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Dentist Urges Fight over Water Standards

Hereford's drinking water is beneficial to teeth ad bones and government insinuations to the contrary are "a tremendous joke," a dentist told the Hereford City Commission Monday

Dentist H.A. "Hap" Cavness urged commissioners to fight the federal Environmental Protection Agency in its effort to reduce the fluoride content in

EPA has ordered the City of Hereford to warn its citizens in the local newspaper and on the radio that the amount of fluoride in drinking water exceeds federal standards, which permit 1.8 milligrams of the mineral per litre. Hereford's water contains 2.4 milligrams of fluoride.

"I've talked to practically all the local physicians and dentists in town, and we've found that only a very small percentage of people will have fluorosis because of the water," Cavness said.

"L believe the American Medical

Association and American Dental Association would be very violently opposed to this sort of thing. I believe I can get some help from some very fine people other than just local folks." Cavness said studies dating back to 1932 have proved that Hereford residents have healthier teeth and gums than people living in most other cities. He said the studies attributed that fact to the amount of fluoride in the water.

"These standards are all a tremendous joke," Cavness told the commission. "For one thing, these darling people have different standards. Certain parts of the country are allowed 1.2 parts per litre, certains parts are allowed 1.6 and

we're allowed 1.8" City Manager Dudley Bayne said it might cost the city millions of dollars to reduce the fluoride.

"Once you remove your fluoride, you have what is now classified as hazardous waste. You'd have to spend a million dollars to set up equipment to remove and dispose of the waste," Bayne said.

He stated that the city would apply for a three-year variance which would postpone the fluoride removal.

"What happens if we don't get the variance?" Commissioner Emory Brownlow asked.

"They'll make us comply." Bayne

Bergland Says Farmers' Debts

Not Bad Compared to Assets

WASHINGTON (AP) - As many other public officials have done over the years, Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland sometimes mentions only partial

statistics in talking about farmers. A condensed version of a Bergland speech issued Monday by the Agriculture Department's Office of Governmental and Public Affairs included a remark about farm debt and how it is continuing

But the gist of Bergland's statement was that farm debt is not so bad when it is compared with the huge dollar assets that farmers have built up in land and other investments.

The total debt of farmers will climb to around \$135.9 billion on Jan. 1, Bergland

"While this is a \$17 billion increase over last year, when debts are compared to farm assets, the ratio is only 1 percent higher than it was 10 years ago, and it is still less than half that of a small urban businessman," he said.

Bergland's remarks were for a meeting here of the Farm Credit Administration, an independent federal agency that versees federal land banks and other

Longtime Nurse Dies in Hereford



Kids Are Reason for His United Way Involvement

Lynton Allred has supported and worked on the United Way campaign for years for the same reason he served on the Hereford school board--kids.

Allred this year has served as United Way campaign steering committee co-chairman.

"The agencies within a United Way make a community a much better place to live," said Allred, who owns Allred Oil Co. in Hereford.

"The agencies within a United Way each serve a unique function within a community. USDA Undersecretary To Be Appointed

WASHINGTON (AP) - A "new" old job title is coming back to the Agriculture Department, that of under secretary of - agriculture.

President Carter announced Monday he will nominate Dale E. Hathaway. assistant secretary of agriculture, to the new position of under secretary for international and commodity programs.

Hathaway, as an assistant secretary, has been in charge of those functions since early in the Carter administration.

But Congress, when it passed an agricultural trade expansion bill this year, included a provision that sets up the job of under secretary.

No one seems quite sure why there is such a chair game going on in USDA, but there has been speculation for some time that with Hathaway is under secretary it will give the department an open title of assistant secretary.

The oddsmakers say that once Hathaway is confirmed in his new post, the vacant title will go to Howard W. Hjort, who is the department's senior

Meanwhile, the job of deputy secretary the No. 2 post in USDA - has been vacant since John White resigned last January to become chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

If Hathaway is approved by the Senate as under secretary - which used to be the No. 2 post before the deputy title was used - he would have the No. 3 job in the department's hierarchy.

Ms. Feinstein, acting mayor since Moscone's death, was elected 6-2 by members of the Board of Supervisors. She pledged to work for the "emotional reconstruction" of her city and respond to San Francisco's "many divergent lifestyles."

Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk were shot to death at City Hall Nov. 27. Former Supervisor Dan White, 32, is charged with their murders. The deaths followed by a week the cult suicide-murders of more than 900 Peoples Temple members in Guyana many of whom were once San Francisco residents.

As president of the Board of Supervisors, Ms. Feinstein automatically assumed the mayor's powers after his death. Moscone had defeated her in her most recent bid for the mayoralty in 1975. She also sought the office in 1971.

Fire Kills Family In Houston Home

HOUSTON (AP) - A candle started Houston's second deadliest blaze ever in which nine persons, six of them children, lost their lives.

The fire swept through a small frame house in northwest Houston Monday morning after one of several candles being used for heat accidentally ignited a couch, arson investigator J.L. Scott said Monday.

Police said all of the dead were related. They were identified by officers as Gloria Boyd, 29; Carolyn Fay Boyd, 28; Carl Boyd, 22; Paula Boyd, 10; Charles Boyd, 9; Daniel Boyd, 7; Shante Boyd, 4; Kimberly Boyd, 3; and Willie Boyd, 2.

Five others who escaped were Ernest Ray Solomon, 19; Merelend Boyd 21; Linda Faye Byrd, 18; Matita Boyd, 10; and Earl Boyd, 10.

Miss Byrd said Paula, Kimberly and Shante were Gloria Boyd's daughters. Charles and Daniel were sons of Anne Boyd, who was not at the house at the time of the fire, she said.

She said Willie was Merelend's son. One Carolyn's sons, Daniel, died with her and the second. Earl, survived, as did Matita, Carolyn's daughter.

Earlier, investigators thought the fire was caused by a makeshift connection using an automobile radiator hose to link a natural gas line with the house.

Man To Be Tried For Cult Killings

GEORGETOWN, Guyana (AP) Prosecutor Carlton Withers says Charles Beikman of the Peoples Temple killed Sharon Amos, a woman official of the cult, at her request after holding her three children while she cut their throats.

"He at least assisted by holding the hair of the children as Mrs. Amos cut their throats, then he killed the woman herself," Weithers told a reporter during a recess in a preliminary hearing to determine whether Beikman, 43, will be tried on murder charges. "The doctor will say the cut severed her jugular vein and windpipe and she couldn't have done it

"Stefany Jones, 9, a niece of Mrs. Amos, entered the bathroom while the murders were being carried out and western Public Service Com-Beikman tried to cut her throat. Weither said testimony from residents of the Peoples Temple headquarters in Georgetown indicated that Beikman went into the second-floor bedroom with Mrs. Amos, the cult's 42-year-old public relations director, and her three children, Martin, 8, Christa, 11, and Leanne, 22.

The bodies of the four Amoses were found in a pool of blood on Nov. 18 not long after Jones and more than 900 members of the cult died in a combined service of 5,535 murder-suicide ritual at Jonestown, their religious commune 50 miles northwest of Georgetown.

comparatively recent innovation in our nation. Originally, all of our schools were "church schools". In the years since, private

education has phased out in favor of tax-supported public education. Yet many parents-while continuing to pay taxes for the support of public schools-elect to pay extra to keep their own children in private or "church" schools.

Today, public education versus Christian education is a conspicuous mismatch.

Academically, Stanford achievement test scores show Christian students seven to 13 months ahead in reading; eighth
