mind.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I'm going on a weekend fishing trip where females will be present. I'm afraid of cancer. If it so happens that we do have sex and one may have a trace or more, even of skin cancer, would I catch it? I'm a good working taxpayer, fair and square with everyone. They've asked me to go and I want to but I need some reassurance about this point. DEAR READER - It's not

possible for me to tell you exactly what you might or might not catch, fish or otherwise. But one of the things you won't catch is cancer. There is no evidence that physical con-

jog or not. Whether jogging will affect your breasts or not may depend a lot on your degree of development. In any case, I think a woman who wants to avoid sagging breasts should wear a brassiere that provides adequate support. Definitely she should wear it when jogging and she should also wear it when she's not jogging. The brassiere will

help to prevent stretching.

I don't know of any evidence that shows that jogging will cause a woman's uterus to drop or in any other way damage the uterus.

You've probably lost some weight from the upper part of the body because you may have eliminated some body fat. At the same time, you may have improved the tone of the muscles in your legs and lower part of your body

that must support your body weight while you're jogging. Since you're interested in jogging, I presume that you may be interested in knowing how it affects the heart and circulation. Therefore, I'm sending you The Health Letter

Also, if the muscles underneath the breast are developed, even a small breast will appear larger and result in a more attractive figure. So if your goal is to improve your bustline, you might consider an overall exercise program that is related to developing all the muscles of your body and helps you maintain an optimal posture.

DEAR POLLY - Last fall I bought a statue of a horse in Mexico. It seems to be made of a light-weight wood and must have termites, because when I dust it there is always some sawdust on the horse's back and small holes in it. Do you know how it can be treated? It's so beautiful and I hate to think of it being ruined. -

DEAR LORI - Do move your statue off the table it is on or the wood in the table may be attacked, too. I think you need to first determine whether or not the piece is really wood - you seemed to have some doubts.

Do take it to a pest control company so they can determine what is eating on it. It might be some other wood-boring insect, but they can do the proper spraying and advise you. Termites work from the inside out and is often not visible on the outside until a piece is ready to collapse. - POLLY

DEAR POLLY - I am answering D.J. who wants to remove paint spots from polyester pants. I am an artist and often get oil or acrylic paint spots on my good clothes. I find rubbing a cream hand cleaner into the paint and letting it stay overnight and then washing as usual does the trick. I bought such a cleaner at the hardware store. COUNTRY PEACH KUCHEN

6 peaches 2 T. lemon juice 2 1/2 C. flour (divided)

1/3 C. sugar 2 tsp. baking powder 2 eggs

2 T. milk 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1/4 C. melted butter 1/2 C. brown sugar

2 T. melted butter 1 egg yolk 3 T. milk

Peel and slice peaches; sprinkle with lemon juice and set aside. Sift 1 1/2 cups flour, sugar, and baking powder. In a mixing bowl, beat eggs and 2 tablespoons milk. Add flour mixture, vanilla and melted butter. Stir with fork until smooth. Spread batter in a buttered, 9-inch round baking dish. Arrange peach slices on batter. Make streusel-type topping by combining brown sugar, 1 cup flour and 2 tablespoons butter. Sprinkle over peaches. Bake at 400 degrees F. for 25 minutes. Combine egg yolk and 3 tablespoons milk; pour over peaches and bake 10 minutes longer. Serve kuchen warm. Good with whipped cream or ice
