### WILL USE A STEAM PLOW.

T. S. Bugbee Will Break and Plant Land in Big Blocks this Year, Using New Methods.

Thomas S. Bugbee, of this city, returned the latter part of last week from Dallas where he had been to buy some new farm machinery. Among his purchases were twelve steam disc plows. These plows are of the latest and best makes, and are in gangs of three. They will be pulled by a steam traction engine, and their owner thinks he will also be able to pull a seeder at the same time, following the plows with the planter and thus killing a whole gamebag full of birds with a couple of stones. The plows in old land will turn a strip of land 12 feet wide on each trip it is sent across the field. In sod land the average will be a little less and ten feet will likely be the limit. The capacity is about 40 acres a day.

Mr. Bugbee, besides being president of the Panhandle Stockmen's Association and a large land and cattle owner, is also perhaps the biggest farmer in the Panhandle. He has always held that farming and stock raising go hand in hand and that the cowman should raise his own feed, and thus be able to keep his cattle through the winter in the best shape at a minimum of cost. Last year he cultivated 1500 acres, while this year he hopes to put in not less than 3500 acres, the crop being mostly kaffir corn.

The new steam plowing outfit will be used principally at the upper ranch in Armstrong county.

## AMENDMENTS

Three Constitutional Amendments to be Voted on at the General Election in November.

There will be three constitutional amendments submitted to the voters of Texas at the next general election in November. The first has for its purpose the exemption from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes; the second provides for the levying of a tax not to exceed 25 cents on the first valuation to pay jurors; the third provides for the increase of salaries of members of the legislature in the following manner:

"Section 20. The members of the legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding \$1,000 for the year succeeding their election, payable in equal installments on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and \$5 per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed 5 cents per mile; the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads and water routes, and the comptroller of the state shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid, but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this state, and any member violating the provisions of this act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or for any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded to the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons, firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this state. Any member of the legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this article."

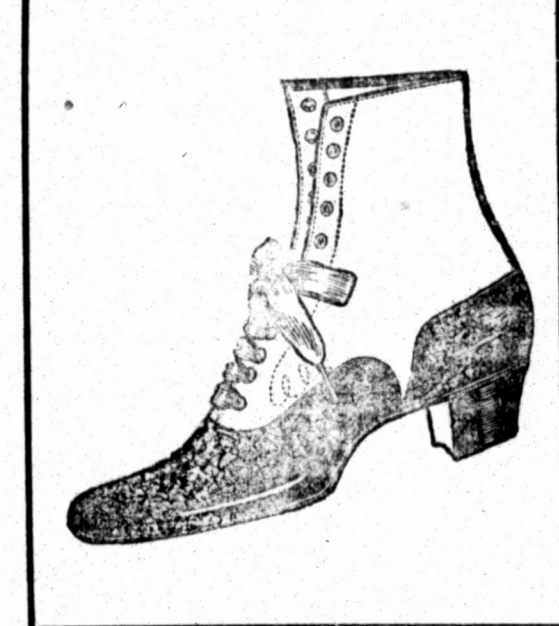
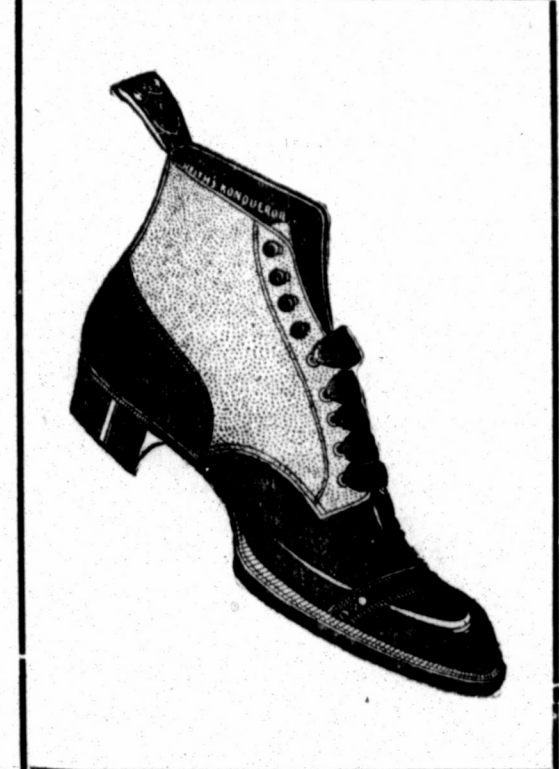

DONLEY county farmers should plant one million locust trees this spring. Planting time is right now and up to the first of May. Trees are cheap; fence posts are high. A big locust grove will prove one of the biggest assets of the farm in a few years. Why neglect it?

## The Pest House.

A petition signed by 25 or 30 citizens was yesterday presented to the commissioners court asking that the county pest house be removed from its present location to some place more remote from habitation. Really, the pest house, although it is seldom if ever used, is too close to town, but as one of the commissioners remarked to the editor yesterday, the court's hands are virtually tied in the matter, as they have been trying for three years to buy a piece of land further out on which to locate the house, being so far unsuccessful in their efforts, as no one seems willing to sell land for that purpose. This gentleman remarked that if the signers of the petition, or any one of them, would find a location for the pest house the court would take great pleasure in buying the land and moving the house instantaneously. A fair proposition, under the circumstances.

## A Merited Appointment.

Judge Geo. F. Morgan, of this city, long known as one of the leading Masonic lights of the state, this week received a merited recognition of his services in the cause of Masonry in the shape of appointment to the place of "Representative of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee near the Grand Lodge of Texas," to succeed B. ## A Sad Death.

Miss Nora Lane, daughter of V. R. Lane, of this city, died at the family residence at 5:15 o'clock yesterday morning. The death was sudden and altogether unexpected, although the young lady had undergone a very serious surgical operation a few days before.

Miss Nora was taken ill last Friday evening, and the attending physician immediately pronounced the trouble appendicitis in a bad form. An operation was immediately arranged for and was performed on Saturday afternoon. The operation was a success in every respect, the patient coming out of it with every indication of a rapid recovery. The usual bad symptoms following this operation were not in evidence in any degree, and on Wednesday morning it was announced that the patient was doing nicely and would recover. A turn for the worse took place that same day, however, and in spite of all that medical science could do the young lady died at the hour above stated.

To the bereaved father, sisters and other relatives the Banner-Stockman tenders a sincere sympathy, in which we will be joined by the entire town.

## As to Sugar Beets.

The article in last week's Banner-Stockman relative to the cultivation of sugar beets in this county and the offer of Banker W. H. Patrick to supply seed for experimental growing, has attracted considerable notice and already a number of farmers have made application to Mr. Patrick for some of the seed. General Freight Agent W. F. Sterley, of the Denver Road, also took cognizance of the article and writes that he has had this matter in mind for some time and has had some correspondence with the Department of Agriculture on the subject. He says the Department is anxious to have experiments made in this section and will furnish seed and instructions to any reliable farmer who will undertake the cultivation of a small acreage. We are therefore instructed to say that any farmer who will promise to make the experiment under the instructions of the Department can obtain the seed by making application, either to the Banner-Stockman office, W. H. Patrick at the First National Bank, or to Local Agent E. E. Baldwin.

It is almost certain that sugar beets will do well here, and if so a big industry can be opened up. We trust that a large number of farmers in the county will respond to this request.

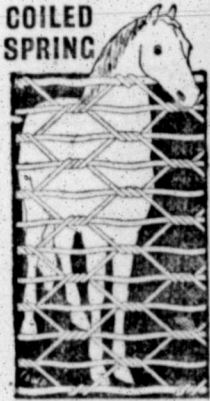

The fifth month of the public school closed last Friday. So far the work of the school has not been hindered by contagious diseases, or inclement weather. The record of attendance was never better. The enrollment for the month was 367; the average number present each day was 336. The enrollment for the term will exceed 450.

Nearly every room in the building had a postoffice in it on Wednesday. Valentines were numerous and much enjoyed by the pupils.

Mrs. Crawford visited Miss Stout's room Tuesday. Irene Fryar is a new pupil in Miss Lide's room, and Clyde Fryar in Miss Steven's room.

The public school with its splendid record does not please everybody, but it comes so near it that fault finders are few.

The pupils of the tenth grade physics class have been giving some impressive demonstrations in magnetism and electricity lately with home made apparatus.

Prof. Willis has been suffering from an attack of grip this week but has managed to meet his classes at school.

The pupils of the public school expect to give a San Jacinto entertainment on Friday evening, April 20, for the benefit of the library.

The public school library was opened for use for the first time Friday. Over half the books were taken out by the children eager to read them. This occurrence, it seems, needs very little comment to convince parents of the necessity of furnishing their children with good books to read.

The superintendent of the public school solicits donations of good books suitable for children and young people to read. Such books will be placed in the library with names of the donors in them for the use of the school. About one hundred standard books have been ordered for the library and will arrive soon but we need at least three or four hundred more. We ask every interested citizen to assist us in establishing a library for the public school.

Among the pupils of the school there are eight organized literary societies. Some of these are very much in earnest and good results are obtained.

**Commissioners Court.**

The county commissioners have been in session all week, and the usual heavy business of the February term is on hand to confront them. 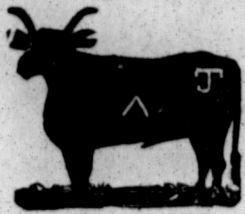

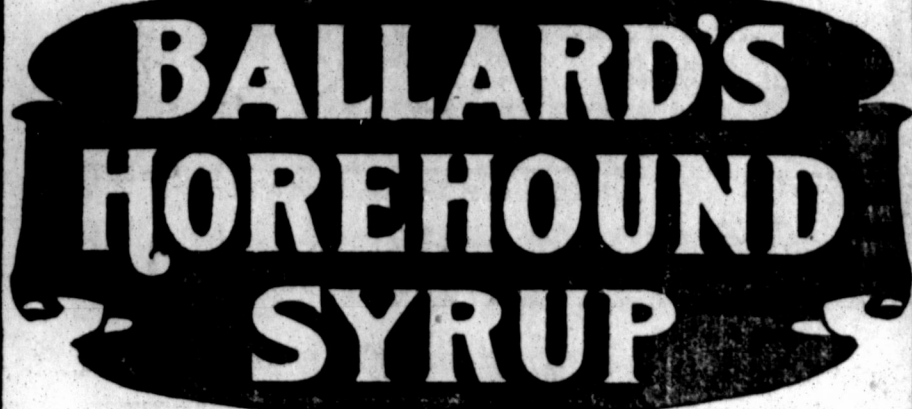
