NEW FEED GRINDING PLANT.

A Long Felt Want to be Supplied the **Farmers of Donley County This** Fall and Winter.

Clarendon has long needed a first-class feed grinding plant to take care of the enormous crops of feed raised in the county. Several attempts have been made to fill this want but they have all proved to be on too small a scale to meet the emergency and the farmers have suffered as a consequence. The Banner-Stockman is glad to announce that this state of affairs is to be brought to a close this fall and that a plant of sufficient capacity is to be put in by the Cold Storage Power Co., of which concern James Trent is the head. Jim Trent never does things by halves, so when we say he is to look after the feed grinding of the county this fall it means that every farmer who has feed to crush can have it done, and done right on short notice.

Mr. Trent will add the equipment to his cold storage plant in plenty of time to catch the earliest orders. He will put in a crusher which will handle any kind of feed, be it threshed kaffir, shelled corn, kaffir in the head or corn in the shuck. Another good feature of the business will be that he will grind for the public on demand when as much as a half day's work is offered, and will take in payment for the service either cash or toll. This toll taking is a good proposition for the farmer. It enables him to have his crop put in saleable shape without any cash outlay. Mr. Trent can well afford to do this because he is a cattle feeder and buys large quantities of feed each year and the toll is the same as money to him. Speaking of so think those who are sick. 



We believe that where the farmer desires to keep a good-sized flock of hens and to raise yearly in excess of 100 chicks the incubator should be used. But we realize the fact that on millions of our farms just enough fowls are kept to consume the scraps from the table.

The hens for setting purposes must come from some of the breeds that have not had the maternity instinct bred out of them. We would not think of selecting any of the Leghorn breeds for sitters. Probably there is no breed that produces better sitters than the Plymouth Rocks. But in sedeath. We have found the lighter wanted. weights to give most excellent satisfaction. While they cannot cover so many eggs as the larger fowls they will bring more chicks to maturity.

Frequent Sprayings.

The novice in spraying cannot afford to be so careless about his sprayings that he will miss the end for which he is working. Neither should he try to get along with the fewest possible number of sprayings. The best sprayers have indeed reduced the number to the minimum, but they are experienced men that have learned to make every spraying count for the most possible.
